Sir—In the suit entitled as above a temporary injunction was granted restraining the City authorities from making a contract with John B. McDonald, or with any one else, for the building and construction of Jerome Park Reservoir, and an order was also granted requiring the defendants to show cause why the injunction should not be continued during the pendency of the action.

The motion to continue the injunction was argued before Mr. Justice O'Brien, who has decided

against the plaintiff.

An order denying the motion to continue the injunction and vacating the temporary injunction has been entered, so that the suit no longer interferes with any action which the Aqueduct Commissioners may desire to take in regard to the letting of the contract for the building of the reservoir.

It appears that the Aqueduct Commissioners advertised for sealed bids or proposals for the construction and building of a reservoir at Jerome Park. That among a number of other bids received were those from John O'Brien for \$5,297,370, and John B. McDonald for \$5,472,080. That O'Brien's bid is \$174,710 less than McDonald's, and was the lowest bid made for the work. The estimate of the Chief Engineer was \$5,882,690.

It is alleged that the Commissioners not only arbitrarily and wrongfully refused to award the contract to O'Brien but wrongfully awarded it to McDonald, and that their action was influenced by unlawful means and against the interests of the City. That such award was fraudulently made for the benefit of a favored bidder. That the giving of \$174,710 more than they could procure the work to be done for is a waste of public funds.

If these charges were sustained, then undoubtedly the Court would enjoin the making of the contract with McDonald. I have looked in vain for any evidence to sustain the charges that the Commissioners acted "fraudulently" or were influenced by "unlawful means," nor do I think that plaintiff seriously contends that there are any facts upon which such conclusions can be sup-

Commissioners acted "fraudulently" or were influenced by "unlawful means," nor do I think that plaintiff seriously contends that there are any facts upon which such conclusions can be supported.

Without spending time on these, we find that the greatest stress is laid upon the claim of favoritism for McDonald, and prejudice against O'Brien. Apart from the fact that the contract was awarded him, there is no evidence of partiality or favoritism towards McDonald.

The charge of prejudice which it is said one of the Commissioners had against O'Brien, is supported by the latter's statement that third persons told him that one of the Commissioners had expressed a prejudice. These persons deny that they made such statements to O'Brien, and we have the affidavit of the Commissioner accused, which asserts that he never made such statements and never entertained such prejudice. It is to be noted that such Commissioner did not vote to award the contract to McDonald, and did not succeed in getting his associates to vote with him in the favor of the contractor whom he regarded as the best. Even if he entertained such prejudice it is quite evident that this Commissioner had no such controlling influence over his associates as to prevent their asserting their individual wills and judgments.

These men, for character and ability, have been selected to conduct a great public work, and it would be a serious reflection on the independence and competency of the entire Commission and justly subject them to removal, if it could be shown that they permitted themselves to be improperly swayed and controlled by one of their number. That they were not so influenced is clearly apparent from the fact already stated, that the Commissioner whom it is suggested had such influence, stood alone on the final vote, making the award to McDonald.

And section 30 reads: "No contract shall take effect until the Commissioners or a majority of them shall certify thereon in writing that its acceptance will, in their judgment, best secure the public interest and efficient performance of the work therein mentioned."

Here the statute does not require the Commissioners to award the contract to the lowest bidder, and those who voted in awarding the contract swear that the acceptance of McDonald's bid will, in their judgment, "best secure the public interest and efficient performance of the work."

This Aqueduct Act has been construed in at least two cases in this court. In the case of Jacob Ebling against the Aqueduct Commissioners where, singularly enough, the plaintiff there sought on much the same grounds as are here present to prevent the award of a contract to O'Brien & Clark on the ground that their bid was not the lowest and that they were favored contractors, Mr. Justice Barrett, in denving the motion for a preliminary injunction, among other things, said:

Justice Barrett, in denying the motion for a preliminary injunction, among other things, said:

"The law permits the Commissioners to reject all the bids which may be presented to them.

It also permits them to accept whatever bid they think will produce the greatest efficiency in the performance of the work. That is the legislative policy upon which this particular public work is performance of the work. That is the legislative policy upon which this particular public work is being constructed.

"We have no power, sitting as a Court of Equity, to limit the range of selection on the part

of these Commissioners

"The difficulty here, as I said before, is that the Legislature has given a wide discretion to these Commissioners. The usual policy of the law has been abandoned, namely, that the work should be given to the lowest bidder. If the Commissioners think that the giving of the work to one who is not the lowest bidder will insure efficiency, they have the power to give it to him."

And in speaking of what should appear to justify the Court's interference, he continues: "That the work was given to one who is not the lowest bidder fraudulently or upon some corrupt understanding."

understanding."

This and other cases that might be cited show that a Court of Equity has no right to interfere with and control the exercise of the discretionary power vested in a public body, such as the Aqueduct Commission. Undoubtedly it will interfere when necessary to prevent fraud, injustice or the violation of a trust, and whenever it is shown that those in whom the discretion is vested are prepared illegally or corruptly to trample upon rights or sacrifice interests entrusted to their care, then the Courts will interfere to prevent the consummation of a fraud.

The law presumes honesty rather than fraud and it will not, in the absence of proof, conclude that a discretion vested in a public body is being fraudulenty exercised. Here we have charges of illegality and fraud, but these are mere conclusions unsupported by a single fact other than the one that there is a lower bidder than the one to whom the contract is to be awarded. If this were enough, then the law, which expressly permits the Commissioners to select any bidder, whether the lowest or not, would be nullified.

I have been referred to many cases by plaintiff's counsel, amongst them Winkler vs. Summers, 22 Abb. N. C., 84, affirmed in 51 Hun, 636. That arose under the charter of Buffalo. It gave the Common Council power to purchase lands for school and other purposes. The Common Council, after examining various preferred sites, selected one which the owner offered to sell for \$11,000, and at which sum the Council directed the Comptroller to purchase.

Upon an application for an injunction to restrain the sale, it was shown that the property was

sell for \$11,000, and at which sum the Council directed the Comptroller to purchase.

Upon an application for an injunction to restrain the sale, it was shown that the property was not worth more than \$8,000, and that no effort to obtain the property at its real value was made. Injunctive relief was therein awarded, on the ground that it involved "an appropriation of a large sum of money belonging to the public, for which no equivalent was to be received by the city."

The distinction between that case and the one at bar is apparent. Here the bid of McDonald is less than the Engineer's estimate, and whether his or O'Brien's bid be selected, it can hardly be claimed at this time that the city will not receive an equivalent.

It is impossible now to determine whether the Engineer of the Commission or the contractors are right in their estimates, and this is made clear when we recall that the bids made by the various contractors for this work vary from a little over five millions to over thirteen millions of dollars.

The Legislature left the determination of the persons who should do the work and the price they should receive to the judgment and discretion of the Commissioners, and it has never been held, even though they erred or were mistaken, that a court could substitute its own for the judgment and discretion of the Commissioners. I have attempted already to point out what are the limitations to the general rule that a court of equity has no right to interfere with and control the exercise of discretionary power vested in a public body. But I might well have rested my conclusion upon Judge Bartlett's reasoning in the case cited and the well-considered case in the General Term, Second Department, recently decided, of Adamson vs. The Nassau E. R. R. Co.

There the Common Council of Brooklyn awarded a franchise for a street railway to the defendant though they had a higher offer from another company of many thousand dollars for the same franchise.

In reversing the injunction order, the Court, among other thing

In reversing the injunction order, the Court, among other things, said:

"It would be a very narrow view of the powers and duties of municipal officers that would confine their exercise to the aggrandizement of the local treasury. Financial considerations are not alone to control in granting permission to prosecute the various enterprises conducted by individuals and private corporarions within the municipality."

and private corporarions within the municipality."

And, in speaking of the statutes which gave a right of action in favor of taxpayers, reference is made to the case of Tolcot vs. City of Buffalo, 125 N. Y., 286, wherein it was said:

"The terms 'waste' and 'injury,' used in this statute, comprehend only illegal, wrongful or dishonest official acts, and were not intended to subject the official action of boards, officers or municipal bodies acting within the limits of their jurisdiction and discretion, but which some taxpayer might conceive to be unwise, improvident, or based on errors of judgment, to the supervision of the judicial tribunals."

"It is believed that no action was ever maintained under that statute, with the sanction of this court, without some proof or allegation that the official act or proceeding complained of was without power, or was tainted by corruption or fraud."

I deem it unnecessary to quote further from that case, or to multiply authorities, as it seems reasonably free from doubt, upon the facts here appearing, that the court would not be justified in interfering with the Commissioners.

Motion for an injunction is accordingly denied.

Two entrance gates are proposed to be made opening from Baxter street, two gates opening from Mulberry street, one gate opening from Bayard street, one gate opening from Park street, and one angular entrance gate at the corner of the park reservation facing Worth street.

Lines of walk of a minimum width of eighteen feet are proposed to be laid out from each of these gates so that moderately direct crosswalks may be secured that will, I think, fairly meet the public needs in this regard.

A circuit walk is also provided which, with its concourses marked A, B, C, D, will be an agreeable feature in the design to visitors who use this park.

The plan also shows that a large greensward will thus be left open in the southerly section of the park and a smaller greensward in the northerly portion.

The borders of these greenswards will be furnished with shade trees, elms, lindens, etc., and seclusion will be secured by planting along the outer boundaries masses of strong growing shrubs of such kinds as will thrive in populous districts.

As water-closet accommodation will be needed it is proposed that this requirement shall be provided for by a structure located near the northerly boundary, the upper portion of which marked P, S, is proposed to be taken advantage of to secure a pleasant shelter and outlook over the whole length of the park.

Suitable locations for flower beds are indicated on the plan.

That there is now being built corner One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street and Park avenue a That there is now being built corner One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street and Park avenue a targe railroad station, occupying nearly four blocks of space, at which all trains going from or soming into the Grand Central Railroad Depot will stop. This, when completed, will become a great railroad centre, and bundreds of thousands of passengers will go to and from this point. The advantages afforded those who will make use of this station by the Third Avenue Railroad Company far exceeds those which can be offered by any other surface road. On this improvement the City is expending large sums of money, and is therefore directly interested.

That the contention, oft repeated, that the Metropolitan Street Railway Company would enable passengers to travel to the Battery on both the east and the west sides of the city is not in all respects true. The west side branch turns at Fifty-third street and reaches the Battery via Broadway. The east side line turns at Twenty-third street and also reaches the Battery via Broadway.

That along a goodly portion of the line of the Metropolitan Street Railway Company's route business is comparatively suspended early in the evening, and the travel at such points is consequently light, while travel at the east side of the city is almost as extensive, all along the line, long after nightfall as it is during the entire day.

That the large number who may desire to connect with the elevated railroads, east and west, in order to travel to and from business by the quickest means of transit, would be best accommodated by the Third Avenue Railroad Company.

That the great and extraordinary large number of people which utilize the Third Avenue Railroad at the present time on Sundays and holidays is a clear and unmistakable indication that from and to the east side of the city does the multitude travel when seeking opportunity for outings, etc.

That the Third Avenue Railroad Company has for many years been in occupation of a large portion of the territory to be affected by the granting of said application; and the facilities for transportation which it has thus afforded have contributed materially to build up that portion of the city.

transportation which it has thus afforded have contributed materially to build up that portion of the city.

That said company has heretofore presented, within the last three years, three other applications to this Board, which have been duly considered, requesting the granting of extensions and branches, and was the first to ask for the franchise now sought.

That it is the opinion of your Committee that the application of the Third Avenue Railroad Company should be granted for the reason, also, that at any sale which may take the proportion of gross receipts for joint business which the Third Avenue Railroad Company must needs pay under the provisions of existing law to the successful bidder, if other than itself, is such as would admit of opposition and competition from the Metropolitan Street Railway Company, or other companies, but that if the application of the Metropolitan Street Railway Company should be granted, the proportion of receipts for joint business which it would necessarily receive from the successful bidder, if other than itself, would be so excessive that no other company could afford to become a bidder at such sale, and the object of the statute under which this consent is to be sold, and which is to secure additional revenue to the City, would thereby be defeated.

That the percentages which the successful bidder is required by law to pay into the City Treasury would be greater in case the application of the Third Avenue Railroad Company were granted, than would be paid to the City in case that of the Metropolitan Street Railway Company were granted.

That said Third Avenue Railroad Company has further stipulated as part of its application, in case it shall be the successful bidder at such sale and acquire the right to build said extension, to pay into the City Treasury the sum of \$250,000 in cash, or \$150,000 more than the Metropolitan Street Railway Company has offered in its agreement to pay into the City Treasury, viz.: the sum of \$100,000 in cash, under like conditions.

That, while your Committee believe that monetary offers of this character should have due consideration, yet they should not be regarded as of sufficient importance to outweigh those considerations which are due the traveling public, the needs of special locality, the general benefits to be derived, the necessities of the city, etc.

It also seems to your Committee that offers of this kind are not in touch with the spirit of the Railroad Act, and have a tendency to limit competition at the sale which takes place under direction of the Comptroller, preventing to a large extent free and open competition to all who might desire to bid for the franchise.

The third item has been increased to \$10,050 by the transfer to it of \$850 by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment from the account for "Printing, Stationery and Blank Books."

It will be observed that the first item—"Printing, Stationery and Blank Books."—called for more than two-thirds of the aggregate appropriation for the entire department.

I sent out, nearly four weeks ago, a request to all of the departments in the city for the immediate submission of their annual requisitions for Printing, Stationery and Blank Book supplies. I have received responses from only a little more than one-half of these departments, and some of them have notified me that they cannot possibly make returns within several weeks to come. Judging from those that have been received, I infer that the appropriation for "Printing, Stationery and Blank Books and Arrears" this year need not exceed that for 1895, though to this account I found chargeable, on my appointment to office, bills in arrears, some of them running back to 1890, 1891 and 1892, aggregating over \$73,000. More than \$27,000 of these arrearages have been met, but other bills are in course of examination, and will no doubt have to be met from the appropriation of next year. These arrearages, according to the statement compiled by the Deputy Supervisor and Accountant of the CITY RECORD, aggregate more than \$46,000. I hope, however, to be able to meet them if the same amount for "Printing, Stationery and Blank Books and Arrears" is set aside for this department this year as was apportioned in 1895, viz.: \$200,000. The appropriation for "Publication of the CITY RECORD," for which \$72,000 was allowed last year, I think can safely be reduced by \$5,000 this year. The appropriation for the "City Record—Salaries and Contingencies," for which \$10,050 was given, can be reduced to \$10,000 this year.

Report of the Bureau of Attorney for the Collection of Arrears of Personal Taxes, for the Quarter ending June 30, 1895, Pursuant to Section 216, Laws of 1882.

There have been begun since the 1st day of April, 1895, 481 special proceedings and 19 actions for the purpose of enforcing the payment of personal taxes in arrears.

Of this number 209 cases have been dismissed, 44 have terminated in an order of commitment and are still unpaid; in 28 cases claims have been filed, 54 are still pending; 5 delinquents have been examined and found insolvent; in one case the tax has been remitted, 140 have paid. There have been brought 19 actions, of which 2 have paid, 2 are in judgment, 1 discontinued and the balance are still pending.

During this quarter this Bureau has collected the sum of \$41,732.87 for taxes and interest, and this amount, in addition to the sum of \$32.723.71 taxes and interest collected for the first quarter of the present year, makes a total collection of the sum of \$74,456.58 for taxes and interest, and in addition thereto costs have been collected and paid to the City Chamberlain in the sum of \$1,036.19, and in addition thereto interest on bank deposits in the sum of \$75,540.81.

In severing my official connection with you I desire to state that my aim has been to make this Bureau efficient and self-sustaining, and I leave the results, as set forth in my various reports, to speak for me.

to speak for me.

From the records in the Finance Department it appears that this Bureau collected \$172,508.90 between May 2, 1882, and December 31, 1889, and during my administration, from January 1, 1890, and ending with this date, the amount collected is \$464,711.31.

Wishing your administration in this Bureau even better success than I have had, I remain,
