Ordinances, resolutions, etc., approved by the Mayor during the week ending October 29, 1881.

AN ORDINANCE to provide the necessary means for the support of the government of the City of New York, and the Board of Education, and for the payment of the quota of the State tax in the year eighteen hundred and eighty-one.
The Board of Aldermen of the City of New York do orlain as follows :
Section 1. There shall be and hereby is imposed upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation according to law, of and within the City and County of New York, to be raised, collected and paid according to law, for the support of the city government and the Board of Education, and for the purpose of paying the quota of the State tax imposed upon the City and County of New York for the year eighteen hundred and eighty-one, the sum of twenty-nine million eight hundred and fifty-four thousand three hundred and twenty-two dollars and fifty-nine cents (\$29,854,322.59), which is the amount certified by the Comptroller of the City of New York to the Board of Supervisors, in pursuance of the provisions of section 112 of chapter 335 of the Laws of 1873, as the sum to be raised and collected in the year eighteen hundred and eighty-one by tax upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation within the City and County of New York, which will more fully appear by the communication from the Comptroller, transmitting his certificate of the aggregate amount of the Final Estimate made by the Board of Stimate and Apportionment for the year eighteen hundred are copies : copies


FINAL ESTIMATE FOR THE YEAR 1881. Made, pursuant to Section 112 of Chapter 335 of the Laws of 1873, by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the City of New York, on December 31, 1880. Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportnonment have considered the objections to, and rectifications of, the Provisional Estimate made by said Board on the 30th day of October, 1880, of the amounts required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business of the City and County of New York, in each Department and branch thereof, and the Board of Education, for the next ensuing financial year, to wit, for the year eighteen hundred and eighty-one (1881) ; in which estimate is included such sum as is necessary for the payment of the interest on the bonds of the said city and county, which become due and payable within said year, and also such sum as is necessary to be raised by tax to pay the principal of any bonds and stocks which become due and payable during the said year; also the amount to be raised by tax annually, which will be sufficient, with the accumulations of interest thereon, to pay the bonds and stocks, payable from taxation, issued after June 3, 1878, pursuant to chapter 383, Laws of 1878 ; and also so much as may be necessary to pay the proportion of the State tax required to be paid Board, under date of November 23, 1880, and pre-sented to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on December 8, 1880 ; therefore Tesolved, That after such consideration of the said objections to, and rectifications of, said Provisional Estimate, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment does hereby make this a **FINAL ESTIMATE**

GENTLEMEN—On May 12 last, a resolution of the Board of Police was referred to the Comp-troller, requesting the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to transfer the sum of \$11,000 from the appropriation to the Police Department, for the year 1880, entitled "Alterations, Fitting Up, Additions and Repairs of Station-houses," to the appropriation for the same objects and purposes for the year 1881, in order to enable the Police Department to make necessary alterations and repairs to the building in East Fourth street, known as the "Dry Dock Savings Bank," leased by the city for the purposes of a station-house and prison for the Eleventh Precinct. On May 19 last, the Board of Police adopted another resolution, also referred to the Comp-troller, requesting a transfer of \$3,000, instead of \$11,000, for the same purposes, and withdrawing the resolution requesting a transfer of an appropriation for that amount. Having carefully examined into the subject I respectfully submit the following REPORT : GENTLEMEN-On May 12 last, a resolution of the Board of Police was referred to the Comp-

REPORT :

REPORT: The Dry Dock Savings Bank building was leased by the city, upon the application of the Police Board, for a station-house, etc., in the Eleventh Precinct, from May 1, 1881, for the term of one year, with the privilege of renewal from year to year for six years, at the yearly rent of \$2,500. The owner agreed also, as I understand, that the city should have the privilege and option of purchase, during the term of the lease, at the price of \$45,000. According to an appraisement I had made of the property, this amount is much more than its relate

value

The plans and specifications for the proposed alterations and repairs of the Dry Dock Savings Bank building necessary to fit it up for the purpose of a station-house, lodging-house, and prison for the Eleventh Police Precinct, have been examined by a competent person, under my direction, and,

for the Eleventh Police Precinct, have been examined by a competent person, under my direction, and, as reported by him, the cost would be at least \$11,000. The expenditure of this sum for the improvement of premises not owned by the city and held only upon a lease for a short time, would not be advisable, in my judgment, especially as the price asked for the property is considered more than it is worth. It would be better, in my opinion, to utilize and improve property now belonging to the city which can be appropriated to and used for the same purposes. With this view, I have had the Union Market building, situated on Sheriff street, at the junction of Houston and Second streets, examined, and plans and estimates prepared for such alterations and improvements as may be necessary to fit it up for the purpose of a station-house, etc., in the Eleventh Precinct. Precinct.

The upper part of the building is now occupied by the Police Department for the Eleventh Precinct Station-house, and a part of the ground floor is used by the Fire Department as a storeroom.

The rest of the ground floor is still used for market purposes, but only half a dozen market stalls are rented, and very little revenue is received.

The cost of making such alterations and improvements as are required for the station-house, reserving a sufficient portion for a public market, is estimated at but little more than one-third of the amount asked to be appropriated for that purpose in the Departmental Estimate for 1882 by the Police Board, to enable them to alter and repair the Dry Dock Savings Bank building. To meet the cost of alterations and improvements which will be required to fit up the Union Mar-ket building for occupation as a station-house, I recommend that an appropriation of \$6,000 be made in the Fetimeter for \$82.

made in the Estimates for 1882. This amount will cover the cost for this purpose as estimated ; the costs for fitting up the mar-ket is otherwise provided for.

ORDER OF THE COMPTROLLER OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK, CONSOLIDATING CERTAIN BUREAUX IN THE FINANCE DEPART. MENT

BUREAUX IN THE FINANCE DEPART.
