



Present—Messrs. Smith, Wheeler, Erhardt, and Nichols, Commissioners.

Whereas, It has come to the knowledge of the Board of Police that, despite its exertions, many young and efficient Patrolmen have succeeded in obtaining posts where there are lighter and pleasanter duties, to the exclusion of officers whose long services extend over a period of many years, but who are still competent to do light patrol duty; therefore be it

Resolved, That the Superintendent be and is hereby directed to cite before the Board of Police, at 6½ A. M., May 24, all Patrolmen performing duty in the Twenty-sixth Precinct, and in the Eastern and Western Steamboat Squads; at 5 P. M., May 24, all Patrolmen performing duty in the First, Second, Third, Fourth, Fifth, and Sixth District Police Court Squads, and at 4 P. M., May 25, all Patrolmen detailed at the ferries, institutions, and attending violations of Corporation Ordinances in Precincts.

Resolved, That the rules and regulations contained in the "Manual of Rules and Regulations of the Police Department of the City of New York, printed by Martin B. Brown, printer, Nos. 201 and 203 William street, 1877," are hereby adopted as the rules and regulations of the Police Department and Force of the City of New York; that a copy of said Manual be placed on file in the office of the Chief Clerk of Police.

Resolved, That Captains of Precincts, and officers commanding Squads, return and deliver to the Chief Clerk all the old Manuals, and report the number of members of the Force assigned to his Precinct or Squad. On receiving the number of new Manuals for the force under his command, he shall cause a receipt to be entered in the current blotter to the effect following:

"Received, one copy of the new Police Manual, issued in May, 1877," which receipt he will require to be signed by each officer, with his name and official rank.

Resolved, That the Superintendent cause all implements of gaming, and lottery tickets and lottery policies, seized and taken in pursuance of the statute, and now held by the Department, as per schedule report of the Property Clerk, to be destroyed under the supervision of the Committee on Repairs and Supplies, in pursuance of the regulations of the Department. Such articles, if combustible, to be destroyed by fire; if incombustible, to be broken up and defaced, so as to be unfit for use.

Resolved, That the Board of Police will not detail for light duty any Patrolmen who have not been on the Police Force for fifteen (15) years until those who have been on the Force twenty (20) years shall have been assigned to light duty; nor any who have been on the Force ten (10) years until those who have served fifteen (15) years shall have been assigned to light duty proper for them; nor will they assign to detailed duty any officer or Patrolmen who is under the age of fifty years, except on the order of the President of the Board of Police, who shall have power to detail in case of sickness, on report of the Board of Surgeons of the applicant's ill health, or for proper cause, such detail to be reported to the Board of Police at its next meeting.

Resolved, That Patrolman Daniel Archibald, Twenty-ninth Precinct, be and is hereby transferred to the Special Service Squad, and detailed at the store of H. O'Neil & Co., 321 to 329 Sixth avenue, on payment of his salary to the Treasurer.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH
of the Health Department of the City of New York,
held at its office on the twenty-fourth day of April, 1877,
the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That section 55 of the Sanitary Code be and
is hereby amended to read as follows: On and after the
fifth day of May, 1877, no cattle, swine, pigs, calves, or
sheep shall be driven on or between Eleventh and Second
avenues south of Sixtieth street, nor on any other streets or
avenues, except as hereinbefore mentioned.

1st. On First avenue, and the cross streets east of First
avenue, between Forty-second and Forty-eighth streets,
inclusive.

2d. On the cross streets west of Eleventh avenue, be-
tween Thirty-ninth and Forty-third streets, inclusive.

3d. On the cross streets west of Eleventh avenue, be-
tween Forty-fifth and Forty-ninth streets, inclusive.

4th. From the cattle yards on Sixtieth street to Tenth
avenue; thence through Tenth avenue to Sixty-fourth
street, Sixty-fourth street to Eighth avenue, Eighth avenue
to Ninety-seventh street, Ninety-seventh street to Fifth
avenue, Fifth avenue to One Hundred and Eighth street,
One Hundred and Eighth street to Second avenue, Second
avenue to One Hundred and Sixth street, One Hundred
and Sixth street to the East river, between midnight and
6 o'clock A. M.

5th. From the cattle yards by the fourth route to Second
avenue, on Second avenue to One Hundred and Twenty-
ninth street, on One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street to
Third avenue, across Harlem Bridge, up Third avenue to
the slaughter-houses in Morrisania, between midnight and
6 o'clock A. M.

6th. From the cattle yards on Sixtieth street to Tenth
avenue, on Tenth avenue to Sixty-fourth street, on Sixty-
fourth street to Eighth avenue, on Eighth avenue to
One Hundred and Twenty-first street, on St. Nicholas
avenue and the Kingsbridge road to the slaughter-houses
north of Spuyten Duyvil creek, between midnight and
6 o'clock A. M.

7th. From the cattle yards on Sixtieth street down
Eleventh avenue to Thirty-ninth street, between mid-
night and 6 A. M.

8th. From the cattle yards on Sixtieth street to Tenth
avenue, on Tenth avenue to Sixty-fourth street, on Sixty-
fourth street to Eighth avenue, on Eighth avenue to Sixty-
fifth street, through Central Park by transverse road to
Fifth avenue, on Fifth avenue to Sixty-seventh street,
through Sixty-seventh street to Fourth avenue, on Fourth
avenue to Sixty-eighth street, through Sixty-eighth street
to First avenue and down First avenue to slaughter-
houses, upon the express condition, however, that the
cattle shall not leave the yards before midnight or after
5 o'clock A. M., that the drivers shall be orderly and quiet,
and that the crosswalks shall be cleaned each morning
before 8 o'clock. Permits under this subdivision shall be
revoked by the Sanitary Superintendent on violation of
any of the foregoing conditions.

9th. The Sanitary Superintendent may, in special cases,
with the approval of the Board, give temporary permits
to drive animals on other routes than those herein des-
ignated.
