Minutes of Meeting of Art Commission Held in the Governor's Room, City Hall, on Monday, May 11th, 1914, at 4 o'clock P. M.

Present—President de Forest, presiding; Commissioners Babbott, Mitchell, Rives, Bitter, Breck, Boring and Dr. John W. Brannan, President of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, in respect to the designs for the dispensary building for the Gouverneur Hospital.

On communications from Mayor Mitchel and Commissioner Healy, explaining their absences, they were excused.

A communication was presented from Commissioner Lawrence, stating that he was unable to attend the meeting, owing to illness.

Minutes of meeting of April 13th were presented and approved.

Honorable George McAneny, President of the Board of Aldermen; Mr. Walter Cook, Consulting Architect; Mr. Alanson T. Briggs, Executive Secretary to the Court House Board, and Mr. Guy Lowell, Architect, appeared before the Commission in respect to the designs for the court house; Mr. Thomas Hastings, of Carrere & Hastings, architects, in respect to the designs for the sculpture for the New York Public Library, and Mr. Ernest P. Goodrich, Consulting Engineer for the President of the Borough of Manhattan, in respect to the designs for letter boxes, also appeared before the Commission.

Submission 1876. *Public School 18, Brooklyn. Certificate 1791.*

Resolved, That the Art Commission hereby approves the designs and location of Public School 18, Brooklyn, on Leonard and Maujer streets, represented by Exhibits "796-E," "796-F," "796-G" and "796-H," of record in this matter.

Submission 1877. *Public School 93, Queens. Certificate 1792.*

Resolved, That the Art Commission hereby approves the designs and location of Public School 93, Queens, on Forest and Putnam avenues, represented by Exhibits "785-D," "785-E," "785-F," "785-G" and "785-H," of record in this matter.

Submission 1879. *Seligman Fountain Tablet. Certificate 1793.*

Resolved, That the Art Commission hereby approves the designs for a tablet to be placed on a rock near the Seligman fountain, represented by Exhibits "519-G" and "519-H," of record in this matter.

Submission 1880. *Drinking Fountain. Certificate 1794.*

Resolved, That the Art Commission hereby approves the designs and location of a drinking fountain to be placed on 3d avenue, near 129th street, represented by Exhibits "401-B" and "401-BW," of record in this matter.

The Committee recommended approval, with the suggestion that the two end figures be brought more into harmony with the central figures.

On motion, the report of the Committee was adopted and the following resolution adopted:

Resolved, That the Art Commission hereby approves the designs and locations of five statues for the attic story of the 5th avenue elevation of the New York Public Library, represented by Exhibits "208-BV," "208-BW," "208-BX" and "208-BY," of record in this matter.

Commissioner Rives requested to be recorded as not voting.

Submission 1872. *Court House, Manhattan.*

The Committee recommended that the designs be given preliminary approval, with a request that a model be made and submitted later, together with examples of stone of which the building is to be constructed. It also suggested that the street surrounding the court house be made wider than 142 feet, believing that every additional foot of width would add to the appearance of the building and give it increased dignity. It also suggested that a wide sidewalk be placed around the whole building and that all the steps of the porches be placed in front of the columns instead of placing a part of them between the columns, as is shown in the drawing, and, further, that the steps return on a mitre, moving the statuary, or, if necessary, eliminating it altogether, in order that there may be a broad easy approach to the building; that the pedestal over the cornice of the porticos be made a proper height, to form a base for statuary; and that the design of the attic story be similar to that in the original drawings.



None of these suggestions, however, are intended to attach any conditions to the approval recommended.

On motion, the report of the Committee was adopted and the following resolution passed:

*Certificate 1798.*

Resolved, That the Art Commission hereby approves, but as preliminary drawings only, the designs for a court house to be located in the plot bounded by Centre, Leonard, Baxter and Pearl streets, Manhattan, represented by Exhibits "739-A," "739-B," "739-C," "739-D," "739-E," "739-F," "739-G," "739-H" and "739-I," of record in this matter.

In the cases in which preliminary approval was given the Assistant Secretary was directed to notify the proper authorities that, when working drawings have been completed, they should be submitted to the Commission for final approval; also to transmit copies of the reports of the Committees to the proper authorities.

## Bellevue and Allied Hospitals.

An adjourned regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals was held on Tuesday, April 28th, 1914, at 3.30 p. m.

Present—Dr. Brannan, the President, in the chair, and Messrs. Farley, O'Keefe, Paulding and Robbins, Trustees. Excused—Messrs. Kingsbury, Sachs and Stern.

The minutes of the meeting of April 7th were held as read and approved.

Bills amounting to \$24,248.85 were presented for approval and forwarded to the Comptroller for payment.

Dr. George O'Hanlon, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:

It is recommended that Dr. George H. Day be appointed to the position of Assistant Resident Obstetrician at the School for Midwives. The work at the school is becoming so heavy that it is no longer possible for the Resident Physician to carry it on. It is also recommended that Dr. Frederick C. Freed be appointed to the maternity service at Bellevue Hospital for six months, beginning July 1st. Dr. Freed is now completing a one-year service on the house staff. Both of these applications have been approved by Dr. Flint and Dr. Edgar.

On April 11th Bellevue Hospital was favored with an outdoor performance by Barnum and Bailey's Circus, and this morning by the "101 Ranch." These entertainments were witnessed by a large number of patients and thoroughly enjoyed.

At the School for Midwives Sophia Wodzinsky and Dora Meschio have completed their course of training, and authority is asked for the granting of the usual diploma.

Several of the Assistant Visiting Physicians, who belong to the Medical Reserve Corps, have inquired as to the attitude of the Board of Trustees toward granting them leave of absence in case they are called to Mexico.

On separate motion, duly seconded and carried in each instance, action was taken upon the report of the General Medical Superintendent as follows:

It was resolved to appoint Dr. George H. Day as Assistant Resident Obstetrician at the School for Midwives, and Dr. Frederick C. Freed as Interne on the maternity service of Bellevue Hospital for a period of six months, beginning July 1st, 1914, and it was further

Resolved, To promote Dr. E. W. Holladay to the place of Resident Obstetrician at the School for Midwives, as recommended by the General Medical Superintendent on March 3d, 1914.

It was resolved to extend a vote of thanks, on behalf of the patients in Bellevue Hospital, to the management of Barnum and Bailey's Circus and of the "101 Ranch."

The award of diplomas to the two pupils who have completed the course at the School for Midwives was approved.

It was resolved to grant leave of absence to all members of the medical administration of the Department who may be called to service on account of the trouble with Mexico.

### REPORTS OF COMMITTEES.

The Chairman of the Building Committee reported that he had inquired into the estimate of \$897 from the John H. Parker Company, referred to by McKim, Mead & White in their communication of April 7th, for additional plumbing and steamfitting work in connection with the future steam tables and urns for the doctors' dining room of pavilions I and K. On the recommendation of the architects and the Building Committee, this estimate was accepted.

The Building Committee reported that they had inquired into the advisability of installing solid floors for the roof wards of pavilions A and B, referred to in a letter from McKim, Mead & White dated April 7th, and recommended that concrete arches, finished with tile, be installed in place of the wood slat floors provided in the specifications, and that an allowance be obtained from the contractor for the omission of the wood floors. After con-

sideration, on motion, duly seconded and carried, this report was approved and its recommendations adopted.

The Building Committee reported that they had inquired into the several proposed additions to pavilions I and K, which McKim, Mead & White, in their letter of April 7th, recommended be incorporated into one contract, and that this plan met with their approval. After consideration, it was moved, seconded and carried to authorize the architects to prepare plans and specifications for the following items, as set forth in their letter: Temporary admitting department on the ground floor, temporary dining rooms for common help, radiographic department, laundry extension, kitchen equipment and the installation of steam tables and urns in the doctors' dining room on the ground floor.

The Building Committee reported that they had inquired into the estimate from the John H. Parker Company for \$997 for changes in the radiographic department of pavilions I and K, referred to by the architects in their letter of April 7th, and recommended that this estimate be rejected on account of the high cost. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this report was accepted.

The Building Committee reported that they had taken up the question of lighting fixtures for the nurses' residence at Harlem Hospital with the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and presented a communication from that Department under date of April 21st, together with plans and specifications for the fixtures, which were estimated to cost approximately \$3,000. On the recommendation of the Building Committee, these plans and specifications were accepted, and it was

Resolved, To transmit them to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for approval.

The Building Committee reported that they had taken up the question of re-wiring the first and second floors of the power house and ambulance station at Harlem Hospital, and had approved of the plans and specifications prepared by the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity for this work, and referred to in a letter from that Department dated April 15th. On motion, duly seconded and carried, the action of the Building Committee was approved.

The President and the Chairman of the Building Committee reported that they had considered the question of the color for the exterior sash and balconies of pavilions I and K, and recommended that dark green be selected. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this recommendation was adopted.

The President reported that he had inquired into the request of Dr. Nordeman that the clinic for the treatment of syphilis be separated from the genito-urinary clinic, and also into the question of receiving payment for the salvarsan used by patients in the dispensary who are able or willing to pay for this treatment, and had found that it is not feasible to adopt these measures at present. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this report was approved.

### COMMUNICATIONS.

A letter dated April 22d was presented from McKim, Mead & White transmitting specifications for the lighting fixtures for pavilions L and M, which had been approved by the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity. A communication dated April 27th was also presented from the architects stating that the cost of installing these fixtures would be approximately \$9,750. As the specifications had already been approved by the Building Committee, on motion, duly seconded and carried, it was

Resolved, To forward them, together with the plans, to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for approval.

A letter dated April 18th was presented from McKim, Mead & White transmitting an estimate of \$123 from the John H. Parker Company for changes in the tile work in the radiographic department of pavilions I and K. The Chairman of the Building Committee reported that he had inquired into this estimate, and in accordance with his recommendation and



that of the architects the estimate was accepted.

A letter dated April 9th was presented from the Department of Correction requesting to be advised if Bellevue and Allied Hospitals would receive special cases of persons who are temporarily detained in Kings County Jail. After discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried to receive such cases as require hospital care, and the matter was referred to the General Medical Superintendent for his attention.

A letter dated April 9th was presented from the Department of Public Charities inquiring if it would be possible for that Department to purchase gasoline from Bellevue and Allied Hospitals at cost price, the gasoline to be delivered to their machines from the storage tank at Bellevue Hospital. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this request was denied, as the storage facilities for gasoline are hardly large enough for the Department.

The minutes of the Medical Board of Harlem Hospital for March 31st were presented. The opinion of the Medical Board that all applicants for places on the interne staffs of Bellevue and the allied hospitals should be examined by a joint examining board representing the entire Department, in order to prepare an eligible list large enough to provide for all positions of internes and substitutes for all the hospitals, was noted, but action thereon was deferred until next fall.

The minutes of the Executive Committee of the Medical Board of Bellevue Hospital for April 8th were presented. The recommendation that each division be empowered to nominate a Pathologist, to be under the guidance and direction of the head of the pathological department, was approved, and the withdrawal of the application of Dr. Gaylord W. Graves for the place of Assistant Physician to Out-Patients on the Fourth Division was accepted.

The minutes of the Medical Board of Fordham Hospital for April 2d were presented. The question of employing two admitting physicians on half duty during the day at half pay was considered, and it was the opinion of the Board that this plan was not feasible.

A communication dated April 20th was presented from the Executive Committee of the Medical Board of Gouverneur Hospital relative to the service in the wards of the hospital of members of the out-patient staff, under the direction of the Visiting Physician. On motion, duly seconded and carried, it was

Resolved, To refer this matter to the Medical Board of Gouverneur Hospital for recommendation, and to instruct the Executive Committee and the Medical Board of Gouverneur Hospital that all committee reports should first be submitted to the Medical Board and by them presented with their recommendation to the Board of Trustees.

A letter dated April 14th was presented from the Hospital for Scarlet Fever and Diphtheria Patients (Minturn Hospital) stating that in future the charge for the care of doctors and nurses from the hospitals of this Department will be the same as that paid by private hospitals, namely, \$30 a week, instead of \$20 a week, as heretofore. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this letter was referred to the General Medical Superintendent for his information.

A letter dated April 20th was presented from the State Commissioner of Health requesting the transfer of a horse now at Bellevue Hospital to that Department on a lease under an arrangement whereby they will take entire charge of the animal at the risk of this Department for one dollar a year. As this horse had been used for experimental purposes by Dr. Wadsworth and is not fit for any other purpose, it was moved, seconded and carried to request the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to approve of this transfer.

A letter was received from the Chairman of the Committee on Clinical Records of Bellevue Hospital recommending that the title of Miss S. T. Barteau be changed to Chief Record Clerk with a salary of \$1,200, and also that the salary of the second Clerk, Miss S. Galligan, be increased. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this communication was referred to the Committee on Officers and Employees.

A communication dated April 8th was presented from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment transmitting copies of five resolutions adopted on April 3d, (1) transferring \$3,000 within the appropriations for 1913, (2) revising the schedules for 1913, (3) revising salary schedules for 1914 as of March 1st, (4) transferring \$4.50 within the appropriations for wages for 1913, and (5) revising the wage schedules for 1913. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this letter was ordered placed on file.

A copy of a resolution adopted by the Board of Aldermen on March 31st was presented, amending the resolution adopted February 10th so that Bellevue and Allied Hospitals is empowered to

purchase fresh fruits and vegetables to the extent of \$12,000 during the year 1914. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this communication was ordered placed on file.

A letter dated April 20th was presented from the Commissioner of Health inviting this Department to make use of the weekly bulletin of the Department of Health as a means of communicating with the medical profession of the City of New York. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this communication was referred to the General Medical Superintendent for his information.

A communication dated April 25th was presented from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment transmitting a copy of the rules of procedure for the conduct of the business of that Board adopted on April 24th. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this letter was ordered placed on file.

#### NEW BUSINESS.

The President referred to the need for enlarging and providing additional equipment for the laundry at Harlem Hospital, and it was moved, seconded and carried to direct the General Medical Superintendent to make an investigation and present a report on this subject at a future meeting.

The President referred to a recent act of the Legislature amending the Public Health Law in relation to habit-forming drugs, and called attention to that section which requires that separate quarters be provided in City or County hospitals for persons addicted to the use of such drugs. After discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried to take no action on this matter at the present time.

It was reported that the Bureau of Contract Supervision of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment had requested this Department to paint two rooms in pavilions L and M in accordance with the specifications from McKim, Mead & White, now before that Board for approval. It was estimated that this work would cost about \$40, and it would be done under the direction of the Bureau of Contract Supervision. As it was considered to be in the interests of the Department, on motion, duly seconded and carried, this request was approved.

A motion to adjourn the meeting was seconded and carried.

A regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals was held on Tuesday, May 5th, 1914, at 3.35 p. m.

Present—Dr. Brannan, the President, in the chair, and Messrs. Farley, O'Keeffe, Paulding and Robbins, Trustees. Excused—Messrs. Kingsbury, Sachs and Stern.

The minutes of the meeting of April 28th were held as read and approved.

Bills amounting to \$91,740.80 were approved and forwarded to the Comptroller for payment.

Dr. George O'Hanlon, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:

The daily average census at the various hospitals during the month of April was as follows: Bellevue, 1,256; Gouverneur, 201; Harlem, 184; Fordham, 174.

Requests for vacations are coming in from the various departments and a certain amount of relief is necessary.

In endeavoring to keep within the per capita allowance for food supplies, it is necessary to consider the question of reducing the allowance of meat to the house staff. They now have the privilege of a choice of meats for luncheon and dinner.

Because of the increased census of the women's surgical ward at Fordham Hospital, it is necessary to add an additional ward maid to the staff. This involves an additional expenditure of \$15 per month, and the authority of the Board is requested.

The Training School has asked for the establishment of the position of Attendant in the amphitheatre at Bellevue at a salary of \$40 per month to replace an Orderly at \$25. This change is recommended on account of the frequent changes among the Orderlies, and the necessity of having a more staple working staff. Approval is requested.

The following communication has been received from the Contract Clerk and Auditor:

The appropriations for the year 1914 for food supplies (\$306,300) and for medical and surgical supplies (\$80,000) appear to be insufficient. Using the figures from the expense ledger as a basis, the cost of food supplies consumed during the first quarter of the year is \$90,883.45. The cost for the entire year, figuring the balance of the year in the same ratio as the cost for the last nine months of the year 1913 is to the cost of the first three months of the year 1913, will be approximately \$378,866.65. Allowance must be made for the increased census—slightly over 5 per cent. for patients and employees—which, if added to the cost of food supplies for the year 1913, would bring the total to over \$397,000, showing

a saving for the year 1914 of approximately \$19,000. The cost of the medical and surgical supplies used during the first three months of the year is \$22,956.02. Treating this appropriation in a similar manner as the food supplies, the total expenses for the year will be approximately \$100,000, showing an estimated deficit of \$20,000. It is recommended that a request be made for an issue of special revenue bonds to meet this anticipated deficit in the appropriations, other than for personal services, for the year 1914.

On separate motion, duly seconded and carried in each instance, action was taken upon the report of the General Medical Superintendent as follows:

It was resolved to provide for vacation relief in the Department as in former years.

It was resolved to approve of one meat allowance for the house staff except on those days when pork is served.

The appointment of an additional Ward Maid at Fordham Hospital was approved.

The establishment of the position of Attendant in the amphitheatre at Bellevue Hospital at \$40 a month was authorized.

The subject of the anticipated deficit in the appropriations for 1914 was referred to the Committee on Supplies for investigation and report as to the advisability of requesting revenue bonds.

#### REPORTS OF COMMITTEES.

The Building Committee reported that they had inquired into the necessity of providing for the last three items mentioned in McKim, Mead & White's letter of April 7th, namely, (1) provision for main refrigerator storage and cutting room for meat on ground floor of laundry building, (2) erection of small temporary building near admitting department of pavilions I and K for sterilizing patients' clothes, and (3) erection of small building for the information bureau near the proposed temporary admitting office. The committee recommended that the architects be instructed to incorporate these items in the contract for additional work in connection with pavilions I and K authorized by the Trustees on April 28th. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this report was approved and its recommendations adopted.

The Building Committee reported that at a meeting with representatives from the Board of Managers of the Training School and the architects the proposed changes in the kitchen of pavilions F and G were discussed, and that the architects had been instructed to prepare plans for a semi-detached one-story building to the east of pavilions F and G for the main kitchen of the new Bellevue Hospital. On motion, duly seconded and carried, the report of the Building Committee was accepted.

Mr. Paulding, on behalf of the Gouverneur Conference Committee, reported that he had taken up with Dr. Huddleston the subject of overvisiting in the wards of Gouverneur Hospital, particularly by physicians connected with the out-patient department, and, after discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried to request Dr. Huddleston to furnish an outline of the work done in the wards of the hospital under his direction, as well as the plan he proposes for reorganizing the medical service.

The Committee on Officers and Employees recommended the establishment of the necessary grade and an increase in the salary of Miss S. T. Barteau to \$1,050 and that this position be included in the Budget for 1915 under the title of Chief Record Clerk. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this report was approved.

The Chairman of the Building Committee presented a letter dated May 5th from the House Committee of the Board of Managers of the Training School stating that the estimate contained in their minutes of February 13th for the installation of a new refrigerator in the nurses' residence was based upon the cost of installing refrigeration coils, and requesting in addition that the walls and floors be lined with tiles and sanitary material, which would involve an additional expense of about \$1,500. On the recommendation of the Building Committee, it was

Resolved, To rescind the resolution adopted by the Board of Trustees on April 7th, authorizing the installation of a new refrigerator in the nurses' residence, and it was further

Resolved, To authorize an advertisement for bids for alterations to the refrigerator in the nurses' residence at Bellevue Hospital, to include the installation of refrigeration coils, the relining of the walls, and changes in the flooring and partitions.

#### COMMUNICATIONS.

A communication dated May 1st was presented from McKim, Mead & White transmitting a credit estimate of \$378 from the contractor for the construction of the roof wards of pavilions A and B for the omission of the wood slat floors from the roof wards. On the recommendation of the architects and the Building Committee, this credit estimate was accepted.

A letter dated April 28th was presented from the Bureau of Municipal Research stating that at the request of the Comptroller they are inquiring into the present status of the expense and stores accounting of the various departments, and asking for a letter to permit their representative to make an examination of these records in Bellevue and Allied Hospitals. The President reported that he had sent this letter to the Bureau of Municipal Research, and on motion, duly seconded and carried, the action of the President was approved.

A letter dated May 4th was presented from the Reverend Edward P. Southwell, Chaplain, requesting the appointment of an additional Chaplain for night duty at Bellevue Hospital. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this letter was referred to Mr. O'Keeffe.

The minutes of the Medical Board of Fordham Hospital for March 5th were presented. On motion, duly seconded and carried, the report of the Executive Committee on delayed ambulance calls, having been investigated by Mr. O'Keeffe and Mr. Robbins, was accepted; and the following were appointed Internes to Fordham Hospital:

Dr. Jokichi Oguri, July 1st, 1914, 2 years, 1st Surgical; Dr. Arthur Weil, July 1st, 1914, 2 years, 2d Surgical; Dr. John J. Hughes, July 1st, 1914, 2 years, Medical; Dr. Clifford M. Scott, January 1st, 1915, 2 years, 1st Surgical; Dr. Louis Sokol, January 1st, 1915, 2 years, 2nd Surgical; Dr. August C. Schwenk, January 1st, 1915, 2 years, Medical.

The minutes of the Medical Board of Harlem Hospital for April 28th were presented. On motion, duly seconded and carried, the resignation of Dr. Ira Brewster Terry as Assistant Surgeon to Out-Patients was accepted, and the assignment of Dr. Heitlinger to succeed him was approved.

A communication dated April 29th was presented from Dr. Herbert L. Wheeler recommending the appointment of Dr. William Ginsberg, Dr. Charles H. Feingold and Dr. William J. Kelleher as Assistant Visiting Dentists to Fordham Hospital. On motion, duly seconded and carried, these appointments were approved.

Two letters dated April 30th were presented from the Department of Finance transmitting executed copies of renewal of leases of premises at 113 and 115 W. 136th st. for a period of one year. On motion, duly seconded and carried, these communications were ordered placed on file.

#### UNFINISHED BUSINESS.

Consideration was given to the question of obtaining qualified doctors in sufficient numbers for the out-patient department of Gouverneur Hospital, and it was moved, seconded and carried to amend the resolution adopted on April 7th, and to request the issue of revenue bonds in the amount of \$3,800 for the payment of salaries to nineteen physicians to out-patients from May 1st, 1914.

A committee composed of Dr. Brannan and Mr. O'Keeffe was appointed to replace the one named on April 7th to meet the Executive Committee of the Bellevue Hospital Medical Board.

#### NEW BUSINESS.

The President referred to the salary of Miss Aikman, the Nurse in charge of the School for Midwives, and after discussion, on the recommendation of the Committee on Officers and Employees, it was

Resolved, To request the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to establish the grade of Trained Nurse at \$1,200, and to appoint Miss Aikman to this place when funds become available; and it was further

Resolved, To include this position in the Budget for 1915.

Mr. Paulding spoke of the desirability of employing a clerical assistant in the out-patient department of Gouverneur Hospital, in order to save the doctors the clerical labor involved in record taking, and also to appointing a physician for general inspection service in the waiting room of the out-patient department of that hospital. After discussion, on motion, duly seconded and carried, the General Medical Superintendent was instructed to inquire into the feasibility of making these appointments and to report at a future meeting.

A motion to adjourn the meeting was seconded and carried.

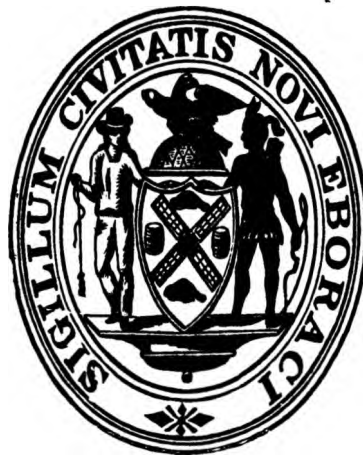

Resolved, That Section 69a of the Sanitary Code be and the same is hereby adopted to take effect immediately:

Section 69a. Every affidavit, duly signed and acknowledged, of a Chemist, Analyst or other Expert employed by the Board of Health of the Department of Health of The City of New York, or any analysis, examination or investigation made by such Analyst, Chemist or Expert in respect to any matter, product or thing which the said Board has authority to examine, or cause to be examined, shall be presumptive evidence of the facts therein set forth.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF Health of the Department of Health, held May 27, 1914, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That Section 165 of the Sanitary Code be and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows, to take effect immediately:

Section 165. No person shall allow to be retained unburied the dead body of any human being for a longer time than four days or where death has resulted from small pox, diphtheria (croup), scarlet fever, epidemic cerebro-spinal meningitis, acute poliomyelitis, yellow fever, typhus fever, plague, Asiatic cholera or measles, for a longer time than twenty-four hours, after death of such person, without a permit from the Sanitary Superintendent or an Assistant Sanitary Superintendent, which permit shall specify the length of time during which such body may be retained unburied.

The Commission has accordingly adopted a route and general plan of construction for a proposed rapid transit railroad to be known as the City Hall Park, Spruce and William Street Route (Route No. 60) and now transmits to your Honorable Board for your approval and the approval of the Mayor, as required by law, a certified copy of resolutions adopted by it on the 26th day of May, 1914, determining and establishing the route and general plan of construction for such new rapid transit railroad. This route begins in Park Place near Broadway, where a connection can be made with the Park Place, William and Clark Street Route, and thence runs under City Hall Park, Spruce Street and William Street to a point south of Beekman Street where a connection can again be made with the Park Place, William and Clark Street Route.

#### NOTICE TO BIDDERS AT SALES OF OLD BUILDINGS, ETC.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing and of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.
