WORK PERFORMED BY THE SANITARY BUREAU.

The following is a summary of the operations of the Sanitary Bureau, which is charged with the duty of inspecting and reporting, in proper form, all nuisances or causes of danger to the public health, with the execution of the orders of the Board and with the care of contagious diseases.

The number of inspections and reinspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors and the Sanitary Police was 172,963, classified as follows:

The Sanitary Superintendent, during the same period, under instruction and authority of the Board, granted 508 permits to discharge cargoes, under proper vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port; 288 permits to scavengers to empty privies; 47 permits to land rags (in bulk), under bonds, and 332 miscellaneous permits under the Sanitary Code.

OFFICE OF THE SECRETARY—NOTICES OF THE BOARD.

The notices of the Board for the abatement of nuisances are issued upon the facts and evidence contained in the written reports of the Sanitary Inspectors, the result of personal inspection of premises complained of. During the quarter ending December 31, 1892, the number of notices issued by the Board was 4,470. These notices call the attention of owners, lessees and agents to violations of the Sanitary Code in each case, and require the necessary alteration, repair, cleaning and improvement of the premises named within five days from the receipt of the notice. If, upon reinspection, it is found that the requirements of the notice have not been complied with, a suit for penalty is commenced against the delinquents under section 82, chapter 335, Laws of 1873.

The subjects of the notices of the Board above referred to are as follows:

The New York Cancer Hospital, at the corner of One Hundred and Sixth street and Eighth avenue, while in receipt of a large income from private subscriptions, legacies, and pay patients, is doing a great amount of good among its peculiarly afflicted poor, and is worthy of public support, and it is recommended that the same amount as donated last year be given, viz.: \$200.

The New York Skin and Cancer Hospital, while not being so well endowed with either buildings or funds, is still doing good work, and is entitled to the same amount as last year, viz.: \$200.

The House of the Holy Comforter, No. 149 Second avenue, is a home for incurables, and furnishes board and medical attendance absolutely free to women and children. The capacity of the home is 36 inmates, and it is now full, being mostly female patients. The only source of income is contributions and church donations, though for some years it has received a share of the Excise Fund. This charity seems to be a good one, and worthy of public support.

Babies' Wards of the Post-Graduate Hospital, No. 222 East Twentieth street—This charitable work was started about nine years ago, and is an adjunct of the Post-Graduate Hospital, under the Executive Committee of the hospital. It is non-sectarian; provides for sick children of the poorest classes brought to the door, and with a corps of one head nurse and nine under-nurses took care of and gave aid to over 300 children last year, and for lack of means were obliged to refuse numerous applications. The expenses for last year were \$6,900, including the house staff of 51 people. The only source of income is contributions, donations and benefits. The institution is an exceedingly good one, and has received no aid from either City or State.

Samaritan Home for the Aged, No. 414 West Twenty-second street—This is a home for aged people of both sexes, and is non-sectarian. It has accommodations for 41 inmates, and has now 36, the average age being between 72 and 73 years. Admission is obtained only upon payment of \$250, which provides a home for the remainder of the inmate's life, and also burial. Medical attendance is free. This appears to be a very good charity, and worthy of consideration.

New York Two-cent Diet Kitchen, No. 300 Avenue A—This society is supported entirely by personal contributions, and the object is to supply a good substantial meal for two cents. Last year meals were supplied to 32,000 persons at this price, and 1,572 were fed without charge, and the expenses exceeded the receipts from sales of meals by \$3,094. There is but one place where the kitchen is established, but another is to be opened when the funds will warrant. The charity seems to be really a good one and in every way deserving of contribution and support.

Home of Industry and Refuge for Discharged Convicts, No. 224 West Sixty-third street—This home is non-sectarian, the object being to give a home to and seek employment for ex-convicts, men only. It is supported by voluntary contributions, together with the income derived from the sale of brooms made by the inmates. The deficit is between \$2,000 and \$3,000 a year. This charity, while possessing a great many good qualities, is not exactly of the nature of the charities which properly appeal for aid to the City.

The Sloane Maternity Hospital—This institution was opened January, 1888, since which time it has cared for 2,485 cases of confinement. During 1882, 735 children were born under its roof. The medical attendance is all gratuitous. This is a worthy charity, and is a great aid in relieving the City from burdens which it would otherwise have to assume, and is therefore deserving of consideration.

I beg to refer to the accompanying communication of Mr. Louis M. Hornthal in reference to the Mt. Sinai Hospital, which will explain the objects and resources of this hospital.

HONORABLE SIR—Referring to the conversation had with you this morning, in the course of which you stated that of the small amount of the Theatrical and Concert License Fund, left for distribution among the various charitable institutions, you desired further information as to the claims of the Mount Sinai Hospital for a portion thereof, I would respectfully beg to state that the Mount Sinai Hospital is different from other similar institutions, for it is probably the only general hospital that has a separate and distinct ward for the care and treatment of children in the hospital itself, besides which it has a very large department for the special care and treatment of children in the dispensary thereof.

A few data in this connection may not be out of place, and may convince you that this institution is certainly entitled to a small share of the fund which is distributed among the institutions, looking specially after the interests of children. Out of a total of 2,810 patients treated in the hospital proper during the year, 493 were children, of whom 394 were discharged as cured or benefited, thus showing that nearly 20 per cent. of the total number of patients were children, and treated in said institution. The total expenditure of the hospital, for the support of the hospital during the year, was \$90,000, of which amount about 20 per cent. was spent in the necessary care and cure of the children. Added to this, the Mount Sinai Hospital, as you are aware, has a very large dispensary in which during the year 3,895 children were treated, with a total number of 9,652 consultations, or again, about one-fifth of the total number treated there.

As before stated, the money which was heretofore appropriated to the Mount Sinai Hospital from the Excise Fund has been withdrawn and applied by law to other purposes. The income of the hospital from patrons, members, invested funds, etc., is \$80,000, whilst the balance of about twenty odd thousand dollars is received from the Hospital Saturday and Sunday Fund, donations, legacies, bequests, etc.

Trusting that you will see your way to appropriating even a small portion of this fund to the support of the Mount Sinai Hospital, an institution which is nonsectarian, and supported entirely by private charities, and which cares for the number of children herein stated, I am,

DEAR SIR—I notice with regret that you withdrew the item of asphaltting the Boulevard, on the ground that it was likely to be disturbed by the extension of the elevated railroad. This is a great disappointment to the owners of property fronting on this street, as they have been promised this improvement for some time. They pay a large sum in taxes, and their property is held dead by the frightful condition of the street, as no one will improve it until it is paved, nor can the residents enjoy any comfort, winter or summer, as it now stands.

I wish you could see its condition at One Hundred and Sixth and One Hundred and Seventh streets at this writing. You can sail a boat there to-day. We have to cross it on boards. Some of the residents have talked with experts on the matter, and they ask me to write you and explain that it would cost less to asphalt it now and patch it around the elevated pillars after they are in place than it would to do it with the obstructions offered by these pillars when they are in place.

Further, it is alleged that the Manhattan would willingly do this patching, as part of their agreement with the City, so that instead of being a saving to delay its paving, it would be a loss to the City to do so.

I am further urged to ask you for a reconsideration of this subject, on the additional ground that the future movements of these extensions are uncertain, and it is not fair to us to hold our property down any longer.

A GENERAL INVITATION IS HEREBY extended to architects to furnish competitive designs and plans for an armory building for the use of Troop A, of the National Guard of the State of New York.

The building to be erected on the ground 200 x 100 feet in the rear of the Eighth Regiment Armory, between Ninety-fourth and Ninety-fifth streets, and fronting on Madison avenue. AUTHORITY FOR TRUST INVESTMENTS.

CHAPTER 65, LAWS OF 1889.

AN ACT authorizing the investment of trust funds in stocks or bonds of any of the cities of this State.

Approved by the Governor, March 14, 1889. Passed, three-fifths being present.

The people of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. It shall be lawful for executors, administrators, guardians and trustees and others holding trust funds for investment to invest the funds so held by them in trust in bonds or stocks of any of the cities of this State, issued pursuant to the authority of any law of this State.

Section 2. This act shall take effect immediately.
