WORK PERFORMED BY THE SANITARY BUREAU.

The following is a summary of the operations of the Sanitary Bureau, which is charged with the duty of inspecting and reporting, in proper form, all nuisances or causes of danger to the public health, with the execution of the orders of the Board and with the care of contagious diseases.

The number of complaints received from citizens was 3,088, all of which were referred to the Sanitary Inspectors and the Sanitary Police for investigation and report.

The Sanitary Superintendent, during the same period, under instruction and authority of the Board, granted 508 permits to discharge cargoes, under proper vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port; 288 permits to scavengers to empty privies; 47 permits to land rags (in bulk), underbonds, and 332 miscellaneous permits under the Sanitary Code.

SIR—I have the honor to submit the following report of the cases of typhus fever which have occurred in this city during the quarter ending December 31, 1892.

The first case brought to the notice of the Department since July 16 was on November 30, when a "suspicious case" was reported in Ward 17, Bellevue Hospital. An Inspector immediately visited the ward and found Michael Shea ill with typhus fever. He ordered his removal to North Brother Island, and all the bedding and clothing that could possibly have been infected removed to the disinfecting depot in Sixteenth street and destroyed.

No visitors were allowed in the ward for three weeks and a list of all the occupants with their addresses was furnished the Department and notice given by the Warden when any one was discharged from the ward; an Inspector was then sent to find him, if possible, and keep him under observation.

Further investigation showed that Michael Shea, occupation that of a longshoreman, had been in the city five years and had occupied bed No. 91 in the lodging-house at No. 173 Park Row, November 26 and 27; he was admitted to Bellevue Hospital on the 29th. He was delirious on admission and no other information could be obtained from him or at the lodging-house.

All the bedding from his cot was removed to Sixteenth street and destroyed, the lodging-house fumigated and disinfected and kept under observation by an Inspector for three weeks.

On the evening of the same day the Superintendent of Chambers Street Hospital telephoned that they had a "suspicious case" in their Reception Ward.

The Inspector who was sent to the hospital found William Bell ill with typhus, and he was removed to North Brother Island, and the bedding destroyed.

As there were only two patients in the ward and they had no suitable place to keep them, one was transferred to Ward 17 at Bellevue Hospital, and the other to the isolating ward at New York Hospital, where he was kept for three weeks.

William Bell had occupied cot No. 52 at the lodging-house No. 194 Park Row for three months before admission to the hospital, and was employed as a district messenger at No. 9 New street, but had not been there since November 21, when he sent word that he was sick.

Bell was also delirious and further history could not be obtained. The usual action was taken at the lodging-house and at No. 9 New street.

December 7, Jacob Goldberg was reported ill with typhus in the isolating ward at Mount Sinai Hospital, and he was ordered removed to North Brother Island by the Inspector.

He was a shoemaker and worked at his residence No. 120 Sheriff street, for Wilmerding, Morris & Mischell, of No. 64 White street.

The next case was that of Edward Devy, who was removed December 9 from the alcoholic ward at Bellevue Hospital, where he had been since December 4.

He had occupied a bed in the lodging-house at No. 160 Park Row from November 14 until his admission to the hospital, and was employed in a restaurant at No. 128 Park Row.

Later in the afternoon John Carney was removed to North Brother Island from the same ward with typhus. He had been there since December 6, and before that he had occupied bed No. 11, at No. 194 Park Row, for a long time.

On account of the amount of exposure, it was deemed advisable to strictly quarantine all the patients who had been exposed, and they were removed to the new Alcoholic Ward, where they could be isolated in separate rooms for three weeks.

A list of all the patients, sixty in number, who had been discharged from the ward, from the admission of Devy to the time the quarantine was established, was furnished the Department. Inspectors were detailed to trace them, it possible, and if found, to keep them under observation.

Of these were found at addresses, 20; tived out of the city, 16; not found, 38; total, 74.

Thomas Cook was removed to North Brother Island, ill with typhus, December 18, from the Homeopathic Hospital on Ward's Island, where he had been since the night before. His residence was given as No. 194 Park Row, but the books at the lodging-house failed to show that he had ever slept there under that name.

On December 29 it was reported that there were three cases of typhoid pneumonia at No. 78 Division street. An Inspector was sent to investigate, and found that Fannie Feldstein, her son Daniel and granddaughter Johanna had been ill with typhus fever about a week, and they were removed to the hospital.

They lived over the bakery which was kept by Daniel Feldstein.

The same day Thomas Pullan, who has been living at No. 194 Park Row, walked in the New York Dispensary, and was sent to the hospital ill with typhus fever.

On December 30 four "suspicious cases" were reported at Bellevue Hospital and four at Chambers Street Hospital, which were found to be typhus fever, and removed to North Brother Island.

Investigation showed that five of the cases had been sick some time, and had been living at

No. 34 Bayard street.
From the prolonged exposure, it is probable that there will more cases develop.

The deaths for the quarter numbered 9,175, 828 less than the total for the last quarter of the previous year. The death-rate was only 19.82, and was less than for the corresponding quarter of any year since 1883. This marked decrease in the mortality appears to be due to the final disappearance of epidemic influenza as a lethal factor, the lingering traces of it having been perceptible. up to the latter part of the previous quarter.

Contagious and infectious diseases show a marked decrease, as compared with the corresponding quarter of 1891, the decrease being greatest in scarlet fever. The deaths for the fourth quarter of 1892 and 1891, respectively, were as follows: Diphtheria, 381 against 426; typhoid fever, 116 against 136; scarlet fever, 115 against 248. Small-pox, however, caused 19 deaths in 1892 against 0 in 1891; typhus fever, 5 against 0; and whooping-cough, 87 against 49.

Diarrhœal diseases caused 274 deaths against 373 in 1891.

A similar falling off is noticeable in the diseases of the respiratory organs. The deaths for 1892 and 1891, respectively, from bronchitis were 373 against 437, and from pneumonia 1,302 against 1,478, while there were only 1,151 deaths from phthisis for 1892 against 1,256 in 1891.

When the death-rates for the quarter are compared with the average for the previous five years, a decrease is noted in almost every item. The only marked increases in the table are in apoplexy, with a rate of .71 against .57; in alcoholism, .26 against .13; and in accidents, .86 against .70.

The deaths of children under five years of age numbered 3,212 against 3,689 for 1891, a decrease of 477, about 13 per cent., and the death-rate of such persons, estimated on the total population, was only 6.94 against the five-year average of 7.66.

The number of marriages reported was slightly greater than in the last quarter of 1891, viz.: 413 against 4,391, but the births show a slight falling off, being only 12,710 against 12,807 for

OFFICE OF THE SECRETARY-NOTICES OF THE BOARD.

The notices of the Board for the abatement of nuisances are issued upon the facts and evidence contained in the written reports of the Sanitary Inspectors, the result of personal inspection of premises complained of. During the quarter ending December 31, 1892, the number of notices issued by the Board was 4,470. These notices call the attention of owners, lessees and agents to violations of the Sanitary Code in each case, and require the necessary alteration, repair, cleaning and improvement of the premises named within five days from the receipt of the notice. If, upon reinspection, it is found that the requirements of the notice have not been complied with, a suit for penalty is commenced against the delinquents under section 82, chapter 335, Laws of 1873.

Mount Sinal Hospital.

An investigation has been made by me into the merits of each institution above mentioned. The New York Cancer Hospital, at the corner of One Hundred and Sixth street and Eighth avenue, while in receipt of a large income from private subscriptions, legacies, and pay patients, is doing a great amount of good among its pecaliarly afflicted poor, and is worthy of public support, and it is recommended that the same amount as donated last year be given, viz.: \$200.

The New York Skin and Cancer Hospital, while not being so well endowed with either buildings or funds, is still doing good work, and is entitled to the same amount as last year, viz.: \$200.

The House of the Holy Comforter, No. 149 Second avenue, is a home for incurables, and furnishes board and medical attendance absolutely free to women and children. The capacity of the home is 36 inmates, and it is now full, being mostly female patients. The only source of income is contributions and church donations, though for some years it has received a share of the Excise Fund. This charity seems to be a good one, and worthy of public support.

Babies' Wards of the Post-Graduate Hospital, No. 222 East Twentieth street—This charitable work was started about nine years ago, and is an adjunct of the Post-Graduate Hospital, under the Executive Committee of the hospital. It is non-sectarian; provides for sick children of the poorest classes brought to the door, and with a corps of one head nurse and nine under-nurses took care of and gave aid to over 300 children last year, and for lack of means were obliged to refuse numerous applications. The expenses for last year were \$6,900, including the house staff of 51 people. The only source of income is contributions, donations and benefits.

Samaritan Home for the Aged, No. 414 West Twenty-second street—This is a hom

HONORABLE SIR-Referring to the conversation had with you this morning, in the course of which you stated that of the small amount of the Theatrical and Concert License Fund, left for distribution among the various charitable institutions, you desired further information as to the claims of the Mount Sinai Hospital for a portion thereof, I would respectfully beg to state that the Mount Sinai Hospital is different from other similar institutions, for it is probably the only general hospital that has a separate and distinct ward for the care and treatment of children in the hospital itself, besides which it has a very large department for the special care and treatment of children in the dispressive thereof the dispensary thereof.

the dispensary thereof.

A few data in this connection may not be out of place, and may convince you that this institution is certainly entitled to a small share of the fund which is distributed among the institutions, looking specially after the interests of children. Out of a total of 2,810 patients treated in the hospital proper during the year, 493 were children, of whom 394 were discharged as cured or benefited, thus showing that nearly 20 per cent. of the total number of patients were children, and treated in said institution. The total expenditure of the hospital, for the support of the hospital during the year, was \$90,000, of which amount about 20 per cent. was spent in the necessary care and cure of the children. Added to this, the Mount Sinai Hospital, as you are aware, has a very large dispensary in which during the year 3,895 children were treated, with a total number of 9,652 consultations, or again, about one-fifth of the total number treated there.

As before stated, the money which was heretofore appropriated to the Mount Sinai Hospital from the Excise Fund has been withdrawn and applied by law to other purposes. The income of the hospital from patrons, members, invested funds, etc., is \$80,000, whilst the balance of about twenty odd thousand dollars is received from the Hospital Saturday and Sunday Fund, donations, legacies, bequests, etc.

Trusting that you will see your way to appropriating even a small portion of this fund to the support of the Mount Sinai Hospital, an institution which is nonsectarian, and supported entirely by private charities, and which cares for the number of children herein stated, I am,

Dear Sir—I notice with regret that you withdrew the item of asphalting the Boulevard, on the ground that it was likely to be disturbed by the extension of the elevated railroad.

This is a great disappointment to the owners of property fronting on this street, as they have been promised this improvement for some time. They pay a large sum in taxes, and their property is held dead by the frightful condition of the street, as no one will improve it until it is paved, nor can the residents enjoy any comfort, winter or summer, as it now stands.

I wish you could see its condition at One Hundred and Sixth and One Hundred and Seventh streets at this writing. You can sail a boat there to-day. We have to cross it on boards. Some of the residents have talked with experts on the matter, and they ask me to write you and explain that it would cost less to asphalt it now and patch it around the elevated pillars after they are in place than it would to do it with the obstructions offered by these pillars when they are in place.

Further, it is alleged that the Manhattan would willingly do this patching, as part of their agreement with the City, so that instead of being a saving to delay its paving, it would be a loss to the City to do so.
