Ordered, That any and all dogs loose and at large in any of the public streets, avenues, highways or other public places in the City of New York unless muzzled or held as aforesaid shall be destroyed by Inspectors or other duly authorized agents and officers of the Department designated and so directed by the Sanitary Superintendent; further be it

Ordered, That this order and regulation be and the same shall remain in force and effect until the 1st day of September, 1909, and that public notice of the requirements hereby and of this order be printed in the City Record and posted and kept posted in each of the Borough offices of the Department of Health for ten days in succession, beginning July 9, 1909.
