

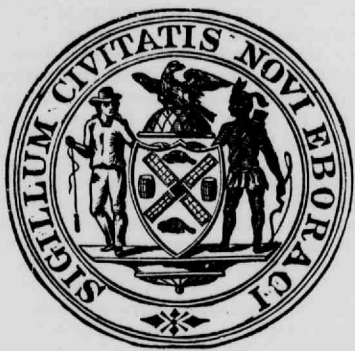

The Third Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within West One Hundred and Tenth street, Fifth avenue, East One Hundred and Sixth street, Third avenue, East Ninety-fifth street, Fifth avenue, Transverse road across Central Park at or near Eighty-sixth street, and Eighth avenue.

The Fourth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within East One Hundred and Sixth street, East river, East One Hundred and Fourth street, and Third avenue.

The Fifth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within East One Hundred and Eleventh street, East river, East One Hundred and Sixth street, and Second avenue, including Ward's Island.

The Sixth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within East One Hundred and Eleventh street, Second avenue, East One Hundred and Sixth street, and Third avenue.

The Seventh Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within West One Hundred and Twelfth street, East One Hundred and Twelfth street, Third avenue, East One Hundred and Sixth street, Fifth avenue, West One Hundred and Tenth street, and Seventh avenue.

The Eighth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within West One Hundred and Fourteenth street, East One Hundred and Fourteenth street, Third avenue, East One Hundred and Twelfth street, West One Hundred and Twelfth street, and Seventh avenue.

The Ninth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within East One Hundred and Fourteenth street, Second avenue, East One Hundred and Eleventh street, and Third avenue.

The Tenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within East One Hundred and Fifteenth street, East river, East One Hundred and Eleventh street, Second avenue, East One Hundred and Thirteenth street, and First avenue.

The Eleventh Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within East One Hundred and Fifteenth street, First avenue, East One Hundred and Thirteenth street, and Second avenue.

The Twelfth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within East One Hundred and Nineteenth street, Avenue A, East One Hundred and Eighteenth street, East river, East One Hundred and Fifteenth street, and First avenue.

The Thirteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within East One Hundred and Nineteenth street, First avenue, East One Hundred and Fifteenth street, and Second avenue.

The Fourteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within East One Hundred and Nineteenth street, Second avenue, East One Hundred and Fourteenth street, and Third avenue.

The Fifteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within West One Hundred and Seventeenth street, East One Hundred and Seventeenth street, Third avenue, East One Hundred and Fourteenth street, West One Hundred and Fourteenth street, and Seventh avenue.

The Sixteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within West One Hundred and Nineteenth street, East One Hundred and Nineteenth street, Third avenue, East One Hundred and Seventeenth street, West One Hundred and Seventeenth street, and Seventh avenue.

The Seventeenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within West One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street, East One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street, Fourth avenue, East One Hundred and Twenty-third street, Madison avenue, East One Hundred and Nineteenth street, West One Hundred and Nineteenth street, and Seventh avenue.

The Eighteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within East One Hundred and Twenty-third street, Third avenue, East One Hundred and Nineteenth street, and Madison avenue.

The Nineteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within East One Hundred and Twenty-first street, First avenue, East One Hundred and Twentieth street, Second avenue, East One Hundred and Nineteenth street, and Third avenue.

The Twentieth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within East One Hundred and Twentieth street, East river, East One Hundred and Eighteenth street, Avenue A, East One Hundred and Nineteenth street, and Second avenue, including Randall's Island.

The Twenty-first Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within East One Hundred and Twenty-fourth street, East river, East One Hundred and Twentieth street, and First avenue.

The Twenty-second Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within East One Hundred and Twenty-third street, First avenue, East One Hundred and Twenty-first street, and Third avenue.

The Twenty-third Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Harlem river, East One Hundred and Twenty-fourth street, First avenue, East One Hundred and Twenty-third street, and Second avenue.

The Twenty-fourth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within East One Hundred and Twenty-seventh street, Second avenue, East One Hundred and Twenty-third street, Lexington avenue, East One Hundred and Twenty-fourth street, and Third avenue.

The Twenty-fifth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within East One Hundred and Twenty-seventh street, Third avenue, East One Hundred and Twenty-fourth street, Lexington avenue, East One Hundred and Twenty-third street, and Fourth avenue.

The Twenty-sixth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within West One Hundred and Twenty-seventh street, East One Hundred and Twenty-seventh street, Fourth avenue, East One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street, West One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street, and Seventh avenue.

The Twenty-seventh Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within West One Hundred and Thirtieth street, East One Hundred and Thirtieth street, Madison avenue, East One Hundred and Twenty-seventh street, West One Hundred and Twenty-seventh street, and Seventh avenue.

The Twenty-eighth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within East One Hundred and Thirtieth street, Lexington avenue, East One Hundred and Twenty-seventh street, and Madison avenue.

The Twenty-ninth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within East One Hundred and Thirtieth street, Harlem river, Second avenue, East One Hundred and Twenty-seventh street, and Lexington avenue.

The Thirtieth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Harlem river, East One Hundred and Thirtieth street, and Fifth avenue.

The Thirty-first Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Harlem river, Fifth avenue, West One Hundred and Thirtieth street, and Seventh avenue.

TWENTY-FOURTH ASSEMBLY DISTRICT.

The Twenty-fourth Assembly District shall be divided into twenty-seven election districts, the extent and limits of which shall be as follows:
