HEALTH DEPARTMENT, No. 301 MOTT STREET,  
NEW YORK, October 19, 1875.

The Board of Health met this day.

#### Orders.

348 orders for the abatement of nuisances were made.

#### Suits for Penalties.

The Attorney was directed to commence suits for non-compliance with the orders of the Board in 45 cases.

#### Reports Received.

Weekly report from the Sanitary Superintendent: On operations of the Sanitary Bureau; on contagious diseases; on slaughter-houses; on operations at receiving dock; from Riverside Hospital; on disinfection of privies, etc., etc.

#### Resolutions.

That the Board of Police be respectfully requested to detail two officers from the Sanitary Company, whose duty it shall be, under the direction of the Sanitary Superintendent, to visit all vessels arriving from foreign ports, and enforce the ordinance which requires that such vessels shall have a permit from this Department to land cargo at the wharves of this city.

Whereas, A drove of 108 cattle were driven on the afternoon of the 15th of October from the cattle yard, Sixty-fifth street, North river, to Forty-second street ferry, in violation of the Sanitary Code, but by written permission of a Captain of Police; therefore

Resolved, That a copy of the preamble and resolution and the written permit of said police officer be respectfully referred to the Board of Police.

That John McCauley be appointed a clerk in the Sanitary Bureau, with salary at the rate of \$600 per annum.

That Order No. 7663, on premises No. 438 West Thirty-sixth street, be rescinded, and suit discontinued, and referred to the Sanitary Superintendent for report on adjoining premises.

That Order No. 9467, on premises No. 212 West Forty-second street, be rescinded.

That Order No. 9864, on premises Nos. 47 and 49 South William street, be suspended until May 1, 1876.

That the petition of citizens in respect to dumping-board at foot of East One Hundred and Tenth street, with the report of the Sanitary Superintendent thereon, to the Board of Police.

#### Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed by the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending October 16, 1875: The total number of inspections made by the Inspectors was 1,803, as follows: 1 public building, 968 tenement houses, 138 private dwellings, 75 other dwellings, 18 manufactories and workshops, 19 stores and warehouses, 58 stables, 55 slaughter-houses, 12 fat-rendering establishments, 1 land and place, 2 dumping grounds, 56 vacant and sunken lots, 50 yards, courts, and areas, 28 cellars and basements, 63 waste-pipes and drains, 123 privies and water-closets, 62 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 2 dangerous stairways, 6 dangerous and smoky chimneys, 10 other nuisances, 1 railroad car, together with 45 visits of the Sanitary Inspectors to cases of contagious diseases.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 551.

During the past week 47 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 38 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 28 houses, 28 privy-sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

9 cases of small-pox were removed to the Hospital, and 1 dead body to the Morgue by the Ambulance Corps.

72 permits were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

108 permits were granted to scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The following number of cases of contagious diseases was reported during the week ending October 16, 1875: Typhus fever, 6; typhoid fever, 26; scarlet fever, 22; measles, 6; diphtheria, 84; and small-pox, 15.

7 tanks and 1,974 cans of night-soil were removed by the scavengers from the privy-vaults of the city during the week ending October 16, 1875.

The following amount of meat and fish was condemned by the officers as unfit for human food during the week ending October 16, 1875: Calves (bob), 1 carcass; calves (case), 2 carcasses; beef, 50 pounds; veal, 50 pounds; poultry, 79 pounds; and fish, 515 pounds.

#### Bureau of Vital Statistics.

During the week ending October 16, 1875, there were issued from this Bureau 487 burial permits for city deaths, 25 for bodies *in transitu*, and 36 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 487 deaths, 129 marriages, 444 births, 36 still-births, 25 applications for transit permits, and 50 returns from Coroners. There were 34 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths, and 6 transcripts of birth record, 2 of marriage, and 23 of death were issued from this Bureau. Two cases of deaths were referred to Coroners.

SIR—Herewith I beg to return the petition of Joseph Bernstein for the restoration to him of twenty-four dollars and sixty-two cents (\$24.62), proceeds of certain property taken from his person



on his arrest, on the 18th of December, 1872, and accompanying memorandum from the Property Clerk.

In answer to inquiry, Captain Caffrey states, in writing, that the articles claimed were not connected with the robbery for which Bernstein was arrested. I am respectfully of opinion that the prayer of the petitioner should be granted.

## CORPORATION SALE OF FERRY FRANCHISES.

**SEALED BIDS WILL BE RECEIVED AND** publicly opened at the Comptroller's office, on Thursday, October 28, 1875, at 2 o'clock P. M., for Leases of Franchise or right to maintain and operate several ferries around the City of New York for the terms and on the conditions hereafter set forth.

The leases will be made to conform to the requirements of the laws relative to ferries, and subject to such regulations, ordinances, or by-laws, as now are or hereafter may be made or passed by the Common Council or State Legislature, and the leases will also provide that the lessees shall take and assume at their own costs and charges all or any responsibilities and liabilities of the Corporation of the City of New York to the present lessees of ferries in relation to boats, fixtures, etc., belonging to such lessees at the respective ferries.

The minimum rate for which the ferry franchise or license to operate ferries shall be used or enjoyed, has been appraised and set by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at two and one-half per centum of the gross receipts for ferrage that shall hereafter accrue at each separate ferry, to be paid quarterly to the Corporation, and a covenant will be contained in each lease requiring the lessees to make and deliver to the Comptroller of the City of New York, quarterly, a statement in writing verified by oath or affirmation of the lessee or of such proper officer of the lessee as may be designated by the Comptroller of the actual total gross receipts for ferrage received by such lessee during the preceding three months, and also that the lessees shall keep regular books of account showing the daily gross receipts of the ferry leased, and allow said Comptroller or any person designated by him to examine such books.

The Department of Docks of the City of New York has fixed and established the rent for which it will lease the property in wharves, piers, slips, and lands under water belonging to the Corporation, at the several ferries to be leased to the parties or persons to whom the lease of the ferry franchise shall be awarded by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, for the term specified for the lease of the franchise, at the rates set forth hereafter, and no deviation will be made from the same, and covenants will be contained in such leases for construction, maintenance and surrender of all necessary fixtures and appurtenances to the wharf and pier property belonging to the city used by such respective ferries.

Proposals for the lease or license to use the ferry franchise at the respective ferries, to state the maximum percentage on gross receipts which the person or parties offering to take each ferry will pay in addition to the rent fixed by the Department of Docks for the use of the pier or wharf property belonging to the city, but no lease will be given at less than the minimum rate of 2½ per cent. on the gross receipts.

Security satisfactory to the Comptroller will be required for the punctual performance by the lessees of the covenants of the lease of the franchise in their behalf.

The several ferries at which the franchise only is to be leased are as follows:

1st. The ferry from the foot of Tenth street, East river, to Greenpoint, Long Island, for the term of five years from November 1, 1875.

The several ferries at which the franchise is to be leased, with use of pier and wharf property belonging to the City of New York, are as follows:

2d. The ferry from the north side of Twenty-third street, East river, as now occupied, to Greenpoint, Long Island, for the term of five years from November 1, 1875, subject to \$2,000 per annum rent, payable as last mentioned.

3d. The ferry from the foot of Grand street, East river, to Grand street, Brooklyn, L. I., including such wharf property as shall have been heretofore used by the ferry run from these points, for the term of ten years from November 1, 1875, subject to payment of \$2,000 per annum for the first five years, and \$3,000 per annum during the second five years, rent payable quarterly to the Department of Docks.

4th. The ferry from the foot of Desbrosses street, North river, to Jersey City, New Jersey, for the term of one year from November 1, 1875, subject to \$3,000 per annum rent, payable as last mentioned.

All of such leases to contain, in addition to the usual covenants and agreements, a clause to the effect that the lessees will, at all times during the term of their respective leases, well and sufficiently repair, uphold, sustain, amend, maintain and keep all and singular the floats, racks, fenders, bridges, and other fixtures at each landing place of their respective ferries, and that in the event of any damage to the bulkheads and piers adjoining their respective ferries, from collision by ferryboats or otherwise, from any action or negligence on their part, that they the said lessees will immediately repair and restore said property to its former good condition, free of cost and expense to the Corporation; also, that if at any time during the continuance of the demised term the Department of Docks shall require any of the premises connected with any ferry slip or landing place so leased, upon written notice having been given for three months, previously that it is the desire of the Department of Docks to progress with the improvements in that vicinity, such Department of Docks may declare the demised term to be terminated, and the lessees shall surrender upon the City of New York for any damages whatever.
