improvement of the water-front between West 44th and West 48th streets, North River, Borough of Manhattan, made and adopted by the Commissioner of Docks in accordance with law, April 10, 1913.

Hon. WILLIAM J. GAYNOR, Mayor and Chairman of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Sir—I submit herewith for the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund new plan for the improvement of the water-front between 44th and 47th streets, North River, which I have this day adopted. Notice of Public Hearing.

Public notice is hereby given that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, in accordance with the provisions of chapter 372 of the Laws of 1907, will hold a public hearing in Room 16, City Hall, Borough of Manhattan, at 11 o'clock in the forenoon on Wednesday, April 30, 1913, relative to request of the Commissioner of Docks that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund approve proposed amendments to amended new plan for the improvement of the waterfront between 44th and 48th streets, North River, Borough of Manhattan, made and adopted by the Commissioner of Docks, in accordance with law, April 10, 1913. The plan as adopted by the Commissioner of Docks is open to the inspection of any citizen at the office of the Comptroller of The City of New York, No. 280 Broadway, Borough of Manhattan, at any time during business hours.

The following is a technical description of the proposed amendments:

The proposed amendments to the new plan consist in the establishment of one pier 150 feet in width and one lateral extension along the northerly side of Pier 84, or West 44th Street Pier, 35 feet in width, extending from the pierhead line established by the Secretary of War in 1897, to the bulkhead line proposed to be established, described as follows:

Beginning at the point of intersection of the northerly side of West 47th street with the bulkhead line established in 1871, running thence easterly and along the northerly side of West 47th street to a point in the same distant 550 feet west of the westerly side of 11th avenue, thence southerly and parallel with and 550 feet west of the westerly side of 11th avenue to a point 30 feet south of the southerly line of West 47th street, thence in a straight line to a point distant 570 feet west of the westerly side of 11th avenue, measured at right angles to the same, and 395 feet north of the northerly side of West 44th street, measured at right angles to the same, thence in a straight line to a point 635 feet west of the westerly side of 11th avenue, measured at right angles to the same, and 35 feet north of the northerly side of West 44th street, thence westerly and parallel with and 35 feet north of the northerly side of West 54th street to its intersection with the bulkhead line established in 1871.

Also the establishment of a marginal street, wharf or place inshore of and adjoining the bulkhead line above described, the inshore line of which is bounded and described as follows:

Beginning at a point on the westerly side of 12th avenue, distant 100 feet 5 inches north of the northerly side of West 47th street, thence easterly and parallel with and distant 100 feet 5 inches north of the northerly side of West 47th street to a point distant 400 feet west of the westerly side of 11th avenue, thence southerly and parallel with and 400 feet west of the westerly side of 11th avenue to the northerly side of West 46th street, thence in a straight line to a point in the southerly side of West 45th street, 445 feet west of the westerly side of 11th avenue, thence southerly and parallel with and 445 feet west of the westerly side of 11th avenue to the southerly side of West 44th street, thence westerly and along the southerly side of West 44th street, and its westerly extension to the westerly side of 12th avenue.

No one appeared for or against the proposition. Calvin Tomkins, ex-Commissioner of Docks, filed a brief.

The Commissioner of Docks submitted the following:

New York, April 29, 1913.

To the Honorable the Mayor, W. J. GAYNOR, and the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Sirs—I transmit herewith estimate of cost of carrying on the improvement of the water-front in the vicinity of West 46th street, by the construction of modern piers, which plan was submitted to your Board for approval on April 16, 1913, from which it will be seen that the actual cost of building a pier 1,000 feet long at the foot of West 46th street, with a shed 1,200 feet long and half of the 360 feet slips on each side, with sufficient property to permit the lengthening of said pier to 1,200 feet, is \$2,735,000.

It would be unbusinesslike, however, not to consider the future development of this section, and the extension of the pier system, which can be carried on at a proportionately less cost. I have therefore also included in the statement the cost of the additional property required for future treatment, and to enable the department to carry out the present plan in the most economical manner of which the future development will derive a large share of the benefit. The Chair then declared the hearing closed.

The Commissioner of Docks presented a communication requesting that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund authorize and assent to the institution of condemnation proceedings for the acquisition of property between the northerly side of West 44th street and the centre line of the block between West 47th and West 48th streets, North River, Borough of Manhattan. A public hearing being necessary the following resolution was offered for adoption:

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby fix 11 o'clock in the forenoon on Wednesday, May 21, 1913, in Room 16, City Hall, Borough of Manhattan, as the time and place for a public hearing in the matter of the request of the Commissioner of Docks, that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund authorize and assent to the institution of condemnation proceedings for the acquisition of property between the northerly side of West 44th street and the centre line of the block between West 47th and West 48th streets, North River, Borough of Manhattan.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report relative to a request of the Armory Board, that the plot of ground at the foot of West 97th street, in the Borough of Manhattan, turned over by the Park Department as no longer required, be assigned to the said Board for the use of the 1st Battalion, Naval Militia, New York.

Gentlemen—On July 7, 1911, the Armory Board adopted a resolution requesting the Department of Parks to surrender to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund a certain piece of property, 225 by 450 feet, at the foot of West 97th street, Borough of Manhattan, for use of the 1st Battalion, Naval Militia, to be used for the location of suitable and adequate dock, berthing and mooring facilities for vessels and boats, and for a site for a boat shed and sail loft for the use of the 1st Battalion, Naval Militia, New York.

In compliance therewith, the Department of Parks on August 17, 1911, adopted a resolution surrendering to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the lands described therein for the purposes therein indicated, as follows:

Beginning at the northwesterly corner of the crib bulkhead on the Hudson River, which extends north from the pier opposite the end of West 97th street, and running thence in a general easterly direction, and at right angles to 12th avenue, to the westerly line of 12th avenue; running thence southerly along the west line of 12th avenue, 450 feet; running thence westerly at right angles to 12th avenue, over land and water, 225 feet; running thence northerly and parallel with 12th avenue, over the waters of the Hudson River, 450 feet; and running thence easterly and at right angles to 12th avenue and in prolongation of the first course laid down to the point or place of beginning * * * to be used for the location of suitable and adequate dock berthing and mooring facilities for vessels and boats, and for a site for a boat shed and sail loft for the use of the 1st Battalion, Naval Militia, New York.

I feel that the propriety of assigning premises which were originally acquired for park purposes, to any department, should be passed upon by the members of the Sinking Fund Commission without any recommendation from the Comptroller, and I therefore submit for their consideration the application of the Armory Board above mentioned and request them to determine whether or not the following described property should be assigned to the Armory Board for the location of suitable and adequate dock, berthing and mooring facilities for vessels and boats, and for a site for a boat shed and sail loft for the use of the 1st Battalion, Naval Militia, New York:

Beginning at the northwesterly corner of the crib bulkhead on the Hudson River, which extends north from the pier opposite the end of West 97th street, and running thence in a general easterly direction, and at right angles to 12th avenue, to the westerly line of 12th avenue; running thence southerly along the west line of 12th avenue, 450 feet; running thence westerly at right angles to 12th avenue, over land and water, 225 feet; running thence northerly and parallel with 12th avenue, over the waters of the Hudson River, 450 feet; and running thence easterly and at right angles to 12th avenue and in prolongation of the first course laid down to the point or place of beginning. "Beginning at the northwesterly corner of the crib bulkhead on the Hudson River, which extends north from the pier opposite the end of West 97th street, and running thence in a general easterly direction, and at right angles to 12th avenue, to the westerly line of 12th avenue; running thence southerly along the west line of 12th avenue, 450 feet; running thence westerly at right angles to 12th avenue, over land and water, 225 feet; running thence northerly and parallel with 12th avenue, over the waters of the Hudson River, 450 feet; and running thence easterly and at right angles to 12th avenue and in prolongation of the first course laid down to the point or place of beginning, to be used for the location of suitable and adequate dock, berthing and mooring facilities for vessels and boats, and for a site for a boat shed and sail loft for the use of the 1st Battalion Naval Militia, New York. Which was referred to a select committee consisting of the President of the Board of Aldermen, Chamberlain and Deputy Comptroller Mathewson.

Note—At this point the President of the Board of Aldermen was excused from further attendance, and Ardolph L. Kline, Vice-Chairman of the Board of Aldermen, took his seat as Acting President.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller brought up the matter of the communication from the Commissioner of Docks, transmitting for approval form of advertisement for a sale of the lease of franchise for a ferry between Bay Ridge avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, and St. George, Borough of Richmond, together with certain wharf property to be used in connection with the operation thereof, which was laid over at the last meeting.

Laid over.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller brought up the matter of the proposed lease by the Commissioner of Docks to the Occidental Dock Company, of Pier (new) 69, North River, at or near the foot of West 29th street, Borough of Manhattan, which was laid over at the last meeting.

Laid over.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented a report of the Corporate Stock Budget Committee, recommending to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that it amend its resolutions as follows:

1. Resolution adopted July 1, 1910, authorizing an issue of \$240,000 corporate stock to pay the cost of construction of a shed on the pier at the foot of West 33d street, Borough of Brooklyn.

2. Resolution adopted June 8, 1911, authorizing an issue of corporate stock to an amount not exceeding \$17,000 for the purpose of providing means for the construction of a shed on pier at the foot of 33d street, Borough of Brooklyn.

Which was laid over at the request of the Commissioner of Docks.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution, relative to the hiring of Metropolitan Temple, 7th avenue and 14th street, Borough of Manhattan, for use of the Board of Education for lecture purposes.

April 25, 1913.

To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—On March 12, 1913, the Board of Education adopted a resolution requesting the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to approve of the hiring of Metropolitan Temple, at 7th avenue and 14th street, Borough of Manhattan, for lecture purposes, during the season of 1912-1913, for one evening per week, at a rental of \$5 per evening.

The City is at present paying all the way from \$5 to \$25 a night for the hiring of halls for lecture purposes, so the rent in the present instance is just and reasonable.

I, therefore, respectfully recommend, the rent being reasonable and just, that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund authorize the hiring of Metropolitan Temple at

7th avenue and 14th street, Borough of Manhattan, by the Board of Education for lecture purposes, during the season of 1912-1913, for one evening per week, at a rental of \$5 per evening, and that the Comptroller be authorized to pay the rental of the same upon a voucher drawn by the Board of Education without the necessity of entering into a lease therefor; the rental to include heat and light. Respectfully,

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby approve of the hiring, by the Board of Education, for lecture purposes, Metropolitan Temple, at 7th avenue and 14th street, Borough of Manhattan, during the season of 1912-1913, for one evening per week, at a rental of five dollars (\$5) per evening, the rental to include heat and light; and be it further

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized to pay the said rental upon a voucher prepared by the Board of Education without the necessity of entering into a lease.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—On December 18, 1912, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopted a resolution authorizing a lease to the City, from Joseph Di Piazza, of the store premises, consisting of a store 12 feet 6 inches by 22 feet 6 inches, with rear room 14 feet 2 inches by 12 feet 6 inches, and storage bin 6 by 6 feet in rear part of cellar, of premises No. 2346 Pacific street, Borough of Brooklyn, for use of the Department of Health, for a period of two years from January 15, 1913, with the privilege of renewal for one year upon the same terms and conditions, at a rental of \$300 a year, payable quarterly.

V. Green, attorney; the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund deeming the said rent fair and reasonable and that it would be for the best interests of the City that such lease be made.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution relative to a lease to the City of premises at No. 364 West 23d street, Borough of Manhattan, for use of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity:

April 25, 1913.

To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—The Commissioner of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, in a communication to your Board under date of March 31, 1913, states that the work of the extension of the high pressure fire service system north of 23d street will begin about May 1. That about thirty-five Engineers and Inspectors will be constantly employed supervising the different features of the construction, and that it is necessary to secure a field office close to the work for these men. He requests that for this purpose a lease be secured of the second floor of the building at No. 364 West 23d street, Borough of Manhattan, containing a floor space of 760 square feet, for a term of one year from May 1, 1913, at a rental of \$720 a year, including steam heat, cold and hot water supply and janitor service, the rent to be paid monthly.

The floor in question is well lighted front and rear and is well adapted to the purpose required, and the rent is the lowest that can be found within the district from 23d to 34th street and 7th to 9th avenue, being at the rate of approximately 96 cents a square foot.

The Commissioner states that in his opinion the rent is reasonable and the necessity for this field office is obvious.

Deeming the rent reasonable and just, I respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt a resolution authorizing a lease of the second floor of the building No. 364 West 23d street, Borough of Manhattan, for use of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, for a period of one year from May 1, 1913, at an annual rental of \$720, payable monthly, the lessor to pay taxes and water rates, make inside and outside repairs and furnish steam heat, hot water and janitor service; the lessee to supply light; and the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund deeming the said rent fair and reasonable and that it would be for the best interests of the City that such lease be made, the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized and directed to execute the same when prepared and approved by the Corporation Counsel, as provided by sections 149 and 217 of the Greater New York Charter.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

Resolved, That the Corporation Counsel be and is hereby requested to prepare a lease to the City, from Jacob Appel, of the second floor of the building No. 364 W. 23d street, Borough of Manhattan, for use of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, for a period of one year from May 1, 1913, at an annual rental of seven hundred and twenty dollars (\$720), payable monthly; the lessor to pay taxes and water rates, make inside and outside repairs and furnish steam heat, hot water and janitor service; the lessee to supply light; and the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund deeming the said rent fair and reasonable and that it would be for the best interests of the City that such lease be made, the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized and directed to execute the same when prepared and approved by the Corporation Counsel, as provided by sections 149 and 217 of the Greater New York Charter.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution relative to an amendment to resolution authorizing a lease of premises at No. 277 Broadway, Manhattan, for use of the Commissioner of Licenses:

April 25, 1913.

To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—On April 2, 1913, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopted a resolution authorizing a renewal of the lease of Rooms 901, 902, 903, 904, 905 and 906, in the Broadway Chambers Building, No. 277 Broadway, Borough of Manhattan, for use of the Bureau of Licenses for a period of one year from May 1, 1913, with the privilege to the lessee of cancelling and terminating said lease at the end of any month after the first six months, upon giving thirty days' written notice to the lessor of its intention so to do, at an annual rental of \$4,000, payable quarterly.

This should have been for use of the Commissioner of Licenses.

I therefore respectfully recommend that the above resolution be amended by substituting the words "for use of the Commissioner of Licenses" in place of the words "for use of the Bureau of Licenses." Respectfully,

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution relative to the hiring of Room 325, at No. 51 Chambers street, Borough of Manhattan, for use of the Committee on Standardization of Salaries and Grades of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

April 25, 1913

To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—The Comptroller, as Chairman of the Committee on Standardization of Salaries and Grades of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, in a communi-

cation to your Board under date of April 23, 1913, requests that the necessary steps be taken to secure possession of Room 325 in the Emigrant Industrial Savings Bank Building, No. 51 Chambers street, Borough of Manhattan, for the use of an additional corps of Draftsmen engaged on charting the organizations of the various Departments of the City.

The room in question has a floor area of 376 square feet and the rental is \$50 a month, or at the yearly rate of \$1.92 a square foot, which is less than the City is paying for some of the other offices in this building. The lessor to furnish heat, light, water, elevator and janitor service and make all repairs, the lease to be terminated on thirty days' notice by either party.

Deeming the rent reasonable and just, I respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt a resolution authorizing the Comptroller to pay to the Emigrant Industrial Savings Bank, quarterly, rent at the rate of \$50 a month for Room 325 in the Emigrant Industrial Savings Bank Building, 51 Chambers street, Borough of Manhattan, for use of the Committee on Standardization of Salaries and Grades of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, for a period not exceeding six months from May 1, 1913, the lessor to furnish heat, light, water, elevator and janitor service and make all repairs, said occupancy to be terminable by either party upon thirty days' notice, without the necessity of entering into a lease therefor. Respectfully,

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report recommending the adoption of a resolution which will provide and direct that the proceeds derived from any sale of real estate or interest therein, from and after April 10, 1913, be placed to the credit of a special fund:

April 25, 1913.

Subject: Proceeds Derived from Sales of Real Estate.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—By chapter 259 of the Laws of 1913, which became a law on April 10, 1913, the Legislature of the State of New York enacted an amendment to section 205 of the City Charter with relation to the powers of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund. The section referred to vests the Sinking Fund Commissioners with the authority to sell or lease any City property, except parks, wharves, piers and land under water, and said section as so amended provides specifically that:

"The proceeds of said sale or leasing shall, on receipt thereof, after paying necessary charges, be immediately paid to the credit of the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt; except that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund shall have power to provide that the proceeds derived from the sale of any real estate or interest therein, remaining after the payment therefrom of the necessary charges of the sale and of any liens and charges upon the property sold, be paid to the credit of an appropriately designated fund, hereby created, and applied to the purchase of other real estate deemed necessary for public purposes when and as authorized, pursuant to the provisions of this act with the same force and effect as though such disbursement was from the proceeds of the sale of corporate stock authorized to be issued for the purchase of real estate. The fund hereby created shall be under the control of the said Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, and the moneys therein not disposed of in the purchase of real estate shall, when and as directed by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, with the concurrence of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, be paid to the credit of the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt. All the provisions of this act, relative to the purchase of real estate by the City, shall be made applicable to the acquisition of such real estate, purchased through the medium of the fund hereby created."

The italicized portions of the section quoted above reflect the amendment which was added thereto by the Legislature of 1913. As this amendment has given the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund power to provide that the proceeds derived from any sale of real estate be paid to the credit of an appropriately designated fund and applied to the purchase of other real estate deemed necessary for public purposes, when and as authorized, it is hereby respectfully recommended that the Sinking Fund Commissioners provide that the Comptroller place and pay all the proceeds derived from and after April 10, 1913, from the sale of such real estate as is referred to in section 205 of the City Charter to the credit of a special fund designated as "Sales of City Property," with a sub-title, "Under section 205 of the Charter as amended by chapter 259, Laws of 1913."

The following resolution is therefore submitted for the purpose of carrying this recommendation into effect. Respectfully,

Whereas, Section 205 of the Charter relating to the powers of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund with respect to the application of the proceeds of the sale of certain City property was amended by the Legislature by an act which became a law on April 10, 1913, being chapter 259 of the Laws of 1913, by vesting the Sinking Fund Commission with power to pay such proceeds to the credit of the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt, or to provide

"That the proceeds derived from any sale of real estate, or interest therein, remaining after the payment therefrom of the necessary charges of the sale and of any liens and charges upon the property sold, be paid to the credit of an appropriately designated fund, hereby created, and applied to the purchase of other real estate deemed necessary for public purposes when and as authorized, pursuant to the provisions of this act, with the same force and effect as though such disbursement was from the proceeds of the sale of corporate stock authorized to be issued for the purchase of real estate."

Therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Sinking Fund Commissioners hereby provide and direct that the proceeds derived from any sale of real estate or interest therein, from and after April 10, 1913, remaining after the payment therefrom of the necessary charges of the sale, and of any liens and charges upon the property sold, be placed and paid to the credit of a special fund to be designated "Sales of City Property—Under Section 205 of the Charter as Amended by Chapter 259, Laws of 1913," and that such proceeds be held in said fund and applied to the purchase of other real estate deemed necessary for public purposes when and as authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund. All the provisions of the Greater New York Charter, relative to the purchase of real estate by the City, shall be made applicable to the acquisition of such real estate, purchased through the medium of the fund hereby created.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution relative to fines payable to the American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals and the Humane Society of New York:

April 25, 1913.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—Fines for cruelty to animals have been imposed and collected in Courts of Special Sessions and in City Magistrates' Courts of the City of New York during the months of December, 1912, January, February and March, 1913, and paid into the Sinking Fund for the Payment of the Interest on the City Debt.

Pursuant to section 5, chapter 490, Laws of 1888, said fines are payable to the several societies indicated.

Said premises are used as a charitable institution for the treatment of diseases of the eye and ear without compensation, when patients are unable to pay. Other patients pay as able. Support is mainly from charitable contributions.

It appears from an examination of the assessment rolls that said property has been exempt from local taxation for the years 1905 and since, and the assessed valuation for the year 1913 is \$51,000 for lot 28 and \$65,000 for lot 29.

It further appears from the records of the Bureau for the Collection of Assessments and Arrears that the following assessments for local improvements were levied against said property and are now open and unpaid on the records of the Department, namely:

It appears from the foregoing that of the total of 8,096 hospital days, 4,210 thereof, or approximately 52 per cent., represents free treatment, and the remaining 3,886 days, or 48 per cent., represents treatment which was paid for.

On the foregoing basis, an equitable adjustment of the matter would be to cancel the aggregate amount of the face of the open charges, viz., \$198.24, upon the payment of 48 per cent. thereof, or \$95.15.

The petitioner, in response to a request, has submitted a financial statement for the last fiscal year, showing the total receipts from all sources (including balance of \$16,408.41 from preceding year), to be \$40,055.08, and the expenditures for all objects, \$18,185.14, leaving a balance of \$21,869.94.

It appearing, therefore, that the petitioner was the actual owner of the real estate in question and entitled to have the same exempted from taxation during the time when said liens, above mentioned, accrued and became a lien thereupon, I am of the opinion that the petitioner has presented a proper case for relief to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of The City of New York, under the provisions of section 221A of the Greater New York Charter, and I would, therefore, certify my approval of the application of the New York Ophthalmic and Aural Institute pursuant to the

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As to Section 1, Block 285, Lot 29, the records of this department show that a portion of the building erected on said premises, known as No. 197 East Broadway, has been leased continuously since May 1, 1904, and is, at the present time, leased by the petitioner to the Board of Education of The City of New York at a yearly rental of \$2,750, being used as an annex to Public School No. 75.

All of the water charges against said lot, which the petitioner seeks to have cancelled, with the exception of the charge for 1903, accrued and became liens during the period when a part of the premises was leased as aforesaid, and while the petitioner was deriving an income of \$2,750 per annum from The City of New York. The part so rented, therefore, was not used exclusively for carrying out thereupon one or more of the purposes for which the petitioner was organized, within the meaning of said subdivision 7, section 4, article 1 of the Tax Law.

In view of this fact, in my opinion, the petitioner is not entitled to a total cancellation of the foregoing water charges, but only to the cancellation of a proportionate part thereof, such proportionate part being based on the value of that portion of the property not leased as compared with the value of the part leased. It being impossible to physically apportion the property, an equitable method of arriving at the respective valuations of the part rented and the part entitled to exemption would be to capitalize the yearly rent paid at 10 per cent., which would give \$27,500 as the value of the part leased, and deducting said sum from \$300,000, the total assessed valuation gives \$272,500 as the value of the part entitled to exemption. On this basis, the respective valuations are as follows: Part leased, 9 per cent.; part entitled to exemption, 91 per cent. A fair adjustment of the matter, therefore, in my opinion, would be to cancel the total amount of the charges against said Lot 29, Block 285, Section 1, viz., \$281.20, upon the payment by the petitioner of 9 per cent. thereof, or \$25.30.

As to Lot 22, Block 387, Section 2, the petitioner has included in its application, in addition to the water charges for 1910 and 1911, hereinbefore specified, water charges for the years 1904 to 1909, inclusive.

The records of this department, however, show that the entire building erected on said premises, known as No. 624 East 5th street, was leased continuously from February 1, 1903, to February 2, 1910, by the petitioner to the Board of Education of The City of New York, at an annual rental of \$2,500, and was used as an annex to Public School No. 105.

Said water charges for the years 1904 to 1909, inclusive, accrued and became liens, therefore, during the period when the entire premises were leased as aforesaid. In my opinion the application, so far as respects said charges, should be denied, inasmuch as the property was not used by the petitioner for carrying out thereupon one or more of the purposes for which it was organized, within the meaning of said section of the Tax Law hereinbefore referred to. The water charges on said lot for the years 1910 and 1911 accrued and became liens after the termination of the aforesaid lease, and as to these charges the relief may properly be granted.

The total amount involved as principal in the above water charges is \$361.70. The property affected by these water charges is located in the Borough of Manhattan, (1) Section 1, Block 285, Lot 29, southeast corner of East Broadway and Jefferson street; (2) Section 2, Block 387, Lot 22, southerly side of East 5th street, between Avenues B and C.

The attorney for petitioner, Benjamin Tuska, in response to a request, has submitted a financial statement for the year ending June 30, 1912, showing the total receipts from all sources to be \$86,371.44 and the expenditures for all objects \$96,737.66, leaving a deficit of \$10,366.22.

It appearing, therefore, that the petitioner was the actual owner of the real estate in question and entitled to have the same exempted from taxation during the time when said liens, above mentioned, accrued and became a lien thereupon, I am of the opinion that the petitioner has presented a proper case for relief to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of The City of New York, under the provisions of section 221A of the Greater New York Charter, except as to the liens which I have refused to certify for cancellation, and I would, therefore, certify my approval of the application of the Educational Alliance to the extent I have herein indicated as proper pursuant to the provisions of such section of the charter and recommend the liens, above set forth, as the ones which may properly be cancelled, be cancelled upon the payment of \$35.30.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

The following petition was received from Charles B. Isham and others, for a release of the City's interest in a strip of land within the old lines of Seaman avenue, on the northerly side, as now laid out, in the Borough of Manhattan:

To the Board of Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of the City of New York:

The petition of Louis B. Rolston, Estate of William B. Isham, and John G. H. Meyers and Henrietta F. Meyers, respectfully shows:

First—Your petitioners' names and addresses are as follows: Louis B. Rolston, 20 Exchange place, Borough of Manhattan, City of New York; Estate of William B. Isham, 27 William street, Borough of Manhattan, City of New York; John G. H. Meyers and Henrietta F. Meyers, 150 Nassau street, Borough of Manhattan, City of New York.

Second—Annexed hereto is a map made by George C. Wheeler, City Surveyor, dated May 29, 1912, No. 730-21, showing the old and new lines of Seaman avenue at its intersection with the southerly line of Isham street, Borough of Manhattan, City of New York.

Third—By resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopted on December 17, 1909, the plan or layout shown on the map hereto annexed was favored. The original plan so approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment was filed in the office of the Register of the County of New York on January 24, 1910, as Map No. 1403. Said resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment changed the lines of Seaman avenue at their intersection with the southerly line of Isham street. The lines marked "new" on the map hereto annexed are those shown on the plan favored by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment by said resolution.

Fourth—The result of the changing of said lines has been to close the parcels lettered "A" and "B" on the annexed plan for street purposes. Parcels "A" and "B" together contain 1,222 square feet more or less.

Fifth—Parcels "A" and "B" on the annexed plan belong to your petitioners, Estate of William B. Isham, and Louis B. Rolston, respectively. The parcels "C" and "D" on the annexed plan belong to your petitioners, Estate of William B. Isham, and John G. H. Meyers and Henrietta F. Meyers, respectively. Parcels "C" and "D" together contain 900 square feet more or less. In order to save the expense of a proceeding on the part of The City of New York to acquire title to said parcels "C" and "D" and in order that the parcels of land fronting on parcels "A" and "B" may continue to have a frontage on Seaman avenue, the undersigned respectfully request that parcel "A" on the annexed plan be conveyed by The City of New York to your petitioner, Estate of William B. Isham, and that parcel "B" on the annexed plan be conveyed by The City of New York to your petitioner, Louis B. Rolston.

In consideration of the conveyance by The City of New York of said parcels "A" and "B" as aforesaid, your petitioner, Estate of William B. Isham, will convey or cause to be conveyed to The City of New York parcel "C" and your petitioners John G. H. Meyers and Henrietta F. Meyers will convey to The City of New York parcel "D"; your petitioners, Estate of William B. Isham and Louis B. Rolston, will also pay to The City of New York a nominal consideration of one dollar.

The descriptions of said parcels "A," "B," "C" and "D" by metes and bounds are as follows:

Parcel A.

Parcel B.

Beginning at a point in the westerly line of Seaman avenue, where the new line of Seaman avenue, as shown on plan adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on December 17, 1909, and filed in the office of the Register of the County of New York as map No. 1403, intersects the westerly line of Seaman avenue, as formerly laid out, said point being distant northerly, as measured along the westerly line of Seaman avenue 158 feet ¾ of an inch from the corner formed by the intersection of the westerly line of Seaman avenue and the northerly line of Emerson street; running thence northerly along the new westerly line of Seaman avenue, as shown on said plan adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on December 17, 1909, and the westerly line of Seaman avenue as formerly laid out, and between the point where the old and new lines of Seaman avenue intersect and the southerly line of Parcel Number Thirty-one (31) as shown on the damage map in the proceeding for opening Seaman avenue from Academy street to Isham street, said southerly line of said Parcel No. 31 being also the southerly line of parcel "A" on the annexed plan.

Parcel C.

Beginning at the corner formed by the intersection of the southerly line of Isham street and the easterly line of Seaman avenue as shown on plan adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on December 17, 1909, and filed in the office of the Register of the County of New York as Map No. 1403; running thence westerly along a prolongation of the southerly line of Isham street 11 feet 11¼ inches to the easterly line of Seaman avenue as formerly laid out; running thence southerly along the easterly line of Seaman avenue as formerly laid out 106 feet 7½ inches to a point where a line distant 100 feet south of and parallel with the southerly line of Isham street intersects the easterly line of Seaman avenue as formerly laid out; thence easterly along a line distant 100 feet south of and parallel with the southerly line of Isham street 3 feet 11½ inches to the new line of Seaman avenue as shown on said plan adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on December 17, 1909, and thence northerly along the new line of Seaman avenue 104 feet 1½ inches to the point or place of beginning and containing 795 square feet more or less; it being the intention to convey all the land now owned by the grantors, lying between the new easterly line of Seaman avenue as shown on said plan adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on December 17, 1909, and the easterly line of Seaman avenue as formerly laid out and now legally open and between the southerly line of Isham street, prolonged, and a line distant 100 feet south of and parallel with Isham street.

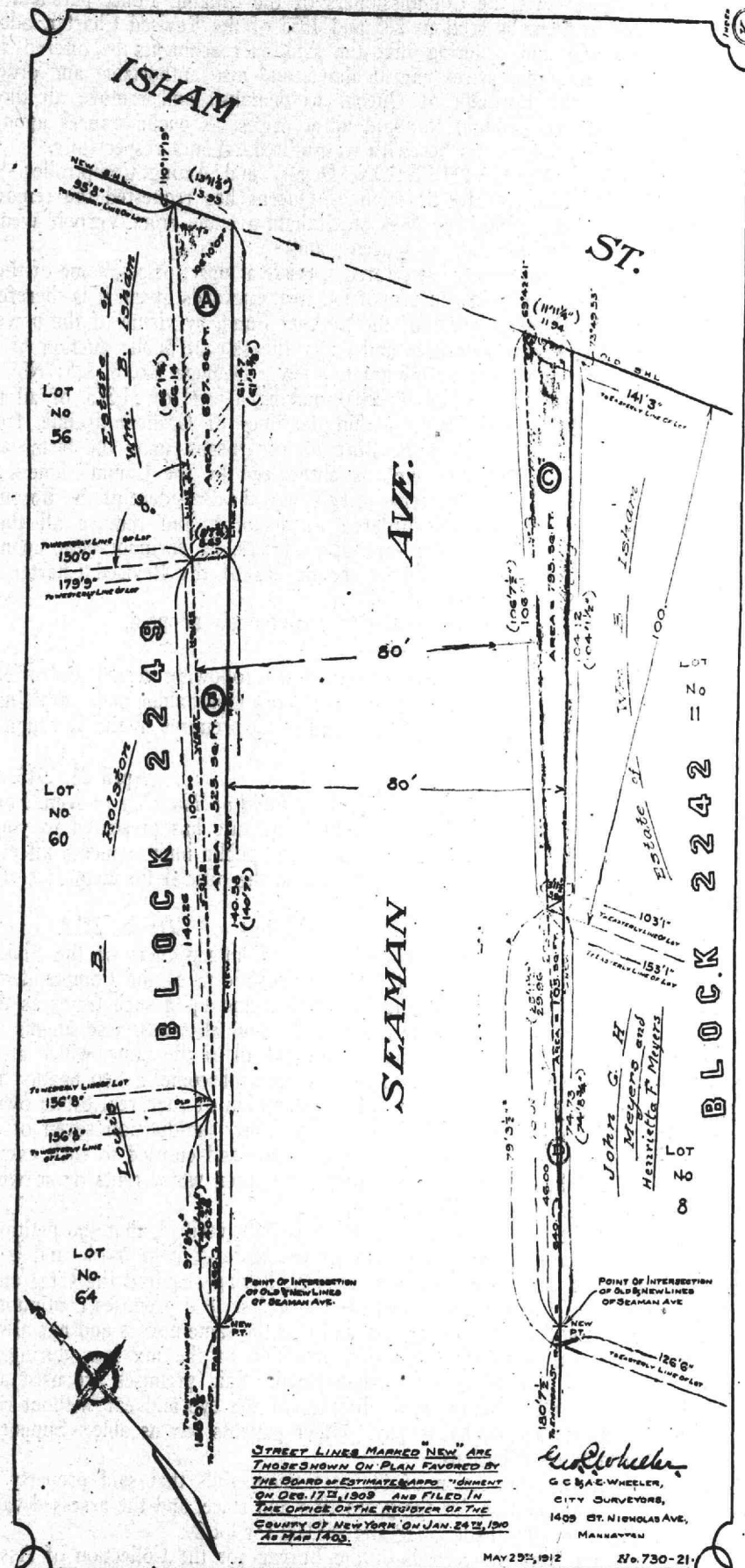

H. Meyers, lying between the new easterly line of Seaman avenue as shown on said plan adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on December 17, 1909, and the easterly line of Seaman avenue as formerly laid out and now legally open, and between a line distant 100 feet south of and parallel with Isham street and the point where the old and new lines of Seaman avenue intersect.

In connection therewith, the Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution:

April 25, 1913.

To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—I am in receipt of a petition to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund from Louis B. Rolston, Estate of William B. Isham and John G. H. Meyers and Henrietta F. Meyers, stating that they are the owners of certain property located on the southeasterly side of Seaman avenue, south of Isham street, Borough of Manhattan.

By resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopted on December 17, 1909, the plan or layout shown on a map attached to the petition was favored. This resolution changed the lines of Seaman avenue at the intersection of the southerly line of Isham street. The lands marked "new" on the map attached to the petition are those shown on the plan favored by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment by said resolution. This resolution relocated the lines of Seaman avenue some feet southeasterly from the old lines, varying from 13 feet 11½ inches on the northerly side of Seaman avenue at Isham street to nothing at a point 202 feet ¾ inch southerly therefrom, and from 11 feet 11¼ inches on the southerly side of Seaman avenue at Isham street to nothing at a point 185 feet 11 inches southerly therefrom.

This leaves a strip of land between the old lines of Seaman avenue and the northerly side of Seaman avenue as now laid out, lying between the lands of the petitioners above named and Seaman avenue, which they desire to obtain from the City. In consideration of a release of this property to them they will cede to the City the lands owned by them on the opposite side of Seaman avenue, and needed by the City to carry out the plan adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on December 17, 1909.

Under the rule adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund the petitioners would be entitled to obtain the closed portion of old Seaman avenue from the City at 50 per cent. of its appraised value. It would therefore be advantageous to accept their proposition and release such land to them, providing they agreed to cede the portions needed on the opposite side of the avenue.

I therefore respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt a resolution authorizing a conveyance, in consideration of the sum of \$1 and the additional charge of \$12.50 for the preparation of the necessary papers, to Charles Isham, Samuel Isham, William B. Isham and Minturn Post Collins, as substituted trustees under the will of William B. Isham, deceased, for the benefit of Flora Isham Collins, of the following described parcel of land in the Borough of Manhattan:

Beginning at the corner formed by the intersection of the southerly line of Isham street and the westerly line of Seaman avenue as shown on plan adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on December 17, 1909, and filed in

The deeds not to be delivered until evidence has been produced that all taxes, assessments and liens due the City, which appear against the land in the road and the petitioners' abutting property have been paid, nor until the sum of \$25 has been paid to the City for the cost of searching the title of the land to be conveyed to the City. Havemeyer, 1 East 66th street, New York City; Horace Havemeyer, Greenwich, Connecticut; Henry O. Havemeyer, Mahwah, N. J.; Frederick C. Havemeyer, Westbury, L. I., and Theodore A. Havemeyer, Brookville, L. I., composing the firm of Havemeyer & Elder, of the hereinabove described property owned by The City of New York in consideration of a conveyance to The City of New York from the fee owners of the property, which it is proposed to exchange therefor and which is also hereinabove described free and clear of all incumbrances; and be it further

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller asked for and received unanimous consent for the consideration of the following:

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution, relative to an amendment to resolution adopted April 22, 1913, approving of agreement between The New York Connecting Railway Company and the Board of Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

April 30, 1913.

To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—On April 2, 1913, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopted a resolution approving of a certain agreement between the New York Connecting Railroad Company and the Board of Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of the City of New York, and requesting the Corporation Counsel to approve such agreement as to form, and to prepare additional instruments, if any, as may be necessary and proper to carry the said agreement into effect.

In accordance therewith the Corporation Counsel was requested to approve the agreement, and to prepare additional instruments if necessary.

In a communication under date of April 24, 1913, the Corporation Counsel stated that he conferred with the representatives of the railroad company regarding the proposed agreement, and they suggested certain changes, as follows:

"The form of agreement contained in resolution adopted by the Sinking Fund Commissioners is acceptable with the exception that in the additional provisions to be added to said agreement as appearing on page 2, the wording in relation to the fences and guards on Randall's Island might be construed to mean that said fences and guards are to be indefinitely maintained on the island. This is not in accordance with the agreement with the authorities having control of the island or in accordance with the obligations imposed by the Certificate of the Board of Rapid Transit Commissioners for the City of New York to the New York Connecting Railroad Co. dated February 14, 1907. It is therefore suggested that after the word 'maintenance' on the last line of page 2 be added 'said guards and fences above provided for to be maintained on said islands only so long as the same are occupied by contractors for construction purposes.'

"Your attention is also called to clause 'B' on page 1 of the resolution (which is a quotation from the certificate issued by the Rapid Transit Board to the railroad company) after the asterisks: 'The rate shall be agreed upon, etc.' The first word should be changed to read 'two' to correspond with the franchise."

I therefore respectfully recommend that the resolution above mentioned be amended by adding after the word "maintenance" on the last line of page 2, the words, "said guards and fences above provided for to be maintained on said islands only so long as the same are occupied by contractors for construction purposes," and by changing in clause (b) on page 1, the word "The" which appears after the asterisks, to "Two." Respectfully,

Resolved, That the resolution adopted by this Board at meeting held April 2, 1913, approving of an agreement between the New York Connecting Railway Company, a corporation of the State of New York, and the Board of Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of The City of New York, and requesting the Corporation Counsel to approve such agreement as to form, and to prepare additional instruments, if any, as may be necessary and proper to carry the said agreement into effect, be and the same is hereby amended by adding after the words "the New York Connecting Railroad Company will construct a high board fence the entire length of the island separating the field of their operations from the rest of the island, this fence to be strongly built and properly guarded at top and ends, such fence to be guarded by at least five guards, to be selected and employed by the New York House of Refuge and subject to their control, and to be paid for by the New York Connecting Railroad Company, at the rate of seventy-five dollars (\$75) per month without maintenance," the words "said guards and fences above provided for to be maintained on said islands only so long as the same are occupied by contractors for construction purposes," and in Clause B (which is a quotation from the certificate issued by the Rapid Transit Board to the Railroad Company), after the asterisks, "The rates shall be agreed upon, etc., by changing the first word to read "Two."

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

A communication was received from the Metropolitan Sewerage Commission, stating that a part of Wards Island will in all probability be required for disposal of part of the work of New York sewage.

Which was referred to the select committee consisting of Deputy Comptroller Mathewson, President, Board of Aldermen, and Chairman of the Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen.

MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

Minutes of Meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of New York, Held Wednesday, March 19, 1913, at 10 o'clock A. M.

Present—President Frank Gallagher and Commissioners Alexander Keogh and Richard Welling. The President presided.

Hon. William H. Edwards, Commissioner of the Department of Street Cleaning, appeared and requested that the Commission reconsider its action on January 8, 1913, in denying his application that the provisions of the rules requiring competition be waived in the case of Mr. Edward D. Very, and his appointment as Sanitary Engineer, at \$5,000 per annum, authorized under clause 5 of Civil Service rule 12. Messrs. James F. Lynch and James F. O'Brien, Deputy Commissioners of the Department of Street Cleaning, also appeared in behalf of the request. Mr. Robert W. Belcher, Secretary of the Civil Service Reform Association, appeared in opposition. There were no other appearances.

The Commission then went into regular session and the minutes of the meeting held March 12 were approved.

On motion, the request of the Commissioner of the Department of Street Cleaning was laid over.

The Commission considered the request of the Commissioner of Public Charities that the provisions of the rules requiring competition be suspended in the case of Dr. Benjamin T. Terry, and his appointment as Director of Laboratories at the Kings County Hospital, at a salary of \$2,700 per annum, authorized under clause 5 of rule 12 of the Municipal Civil Service Rules, which request had been ordered continued on the calendar at a previous meeting of the Commission. On motion of Commissioner Welling, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the requirement of competitive examination be and the same hereby is waived so far as it applies to the position of Director of Laboratories at the Kings County Hospital, Department of Public Charities, and the appointment of Dr. Benjamin T. Terry to that position at a salary of \$2,700 per annum, is hereby approved in accordance with the provisions of clause 5 of Municipal Civil Service rule 12, it appearing that Dr. Terry is a person of high and recognized attainments in the desired qualities and that competition is impracticable.

John M. O'Shea, 1765 Park ave., New York City, appeared before the Commission, as directed, to show cause why his name should not be removed from the eligible list of Sweeper, Department of Street Cleaning, for physical disability. On motion, it was

Resolved, That the name of John M. O'Shea, 1765 Park ave., New York City, be and the same hereby is removed from the eligible list of Sweeper, Department of Street Cleaning, on account of physical disability.

On motion, it was resolved, that the following names be and the same hereby are removed from the eligible list of Fireman under the provisions of clause 14 of rule 7 (physical disability) after a hearing of the candidates on this date: Thomas J. Gibbons, 1082 Broadway, Brooklyn, N. Y.; Francis Fitzgerald, 719 Prospect place, Brooklyn, N. Y.

On motion, it was resolved, that after a hearing accorded John J. O'Neill, of 20 Morton st., New York City, at which he appeared on this date, the certification of his name to the Fire Commissioner for appointment to the position of Fireman be and the same hereby is revoked under clause 6 of rule 11 of the Municipal Civil Service rules, and his name be and the same hereby is removed from the eligible list under the provisions of clause 14 of rule 7, he having practiced a fraud on the Commission by having some one impersonate him in the examination, and the Secretary was instructed to place his name upon the Commission's disqualified list.

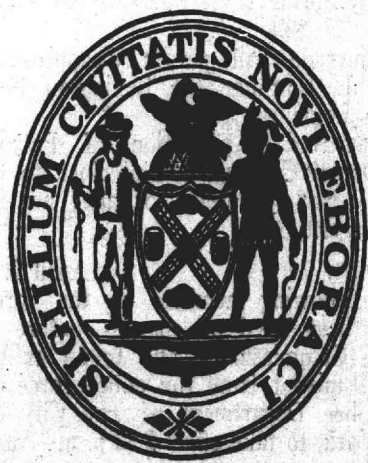

DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH.

Amendment to Sanitary Code.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF Health of the Department of Health, held May 6, 1913, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That section 163a of the Sanitary Code be and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Section 163a. No transit permit shall be granted for the removal, burial or other disposition of the remains of any persons who shall have died in The City of New York unless a certificate of death, signed as herein provided, be made upon a form furnished by and filed in the Department of Health of said city.

Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all person interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement, to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrest to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
