



Notable Fires.

July 8.—No. 141 Chambers street, a five-story brick building, 25 by 100 feet, occupied by a willowware dealer. The fire originated on the fourth floor and extended to the fifth floor, slightly damaging the building. The first alarm was received at 7.14 P. M., and at 7.20 and 7.47 P. M., respectively, second and third alarms were ordered, and subsequently special calls for two engine companies and one hook and ladder company. The fire required the services of nine engine and four hook and ladder companies, one water-tower, and was under control in about one hour. The loss was estimated at \$22,600. It was caused by rats gnawing matches.

July 15.—Nos. 1, 2, 3 and 4 East street. A three-story brick building, 100 by 250 feet, occupied by the Madison, Chambers and Grand Street Railway Company as stables. The fire originated on the third floor and extended throughout the building. Because of the delay in giving the alarm and of the combustible nature of the contents, the fire had entire control of the building on the arrival of the first assignment of the force. The first alarm was received at 1.54 P. M., and at 2 P. M. a third alarm was ordered, and subsequently a special call for one engine and one hook and ladder company. The fire required the services of sixteen engine and five hook and ladder companies, and was under control in about one hour. The loss was estimated at \$5,500. The cause was not ascertained.

July 18.—Nos. 195 to 199 Broadway, an eleven-story brick, stone and iron building, 75 by 150 feet, and 180 feet in height to the top of the mansard roof, occupied by the Western Union Telegraph Company. The fire originated in the battery-room on the seventh floor, and extended through openings left in the floors for wires, to the operating rooms, associated press rooms, storerooms for dispatches and the kitchens and sleeping apartments for the employees, all of which were on the upper floors of the building and contained a large quantity of combustible material, causing the fire to burn fiercely and rapidly, and cutting off all means of escape for those on the upper floors. The first alarm was received at 7.04 A. M., and on the arrival of the first assignment of the force it was found to be beyond control, the employees in the building having been at work for at least twenty minutes trying to extinguish the fire with fire-extinguishers and other appliances, before giving the alarm. Several of the employees were driven to the roof of the building by the heat and smoke, and on the arrival of Hook and Ladder Companies Nos. 10, 1 and 15, were seen in the upper part of the building calling for assistance. These companies immediately proceeded to the roofs of the adjoining buildings, and by means of ladders raised there succeeded in rescuing about ten of the employees, including several females, bringing them safely down the ladders. Hook and Ladder Company No. 15 threw life-lines from the gun to those who were at the time cut off from escape, but they were not used, those in danger having in the meantime been taken down the ladders. At 7.10, 7.14 and 7.34 A. M., respectively, second, third and fourth alarms were ordered. The water-tower was placed in service, but was not effective on account of the great height of the building. The fire had to be fought from floor to floor, commencing at the seventh and going up to the eleventh floor, as it was impossible to reach it effectively from the outside because

of the great height of the building, which also made it very difficult to work the department forces to advantage. The fire required the services of nineteen engine companies (using an aggregate of twelve thousand feet of hose), six hook and ladder companies and one water-tower, and the fire was under control in about three hours. Some of the engines were too light to force water to the height of this building and were disabled under the strain. The supply of water was very poor, and eleven of the companies reported no water pressure on the hydrants when opened. The loss was estimated at \$65,010. The fire was caused by the overcharging of a short circuit wire igniting the insulation.

August 17.—South side of One Hundred and Eighth street, between Ninth and Tenth avenues, a two-story brick building, 75 by 100 feet, occupied by the Lion Brewery as stables. The fire originated on the first floor and extended throughout the building, considerably damaging it. The first alarm was received at 9.43 P. M., and the fire had considerable headway on the arrival of the first companies on account of the alarm not being promptly given, and at 9.53 P. M. a third alarm was ordered, and afterwards special calls for five engine and one hook and ladder companies. The fire required the services of ten engine and three hook and ladder companies, and was under control in about one hour. One of the companies reported no pressure of water on the hydrant. The loss was estimated at \$34,045 and the cause was not ascertained.

September 3.—Nos. 227 and 229 East Fifty-sixth street, a five-story brick building, 50 by 50 feet, occupied as a cornice manufactory. The fire originated in the cellar and extended up the stairway to the roof, considerably damaging the building. The first alarm was received at 7.01 A. M. The fire had considerable headway on the arrival of the first companies, and at 7.04 A. M. a second alarm was ordered, followed at 7.07 and 7.20 A. M., respectively, by third and fourth alarms. A special call for a water-tower was sent, and the fire required the services of fifteen engine and five hook and ladder companies, and was under control in about two hours. After the fire had been extinguished the body of an employee, who had been burned to death, was found in the cellar. The loss was estimated at \$25,500. The cause was carelessness of an employee handling roof paint.

September 8.—No. 71 John street, a four-story brick building, 25 by 100 feet, occupied as a plated ware manufactory. The fire originated on the first floor and extended by stairway to the roof, considerably damaging the building. The first alarm was received at 8.03 P. M., and, the fire having spread very rapidly, second and third alarms were sent at 8.14 and 8.28 P. M. The fire required the services of ten engine and three hook and ladder companies, one water-tower, and was under control in about one hour. The loss was estimated at \$33,100. The cause was rats gnawing matches.

September 10.—Nos. 179 and 181 East One Hundred and Twenty-fourth street, extending through to One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street, a two-story brick building 50 by 200 feet, occupied as a dry goods and notion store. The fire is supposed to have originated on the second floor and extended through a large light-shaft in the centre of the building to the first floor and basement. This building was locked up for the night when the fire broke out, and it had extended throughout the entire building before any attempt was made to send out an alarm. The first alarm was received at 7.05 P. M. As the fire was burning very fiercely when the first companies arrived, and because the stage of the Harlem Theatre abutted against the building, second and fourth alarms were sent, respectively, at 7.07 and 7.09 P. M. The fire required the services of ten engine and four hook and ladder companies, and was under control in one hour. The water pressure was good. The loss was estimated at \$64,275 and the cause could not be ascertained.

Water Consumption.

As nearly as can be estimated 6,157,000 gallons of water were used by the land engines of the Department in extinguishing fires, including the quantity taken from the rivers; and in addition thereto an estimated quantity of 535,000 gallons of river water was used by the floating engines, making an aggregate of 6,692,000 gallons.

AQUEDUCT COMMISSION.

Minutes of Stated Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, held at their Office, No. 209 Stewart Building, on Wednesday, January 21, 1891, at 3 o'clock P. M.

Present—The Comptroller, and Commissioners Duane, Tucker and Scott.

On motion of Commissioner Scott, the minutes of stated meeting of January 7, 1891, were ordered approved.

The Committee of Finance and Audit reported their examination and audit of Voucher No. 6632, being estimate for work done by contractors, amounting to \$22.95; also of bills contained in Vouchers Nos. 6633 to 6649, inclusive, amounting to \$1,082.87.

NEW YORK, January 20, 1891.

Schedule of the flow at Croton Dam into the New Aqueduct, as per request of the Chief Engineer of the Croton Aqueduct:

In my last report I stated that the gates at Croton Dam were closed on the evening of the 12th instant for the purpose of making certain gaugings. The gates at Croton Dam were opened again on the evening of January 14, and a flow of 60,000,000 gallons per twenty-four hours resumed.

During the time that the flow was stopped I caused gaugings to be done under the direction of Deputy Chief Engineer George S. Rice, at Shaft 19½, and also at Shafts 25 and 26, to ascertain the amount of water which reaches the Aqueduct from Croton Dam to the sections under pressure, and also the amount of water lost by percolation in the circular part of the Aqueduct. Without entering into the details of the gaugings, I can report that, at this time of the year, the resultant gain to the supply for the whole length of the Aqueduct is very nearly 4,000,000 of gallons per twenty-four hours, exclusive of the percolation, which, although not exactly computed as yet, will be found to be in the neighborhood of 150,000 gallons per day.

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereafter liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall thenceforth be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act: When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.
