STANDING OF THE CITY AND COUNTY DEPARTMENTS.

The figures below are based upon subscriptions received up to 2 o'clock P. M. yesterday at the Comptroller's office, Room 851, Municipal Building, having been in the first instance turned in to the heads of the respective departments and by them transmitted to the Comptroller, as the Chairman of the Mayor's Committee. The Comptroller files summary statement daily with the Commissioner of Accounts, as Chairman of the Executive Committee of the Mayor's Committee, and the latter calculates the departmental percentages upon the basis of one \$50 bond to the total payroll of each department, as provided in the 1917 budget, thereby fixing the base percentage for each department. In the interest of fairness the smaller boards, commissions, etc., have been grouped together for scoring purposes. Similarly certain county offices of each county have likewise been combined.

Bellevue and Allied Hospitals.

A regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals was held on Tuesday, April 17, 1917, at 3:30 p. m.

Present—Dr. Brannan, the President, in the chair; Messrs. Paulding, O'Keeffe, Farley, Stern and Robbins, Trustees. Excused—Mr. Sachs and Mr. Kingsbury, Commissioner of Public Charities.

George O'Hanlon, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:

Nurse, whose illness was reported at the last meeting, died on the 11 inst.

The Chief Clerk and Auditor reports as follows:

The Central Purchasing Committee has written a letter to this department stating in effect that it has figured the estimated deficit in the appropriation for fuel supplies for the year 1917 and has requested that this department make application to the Board of Aldermen for special revenue bonds. This department will also face deficiencies in the appropriations for food supplies and medical and surgical supplies, and I beg leave to recommend that the application to the General Inspector of Construction in a report dated April 9, 1917. He reported also that he considered the allowance fair and recommended the acceptance of the building. After discussion, on motion, duly seconded and carried, the building was formally accepted on behalf of the City and final payment authorized.

Mr. A. W. King, under date of April 4, requested an extension of three months time on his contract for the reduction of the fire hazards in the old building at Bellevue Hospital, on account of delays in obtaining the approval of the plans by the Building Department. A report relating thereto was presented from McKim, Mead & White, under date of April 17th. On the recommendation of the Building Committee, it was moved, seconded and carried, to grant the contractor an extension of sixty days' time.

The Chairman of the Building Committee reported that upon receipt of a letter from the Bureau of Contract Supervision, under date of March 5, suggesting that the department connect the heating system of the new building for the Out Patient Department of Gouverneur Hospital with the boiler plant of the hospital, McKim, Mead & White were asked for their recommendations, which were received under date of April 11. After discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried, to send a copy of this report to the Bureau of Contract Supervision with the information that in view of its contents the Trustees believe it unwise to place an additional load on the old boiler plant at Gouverneur Hospital.

An expression of the Board's deep regret at the death of Miss McCullough was ordered placed on the minutes.

After consideration, it was moved, seconded and carried to request the Board of Aldermen to authorize an issue of special revenue bonds in the sum of \$266,700 to meet the deficits in the appropriations to the Department for fuel, food and medical and surgical supplies.

COMMITTEE REPORTS.

The President presented a tabulation of bids received at the office of the Central Purchase Committee on April 12 for clothing, dry goods and notions, and on April 16th for (a) milk and cream, (b) eggs, (c) paints and oils. On the clothing, dry goods and notions, contracts were awarded to the low bidder on each line. On paints and oils contracts were awarded to the low bidder on each line. As no bids were received for turpentine and alcohol, lines 70 and 107, respectively, the purchase of these articles in the open market was authorized. As no bids were received for eggs, the Central Purchase Committee was authorized to readvertise. The Trustees having at a previous meeting authorized the purchase in the open market of milk and cream for Neponset Beach Hospital, and as no bids were received, no further action was required on the subject.

Mr. O'Keeffe, on behalf of the Conference Committee of Fordham Hospital, recommends the following promotions and appointments: Robert E. Walsh promoted to the place of Assistant Visiting Surgeon; J. J. McGowan promoted to the position of Visiting Physician; William A. Randel appointed as Assistant Surgeon to Out Patients, Nose and Throat Clinic; Joseph C. Josephson as Assistant Physician to Out Patients, Pediatrics; Pasquale Badia as Assistant Surgeon to Out Patients; J. E. Conboy as Assistant Physician to Out Patients, Children's Clinic; William M. Hendry and Louis J. Ferrara as Assistant Surgeon to Out Patients, Nose and Throat Clinic.







All wells, cesspools, sinks, etc., existing on the property must be filled to the level of the surrounding ground with clean earth.

The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw and remove all abandoned water taps and old service mains, and in place thereof cause to be inserted a brass plug in the main water pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that this has been performed.

The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all house sewer connections to the main sewer in the street and the openings of the main sewer in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The permit for all opening in the street to be

obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurte-

nances, or any part thereof, within thirty days from the day of possession will work forfeiture of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances or portions as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidders assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the date of possession, and the successful bidder will provide and furnish all materials of labor and machinery necessary thereto, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants, and each of them, against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against and from all damage and costs to which it, they or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the removal of said buildings.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate purchasers.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furring, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beam holes, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs and adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the Contractor.

"No buildings, parts of buildings, fixtures or machinery sold for removal under these terms and conditions, shall in any case be re-located or re-erected within the lines of any proposed street or other public improvement, and if any such buildings, parts of buildings, fixtures or machinery, etc., shall be re-located or re-erected within the lines of any proposed street or other public improvement, title thereto shall thereupon become vested in The City of New York and a resale at public or private sale may be made in the same manner as if no prior sale thereof had been made."

The Comptroller of The City of New York reserves the right on the day of sale to withdraw from sale any of the buildings, parts of buildings and machinery included therein, or to reject any and all bids, and be it further

Resolved, That while the said sale is held under the supervision of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller is authorized to sink the sale to be advertised and to direct the sale thereof as financial officer of the City.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS ON WORK TO BE DONE FOR, OR SUPPLIES TO BE FURNISHED TO THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

The person or persons making a bid for any service, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or officers, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the bids will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making a bid for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer or employee of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the bid, that the several matters stated therein are as practical as

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The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done or the supplies for which are to be furnished.
