

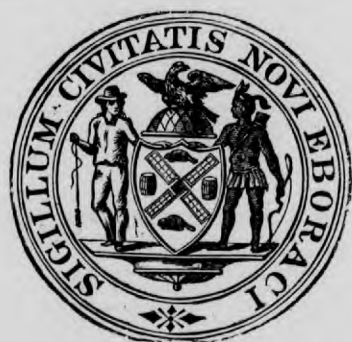

APPROVED PAPERS.

Ordinances, resolutions, etc., approved by the Mayor during the week ending October 29, 1881.

AN ORDINANCE to provide the necessary means for the support of the government of the City of New York, and the Board of Education, and for the payment of the quota of the State tax in the year eighteen hundred and eighty-one.

The Board of Aldermen of the City of New York do ordain as follows:

Section 1. There shall be and hereby is imposed upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation according to law, of and within the City and County of New York, to be raised, collected and paid according to law, for the support of the city government and the Board of Education, and for the purpose of paying the quota of the State tax imposed upon the City and County of New York for the year eighteen hundred and eighty-one, the sum of twenty-nine million eight hundred and fifty-four thousand three hundred and twenty-two dollars and fifty-nine cents (\$29,854,322.59), which is the amount certified by the Comptroller of the City of New York to the Board of Supervisors, in pursuance of the provisions of section 112 of chapter 335 of the Laws of 1873, as the sum to be raised and collected in the year eighteen hundred and eighty-one by tax upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation within the City and County of New York, which will more fully appear by the communication from the Comptroller, transmitting his certificate of the aggregate amount of the Final Estimate made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the year eighteen hundred and eighty-one, of which said communication, certificate, and Final Estimate the following are copies:

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York:

In pursuance of the provisions of section 112 of chapter 335 of the Laws of 1873, I herewith transmit to you the Comptroller's certificate of the aggregate amount of the Final Estimate made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on the 31st day of December, 1880, for the year eighteen hundred and eighty-one, to wit: the sum of twenty-nine million eight hundred and fifty-four thousand three hundred and twenty-two dollars and fifty-nine cents (\$29,854,322.59), being the amount of the Final Estimate for the year 1881, as made and adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the said City of New York on the 31st day of December, 1880, a copy of which Final Estimate is hereunto annexed.

I, Allan Campbell, Comptroller of the City of New York, in pursuance of the provision of law contained in section 112 of chapter 335 of the Laws of 1873, do hereby certify to the Supervisors of the County of New York that the aggregate amount required to pay the expense of conducting the public business of the said City and County, in each department and branch thereof, and the Board of Education, for the financial year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one, is twenty-nine million eight hundred and fifty-four thousand three hundred and twenty-two dollars and fifty-nine cents (\$29,854,322.59), being the amount of the Final Estimate for the year 1881, as made and adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the said City of New York on the 31st day of December, 1880, a copy of which Final Estimate is hereunto annexed.

FINAL ESTIMATE FOR THE YEAR 1881.

Made, pursuant to Section 112 of Chapter 335 of the Laws of 1873, by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the City of New York, on December 31, 1880.

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment have considered the objections to, and rectifications of, the Provisional Estimate made by said Board on the 30th day of October, 1880, of the amounts required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business of the City and County of New York, in each Department and branch thereof, and the Board of Education, for the next ensuing financial year, to wit, for the year eighteen hundred and eighty-one (1881); in which estimate is included such sum as is necessary for the payment of the interest on the bonds of the said city and county, which become due and payable within said year, and also such sum as is necessary to be raised by tax to pay the principal of any bonds and stocks which become due and payable during the said year; also the amount to be raised by tax annually, which will be sufficient, with the accumulations of interest thereon, to pay the bonds and stocks, payable from taxation, issued after June 3, 1878, pursuant to chapter 383, Laws of 1878; and also so much as may be necessary to pay the proportion of the State tax required to be paid by the City and County of New York, in said year, which objections to, and rectifications of, said Provisional Estimate made by the Board of Aldermen, were transmitted by the Clerk of said Board, under date of November 23, 1880, and presented to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on December 8, 1880; therefore

Resolved, That after such consideration of the said objections to, and rectifications of, said Provisional Estimate, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment does hereby make this a

FINAL ESTIMATE

of the amount required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business of the City and County of New York, in each Department and branch thereof, and the Board of Education, for the next ensuing financial year, to wit, the year eighteen hundred and eighty-one (1881), in which is included such sum as is necessary for the payment of the interest on the bonds of the said city and county, which become due and payable within said year, and also such sum as is necessary to be raised by tax to pay the principal of any bonds and stocks which become due and payable during the said year; also the amount to be raised by tax annually, which will be sufficient, with the accumulations of interest thereon, to pay the bonds and stocks, payable from taxation, issued after June 3, 1878, pursuant to chapter 383, Laws of 1878; and also so much as may be necessary to pay the proportion of the State tax required to be paid by the City and County of New York, in said year, as follows:

In addition to the sum imposed upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation, according to law, of and within the City and County of New York, in and by the first section of this ordinance, there shall also be, and is hereby imposed upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation, according to law, of and within the City and County of New York, and to be raised, collected, and paid according to law, the sum of four hundred and four thousand eight hundred and eighty-two dollars and fifty-five cents (\$404,882.55), being the amount of additional appropriations for the year 1881, made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, pursuant to the provisions of chapters 246, 324, 333, 367, 447, 450, 456, 461, 478, 587 and 706, of the Laws of 1881, as appears by the following certificate of the Comptroller of the City of New York:

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York:

I hereby certify that, pursuant to the provisions of certain acts of the Legislature of this State, passed at its last session, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment has made appropriations for the purposes specified in said acts respectively, in addition to the final estimate for the year 1881, adopted December 31, 1880, and presented to your Honorable Body on July 4, 1881, the amount of which appropriations is to be included in the tax levy for the present year, as follows:

BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT.

BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT—CITY OF NEW YORK,
MAYOR'S OFFICE, CITY HALL,
SATURDAY, October 29, 1881, 12 o'clock M.

The Board met in pursuance of an adjournment.

Present—All the members, viz.:

William R. Grace, the Mayor of the City of New York; Allan Campbell, the Comptroller of the City of New York; Patrick Keenan, the President of the Board of Aldermen; Thomas B. Asten, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments.

The minutes of the meeting held October 28, 1881, were read and approved.

The Comptroller presented the following report :

FINANCE DEPARTMENT—COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE,
October, 1881.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment :

GENTLEMEN—On May 12 last, a resolution of the Board of Police was referred to the Comptroller, requesting the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to transfer the sum of \$11,000 from the appropriation to the Police Department, for the year 1880, entitled "Alterations, Fitting Up, Additions and Repairs of Station-houses," to the appropriation for the same objects and purposes for the year 1881, in order to enable the Police Department to make necessary alterations and repairs to the building in East Fourth street, known as the "Dry Dock Savings Bank," leased by the city for the purposes of a station-house and prison for the Eleventh Precinct.

On May 19 last, the Board of Police adopted another resolution, also referred to the Comptroller, requesting a transfer of \$8,000, instead of \$11,000, for the same purposes, and withdrawing the resolution requesting a transfer of an appropriation for that amount.

Having carefully examined into the subject I respectfully submit the following

REPORT :

The Dry Dock Savings Bank building was leased by the city, upon the application of the Police Board, for a station-house, etc., in the Eleventh Precinct, from May 1, 1881, for the term of one year, with the privilege of renewal from year to year for six years, at the yearly rent of \$2,500.

The owner agreed also, as I understand, that the city should have the privilege and option of purchase, during the term of the lease, at the price of \$45,000.

According to an appraisal I had made of the property, this amount is much more than its value.

The plans and specifications for the proposed alterations and repairs of the Dry Dock Savings Bank building necessary to fit it up for the purpose of a station-house, lodging-house, and prison for the Eleventh Precinct, have been examined by a competent person, under my direction, and, as reported by him, the cost would be at least \$11,000.

The expenditure of this sum for the improvement of premises not owned by the city and held only upon a lease for a short time, would not be advisable, in my judgment, especially as the price asked for the property is considered more than it is worth.

It would be better, in my opinion, to utilize and improve property now belonging to the city which can be appropriated to and used for the same purposes.

With this view, I have had the Union Market building, situated on Sheriff street, at the junction of Houston and Second streets, examined, and plans and estimates prepared for such alterations and improvements as may be necessary to fit it up for the purpose of a station-house, etc., in the Eleventh Precinct.

The upper part of the building is now occupied by the Police Department for the Eleventh Precinct Station-house, and a part of the ground floor is used by the Fire Department as a store-room.

The rest of the ground floor is still used for market purposes, but only half a dozen market stalls are rented, and very little revenue is received.

The cost of making such alterations and improvements as are required for the station-house, reserving a sufficient portion for a public market, is estimated at but little more than one-third of the amount asked to be appropriated for that purpose in the Departmental Estimate for 1882 by the Police Board, to enable them to alter and repair the Dry Dock Savings Bank building.

To meet the cost of alterations and improvements which will be required to fit up the Union Market building for occupation as a station-house, I recommend that an appropriation of \$6,000 be made in the Estimates for 1882.

This amount will cover the cost for this purpose as estimated ; the costs for fitting up the market is otherwise provided for.

The Comptroller moved that when the Board adjourn, it do so to meet on Monday, October 31, 1881, at one o'clock P. M.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH of the City of New York, held at its office on the 17th day of October, 1881, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That under the power conferred by law upon the Health Department, the following amendment of the Sanitary Code for the security of life and health be and the same is hereby adopted, and declared to form a portion of the Sanitary Code:

Resolved, That Section 201 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 201. That for all lodging-houses in which beds are let for lodgers containing four or more beds in any apartment therein for the use of lodgers, a permit in writing from this Department shall be required, and no person in the City of New York, shall have, lease, let or keep any such lodging-house or the lodgings therein, or assist in the keeping, hire, or assist in hiring, or conduct the business of any such lodging-house or the lodgings therein, except pursuant to the terms and condition of a permit in writing previously obtained therefor from this Department, an application for which shall be made in accordance with the rules and regulations of the Board of Health by the person or persons who propose to use the same. The beds in all lodging-houses and in every room in which beds are let for lodgers shall be separated by a passageway of not less than two feet, horizontally, and all the beds shall be so arranged that under each of them the air shall freely circulate, and there be adequate ventilation. Six hundred cubic feet of air space shall be provided and allowed for each bed or lodger, and no more beds shall be permitted than those provided in this way, unless free and adequate means of ventilation exist, approved by the Board of Health, and a special permit in writing be granted therefor, specifying the number of beds or the cubic air space which shall under special circumstances be allowed.

NOTICE TO TAXPAYERS.

RELATING TO THE PAYMENT OF UNPAID TAXES, ASSESSMENTS, AND CROTON WATER RENTS.

THE COMPTROLLER OF THE CITY OF NEW York hereby gives notice to owners of real and personal estate in this city, that all unpaid taxes, assessments, and Croton water rents may now be paid with interest thereon at the rate of seven per cent. per annum, as provided by chapter 33 of the Laws of 1881, which is as follows:

CHAPTER 33.
AN ACT relative to the collection of taxes and assessments, and of arrears of taxes and assessments, and Croton water rents, in the City of New York.
(Passed March 16, 1881; three-fifths being present.)

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. If any taxes of any year shall remain unpaid on the first day of November, after the assessment-rolls and the warrants to collect such taxes have been delivered to the Receiver of Taxes in the City of New York, it shall be the duty of said Receiver to give public notice, by advertisement for at least ten days in two of the daily newspapers, and in the CITY RECORD, printed and published in said city, respectively, that unless the same shall be paid to him at his office on or before the first day of December, in any such year, he will immediately thereafter proceed to collect such unpaid taxes, as provided in the following section of this act:

Section 2. If any such tax shall remain unpaid on the said first day of December, it shall be the duty of the said Receiver of Taxes in said city to charge, receive, and collect upon such tax so remaining unpaid on that day, in addition to the amount of such tax, one per centum on the amount thereof; and to charge, receive, and collect upon such tax so remaining unpaid on the first day of January thereafter, interest upon the amount thereof at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated from the day on which said assessment-rolls and warrants shall have been delivered to the said Receiver of Taxes to the date of payment.

The same rate of interest shall be so charged and collected upon any tax levied in the year eighteen hundred and eighty, remaining unpaid at the date of the passage of this act.

Section 3. All existing provisions of law which impose a charge and require the collection of interest at the rate of twelve per centum per annum upon arrears of taxes on real and personal estate within the City of New York, upon arrears of assessments for local improvements and street openings in said city, and upon arrears of Croton water rents in said city, are hereby repealed; and in lieu of such charge of interest at the rate of twelve per centum per annum, there shall be charged and collected by the officer authorized to collect and receive any such arrears of taxes and assessments and Croton water rents, interest upon the amount thereof at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated for the same period as interest at the rate of twelve per centum per annum is now required by law to be calculated thereon. This provision shall apply to taxes, assessments, or Croton water rents remaining unpaid and due, for the non-payment of which the lands and tenements liable therefor shall be hereafter sold at public auction as now provided by law; provided, however, that nothing in this act shall be construed to affect the rights of purchasers at sales for taxes, assessments, or Croton water rents, heretofore made, or to authorize the redemption of lands and tenements from sales heretofore made for any lesser sums than the sums collectible for such redemption under the provisions of existing laws.

Section 4. It shall be the duty of the Comptroller of the City of New York to give public notice, by advertisement,

for at least ten days, in the CITY RECORD, printed and published in said city, immediately after the confirmation of any assessment for a local improvement or street opening in said city, that the same has been confirmed specifying the title of such assessment and the date of its confirmation by the Board of Revision and Correction of Assessments in proceedings for local improvements, and by the Supreme Court in proceedings for street openings, and also the date of entry in the record of titles of assessments kept in the Bureau for the Collection of Assessments, and of Arrears of Taxes and Assessments, and of Croton water rents, notifying all persons, owners of property affected by any such assessment, that, unless the amount assessed for benefit on any person or property shall be paid within sixty days after the date of said entry of any such assessment, interest shall thereafter be collected thereon as provided in the following section of this act, and all provisions of law or ordinance requiring any other or different notice of assessments and interest thereon are hereby repealed.

Section 5. If any such assessment shall remain unpaid for the period of sixty days after the date of entry thereof in the said record of titles of assessments, it shall be the duty of the officer authorized to collect and receive the amount of such assessment, to charge, collect, and receive legal interest thereon, at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated from the date of such entry to the date of payment.

Section 6. This act shall take effect immediately.

ORDER OF THE COMPTROLLER OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK, CONSOLIDATING CERTAIN BUREAUX IN THE FINANCE DEPARTMENT.

SECTION 3 OF CHAPTER 521 OF THE LAWS of 1880, requires that heads of departments shall reduce the aggregate expenses of their respective departments by a reduction of salaries, and confers upon them authority to consolidate bureaux and offices for that purpose, as follows, to wit:

"In making the reduction herein required, every head of department may abolish and consolidate offices and bureaux, and discharge subordinates in the same department."

The Comptroller of the City of New York, in pursuance of the duty imposed and the authority thus conferred upon him, hereby orders and directs that the following Bureaux in the Finance Department shall be consolidated, the consolidation thereof to take effect on the first day of January, 1881, viz.:

First—"The Bureau or the Collection of Assessments, and 'The Bureau for the Collection of Arrears of Taxes and Assessments and of Water Rents,' shall be consolidated as one bureau, and on and after January 1, 1881, shall be known as 'The Bureau for the Collection of Assessments and of Arrears of Taxes and Assessments and of Water Rents,' and possess all the power conferred and perform all the duties imposed by law and ordinance upon both of said bureaux, and the officers thereof, the chief officer of which consolidated bureau shall be called 'Collector of Assessments and Clerk of Arrears.'"

Second—"The Bureau for the Collection of the Revenue accruing from rents, and interest on bonds and mortgages, revenue arising from the use or sale of property belonging to or managed by the city," and "the Bureau of Markets," shall be consolidated as one Bureau, and on and after January 1, 1881, shall be known as "the Bureau for the Collection of City Revenue and of Markets," and possess all the powers conferred and perform all the duties imposed by law and ordinance upon both said Bureaux, and the officers thereof; the chief officer of which said consolidated Bureau shall be called "Collector of City Revenue and Superintendent of Markets."
