MAYOR'S OFFICE, NEW YORK, November 28, 1887.

Whereas, It is provided in and by section twelve of chapter seven hundred and eighteen of the laws of eighteen hundred and eighty-seven, entitled "An Act to provide for the recording and indexing of conveyances and instruments relating to land in the City of New York, according to limited areas," that if it shall be determined by the Mayor of said city and the Register of the City and County of New York that said act cannot go into operation at the time therein designated therefor, by reason of the non-completion of the map or indices referred to in said act, or for any other reason, thereupon said Mayor, by notice published in the CITY RECORD, in the City of New York, for thirty days prior to the expiration of said time, may extend the time for said act to go into operation, and for the books, maps and indices in said act referred to to be completed, not exceeding six months from the time in said act designated therefor, and that said act, upon such publication, shall thereupon go into operation in said Register's office at the time so to be designated by said Mayor; and

Whereas, The said Mayor and Register have determined that said act cannot go into operation at the time therein designated therefor, by reason of the non-completion of said map and indices, and for other reasons;

Now, therefore, I, Abram S. Hewitt, Mayor of the City of New York, do hereby give notice that I have extended and do hereby extend the time for said act to go into operation, and for said books, maps and indices to be completed, to the thirtieth day of June, in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight, which is hereby designated by me as the date upon which said act shall go into operation in said Register's office.

AQUEDUCT COMMISSION.

Minutes of Stated Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, held at their office, No. 209 Stewart Building, on Wednesday, November 16, 1887, at 3 o'clock P. M.

Present—Commissioners Spencer, Dowd, the Commissioner of Public Works, and Commissioners Baldwin, Barnes, Ridgway and Fish.

Also, Chief Engineer Church, and Chief Engineer Birdsell of the Department of Public Works.

The Commissioners met to open the bids received for the construction of the Gate-houses at Pocantico and South Yonkers, on Sections 4 and 9 respectively, of the New Croton Aqueduct, in pursuance to the notices published daily for fifteen consecutive days, commencing October 27, 1887, in the CITY RECORD, "New York Star," and "New York Tribune."

After the reading of the aforesaid notices the bid-box was opened by the Commissioners, and the following bids, upon which the required deposit had been made, were opened and read aloud by the Secretary:

For Section 4.

No. 1. Thomas Dobbin.
No. 2. Brown, Howard & Co.
No. 3. John Pierce.

For Section 9.

No. 1. Thomas Dobbin.
No. 2. O'Brien & Clark.
No. 3. John Pierce.

Whereupon Commissioner Ridgway offered the following preamble and resolutions, and moved their adoption:

Whereas, The bids for the building of the gate-houses at Pocantico and South Yonkers, on Sections 4 and 9 respectively, of the New Croton Aqueduct, having been received and publicly opened and read; and therefore

Resolved, That the Chief Engineer is hereby directed to have the said bids calculated and tabulated with his estimates of the work, and report the same to the Commissioners for consideration by them, on the 23d day of November, instant, at 3 o'clock P. M.

Resolved, That the bids and checks of the bidders received for the construction of said gate-houses are hereby referred to the Committee of Finance and Audit for examination, and report to the Commissioners as to their formality and the sufficiency of the sureties proposed by the bidders.

Adopted.

The minutes of the stated meeting of November 9 were read and approved.

The Committee of Finance and Audit reported their examination and audit of vouchers Nos. 3082 to 3096, being estimates for work done by the contractors during the month of October; also of bills contained in vouchers Nos. 3097 to 3118, inclusive; also of voucher No. 3119, being sub-estimate for work done by contractors on Section 1, and, on motion of Commissioner Dowd, the same were approved and ordered certified to the Comptroller for payment.

Also, recommended the adoption of the following preamble and resolution:

Whereas, The appropriation of fifteen hundred dollars for furniture and fixtures for the use of this Commission and its employees, approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, February 21, 1885, is now exhausted; and therefore, be it

Resolved, That the sum of one thousand dollars be and the same is hereby appropriated for the purchase of necessary furniture and fixtures for the office of the Aqueduct Commissioners and its employees, subject to the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, as required by section 41, chapter 490, Laws of 1883.

On motion of Commissioner Dowd, the resolution was adopted and the appropriation made.

The Committee on Construction recommended the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That Article V. of the By-Laws be amended by adding the following section between Sections 3 and 4, which shall be denominated "Section 4"; and the present Section 4 shall be numbered as "Section 5;":

Section 4. Deputy Chief Engineer—The Deputy Chief Engineer is the Principal Assistant of the Chief and holds a confidential relationship with him, and, under his directions, attends to the preparation and execution of the work, and the details thereof, especially in regard to the formulation of all contracts and specifications in engineering work; and he shall have special charge of the offices of the Chief Engineer in the City of New York, and of the property therein, and of all maps and plans in the Draughting Department; which are hereby entrusted to his direct charge and supervision. In the absence of the Chief Engineer, or in case of his inability to act, he shall assume and perform the Chief Engineer's functions and duties under the title of "Acting Chief Engineer." He shall also act as such, in any special case, when so directed and authorized by the Commissioners, or the Committee on Construction, or the Chief Engineer.

President Spencer stated that the adoption of the above resolution would necessarily go over to the next meeting, by the tenth Rule of Order; whereupon Commissioner Barnes moved that Rule 10 of the Rules of Order be suspended; which motion was carried, and the resolution was then unanimously adopted.

Also, submitted a communication received from Francis R. de Fava, Jr., addressed to the Chief Engineer, making a request for "such literature, books, pamphlets, contracts and contract drawings, appertaining to the work now under construction, for the uses and benefits of an European institution," and recommended that such request be granted.

On motion of Commissioner Baldwin, the Chief Engineer was directed to reply to said communication, and to comply with his request therein made as far as practicable.

A communication was received from the Secretary, stating that no price had been fixed for copies of the contract drawings for a masonry dam and other work connected therewith on the east branch of the Croton river.

In connection therewith, Commissioner Barnes offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Secretary be and he is hereby authorized to furnish the copies of the above-mentioned contract drawings for \$5 each. Adopted.

The Comptroller, under date of November 12, 1887, gave notice of the issue of warrants for vouchers not certified to by the Aqueduct Commissioners, for

—which was ordered entered upon the books of the Commission and filed.	

The Secretary gave notice of the filing of a lien against contractors John Brunton & Co., by Joseph O'Leary, for labor and materials furnished upon Sections 13 and 14 of the New Croton Aqueduct; which was ordered filed, and the Secretary was directed to notify said contractors of this action.

On motion of Commissioner Baldwin, the Chairman of the Committee on Construction was requested to have an interview with Messrs. John Brunton & Co., contractors, with regard to the condition of the work on the New Croton Aqueduct, and learn from them what steps have been or are to be taken for carrying on the same, and request them to be present at a meeting of the Committee on Construction to be held on Monday next, 21st instant, at 3 o'clock P. M.

The Commissioners then adjourned.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending November 12, 1887:
 There were 4,391 inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors and the Sanitary Police.
 There were 338 complaints returned by the Sanitary Inspectors and the Sanitary Police.
 There were 178 complaints received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors and Sanitary Police for investigation and report.
 There were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port, 32 permits.
 There were issued to consignees, to discharge rags (in bulk, under bonds), 4 permits.
 There were issued, under the Sanitary Code, 12 miscellaneous permits.
 There were issued to scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks, 52 permits.

The certificates of 736 births, 51 still-births, 274 marriages and 658 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, November 12, 1887. This shows a decrease of 21 births, 13 still-births and 80 marriages and an increase of 93 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1886 there was an increase of 144 births, a decrease of 3 still-births, 86 marriages and 57 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from typhoid fever decreased 3; cerebro-spinal fever, 2; malarial fevers, 1; alcoholism, 1; aneurism, 4; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 12; convulsions, 1; apoplexy, 8; gastritis, gastro-enteritis, enteritis, and peritonitis, 2; cyanosis and atelectasis, 1; while the deaths from small-pox increased 1; diphtheria, 13; croup, 5; erysipelas, 1; puerperal diseases, 3; diarrheal diseases, 9; inanition, 4; cancer, 3; phthisis pulmonalis, 3; bronchitis, 8; pneumonia, 22; heart diseases, 13; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 5; meningitis and encephalitis, 6; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 4; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 6; Bright's disease and nephritis, 3; premature and preterm births, 3; suicide, 6. The number of deaths from measles, scarlatina, whooping cough, rheumatism and gout, surgical operations and drowning was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 109 were in institutions, 395 in tenement-houses, 130 in houses containing three families or less, 8 in hotels and boarding-houses, 16 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 116 were on the basement floor, 169 on the first, 121 on the second, 88 on the third, 21 on the fourth, 1 on the fifth, 1 on the sixth; 646 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 12 non-residents; 97 were stated to be single, 182 married, 83 widowed, and the condition of 296 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 658; still-births, 51; bodies in transit, 13; of the total burial permits issued for city and still-births, 95 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 736 births, 274 marriages, 51 still-births, 658 deaths; 13 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed and tabulated; 115 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 5 transcripts of the birth record, 4 of marriage, and 63 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending November 12, 1887, was 41.8 degrees Fahr.; the mean reading of the barometer was 29.825; the mean humidity was 64, saturation being 100; the

number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,731, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.64 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph. D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 626 deaths and still-births, or 88.29 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 19; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 271; City pauper burial-ground (undenominational), 85; Greenwood (undenominational), 33; Lutheran (undenominational), 103; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 17; Evergreen (undenominational), 22; Woodlawn (undenominational), 17; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 11; Union (Methodist Protestant), 5; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 12; Macpelah, L. The actual mortality for the week ending November 5, 1887, was 611; this is 68 less than the number that occurred during the corresponding week of the year 1886, and 22.8 more than the average of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 21.22 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,497,351.
