

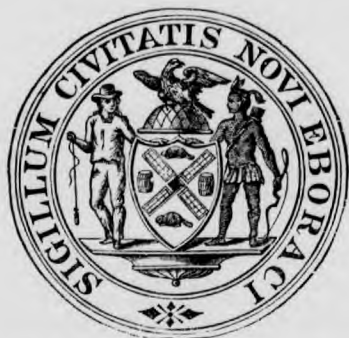

Petition of residents of the Nineteenth Ward for an appropriation for the erection of a building in said ward for school purposes.

To the Board of Aldermen:

The undersigned School Trustees of the Nineteenth Ward respectfully represent:

That on the 18th of September, 1876, they submitted to the Board of Education the following communication:

"The School Trustees of the Nineteenth Ward request the earnest attention of the Board of Education to the following:

"Under the recent rules of the Board of Education, limiting the attendance by the sitting capacity and air-space of the class-rooms, the number of pupils that can be accommodated in the schools of the ward is 7,907. The attendance on the opening of the schools was 9,049, and the excess over the number that can be properly accommodated is 1,142. The number of applicants refused admission for want of room, for the two weeks ending 15th of September, 1876, was 1,074.

"Every department and school in the ward, with one exception, recently organized, rejected applicants. Upwards of seventy per cent. of these were applicants for admission to the primaries, and mainly children who have never attended any school. The Trustees, on behalf of these children, request that a sum or sums be appropriated sufficient to furnish the school facilities they have a right to ask and demand."

Henry Kiddle, Esq., the City Superintendent of Schools, investigated the matters in said communication referred to, and made his report thereon to the Board of Education on the 20th of September, 1876, as follows:

"Many of the schools were crowded to such an extent as to be unable to receive all the pupils applying for admission. Since the opening day (September 4, 1876) it has been necessary in the Nineteenth Ward to send away a large number of applicants, upwards of 1,000. Notwithstanding the exclusion of so large a number of children who ought to find the means of instruction in these schools, the class-rooms are still very much overcrowded, particularly in all the primary departments and schools of the ward. The need of additional school accommodations in this ward is thus very urgent."

Upon the presentation of these facts the Board of Education included in its estimates for 1877, a sum for a site for a school and school building, and for the leasing of buildings temporarily for school purposes.

In view of the facts above stated, the undersigned appeal to you to approve the estimate, as submitted by the Board of Education, dated September, 1876.

The undersigned earnestly request that you approve the estimate as proposed by the Board of Education, and aid in furnishing sufficient accommodation for the education of the children in the Ward, and in removing a state of things that now disgraces the City of New York.
