

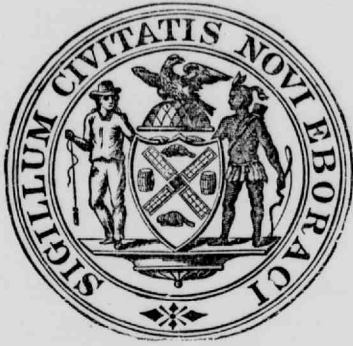

##### COMMUNICATIONS FROM THE DEPARTMENTS AND CORPORATION OFFICERS.

The President laid before the Board the following communication from the Counsel to the Corporation :

LAW DEPARTMENT,  
OFFICE OF THE COUNSEL TO THE CORPORATION,  
NEW YORK, October 6, 1880.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York :

I have received your resolution, as follows :

“Resolved, That the Counsel to the Corporation be and he is hereby requested to report to this Board, at its next meeting, if it is competent to adopt the usual ordinance confirming the taxes and fixing the rate of taxation for this year, in view of orders of the courts recently served upon this Board, and now in possession of the said Counsel, providing for a review of the tax-rolls as made up by the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments, or other orders relating to that subject ; or, if such confirmation is made by this Board before decision is rendered by the Courts, could such affirmative action be held as being in contempt of the Court issuing such orders ? ”

In answer thereto, I advise :

1. That it is the duty of your Board to proceed to confirm the taxes in the manner provided by law.

2. That the adjudications which may be made in the pending proceedings, commenced in behalf of various banks, insurance companies, etc., to review, by certiorari, the assessments made against them, when pronounced, will affect only the taxes imposed upon such litigants.

3. That confirmation of the taxes by your Board will not be held to be contempt of the Court by which such writs of certiorari have been issued.

##### UNFINISHED BUSINESS.

General Order No. 294, being a report of the Committee on Finance, with an ordinance to provide the necessary means for the support of the government of the City of New York, the Board of Education, and for the payment of the quota of the State tax in the year eighteen hundred and eighty, being the subject mentioned in the call for the special meeting of to-day, was here taken up for consideration and is as follows :

AN ORDINANCE to provide the necessary means for the support of the government of the City of New York, the Board of Education, and for the payment of the quota of the State tax in the year eighteen hundred and eighty.

The Board of Aldermen of the City of New York, do ordain as follows :

Section 1. There shall be and hereby is imposed upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation according to law, of and within the City and County of New York, to be raised, collected and paid according to law, for the support of the city government and the Board of Education, and for the purpose of paying the quota of the State tax imposed upon the City and County of New York for the year eighteen hundred and eighty, the sum of twenty-eight million one hundred and forty-two thousand nine hundred and ninety-one dollars and ninety-eight cents, which is the amount certified by the Comptroller of the City of New York to the Board of Supervisors, in pursuance of the provisions of section 112 of chapter 335 of the Laws of 1873, as the sum to be raised and collected in the year eighteen hundred and eighty by tax upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation within the City and County of New York, which will more fully appear by the communication from the Comptroller, transmitting his certificate of the aggregate amount of the Final Estimate made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the year eighteen hundred and eighty, of which said communication, certificate, and Final Estimate the following are copies :

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York :

In pursuance of the provisions of section 112 of chapter 335 of the Laws of 1873, I herewith transmit to you the Comptroller's certificate of the aggregate amount of the Final Estimate made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on the 31st day of December, 1879, for the year eighteen hundred and eighty, to wit : the sum of twenty-eight million one hundred and forty-two thousand nine hundred and ninety-one dollars and ninety-eight cents ; which amount, so estimated and certified as aforesaid, the Board of Supervisors of the County of New York is “empowered and directed to cause to be raised, according to law, and collected by tax upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation, within the said City and County of New York.”

### FINAL ESTIMATE FOR THE YEAR 1880.

Made, pursuant to Section 112 of Chapter 335 of the Laws of 1873, by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the City of New York, on December 31, 1879.

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment have considered the objections to, and rectifications of, the Provisional Estimate made by said Board on the 31st day of October, 1879, of the amounts required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business of the City and County of New York, in each Department and branch thereof, and the Board of Education, for the next ensuing financial year, to wit, for the year eighteen hundred and eighty (1880) ; in which estimate is included such sum as is necessary for the payment of the interest on the bonds of the said city and county, which become due and payable within said year, and also such sum as is necessary to be raised by tax to pay the principal of any bonds and stocks which become due and payable during the said year ; also the amount to be raised by tax annually, which will be sufficient, with the accumulations of interest thereon, to pay the bonds and stocks, payable from taxation, issued after June 3, 1878, pursuant to chapter 383, Laws of 1878 ; and also so much as may be necessary to pay the proportion of the State tax required to be paid by the City and County of New York, in said year, which objections to, and rectifications of, said Provisional Estimate made by the Board of Aldermen, were transmitted by the Clerk of said Board, under date of November 25, 1879, and presented to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on November 26, 1879 ; therefore

Resolved, That after such consideration of the said objections to, and rectifications of, said Provisional Estimate, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment does hereby make this a

#### FINAL ESTIMATE

of the amount required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business of the City and County of New York, in each Department and branch thereof, and the Board of Education, for the next ensuing financial year, to wit, the year eighteen hundred and eighty (1880), in which is included such sum as is necessary for the payment of the interest on the bonds of the said city and county, which become due and payable within said year, and also such sum as is necessary to be raised by tax to pay the principal of any bonds and stocks which become due and payable during the said year ; also the amount to be raised by tax annually, which will be sufficient, with the accumulations of interest thereon, to pay the bonds and stocks, payable from taxation, issued after June 3, 1878, pursuant to chapter 383, Laws of 1878 ; and also so much as may be necessary to pay the proportion of the State tax required to be paid by the City and County of New York, in said year, as follows :

In addition to the sum imposed upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation, according to law, of and within the City and County of New York, in and by the first section of this ordinance, there shall also be, and is hereby imposed upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation, according to law, of and within the City and County of New York, and to be raised, collected, and paid according to law, the sum of twenty-five thousand dollars, being the amount of an additional appropriation for the year 1880, made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, pursuant to the provisions of chapter 66 of the Laws of 1880, as appears by the following certificate of the Comptroller of the City of New York:

COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE, September 10, 1880.

## To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

I hereby certify to your Honorable Board, that, as provided by chapter 66 of the Laws of 1880, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, by resolution adopted on June 3, 1880, has appropriated the sum of twenty-five thousand dollars to the Department of Public Parks, for the purpose of providing means to complete the restoration of Tompkins square as a public park, and has added and included the said amount in the Final Estimate for the year 1880, transmitted to your Honorable Board on July 1, 1880, and that the aggregate amount of said Final Estimate, including the said appropriation of twenty-five thousand dollars, is twenty-eight million one hundred and sixty-seven thousand nine hundred and ninety-one dollars and ninety-eight cents (\$28,167,991.98), which amount the Board of Supervisors of the County of New York is empowered and directed by law to cause to be raised and collected by tax upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation within the City and County of New York in the year 1880.

In addition to the sums imposed upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation according to law, of and within the City and County of New York, in and by the first and second sections of this ordinance, for the support of the government of the City of New York for the year 1880, there shall also be and is hereby imposed upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation according to law, of and within the City and County of New York, and to be raised, collected and paid according to law, the sum of seven hundred and sixty-nine thousand, two hundred and eighty dollars and ninety-two cents, said amount being deemed necessary for the purpose of providing for deficiencies in the actual product of the amounts imposed and levied for the support of the government of the City of New York for the year 1880, and not exceeding three per cent. of the aggregate amounts imposed for that purpose by the first and second sections of this ordinance, in pursuance of the provisions of section 4 of chapter 756 of the Laws of 1873.

Sec. 4. The assessment rolls of the real and personal estates of the City and County of New York for the year eighteen hundred and eighty are hereby approved and confirmed, and the aggregate amount of the assessed valuations thereof is hereby fixed at the sum of one thousand one hundred and forty-three million seven hundred and sixty-five thousand seven hundred and twenty-seven dollars and nine cents (\$1,143,765,727.09), in accordance with the returns of the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments, for the year 1880, as follows:

## DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS.

At a meeting of the Board of Docks, held September 22, 1880.

Present—Commissioners Dimock & Vanderpoel.

A communication was received from the Board of Commissioners of Pilots, enclosing a complaint from Captain Williams, of the Bureau of Street Cleaning, that the occupants of Pier 53, East river, were in the habit of throwing the saw-dust, straw and dirt collected thereon into the river, and, being read,  
 On motion, it was

Resolved, That the occupant of Pier 53, East river, be and hereby is notified that complaint has been made that straw, saw-dust and dirt are frequently thrown into the river from said pier, which is an offense against the regulation of this Department; and further notice is hereby given, that a penalty of twenty-five dollars will be imposed and collected by the Department for each and every time hereafter such offense may be committed.

A communication was received from the Engineer-in-Chief, reporting that the easterly half of Pier 12, East river, was in such condition as to be unsafe for use, and, being read,  
 On motion, it was

Resolved, That the owner or owners of the easterly half of Pier 12, East river, be and he is or they are hereby notified and directed to make without delay and under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, such repairs thereto as may be necessary to put the premises in a safe condition for commercial use, the Board being informed that at present the pier is liable to break down even by ordinary usage; and further, that the said owner or owners be requested to confer with this Board at once, with a view to consenting that said repairs may be made simultaneously with and by and under the contract now being prepared for public letting, for repairs to the westerly half of said pier, owned by the Corporation.

On motion, the Engineer-in-Chief was directed to prepare specifications for doing all the work by contract jointly with the owner or owners of the easterly half, for the repairs necessary to put the whole of said Pier 12, East river, in good order and condition, the lessee of the westerly half having thus far neglected to repair that portion of the pier as directed by the Board on the 4th instant, and it being understood that he refuses to make the repairs.

CITY OF NEW YORK—FINANCE DEPARTMENT, }  
COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE, October 5, 1880. }

GENTLEMEN—Chapter 552 of the Laws of 1880 provides for the issue of certain bonds and stocks of the City of New York, exempt from municipal taxation, as follows, to wit:

AN ACT to authorize the issue of certain bonds and stocks of the city of New York exempt from taxation.

Passed June 9, 1880; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. The commissioners of "the sinking fund of the city of New York for the redemption of the city debt," when duly authorized by ordinance of the common council, may, by concurrent resolution, direct that the bonds and stocks of said city, hereafter issued pursuant to law, shall be exempt from taxation by said city and by the county of New York, but not from taxation for state purposes; and all bonds and stocks issued pursuant to such authority shall be exempt from taxation accordingly, provided that said bonds and stocks shall not bear interest exceeding the rate of four and one-half per centum per annum.

Sec. 2. The bonds and stocks of the city New York, issued pursuant to the provisions of this statute, shall express upon their face the fact that they are exempt from taxation by the city and county of New York, but not from state taxation, and shall refer to this act, and to the ordinance of the common council, and the resolution of the commissioners of the sinking fund authorizing their issue.

Sec. 3. This act shall effect immediately.

The Common Council have passed an ordinance in pursuance of this act, as follows, to wit:

AN ORDINANCE to authorize the issue of certain bonds and stocks of the city of New York  
exempt from taxation.

The Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York do ordain as follows :

Section 1. The commissioners of "the sinking fund of the city of New York for the redemption of the city debt" are hereby authorized, as provided by section 1 of chapter 552 of the Laws of 1880, by concurrent resolution, to direct that the bonds and stocks of the city of New York, hereafter issued, pursuant to law, shall be exempt from taxation by said city, and by the county of New York, but not from taxation for state purposes ; and all bonds and stocks issued pursuant to such authority shall be exempt from taxation accordingly, provided that said bonds and stocks shall not bear interest exceeding the rate of four and one-half per cent. per annum.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.  
Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, September 14, 1880.

In order to carry out and give effect to the provisions of the foregoing act of the Legislature and ordinance of the Common Council, I have prepared and herewith submit a resolution for the adoption of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

Whereas, An ordinance was duly enacted by the Common Council of the city of New York on the 2d day of October, 1880, in the terms following, to wit :

AN ORDINANCE to authorize the issue of certain bonds and stocks of the City of New York, exempt from taxation.

The Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York do ordain as follows :  
Section 1. The commissioners of "the sinking fund of the city of New York for the redemption of the city debt" are hereby authorized, as provided by section 1 of chapter 552 of the Laws of 1880, by concurrent resolution, to direct that the bonds and stocks of the city of New York, hereafter issued, pursuant to law, shall be exempt from taxation by said city, and by the county of New York, but not from taxation for state purposes ; and all bonds and stocks issued pursuant to such authority shall be exempt from taxation accordingly, provided that said bonds and stocks shall no bear interest exceeding the rate of four and one-half per cent. per annum.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Now, as authorized by said ordinance, and pursuant to the authority conferred by the provisions of said statute, chapter 552 of the Laws of 1880, the Commissioners of "the Sinking Fund of the City of New York for the Redemption of the City Debt" do hereby, by their concurrent resolution, enact that the Bonds and Stocks of the City of New York, hereafter issued, pursuant to law, shall be exempt from taxation by said city, and by the County of New York, but not from taxation for State purposes, provided that said bonds and stocks shall not bear interest exceeding the rate of four and half per cent. per annum.

Of the bonds falling due on November 1, 1880, as above stated, \$300,000 6 per cent. Assessment Fund Bonds were issued on account of street openings. From collection of assessments for street openings there was in the Treasury on October 1, 1880, \$163,261.81 specially available for the redemption of this class of bonds. There is also due on the first day of next November \$119,000, being the amount of bonds issued for the Riverside Avenue Improvement, not yet completed, and for the redemption of which no assessment has as yet been made.

COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND.

*Abstract of the Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at the meeting held  
October 7, 1880.*

Present—Hon. Edward Cooper, Mayor (Chairman); Hon. Frederick Smyth, Recorder; Hon. John Kelly, Comptroller; J. Nelson Tappan, Esq., Chamberlain; and Patrick Keenan, Esq., Chairman Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

The report of the Comptroller in relation to lease of premises No. 2 Fourth avenue, heretofore occupied by the Department of Buildings, presented at the last meeting and laid over for consideration, was taken up for action ; whereupon the report was accepted, and the resolution submitted with the report amended, and, on motion, adopted, to read as follows, viz. :

Resolved, That the Counsel to the Corporation be requested to prepare a lease to the city of the premises No. 2 Fourth avenue, heretofore occupied and used by the Department of Buildings, from May 1, 1879, to May 1, 1881, at the yearly rent of three thousand two hundred and fifty dollars (\$3,250), and that the Comptroller be authorized to execute such lease, when so prepared and approved by him, as provided by chapter 461 of the Laws of 1880.

The Comptroller submitted the application of the New York Society for Prevention of Cruelty to Children, for transfer of fines deposited in error; whereupon the following resolution was adopted, viz. :

SIR—There were 571 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, September 25, 1880, which is an increase of 38, as compared with the number reported during the preceding week, and 120 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1879. The actual mortality for the week ending September 18, 1880, was 553, which is 20.6 above the average for the corresponding week of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 23.62 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,217,496.

### CHAPTER 195.

AN ACT in relation to the payment of assessments for local improvements in the City of New York.

Passed May 7, 1880; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. At any time before the first day of September, eighteen hundred and eighty, any person liable therefor may pay, to the officer authorized to receive the same, the amount of any assessment for any local improvement in the City of New York, heretofore confirmed and now unpaid, with interest thereon at the rate of seven per centum per annum from the date of confirmation to the date of payment and at any time on or after said first day of September, and before the first day of December, eighteen hundred and eighty, any such assessment may be paid as aforesaid, with interest at the rate of nine per centum per annum from the date of confirmation to the date of payment.

Sec. 2. Where any installment or installments of any assessments have been paid under the provisions of chapter one hundred and three of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-six, or of chapter one hundred and fifty-nine of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-seven, or of chapter two hundred and fifty-five of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-eight, the amount of such assessment or assessments remaining unpaid may be paid within the same periods prescribed in the first section of this act and upon the same terms and conditions therein prescribed.

Sec. 3. Upon such payment in full, as hereinbefore provided, such assessment or assessments shall cease to be a lien upon the property, and shall be deemed fully paid, satisfied and discharged; and there shall be no further interest or penalty by reason of such assessment or assessments not having been paid within the time heretofore required by law, or by reason of any statute heretofore requiring the payment of any penalty or interest over the rate hereinbefore provided for upon any unpaid assessment.

Sec. 4. No provision of this act hereinbefore contained shall be construed as applicable to or affecting any assessment for the collection of which assessment the property has been sold.

Sec. 5. This act shall take effect immediately.

## ARREARS OF TAXES.

### NOTICE TO TAXPAYERS.

THE COMPTROLLER OF THE CITY OF NEW York hereby gives notice to owners of Real Estate in said city, that, as provided by chapter 123 of the Laws of 1880, they may now pay any arrears of taxes and Croton water rents levied prior to the year 1877, with interest thereon at the rate of seven per cent. per annum. If, however, such taxes and Croton water rents are not paid before the first day of October next, the property on which they are due will be sold for taxes immediately thereafter, with the addition of accrued interest thereon at the rate of 12 per cent. per annum from the respective dates on which they were levied.

### CHAPTER 123.

AN ACT in relation to arrears of taxes in the City of New York, and to provide for the reissuing of revenue bonds in anticipation of such taxes.

Passed April 15, 1880; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. At any time after the passage of this act, and before the first day of October, eighteen hundred and eighty, any person may pay to the Comptroller of the City of New York the amount of any tax upon real property belonging to such person, heretofore laid or imposed and now remaining unpaid, together with interest thereon at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated from the time that such tax was imposed to the time of such payment, provided, also, that the time when such payment may be made on the amount of any such tax laid or imposed in the years eighteen hundred and seventy-seven, eighteen hundred and seventy-eight, and eighteen hundred and seventy-nine shall extend to the first day of April, eighteen hundred and eighty-one. The comptroller shall make and deliver to the person making any such payment a receipt therefor, and shall forthwith cancel the record of any such tax on the books of the finance department; and upon such payment being made such tax shall cease to be a lien upon the property and shall be deemed fully paid, satisfied and discharged, and there shall be no right to any further interest or penalty by reason of such tax not having been paid within the time heretofore required by law, or by reason of any statute passed requiring the payment heretofore of any penalty or interest over even per centum per annum upon any unpaid tax.

Sec. 2. Any revenue bond heretofore issued in anticipation of the taxes in the first section specified which may fall due and become payable before said taxes are collected, may be reissued by the comptroller of said city, in whole or in part, for such period as he may determine, not exceeding one year.

Sec. 3. This act shall take effect immediately.
