

### BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF RAPID TRANSIT.

### The Board met, pursuant to adjournment, at 12 o'clock M.

Present-All the Commissioners, viz. : The President, Lewis B? Brown, Cornelius H. Delamater, Jordan L. Mott, and Charles J. Canda.

The printed minutes of the meetings held July 30, August 2, and August 3, 1875, respectively, were read, and, upon motion of Mr. Mott, were approved.

Communications were received from various persons, read, considered, and numbered from 171 to 178, inclusive.

Resolved, That Samuel H. 


