Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending April 8, 1882 :

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,616, as follows, viz.: 586 tenement-houses, 91 private dwellings, 54 other dwellings, 11 manu-factories and workshops, 8 stores and warehouses, 33 stables, 46 slaughter-houses, 1 stock yard, 3 lodging-houses, 2 public sewers, 2 smoke houses, 23 swill houses, 17 sunken and vacant lots, 1 gas main, 100 yards, courts, and areas, 127 cellars and basements, 160 waste-pipes and drains, 284 privies and water-closets, 75 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 5 dangerous stairways, 2 smoky chimneys, 2 cesspools, 1 piggery, and 3 other nuisances. The number of reports thereon received from the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 226.

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During the past week 140 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report. 105 permits were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

130 permits were issued to scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks. The Disinfecting Corps have visited 325 premises where contagious diseases were found and have disinfected and fumigated 286 houses, 286 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc. 15 cases of contagious disease were removed to the hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 513 births, 65 still-births, 164 marriages, and 762 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, April 8, 1882; this shows a decrease of 5 births, 90 marriages and 84 deaths, and an increase of 2 still-births, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1881, there was a decrease of 10 births and 6 marriages, and an increase of 19 still-births and 40 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the pre-ceding week, the deaths from small-pox decreased 4; measles, 15; scarlatina, 10; diphtheria, 5; croup, 4; whooping cough, 6; typhoid fever, 2; cerebro-spinal fever, 2; puerperal diseases, 8; diarrhoeal diseases, 5; inanition, 7; phthisis pulmonalis, 10; bronchitis, 14; pneumonia, 11; aneurism, 2; meningitis and encephalitis, 2; apoplexy, 1; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 9; premature and preternatural births, 6; while the deaths from typhus fever increased 3; malarial fevers, 5; alcoholism, 4; rheumatism and gout, 3; cancer, 1; heart diseases, 16; maras-mus, tabes-mesenterica, and scrofula, 6; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 1; convulsions, 2; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 1; gastritis, enteritis, and peritonitis, 2; Bright's disease and nephritis, 1; cyanosis and atelectasis 1; drowning, 3. SIR—There were 762 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, April 8, 1882, which is a decrease of 84, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 40 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1881. The actual mortality for the week ending April 1, 1882, was 812, which is 256.4 above the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 33.24 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,270,324.

Resolved, That the premises on the west side of Arthur street, Fordham, about 400 feet south of Pelham avenue, owned by Joseph McMahon, and known as lot A V on map of the Powell farm, be and they are hereby designated as and for a public pound, and that a pound master be appointed therefor and assigned thereto by the Mayor, without any compensation or salary to be paid by the corporation.
