REPORTS OF DISTRICT PRISONS.

New York, October 3, 1912.

Hon. PATRICK A. WHITNEY, Commissioner:

Dear Sir—I respectfully transmit herewith a quarterly report of improvements and other work done at District Prisons for the three months ending September 30, 1912.

At Second District Prison a number of extensive repairs to boilers and general overhauling of the entire steam heating plant have been practically completed and the plant put in first-class serviceable condition. General overhauling of the entire plumbing system was done by staff and the material thereto was furnished by the Department. A great deal of carpenter repairs was also done by staff, the stoop in yard has been replaced with a new one, the windows of engine room and kitchen have also been repaired and placed in good condition.

At Fourth District Prison extensive repairs to plumbing was done by staff, new windows in cells have been adjusted wherever necessary, glazing and other repairs to windows and storm door and to the prison in general were done by prison labor.

At Fifth District Prison the installation of a new water back to Boynton & Richardson kitchen range, "Perfect, No. 114," were done by paid labor, also new circulation pipe to connect range and boiler was installed. The house sewer, which has been obstructed has been cleared and the overflow in yard and cellar was practically cleared. All this work was done by paid labor.

At Sixth District Prison repaired and placed in good serviceable condition the prison cell locks; also renovation of the entire prison room.

At Seventh District Prison considerable work was done in plumbing repairs, material thereto was furnished by the Department and the work done by staff. The lock on front gate, ten-day house gate and lock on cell in male prison was repaired; also there was a new iron mesh grill installed on gate leading from hallway to female prison. This work was done by paid labor.

The female prisoners transferred from the workhouse to the district prisons to serve their sentences are employed in cleaning, scrubbing, cooking and doing some laundry work in the institutions.

The male prisoners are employed in cleaning, painting, cooking, plumbing and general utility work.

Attached herewith you will find statements showing the disposition of prisoners received for the three months ending September 30, 1912; also the amounts of moneys collected from fines and telephone receipts from prisoners committed by the City Magistrates and paid over to the City Chamberlain, the Board of Health, and the General Bookkeeper and Auditor of the Department in liquidation of monthly telephone bills.

REPORT OF THE BRANCH WORKHOUSE, RIKERS ISLAND.

New York, October 5, 1912.

Hon. PATRICK A. WHITNEY, Commissioner:

By Prisoners at Work at Outdoor Labor.

Six hundred and fifty cubic yards of earth have been removed from the bank and used to fill in behind sea wall, in doing which one-sixteenth of an acre of ground has been made. Fifteen feet of the bank has been cut away for a distance of 400 feet along the shore road, the same terraced and a new walk laid out; this walk has been covered with ashes, rolled and tamped, and at present in first-class condition. The installing of three hydrants in the rear of the prisons has been started and will be shown in the next report. The Department of Docks and Ferries has made repairs to the dock, driving spike at the north end, and putting down a new floor. The roads, beaches, lawns and farms have received constant attention. From the farm the following were received: 3,000 heads of cabbage, 25 barrels of carrots, 10 barrels spinach, 150 bunches rhubarb, 20 bags onions, 20 barrels turnips, 500 quarts peas, 250 bunches beets, 200 bunches leek, 150 bunches parsley, 5 bags cucumbers, 450 bunches radishes, 50 bushels string beans, 50 bushels lima beans, 600 crates tomatoes. The following vegetables were sent to the Storekeeper, Blackwells Island: 1,000 heads cabbage, 10 barrels carrots, 4 barrels spinach, 100 bunches leek, 50 bunches parsley, 25 bushels string beans, 30 bushels lima beans, 200 crates tomatoes. New signs, "Prison Island, Don't Anchor," have been made, painted and put in place.

Painters—Dormitory No. 1, painted outside of building and roof one coat, painted bars on windows one coat. Dormitory No. 2, painted outside of building and roof one coat, painted bars on windows one coat. Dormitory No. 3, painted outside of building and roof one coat, painted bars on windows one coat. Mess Hall, painted outside of building two coats, painted roof and leader pipes one coat, painted prisoners' kitchen one coat, painted legs on prisoners' tables and 4 radiators one coat of black asphaltum. Doctors' quarters and hospital, painted outside of building and roof one coat, painted stoops at front and rear two coats, painted inside of doctors' quarters two coats. Painted outside of storehouse and icehouse one coat, painted roof of both buildings two coats, painted inside and outside of dark cell building one coat, painted roof and leader pipes two coats, painted cell doors one coat of black asphaltum. Keepers' quarters, painted outside of building two coats, painted roof of building and leader pipes two coats, painted ceilings of 12 rooms and hall two coats, varnished side walls of 12 rooms and hall one coat. Miscellaneous, whitewashed bottom of 40 trees, painted, grained and varnished 45 chairs, painted, striped and lettered 5 carts, painted waiting room at dock inside, outside and roof one coat; painted 15 lamp-posts, painted rowboat three coats, painted bath house and steps one coat, painted sprinkling cart one coat, painted icebox in prisoners' kitchen.

Carpenters—Repaired door at entrance to Dormitory No. 1 and No. 2, made and set new stoop at rear of same dormitories, repaired sashes and window frames of dormitory No. 3. Mess hall, made and set up new stoop at rear of building, made and set up a swinging door in the officers' dining room, made two bread boxes, repaired 22 chairs, repaired 4 bread trays. Hospital, made and set up new stoop at rear of building, made and set up door to doctors' quarters, repaired two tables and

4 chairs. Keepers' quarters, repaired doors and put locks on same in 5 rooms in this building.

Blacksmith—Shod 14 horses, made new axle for runway at the dock.

Laundry—Washed 1,500 undershirts, 850 outside shirts, 1,000 pairs pants, 2,500 pairs socks, 300 cot bottoms, 2,500 towels.

Shoemaker—Repaired 450 pairs of shoes.

During the quarter the daily average census was 100, and they were employed as follows: Stablemen and drivers, 5; carpenters, 2; tinsmith, 1; painters, 4; shoemaker, 1; kitchen and mess hall men, 8; utility men, 5; cleaning buildings and outdoors labor, 74—100.

Band Instruction.

About sixty-five (65) inmates are profiting by the instruction in the ordinary band instruments, and by their daily practice are becoming quite efficient. During this quarter a violin class has been instituted and already more than twenty (20) inmates are showing unusual development in this line. This class has had a marked effect on the tone of the institution, and has materially aided in the elevation as well as the reformation of the inmates.

Scholastic Education.

The regular classes are held daily. There are both morning and afternoon sessions. One hour daily there is calisthenic exercises and military drill, also one hour each evening. Library and reading for all.

Shoe Department (Repairing).

Those in this branch of the work are employed solely at repairing.

Tailoring Industry.

The inmates employed in this department have been preparing the winter raiment for the inmates; making new suits, shirts, etc., for their own use, at the same time repairing and pressing old work.

Plumbing Industry.

The work of the plumbing class, as usual, has been confined to the repairs in the different buildings of the Reformatory and practise work, and in any new work where necessary.

Painting Industry.

The inmates of this department have been occupied in practise work for beginners, and at the same time receiving elementary instruction; and as advanced put on work such as painting the interior of the school building dining rooms, kitchen, pantries, steamboats, etc.

Tinsmith Industry.

The inmates of this department have been occupied at their usual work, under their instructors' care; also making new articles for this and other institutions of the department and repair work.

Electrical Industry.

Daily classes are held in the shop, where, under the tutelage of the electrical instructor, they are put through a course in the various elements of magnetism and electricity. They are first instructed in the theory, of which they then make practical application under the guidance of the instructor. They are given daily lessons whenever possible in the repair of all electrical work of the institution.

Carpentry Industry (Manual Training).

In this department the boys are taught the use of tools and begin practise work. As advanced they are put on the general work of the institution, which comprises new and repair work, required in the different buildings of the Reformatory.

Bricklaying and Cement Industry.

In our bricklaying class we have and are now giving instruction on an average to fifty (50) boys, and in every case show daily improvement in their practise work. For the past month they have been constructing a greenhouse, which will be completed shortly, no outside help being employed in any branch of the same.

Printing Industry.

Our printing department is now doing all the printing matter for the Reformatory, also for other branches in the Department of Correction. The instructor of this department is daily giving instructions to the boys as to how to set up type and how to distribute the same in cases, also proofreading.

Gardening Class.

General instruction of boys as follows: Trimming trees, shrubs and hedges, cutting grass, edging lawns, sowing grass, flower and vegetable seed; also transplanting flowers and planting flowers in beds and boxes.

Health of Inmates.

The general health of the inmates has been good and only one (1) serious case of acute disease has occurred in the past three months: the death of Taki Griacian, inmate No. 2947, of pulmonary tuberculosis. The following are the number of cases treated:

Traumatism, 1; syphilis, 7; acne, 2; enteritis, 4; rash, 8; rheumatism, 11; tonsilitis, 14; sprains, 10; sore eyes, 8; constipation, 65; toothache, 13; chancroid, 7; burns, 3; bubo, 1; tuberculosis, 4; chorea, 5; cold, 11; varicose veins, 1; eczema, 2; nerves, 6; boils, 11; epileptic, 4; dermatitis, 1; scabies, 1; kidney trouble, 2; asthma, 1; ulcerated leg, 1; crushed toes, 3; bronchitis, 2; appendicitis, 1; lacerations, 5; simple fever, 30; impetigo, 1.

Spiritual Welfare.

The spiritual welfare of the inmates has been very carefully attended to by the Catholic, Hebrew and Protestant Chaplains of the Department of Correction. The attendance at the religious services has been usually very large, though not compulsory. Respectfully submitted,

REPORT OF THE CITY PRISON, BROOKLYN.

Brooklyn, October 1, 1912.

Hon. PATRICK A. WHITNEY, Commissioner of Correction:

Dear Sir—I most respectfully submit a report of the City Prison, Borough of Brooklyn, for the quarter commencing June 30, 1912, and ending September 30, 1912.

Two new prison vans have been built. A 1-inch gas line has been installed from the main in the basement and connected with the incinerator in kitchen. The defective concrete sidewalk in front of female prison has been removed and replaced. The iron grille door leading from female prison to chapel has been replaced with a solid steel frame door in accordance with the regulations of the Fire Department. Prison van No. 14 has been repaired, painted and lettered. A double grille iron door, with frame, has been installed to opening to hay loft and nine (9) window guards have been installed to windows in stable. A 7-foot wrought iron railing has been erected on coping of retaining wall back of male prison building. All window operating devices in male prison have been repaired. A new prison lock has been put on the kitchen gate. A scuttle opening has been cut through roof of Administration building. A double gas range with canopy top has been installed in Warden's kitchen. A new alberne sink 60 inches by 30 inches by 7 inches with eight (8) faucets, has been installed in prison kitchen. The walls and ceilings of administration hall, general office, Doctor's office, prison kitchen and all basement halls in male and female prisons have been painted by prison labor.

The female prisoners under sentence here are employed in cleaning and scrubbing in and around the female prison and in the administration building.

The male prisoners under sentence here are employed in cleaning about the male prison, kitchen and stable, and in repairing and painting about the institution.

Appended herewith please find a statement showing the number of prisoners at commencement of quarter, the number received, transferred and discharged; the amount of fines received from the County Court, the Court of Special Sessions and ten City Magistrate's Courts, all of which has been paid over to the City Chamberlain, as section 1550 of the Greater New York Charter requires.

A resolution instructing the Board of Superintendents to nominate, during the year 1912, the full number of teachers for service in the elementary schools, for whom salaries are provided for that year in the tentative apportionment of the General School Fund adopted by the Board of Education, on the recommendation of the Committee on Finance, on April 10, 1912, or that may be provided in the final apportionment whenever adopted, was referred to the Committee on Finance.

The following reports and resolutions were also adopted:

To the Board of Education:

The Committee on Special Schools respectfully reports that it has had under consideration the following preamble and resolution submitted by the Board of Aldermen:

"Whereas, The young men of the community have greatly benefited by the work of the principal and teachers in Evening Recreation Centre 84, at Glenmore ave. and Watkins st., in the Borough of Brooklyn; and

"Whereas, The influence upon the young men who frequent the centre is largely undone by the closing of the recreation centre during the months of June, July, August and September; and

"Whereas, This cessation of the centre's activities throws the patrons of the centre into the streets and even other less desirable places; and

"Whereas, The social spirit of the centre has been elevated to a very high plane by the numerous social features that have evolved through the club work in the centre; be it

"Resolved, That we hereby petition the members of the Board of Education to open the club rooms of Evening Recreation Centre 84, Brooklyn, and assign a club teacher at least one evening a week during the months of June, July, August and September for the use of the clubs who hereunto subscribe their willingness to attend regularly during that period."

The departmental estimate of the Board of Education for 1912 asked for \$369,091.50 for vacation schools, playgrounds, evening recreation centres, baths, etc., including an item of \$1,690 for summer evening recreation centres, the intention being, if funds for the purpose were allowed, to open ten buildings for two nights a week during June, July and August. In making up the Budget for 1912, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Board of Aldermen allowed \$250,000 for vacation schools, playgrounds, recreation centres and baths, thus making it impossible for the Board of Education to carry out its plans for the conduct of the activities mentioned.

In connection with the preamble and resolution quoted above special attention is called to the action of the Board of Aldermen on April 2, 1912, when a report of its Committee on Finance, rejecting a re-

quest from the Department of Education for an issue of \$25,000 special revenue bonds, for supplies for playgrounds and evening recreation centres, was accepted.

If additional funds are provided from any source, your Committee will be glad to do everything in its power to carry out the request of the Board of Aldermen.

The following resolution was offered for adoption:

Resolved, That a copy of the foregoing report be transmitted to the Board of Aldermen.

To the Board of Education:

The Committee on Elementary Schools respectfully reports that it has had under consideration the following preamble and resolutions adopted by the Board of Aldermen on March 19, 1912, which were referred to it by the Board of Education at the meeting held on March 27, 1912 (see Journal, pages 471-72):

"Whereas, There are many thousands of children now attending the public schools who are receiving part-time education; and

"Whereas, It is the primary duty of our City to secure equal educational opportunities for every child; therefore be it

"Resolved, That the Department of Education be, and it is hereby, requested to outline a plan that will provide a full time school seat for every school child; and be it further

"Resolved, That the Department of Education shall submit, without delay, to the Board of Aldermen and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment."

Your Committee would report that the Board of Education is in hearty sympathy with the idea in the minds of the Board of Aldermen, and would be highly gratified to bring about the elimination of part time from our public schools. To accomplish this desirable end many additional school buildings are necessary. It is the function of the Board of Aldermen in conjunction with the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to provide the necessary funds. The requirements of the Department of Education for the issue of corporate stock for the year beginning July 1, 1912, are set forth in reports which have been presented at this meeting by the Committee on Buildings and the Committee on Sites. This matter will be submitted in regular course to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and will then reach the Board of Aldermen. It is hoped that the Board of Aldermen will use its good offices to secure favorable action by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and will act as promptly as possible upon the recommendations which receive the approval of that Board.

That the utilization of the funds which it is hoped will be authorized will "provide a full time school seat for every school child," as requested of the Department of Education by the Board of Aldermen, cannot be confidently counted upon,

but it will unquestionably do away with part time to a very considerable extent.

The increase of our school population is so rapid that it is impossible to solve the part-time problem completely without the expenditure of enormous sums of money.

The Board of Education is doing its best within reasonable bounds to meet the situation. It desires and hopes for the best co-operation of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Board of Aldermen.

In this connection special attention is called to the fact that the erection of a large number of new schools imposes a vast amount of work upon the Bureau of School Buildings, which is greatly in need of additional assistance, and to the further fact that the Board of Aldermen at its meeting held on April 16, 1912, failed to approve a resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment providing for twenty-five additional architectural and mechanical draftsmen and other necessary employees in said Bureau, there being eleven affirmative and thirty-three negative votes upon the proposition.

The Board of Education cannot be held responsible for the failure to relieve part time if the additional assistance necessary to prepare plans, etc., for new school buildings is not promptly provided. In view of the foregoing facts, it is respectfully requested that the Board of Aldermen reconsider its action upon the resolution providing for additional draftsmen, et al.


Resolved, That the foregoing report be approved, and that a copy of the same be transmitted to the Board of Aldermen.

During the call of the calendar, Mr. Churchill moved that the membership of the Special Committee of Eight appointed to inquire into the methods of the Board of Examiners, etc., be increased to nine, and that Mr. Man be appointed a member of said Special Committee. Adopted.

The attention of the Chair was called to the fact that a quorum was not present, and the Board adjourned at 6:23 o'clock p.m.
