

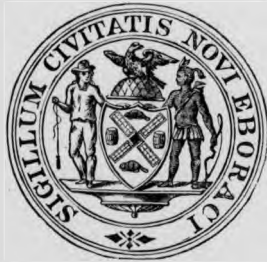

REPORTED MORTALITY* for the week ending September 6, 1884, together with the ACTUAL MORTALITY for the week ending August 30, 1884.

SIR—There were 665 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, September 6, 1884, which is a decrease of 27, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 75 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1883. The actual mortality for the week ending August 30, 1884, was 690, which is 101.2 above the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 26.31 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,363,712.

Secretary directed to advise that the Board will give the matter attention at the earliest possible moment.

From Department of Public Parks—In reference to making copies of maps on file in their Department, of the water front extending from Bronx river on the east, to Yonkers on the North or Hudson river. The Secretary stating that, by direction of the Commissioners, he had replied thereto and stated that Mr. Nicholas J. Vander Weyde would call and make the selection of such maps as may be required for the purposes of this Department, his action was approved.

From Commissioners of Accounts—Requesting the Department to furnish them with copies of annual report for 1882, 1883 and 1884. Secretary directed to send the reports as requested.

From Municipal Service Examining Board—Certificate of qualification of John W. Beane as assistant engineer.

From Stephen A. Walker, attorney—In reference to alleged violation of injunction order at West Twenty-sixth street and West Twenty-seventh street, North river. The Secretary stating that, by direction of Commissioner Voorhis, he had requested Mr. Walker to meet and confer with the Commissioners on Monday, September 1st instant, in respect thereto, his action was approved.

From Eldridge & Mould—In reference to dumping of scows into the water at the bulkhead between Piers 52 and 53, East river. Dock Master to be directed to investigate and report as to the unlawful dumping of material at the said bulkhead.

From Metropolitan Telephone and Telegraph Co.—In reference to renewal of contract for private line. Subject matter referred to the Treasurer.

From Greenpoint Ferry Co.—Requesting permission to repair the bulkhead in rear of ferry

rack on the north side of East Twenty-third street. The Secretary stating that he had granted a permit therefor by direction of the Commissioners, work to be done under the supervision and direction of the Engineer-in-Chief, his action was approved.

From W. D. Morgan—Reporting that Messrs. James E. Ward & Co. have placed their steamer "Santiago," in the slip between piers 17 and 18, East river, and also stating that the said steamer is an obstruction to their business and prevents the free use of the slip thereat for ordinary business purposes, and requesting Department to have the obstruction complained of removed. Secretary directed to advise Mr. Ward that complaint has been made to this Department that uncalled for obstructions have been placed in the slip between Piers 17 and 18 East river, preventing the use of the slip for commercial purposes, and request him to have the same removed, so as to permit free access for vessels to use the said slip.

From George Ott, Jr.—Enclosing bill for wharfage charged by Mr. Owens for use of dock at Forty-seventh street, East river, and requesting Department to inform him if he is obliged to pay the amount of the said bill. The Secretary stating that, by direction of Commissioner Voorhis, he had replied thereto and informed Mr. Ott that as the Department does not know of the character of vessel for which the wharfage was charged it was unable to answer the inquiry, his action was approved.

From John Gilles—Requesting an extension of time for twelve days to complete the work under his contract at Pier foot of West Thirty-sixth street, North river.

From Engineer-in-Chief:

1st. Reporting assignment of employees to special duty other than that to which they were appointed. Secretary directed to notify the bookkeeper.

2d. Reporting that the inner water-hydrant on Pier, new 43, North river, is leaking, and that the water-pipes supplying the basins in offices on both sides of the pier are out of order. Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to do the work required thereat.

3d. Reporting that all the iron cleats have been placed on Pier, new 27, North river.

The action of the Secretary in notifying the Pennsylvania Railroad Company of the commencement of the term of lease of Piers, new 27 and 28, North river, from September 1, 1884, at the rental of \$55,000 per annum, was approved.

8th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 3839, that he had repaired the bulkhead between Sixty-first and Sixty-second streets, East river.

9th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 3881, in reference to the necessity of placing a mooring post at the bulkhead at Pier 57, East river, and also stating that he had placed a mooring post thereat. Action of the Engineer-in-Chief approved.

10th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 3894, that two cleats are needed on the bulkhead, between Piers, new 46 and new 47, North river, and also that a new backing log is required thereat. Secretary directed to notify the lessees of Pier, new 47, to repair the backing log, under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief, within fifteen days, and the Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to place the necessary cleats thereat.

11th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 3895, that he had repaired the bulkhead between Piers 18 and 19, East river.

12th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 3902, in reference to the condition of the backing log at bulkhead between Piers, new 44 and new 47, North river.

Secretary directed to request the Department of Street Cleaning to cause the enclosed spaces under the dumping boards on the piers used by them to be kept clear and free from accumulation of rubbish, etc.

3d. Reporting two bad breaks in the Pier foot of Fortieth street, North river. Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to keep the said pier safe.

From George W. Wannmaker, Dock Master—Reporting that the platform on the north side of Desbrosses Street Ferry, North river, is in a very bad condition, the deck being rotten in several places, also three holes in same. Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to examine and report.

From Bernard Kenney, Dock Master—Reporting that the bulkhead between Piers 59 and 60, East river, is in a dangerous condition, and also reporting that Pier 60, East river, is in a dangerous condition. Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to examine and report.

From E. Abeel, Dock Master:

1st. Reporting that a number of plank are badly rotted and require replacing on Pier 48, East river. Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to examine and report.

2d. Reporting a hole in the bulkhead at the foot and south side of Cherry street, East river. Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to examine and report.

A communication from the Comptroller of the City, in reference to requisition for the issue of additional Dock Bonds, was received, read and ordered to be placed on file, and the following resolution, offered by Commissioner Voorhis in relation thereto, adopted:

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, pursuant to authority vested in them by subdivision 11 of section 6, chapter 574, Laws of 1871, be and hereby are respectfully requested to direct the Comptroller of the City of New York to prepare and issue Dock Bonds of the City of New York for the amount of (\$250,000) two hundred and fifty thousand dollars for the uses and purposes of the Department of Docks.

And the Secretary was directed to advise the Comptroller of the action taken by the Board, and that not less than \$1,000,000 will probably be required for the uses and purposes of the Department during the balance of the year.

A report from the Engineer-in-Chief on Secretary's Order No. 3550, submitting plans, specification and form of contract for repairing and extending the pier at Thirty-fifth street, North river, at an estimated cost of \$27,000, was received, read and ordered to be placed on file, and the following resolution, offered by Commissioner Laimbeer in relation thereto, adopted:

Resolved, That the plans, specifications and form of contract, as prepared by the Engineer-in-Chief, for repairing and extending the Pier at Thirty-fifth street, North river, be and hereby are approved and adopted, subject to the approval of the Counsel to the Corporation as to form; and that the Secretary be and hereby is directed to have a sufficient number of blank forms of proposals printed, and proper advertisements inviting bids for doing the said work inserted in the papers designated by law.

Commissioner Voorhis, to whom was referred the communication from the New Jersey Steamboat Company in relation to the dumping board berthed at the bulkhead north of Pier, old 41, North river, reported thereon that he had conferred with Mr. William P. Prentiss, the counsel for the Steamboat Company in relation thereto, and recommended that the Board accept from Brown and Fleming, for the use of the berth for the floating dump at Canal street, North river, from and after August 1, ultimo \$6 per day, with the understanding that \$4 per day in addition is to be paid to the New Jersey Steamboat Company from that date as compensation for the use of the water on the north side of pier, old 41, North river.

On motion, the report was received and ordered to be placed on file and the recommendation adopted.

APPROVED PAPERS.

Whereas, By resolution approved December 23, 1876, all incorporated gas companies were permitted "to lay gas mains and pipes in the streets, avenues and public places in this city for the purpose of supplying gas to the City and its inhabitants, upon such conditions as may be first prescribed and approved of by his Honor the Mayor, the Comptroller, and the Commissioner of Public Works, who are now by law authorized to make provision for lighting the streets of the City; and, Whereas, Since the passage of the aforesaid resolution by the Common Council, several incorporated gas companies have obtained permission, under conditions prescribed and approved by the

city officers therein named, to lay gas-pipes in many of the streets, avenues and public places, and have in good faith complied with the said conditions, and are now supplying, or are nearly ready to supply, gas to the City and its inhabitants; and

Whereas, At the General Term, May, 1884, of the Court of Common Pleas, in the suit of Elbert Ellery Anderson, appellant, against the Equitable Gas-light Company of New York and Hubert O. Thompson, respondents, it was held substantially that "there is no provision in the law itself authorizing them (the Common Council) to delegate this power, and that the case falls within the settled principle that powers of this description cannot be delegated," but must be regarded as "public powers and trusts, devolved by law or charter upon the Common Council, or governing body, to be exercised by it when and in such manner as it shall judge best, and cannot be delegated to others," and that "there is no provision of law authorizing the Mayor, Comptroller, and Commissioner of Public Works to decide the manner or upon what conditions the defendant corporation may open the streets to lay its mains, and any permit founded upon their action in the premises, confers no license, and is void;" and

Whereas, It would be manifestly unjust to the gas companies, who have acted throughout in good faith and have complied with the provisions of the resolution of December 23, 1876, to enforce the principle embraced in the decision, which, in effect, declares them to be trespassers upon the property of the public—as a void permission is no permission—and any disturbance of the relations now existing between these several companies and this City and its inhabitants, would be injurious to both; while the continued existence of the resolution of 1876, which has produced such unsatisfactory results, would be both unwise and inexpedient; in order, therefore, that no injustice may be done the gas companies, or injury inflicted upon the City or its inhabitants, be it

Resolved, That the ordinance or resolution of the Common Council, adopted by the Board of Aldermen December 21, 1876, and approved by the Mayor, December 23, 1876, as follows, viz: "Resolved, That permission be and is hereby given to all incorporated gas-light companies to lay gas-mains and pipes for the purpose of supplying gas to the City and its inhabitants upon such conditions as may be prescribed and approved by his Honor the Mayor, the Comptroller, and the Commissioner of Public Works, who are now by law authorized to make provision for lighting the streets of the City," be and the same is hereby repealed, but this repeal shall not prejudice or effect any right, interest, privilege or power which has heretofore arisen, accrued or been conferred by the said ordinance or resolution, and by the action of his Honor the Mayor, the Comptroller and the Commissioner of Public Works following thereon, as such right, interest, privilege, or power now exists, and every such right, interest, privilege or power conferred, given or granted by the said Mayor, the Comptroller and the Commissioner of Public Works, under and by the terms and provisions of the said resolution of December 23, 1876, are hereby confirmed, ratified and approved.
