



ACTION TAKEN AT MEETINGS HELD PURSUANT TO PROVISIONS IN SECTION 1536 OF CHAPTER 378, LAWS OF 1897.

Resolved, That the annexed resolutions and plan of the assignment and transfer of the employees and property of the City of New York, of the City of Brooklyn, of Long Island City, and the Borough of Richmond, and that part of the County of Queens included within the City of New York, as constituted by the Greater New York Charter, to the City of New York, constituted by the Greater New York Charter, be and the same hereby are directed to be published in the CITY RECORD on January 14, 1898.

Unanimously adopted.

Resolved, That, pursuant to section 1536 of the Greater New York Charter, the annexed detailed plan of the transfer to and the partition between the several public departments, bureaus and offices created or provided by said charter of all the public property pertaining to the administration of said departments, bureaus and offices in the City of New York, and the books, records, vouchers and other property of the said City of New York, and of the apportionment between the several public departments, bureaus and offices, and the assignment of service in said public departments, bureaus and offices, respectively, so far as practicable, of all the subordinates and employees in every branch of the public service in said City of New York, in such manner that each person thereof shall be assigned, as nearly as may be, without prejudice or advantage, to perform the same service in the same part of the city and to hold the same relative rank and position in the City of New York, as constituted by said charter, as he performs and holds at the present time, be and the same hereby is approved and adopted.

Whereas, Section 1536 of the Greater New York Charter provides that the Mayor of the City of New York, the Mayor of the City of Brooklyn, the Mayor of Long Island City, the Chairman of the Board of Supervisors of the County of Richmond, and the County Judge of Queens County, shall meet in the Mayor's office, in the City of New York, on the 1st Day of December, 1897, and as often thereafter during the month of December as may be necessary and proper, and adopt a detailed plan for the transfer to, and the partition, between the several public departments, bureaus and offices created or provided by said charter, of all the public property appertaining to the administration of said departments, bureaus and offices in the City of New York, and the books, records, vouchers and other papers of said municipal and public corporations, and for the apportionment between the several public departments, bureaus and offices, and the assignment to service in said public departments, bureaus and offices respectively, so far as practicable, of all the subordinates and employees in every branch of the public service, in said City of New York, in such manner that each person thereof shall be assigned, as nearly as may be, without prejudice or advantage, to perform the same service in the same part of the city and to hold the same relative rank and position in the City of New York, as constituted by said charter, as he performs and holds at the time said plan and apportionment and assignment was determined upon; and

Whereas, To that end the said Mayors, Chairman and County Judge having so met, the said Mayor of the City of New York hereby presents with his approval the following detailed plan as to persons in the service of the City of New York and the property of said City; transferring and apportioning said persons and property from the various departments and boards of said City of New York to the same or similar departments and boards of said City of New York, as constituted by said charter.

DEPARTMENT OF BUILDINGS.

First—All employees of the Department of Buildings of the City of New York, excepting the Attorney and Assistant Attorneys, are hereby assigned to the Department of Buildings of the City of New York, as constituted by said charter, for service in the Boroughs of Manhattan and the Bronx.

Second—The Attorney and the Assistant Attorneys of said Department are hereby assigned to the Law Department of the City of New York, as constituted by said charter.

Third—All papers, records, etc., and all other property of said Department of Buildings, excepting those referring to matters in charge of said Attorney and said Assistant Attorneys, are hereby transferred to said Department of Buildings of the City of New York, as constituted by said charter, for use in the Boroughs of Manhattan and the Bronx.

Fourth—All papers, records, etc., in matters which have been referred to said Attorney, and which he has in charge, are hereby transferred to the Law Department of the City of New York, as constituted by said charter.

DEPARTMENT OF FINANCE.

All the employees of the Department of Finance are hereby assigned, and all the property of the said Department is hereby transferred, to the Department of Finance, as created and provided for under the Greater New York Charter.

LAW DEPARTMENT.

All the employees of the Law Department of the City of New York, and the several bureaus thereof, and the Attorney for Arrears and Personal Taxes, and all the papers, records and other property thereof, are hereby assigned and transferred to the Law Department, created and provided for by the Greater New York Charter.

The Attorney of the Fire Department of the City of New York is hereby assigned to the Law Department of the City of New York, as constituted by said charter, and the books and papers in matters now in charge of said Attorney are hereby assigned and transferred to the said Law Department of the City of New York.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS.

First—All employees of the Department of Public Works are hereby assigned to the various departments of the City of New York set opposite their names in the annexed Schedule "A" of list of officers and subordinates employed in the Department of Public Works of the City of New York.

Second—All the property of the said Department of Public Works is hereby transferred to the Board of Public Improvements and to the following departments:

Department of Water Supplies,

Department of Highways,

Department of Sewers,

Department of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies,

Department of Bridges,

—in such manner and to such departments as the Board of Public Improvements shall determine and direct.

DEPARTMENT OF TAXES AND ASSESSMENTS.

First—All employees of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, except the Board of Assessors and the employees of that Bureau, are hereby assigned to the Department of Taxes and

Assessments of the City of New York, for services respectively in the office of said Department, and in the Borough of Manhattan, and in the Borough of the Bronx, according to their designation in the schedule marked Schedule "C" hereto annexed.

Second—All papers, records, etc., and all other property of said Department, with the exception of the records, etc., of the Board of Assessors, are hereby transferred to said Department of Taxes and Assessments of the City of New York for use in the Boroughs of Manhattan and the Bronx, so much for use in the said Borough of Manhattan as is designated under the name of said Borough in said Schedule "C," and so much thereof for use in the Borough of the Bronx as is designated under the name of said borough in said Schedule.

Third—The Members of the Board of Assessors and the employees of that Bureau and the records, etc., of said Board of Assessors, are hereby transferred and assigned to the Board of Assessors of the City of New York, as constituted by said charter, pursuant to the provisions of section 943 of said charter.

COMMISSIONER OF STREET IMPROVEMENTS OF THE TWENTY-THIRD AND TWENTY-FOURTH WARDS.

The books, records, papers and other property of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, which are now in the possession of, or under the control of the Commissioner of Street Improvements of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, in the Municipal Building in Crotona Park, or elsewhere, are hereby transferred to the Department of Highways, the Department of Sewers and the Department of Bridges of the City of New York, in such proportion and manner as the Board of Public Improvements may designate, except the desks, tables, chairs and other office furniture, fixtures and books now in the office of the said Commissioner of Street Improvements and in the Deputy Commissioner's and Secretary's office, which are hereby transferred to the President of the Borough of the Bronx.

All the employees now under the Commissioner of Street Improvements of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards are hereby assigned and transferred to the various departments of the City of New York, as constituted by said charter, set opposite their names respectively in the annexed schedule marked Schedule "D".

DEPARTMENT OF STREET CLEANING.

First—All employees of the Department of Street Cleaning of the City of New York are hereby assigned to the Department of Street Cleaning of the City of New York, as constituted by said charter, for service in the Boroughs of Manhattan and the Bronx.

Second—All papers, records, etc., and all other property of said Department of Street Cleaning, are hereby transferred to said Department of Street Cleaning, as constituted by said charter, for use in the Boroughs of Manhattan and the Bronx.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC PARKS.

All employees of the Department of Public Parks are hereby assigned, and all the property of the said Department is hereby transferred to the Department of Parks, as created and provided for under the Greater New York Charter.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC CHARITIES.

First—All employees of the Department of Public Charities are hereby transferred to the Department of Public Charities of the City of New York for services in the Boroughs of Manhattan and the Bronx.

Second—All books, records, equipments and other property of said Department of Public Charities are hereby transferred to the Department of Public Charities of the City of New York for use in the Boroughs of Manhattan and the Bronx.

DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTION.

All employees of the Department of Correction of the City of New York are hereby assigned, and all the property thereof is hereby transferred to the Department of Correction, created and provided for by the Greater New York Charter.

DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS AND FERRIES.

First—All employees of the Department of Docks of the City of New York are hereby assigned to the Department of Docks and Ferries of the City of New York, as constituted by said charter, for service in the Boroughs of Manhattan and the Bronx.

Second—All papers, records, etc., and all other property of said Department of Docks are hereby transferred to said Department of Docks and Ferries for use in the Boroughs of Manhattan and the Bronx.

DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH.

First—All employees of the Department of Health whose names are set forth in Schedule "B" hereto annexed, are hereby assigned to the Health Department of the City of New York for service in the Borough of the Bronx.

Second—All other employees of said Department, excepting the Attorney and Assistant Attorneys, are hereby assigned to the Health Department of the City of New York for service in the Borough of Manhattan.

Third—The Attorney and Assistant Attorneys of said Department are hereby assigned to the Law Department of the City of New York.

Fourth—All papers, records, etc., and all other property of said Department of Health, excepting those referring to matters in charge of said Attorney and said Assistant Attorneys, are hereby assigned to the Health Department of the City of New York for use in the Boroughs of Manhattan and the Bronx. Such portion thereof as shall be designated by the Board of Health before the 1st day of January, 1898, or if said Board of Health fails to so designate any of said property thereof as shall be designated by the Board of Health of said City of New York, as constituted by said charter, after the 1st of January, 1898, for use in the Borough of Manhattan and the Borough of the Bronx respectively.

Fifth—All papers, records, etc., and matters which have been referred to said Attorney and said Assistant Attorneys, and which he has, or they have in charge, are hereby transferred to the Law Department of the City of New York.

THE BOARD OF ELECTRICAL CONTROL.

All employees of the Board of Electrical Control are hereby assigned, and all the property of said Board is hereby transferred to the Department of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies of the City of New York.

COMMISSIONERS OF ACCOUNTS.

1st—All employees of the Commissioners of Accounts are hereby assigned to the Commissioners of Accounts of the City of New York.

2d—All property under the control of said Commissioners of Accounts is hereby transferred to the Commissioners of Accounts of the City of New York.

BOARD OF ARMORY COMMISSIONERS.

All the employees of the Board of Armory Commissioners, and all the records and property thereof, are hereby assigned and transferred to the said board, as it will exist after the reorganization thereof, according to the provisions of said charter.

LEGISLATIVE DEPARTMENT.

All the employees of the Legislative Department and all the records and property thereof are hereby assigned and transferred to the Legislative Department of the City of New York as constituted by the said charter.

BOARD OF CITY RECORD.

All the employees of the Board of City Record are hereby assigned and all the property of said Board is hereby transferred to the Board of City Record of the City of New York as constituted by said charter.

NEW YORK CITY CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

All the employees of the New York City Civil Service Commission and all the records and property thereof are hereby assigned and transferred to the said New York City Civil Service Commission as it will exist under the provisions of said charter.

EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT.

All the employees of the Executive Department and all the records and property thereof are hereby assigned and transferred to the Executive Department of said City of New York as constituted by said charter, with the exception of the Mayor's Marshal and the employees of the Bureau of Licenses in the Mayor's Office of the City of New York, which said Mayor's Marshal and employees in the Bureau of Licenses of the City of New York are hereby transferred to the Executive Department of the City of New York or such other department as the Municipal Assembly of said city by ordinance may designate.

BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT.

All the employees of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and all the records and property thereof are hereby assigned and transferred to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the City of New York as constituted by said charter.

BUREAU OF PUBLIC ADMINISTRATOR.

All the employees of the Bureau of Public Administrator and all the records and property thereof are hereby assigned and transferred to the Bureau of the Public Administrator of the City of New York as constituted by said charter.

COMMISSIONER OF JURORS.

All the employees of the Commissioner of Jurors and all the records and property of said department are hereby assigned and transferred to the Commissioner of Jurors for the Boroughs of Manhattan and the Bronx.

MISCELLANEOUS DEPARTMENTS, BUREAUS, BOARDS, OFFICES AND EMPLOYEES.

All the employees of the City of New York assigned for service under any department, bureau, board or office of said city not hereinbefore specifically mentioned, with the exception of the Board of Education, the Fire Department and the Police Department, and all the records and property of or under the control of said departments, bureaus, boards, offices or employees are hereby assigned and transferred to the respective departments, boards, bureaus and offices exercising corresponding functions or performing similar duties under the provisions of said charter or the provisions of any independent statutes not repealed thereby.

LIMITATION OF PLAN.

The foregoing plan shall not in any of its provisions be deemed or construed to be a new appointment or reappointment of any of said employees, but shall be deemed to be and shall be a continuation of the appointment and employment theretofore held by them.

This plan shall not be deemed to confer any rights upon, or be a new employment of, any employee whose position is abolished by law.

The foregoing plan is hereby approved this 30th day of December, 1897.

Hon. William L. Strong, Mayor of the City of New York:

DEAR SIR—In answer to your favor of the 9th inst., requesting me to furnish to you a schedule showing the manner in which, in my judgment, the public records and subordinates in this Department should be transferred and reapportioned under the provisions of section 1536 of the Greater New York Charter, I beg to say that my suggestions are as follows:

First—All employees of the Department of Buildings, except the Attorney and Assistant Attorneys, should be assigned to the office of the Commissioner of Buildings for the Boroughs of Manhattan and the Bronx.

Second—The Attorney and the Assistant Attorneys should be assigned to the office of the Counsel to the Corporation.

Third—All papers, records, etc., excepting those referring to matters in charge of the Attorney, should be turned over to the Commissioner of Buildings for the Boroughs of Manhattan and the Bronx.

Fourth—The papers and records in matters which have been referred to the Attorney, and which he has in charge, should be turned over to the Counsel to the Corporation.

I beg to send herewith, in Schedule marked "A," the names and salaries of the persons who should be assigned to the office of the Commissioner of Buildings for the Boroughs of Manhattan and the Bronx, as above suggested, and Schedule "B," a list of the persons and their salaries who should be assigned to the office of the Counsel to the Corporation, as above suggested.

The Acting Assistant Sanitary Superintendent should for the present have his office in the Criminal Court Building.

One of the clerks at present in the office of the Chief Sanitary Inspector (James A. O'Connor) should be detailed to assist the Acting Assistant Sanitary Superintendent of the Borough of the Bronx in the recording of complaints and preparing them for the Secretary's office.

One of the clerks in the Secretary's office (William Rooney) should be detailed to issue the orders, on their proper blanks, relating to premises within that Borough.

One Diagnostician (W. Warren Talley, M. D.), one Disinfector (Patrick Conway), one Milk Inspector (Samuel W. Clason, M. D.), three Sanitary Police Inspectors (Andrew Kelly, John Crinion and Mark F. Healy), and one of the clerks in the Division of Medical School Inspection (Lena Schumacher) should be detailed under the Acting Assistant Sanitary Superintendent of that Borough.

His office at present to be in the Criminal Court Building.

All applications for bacteriological research and chemical examinations made to the Acting Assistant Sanitary Superintendent to be referred to and the work performed at the present bacteriological and chemical laboratories.

All applications for hospital care and treatment of contagious diseases should be made through the Acting Assistant Sanitary Superintendent of the Borough of the Bronx and should be cared for in the Reception, Willard Parker and Riverside Hospitals.

DEAR SIR—In compliance with your request of the 9th inst., this morning received, I beg to transmit herewith a complete list of all of the employees of the Department of Taxes and Assessments of the City of New York, as well as that of the Board of Assessors, at this date.

Inasmuch as the charter for the Greater New York will take from the Department of Taxes and Assessments the Board Assessors, they will be provided for, I presume, under the provisions of the new charter.

SIR—In accordance with your instructions I have considered the letter of the Mayor of December 10, in regard to a "partition between the several departments," * * * of all the public property appertaining to the administration of said departments, etc., and submit herewith an inventory of the tools, materials and equipments of all kinds in the different sections and bureaus of this Department.

In regard to "the apportionment between the several public departments," * * * of all subordinates and employees * * * in such manner that each person shall be assigned, as nearly as may be, without prejudice or advantage, to perform the same service and in the same part of the city, and to hold the same relative rank or position in the city constituted by this act as he performed and held at the time said plan of apportionment and assignment is determined upon." I would respectfully recommend, in view of past experience, that the department employees and property be assigned and partition to the city created by chapter 378, Laws of 1897, so as to remain where they now are, as the needs of the Department would indicate that the present adjustment is satisfactory.

DEAR SIR—I beg to acknowledge receipt of your communication, dated December 9, addressed to the Hon. Everett P. Wheeler.

I am instructed by Chairman Wheeler to write you to the following effect:

It is his opinion that under the provisions of the Greater New York Charter, the Civil Service Commissions as now constituted, hold over until a new Commission is appointed by the incoming Mayor, and that all employees in the several Commissions are continued in the service, and he would therefore recommend that until the appointment of the new Commission, the present Commissions remain as they have been heretofore constituted, and that the business of the Commission shall be conducted in the manner heretofore carried on, and that no change should be made until the new Commission has been appointed, and the matter of reorganization be left with them.

Further, that the records now on file in the Police Civil Service Bureau of the Police Department, and the records on file in the registration Bureau of the Street Cleaning Department, be transferred to the office of the New York City Civil Service Commission as now constituted, and be placed on the files of this Commission.

The Chairman desires to place your communication before the Commission, and will have some further matters to suggest, which will be presented to you at the earliest possible moment.

NEW YORK CITY CIVIL SERVICE BOARDS,

HON. WILLIAM L. STRONG, Mayor of the City of New York:

DEAR SIR—it is impossible for me to be present at the meeting at your office to-day in reference to the arrangements to be made for the transfer to the Mayor and other persons holding office under the Greater New York Charter, of the various public offices existing in what is now known as the City of New York. I respectfully submit the following suggestions on the subject:

It seems to me clear that under the language of section 1613 of the Greater New York Charter, the continuity of all the public offices is preserved. This expressly provides that all officers in office when this act takes effect (which, by section 1611, is January 1, 1898), shall remain in office until their successors are respectively elected and appointed, and shall have qualified under the provisions of this act. In reference to the Civil Service Commission, there is a special provision in section 125, as follows:

"Until the appointment of a municipal civil service commission under this act in said city, the municipal civil service commissioners now in existence in any part of the territory of said city shall continue in office, and the civil service rules now in force therein shall continue to be in force until the adoption of new rules hereunder."

My view of the situation, therefore, is this. The present Civil Service Commissioners will remain in office until the Mayor of the Greater New York makes other appointments to that position. The entire machinery of the office will remain until new regulations shall be adopted by the Mayor and approved by the State Civil Service Commission, pursuant to section 123 of the Charter, and to chapter 410, Laws of 1884 (the Civil Service Amendment Act of that year). When new officers are appointed they will, of course, take charge of the office and all the documents therein.

This opinion is strengthened by the language of section 1608, which provides that the Greater New York Charter "is intended to be not a new enactment, but a continuation of the said consolidation act of eighteen hundred and eighty-two, and said other acts, and is intended to apply the provisions thereof as herein modified to the city of New York as herein constituted, and this act shall accordingly be so construed and applied."

DEAR SIR—in your communication, dated December 9, you request me to furnish you with a schedule showing the manner in which, in my judgment, the public records and the employees and subordinates in this Department should be transferred and reappointed under the provision of section 1536 of the Greater New York Charter, parts of which are quoted in your said communication.

Section 518 of the Greater New York Charter provides that "nothing in this act contained shall be deemed or construed to repeal or in any wise affect chapter 490 of the Laws of 1883 (known as the Aqueduct Act) * * * or the several acts amendatory thereof, but the said act and its amendments shall remain in full force and effect. * * * The term of office of the Commission appointed and existing under the aforesaid act shall cease and determine on the first day of January, 1901."

From the above it appears that no change is to take place after January 1, 1898, in the existence of the Aqueduct Commission or in its method of work. It appears, consequently, that no plan should be prepared and adopted for the transfer of City property under the jurisdiction of the Aqueduct Commission to any other department and that no reappointment of subordinates and employees should take place.

THE BOARD OF EDUCATION.

Extract from the Minutes of a Meeting of the Board of Education held December 15, 1897.

Commissioner Anderson presented the following:

To the Board of Education:

The Committee on By-laws and Legislation, to which was referred a communication from the Hon. William L. Strong, Mayor of the City of New York, dated December 9, 1897, to Hon. Charles Bulkley Hubbell, President of this Board, by which the President of this Board was requested to furnish the Mayor, as soon as possible during the month of December, with a schedule showing the manner in which the public records of this Board, the public property appertaining to its administration and its employees and subordinates, should be transferred and reapportioned under the provisions of section 1536 of the new Charter, hereby report:

As far as the title to the lands and buildings embraced within the Boroughs of Manhattan and the Bronx is concerned, that title has heretofore been vested in the City of New York, and by the provisions contained in the new Charter such title will devolve upon the City of New York as created by the new Charter.

As far as the books, records, contracts, surveys, plans for new buildings, vouchers, including also the records of the Superintendents, the Teachers' records, the eligible lists, vouchers of the different departments, and, in general, all papers, whether belonging to the Educational Department or the Building Department of the present Board of Education are concerned, all of these records, books, contracts and other papers should be transferred and delivered to the School Board for the Boroughs of Manhattan and the Bronx when that Board comes into being on the first day of February, 1898.

As far as the books, stationery and other property under the control of the Committee on Supplies is concerned, that property should in like manner be transferred to the School Board of the Boroughs of Manhattan and the Bronx when organized.

As far as the Principals, Teachers, City Superintendent, Assistant Superintendents, Clerks, Janitors and other employees of this Board are concerned, it is provided by section 1536 of the new Charter that their duties shall be apportioned in such manner that each person shall be assigned, as nearly as may be, without prejudice or advantage, to perform the same service in the same part of the city and to hold the same relative rank or position in the city constituted by this act as such person performs and holds at the time the said plan of apportionment and assignment is determined upon. The general purpose evidenced by this section is to leave all of the employees of the present Board of Education in their present positions, with their present salaries and in their present localities, as near as may be.

It may, of course, happen that the Board of Education to be constituted, may appoint some of our present officials to fill positions as officials of the new Board, but the transfers so made will become effective by the action of the new Board and do not appear to require any present apportionment of service by action of this Board.

It may in like manner, by reason of the fact that the new Board of Education is vested with power to disburse the special fund referred to in section 1065 of the new Charter, which is the fund applicable to the acquisition of new sites and the construction of new buildings, be necessary to deliver to the new Board, or to the appropriate committee to be appointed by it, the contracts, plans and other papers relating to the construction of schools; but until the new Board shall have taken action in relation to this subject it would seem that the custody of all these papers should be retained by the Borough Board of Manhattan and the Bronx, which is the natural successor of the present Board of Education.

Your Committee, therefore, report for adoption the following resolutions:

Resolved, That all the books, records, contracts, surveys, plans for new buildings, vouchers, records of the Board of Superintendents, eligible lists, and in general all the papers of this Board, whether belonging to the Educational Department or to the Building Department, be transferred and delivered to the School Board for the Boroughs of Manhattan and the Bronx when that Board shall be organized on or after the first day of February, 1898.

Resolved, That all text books, stationery and other property of this Board under the control of the Committee on Supplies or of the Clerk of this Board, wherever situated, be transferred to the School Board of the Boroughs of Manhattan and the Bronx when that Board shall be organized on or after the first day of February, 1898.

Hon. WILLIAM L. STRONG, Mayor, New York:

DEAR SIR—I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your communication of the 9th instant, addressed to the President of this Commission, in which you call attention to section 1536 of the Greater New York Charter and in which you ask for certain information in regard to the assignment to service in public departments, bureaus, offices, etc.

Under chapter 789 of the Laws of 1896, which authorizes the construction of a bridge over the East river between the Cities of New York and Brooklyn, I have to state that the current expenses of the Commission, and also the cost of the construction of the bridge and its approaches, including land damages, are provided for by the proceeds of the sale of bonds, equally divided between the Cities of New York and Brooklyn, no direct appropriation for this work being made by the municipal authorities of either of these cities.

The property of the Executive office of the Commission consists of the ordinary office furniture, safe, desks, chairs, tables, etc.; of the Engineer's office, which is located in Brooklyn, the usual engineering instruments and appliances, furniture, etc.

In the Executive office are six Commissioners, one Assistant Secretary and one Stenographer, the names of whom are printed upon the accompanying paper marked "No. 1." A list of all the persons employed in the Engineer's office in Brooklyn is also submitted herewith and marked "No. 2."

The services of all these subordinates are necessary for the efficient, economical and proper discharge of the duties assigned to the Commission.

Should I have failed in this letter to communicate all the information you may desire in regard to the operation of this Board, upon being so advised I shall be glad to furnish all that is necessary in addition.

Pursuant to the provisions of section 1536 of the Greater New York Charter, constituting chapter 378 of the Laws of the State of New York, passed in the year 1897, we, the undersigned, William L. Strong, Mayor of the City of New York; Frederick W. Wurster, Mayor of the City of Brooklyn; Patrick J. Gleason, Mayor of Long Island City; , the Chairman of the Board of Supervisors of the County of Richmond, and , the County Judge of Queens County, with the approval of the Mayor of the City of Brooklyn, manifested by his signature hereto, do hereby adopt this plan for the transfer to and the partition between the several public departments, bureaus and offices created by said act, of the public books, records, vouchers and other papers and property of the municipality of the City of Brooklyn; and also for the apportionment between the said several public departments, bureaus and offices and assignment to duty therein of all the subordinates and employees of the said municipality of the City of Brooklyn:

First—The Comptroller of the City of Brooklyn shall retain in his possession all the said books, records, vouchers, other papers and property now on file in the Finance Department of the said city or under his control until the Comptroller-elect of the City of New York shall assume the duties of his office, when the said Comptroller of the City of Brooklyn shall deliver to the said Comptroller of the City of New York all of the said books, records, vouchers and property to be distributed by the Comptroller of the City of New York to and among the proper bureaus in the Finance Department of said city, except as hereinafter provided.

Second—All stocks, bonds, securities, moneys and other property belonging to the Sinking Fund of the City of Brooklyn and to the Water Sinking Fund of said city shall be delivered and paid over by the Comptroller of said city to the Board of Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of the City of New York.

Third—The Auditor of the City of Brooklyn shall retain in his custody all the said books, papers and property now being and remaining in the Department of Audit of said city until the Comptroller of the City of New York shall assume the duties of his office, when he shall deliver to the said Comptroller all the said books, records, vouchers, papers and property to be by the said Comptroller distributed to and among the proper bureaus in the Finance Department of the City of New York.

Fourth—The Treasurer of the County of Kings, as ex-officio Treasurer of the City of Brooklyn, shall retain all the said books, vouchers and papers now remaining in his possession in any manner relating to his duties as Treasurer of said city until the Comptroller of the City of New York shall assume the duties of his office, when he (the said County Treasurer) shall deliver to the said Comptroller all of said books, records, vouchers and papers, to be by the said Comptroller deposited in the office of the Chamberlain of said city, or such other bureau of the Finance Department of said city as may be suitable and proper for the purpose.

Fifth—The Collector of Taxes and Assessments of the City of Brooklyn shall retain in his possession all the books, rolls, vouchers, warrants and other papers of every character relating to the discharge of the duties of his office, and all property of said city under his control, until the Comptroller of the City of New York shall assume the duties of his office, when he shall transmit to and deposit with the said Comptroller all the said books, rolls, vouchers, warrants and other papers of every character appertaining to said office.

Sixth—The Registrar of Arrears of the City of Brooklyn shall retain in his possession all the books, rolls, vouchers, warrants and other papers and property of every character relating to the discharge of the duties of his office, and all property of said city under his control, until the Comptroller of the City of New York shall assume the duties of his office, when he shall transmit to and deposit with the said Comptroller all the said books, rolls, vouchers, warrants and other papers appertaining to his said office.

Seventh—The Attorney and Counsel to the Corporation of the City of Brooklyn shall retain in his possession all the books, records, papers, vouchers and property appertaining to the discharge of the duties of his office, until the Corporation Counsel of the City of New York shall be appointed and assume the duties of his office, when he shall deliver the same to the said Corporation Counsel.

Eighth—All the books, records, vouchers, papers and property of every description now being and remaining in the Department of Assessment of the City of Brooklyn shall continue in the possession of the President of the said Department until the Board of Taxes and Assessments of the City of New York shall be constituted and enter upon the discharge of the duties of its office, when the President of the Department of Assessment of the City of Brooklyn shall deliver to said Board all of such books, records, vouchers, papers and property, except so much thereof as may relate to the laying of assessments for local improvements, which shall be delivered by said President to the Board of Assessors of the said City of New York when such Board shall be appointed, qualify and assume the duties of its office.

Ninth—All the books, records, vouchers and papers of every description and property aforementioned now being and remaining in the Department of Police and Excise of the City of Brooklyn, or subject to the control of the Commissioner of the said Department, shall remain in the charge and custody of the said Commissioner until the Police Board of the City of New York shall be constituted, qualify and assume the duties of its office, when the said Commissioner of Police and Excise of the City of Brooklyn shall deliver the same to the said Board.

Tenth—All the books, records, papers, vouchers and other property aforesaid of every description now being or remaining in the Department of Health of the City of Brooklyn, or under the charge or control of the Health Commissioner of the said city, or in anywise relating to the duties of the office of said Commissioner, shall remain in his charge and control until the Board of Health of the City of New York shall be constituted and assume the duties of its office, when all of such books, records, papers, vouchers and other property shall be by the said Health Commissioner transferred and delivered to the said Board.

Eleventh—All the property in anywise relating to the extinguishment of fire in the City of Brooklyn, and all the records, books, vouchers and other papers in the Department of Fire of said city, or in the custody or under charge or control of the Commissioner of said Department, shall remain under the charge or control of the said Commissioner until the Commissioner of the Fire Department of the City of New York shall be appointed and enter upon the discharge of the duties of his office, when all of said property, records, books, vouchers and other papers shall be by him delivered to the said Commissioner of the Fire Department of the City of New York, to be and remain in his custody and control at his office in the Borough of Brooklyn, and for uses in said borough.

Twelfth—All the plans, records, books, vouchers and papers of every description now being and remaining in the Department of Buildings of the City of Brooklyn, or in the custody or under the control of the Commissioner of said department, shall remain in the custody and under the control of said Commissioner until the Board of Buildings of the City of New York shall be constituted and assume the duties of its office, when the same shall be delivered by the Commissioner of the Department of Buildings of the City of Brooklyn to the said Board, to remain in the custody of said Board at its office in the Borough of Brooklyn.

Thirteenth—All property of every description relating to the waterworks of the City of Brooklyn, or to the water supply thereof, and all records, papers, vouchers and documents of every character relating to said waterworks and system, now under the charge or control of the Commissioner of the Department of City Works of said city, or in the custody of the Secretary thereof, shall continue under the charge and control of the Commissioner of the said Department until the Commissioner of Water Supply of the City of New York shall be appointed and enter upon the discharge of the duties of his office, when the same shall be surrendered and delivered by the said Commissioner of the Department of City Works to the said Commissioner of Water Supply.

Fourteenth—All the records, maps, plans, rolls, papers, vouchers, documents and property of every character now being and remaining in the Department of City Works of the City of Brooklyn or under the charge or in the custody of the Commissioner of the said department in any wise relating to the opening, regulating, grading, curbing, flagging and guttering of streets and laying of crosswalks, to the constructing and repairing public roads, paving, repaving, resurfacing and repairing streets or relaying pavements, to the laying or relaying of surface railroad tracks in any public street or road, to the form of rail used or character of foundation or method of construction, and to the restoration of the pavement or surface after such work, to the filling of sunken lots, fencing vacant lots, digging down lots and to the licensing of vaults under sidewalks, to the removal of incumbrances, and to the issue of permits to builders and others to use streets, shall remain in the charge and custody of the Commissioner of said Department of City Works until the Commissioner of Highways of the City of New York shall be appointed and enter upon the discharge of the duties of his office, when the same shall be delivered to the said Commissioner of Highways.

Fifteenth—All plans, records, documents and papers relating to the public sewers and drainage of the City of Brooklyn, and all contracts and specifications relating to the construction of such sewers, now remaining in the Department of City Works of the City of Brooklyn or under the charge or control of the Commissioner or Secretary thereof, shall remain under the charge and control of the said Commissioner until the Commissioner of Sewers of the City of New York shall be appointed and enter upon the discharge of the duties of his office, when the same shall be delivered by the said Commissioner of City Works to the said Commissioner of Sewers.

Sixteenth—All contracts, papers, records, documents and property relating to the sweeping and cleaning of the streets of the City of Brooklyn and to the removal or other disposition of ashes, street sweepings, garbage and other light refuse and rubbish, or to the removal of snow and ice from the thoroughfares of said city, now remaining in the Department of City Works of said city or in the custody or under the control of the Commissioner of said department, shall remain in his custody and control until the Commissioner of Street Cleaning of the City of New York shall be appointed and enter upon the discharge of the duties of his office, when the same shall be delivered by the said Commissioner of City Works to the said Commissioner of Street Cleaning.

Seventeenth—All the property, contracts, records, plans and papers of every character relating to the construction, repairs, cleaning and maintenance of public buildings of the City of Brooklyn, and the furnishing the said city or any part thereof with gas, electricity or other illuminant, to the care and cleaning of public offices, including the public baths, and also relating to the purchase of fuel, furniture and other supplies for public offices, including all such fuel, furniture and supplies already purchased, now being and remaining in the custody or under the control of the Commissioner of City Works of said city, shall continue in his custody and under his control until the Commissioner of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies of the City of New York shall be appointed and enter upon the discharge of the duties of his office, when the same shall be delivered by the said Commissioner of City Works to the said Commissioner of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies.

Eighteenth—All leases, permits and other papers relating to the leasing or rental of market property of the City of Brooklyn, now being and remaining in the Department of City Works of said city, or in the charge or under the control of the Commissioner of said department, shall be by him delivered to the Comptroller of the City of New York as soon as he shall assume the duties of his office.

Nineteenth—All plans, maps, contracts, specifications and other papers relating to the construction or repair of basins, bulkheads, wharves or piers, now being and remaining in the Department of City Works of the City of Brooklyn, or under or subject to the control of the Commissioner thereof, shall be by him delivered to the Board of Docks as soon as said Board is constituted.

Twentieth—All public parks, parkways, squares and public places of the City of Brooklyn, and all the property, records, documents, vouchers, papers, contracts and plans relating thereto and to the improvement and management thereof, now in the possession of and under the control of the Commissioner of the Department of Parks of said city, shall remain in his possession and under his control until the Park Board of the City of New York shall be constituted and enter upon the discharge of its duties, when possession and control of the same shall be by the said Commissioner of Parks of the City of Brooklyn delivered to the said Park Board; provided, however, that all such records and papers as relate to the police force of the said Department of Parks of the City of Brooklyn shall be delivered to the Police Board of the City of New York so soon as it shall be constituted and enter upon the discharge of the duties of its office.

Twenty-first—All the muniments, records, patents, deeds, minutes, writings and papers relating to the title of the City of Brooklyn to any property whatsoever owned by it now in the possession or custody of the Comptroller of the said city, or of any officer or department of said city, shall remain in the custody of such officers and departments until a Clerk of the City of New York shall be appointed and assume the duties of his office, when the same shall be delivered to such Clerk.

Twenty-second—The Commissioners of the Department of Charities and Correction, of the City of Brooklyn, shall retain in their possession all that part of said records, vouchers, papers and other property relating to their duties as Charity Commissioners now under their control until the Board of Public Charities shall be appointed and shall qualify under said Charter, when they shall deliver the same to said Board. The said Commissioners shall also retain all that part of such records, vouchers, papers and property relating to their duties as Commissioners of Correction, until the Commissioners of Correction of the City of New York shall qualify, when they shall deliver the same to the last-mentioned Commissioners.

Twenty-third—All the books, papers, documents, records and property of every description now in the office of the Clerk of the City of Brooklyn, or under and subject to his control, shall continue in his possession and under his control until a clerk of the City of New York shall be appointed and shall assume the duties of his office, when the same shall be delivered to such clerk by the Clerk of the said City of Brooklyn.

Twenty-fourth—All moneys in the Treasury of the City of Brooklyn and deposited to the credit of said City in any bank or trust company, as shown by the account thereof at the close of business hours on the 31st day of December, 1897, shall be paid over to the Chamberlain of the City of New York by warrants drawn upon the Treasurer of the City of Brooklyn to the order of the City of New York, signed by the Comptroller of the City of Brooklyn and countersigned by the Mayor and City Clerk thereof in the same manner as warrants of the City of Brooklyn are now drawn and paid; the intention of this rule being that sufficient moneys shall remain on deposit to the credit of the said City of Brooklyn to meet and pay all warrants of said city drawn and delivered on or prior to the 31st day of December, 1897, and not presented for payment or paid.

Twenty-fifth—Every officer of the City of Brooklyn and every head of department of said city having under his charge or control any moneys belonging to said city, or any moneys as special deposits made as security for any claim or demand of said city, shall render a detailed statement thereof to the Chamberlain of said City of New York and pay the same over to such Chamberlain so soon as he shall be appointed and assume the duties of his office, to be held and applied by him for the purposes and under the terms of the deposit.

Twenty-sixth—The Board of Elections of the City of Brooklyn shall deliver to the Bureau of Elections of the City of New York, at its branch office in the City of Brooklyn, all the books, records, documents and papers appertaining to the duties of its office.

Twenty-seventh—The various officers and departments of the City of Brooklyn required by the Greater New York Charter, or by this plan, to transfer to the several departments and bureaus under said Charter, any records, vouchers and other papers or property, shall so far as practicable make a list and inventory of the same, and file a copy of such list and inventory in the office of the Clerk of the City of New York.

Twenty-eighth—The several officers or heads of departments in the City of Brooklyn required by the provisions of the Greater New York Charter, or by this plan, to deliver any plans, records, papers or property to any department of the City of New York, or to any bureau thereof, may designate any one or more, as may be necessary, of the employees or subordinates now in his department or office, whose services are hereinafter continued and transferred to the greater city, to supervise and list or otherwise direct the transfer of such plans, records, papers or property until the same are fully delivered, and the salary or compensation of such person or persons so designated shall be a charge upon and shall be paid by the City of New York as constituted under the act aforesaid.

Twenty-ninth—All said records, papers and property now in the office of the Mayor of the City of Brooklyn shall be delivered to the President of the Borough of Brooklyn.

Thirtieth—The Mayor's secretary, clerk, stenographer and messenger are hereby transferred to and assigned to service in the office of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn. The sealers of weights and measures and coal inspectors appointed by the Mayor of said city are hereby

assigned to duty in said borough, and, as respects the said sealers, in the same districts in which they now respectively act.

Thirty-first—The deputy comptroller, bond clerk, assistant bond clerk, clerk of accounts, two assistant clerks of accounts, bookkeeper, general warrant clerk, five assistant general warrant clerks, salary warrant clerk, seven assistant salary warrant clerks, paymaster, two assistant paymasters, coupon clerk, assistant coupon clerk, stenographer, three messengers, clerk of the Bureau of Taxes and Assessments, and nine assistant clerks, clerk of arrears, searcher, superintendent of Bureau of Docks, clerk to the Bureau and ten dockmasters employed in the office of the Comptroller of the City of Brooklyn are hereby assigned to duty in the Finance Department of the City of New York, in such places and bureaus as the Comptroller of said city may designate.

Thirty-second—The First and Second Deputy Auditors, Chief Clerk, Bookkeeper, Pay-roll Clerk, Inspector, Accountant and Messenger employed in the Department of Audit of the City of Brooklyn, are hereby assigned to duty in the Auditing Bureau of the Department of Finance of the City of New York, in such places as the Comptroller of such city may designate.

Thirty-third—The following named persons employed in the office of the Treasurer of Kings County, in his capacity of ex-officio Treasurer of the City of Brooklyn, are hereby assigned to duty in the office of the Chamberlain of the City of New York, viz.: John H. Brennen, in charge of receipts and deposits of moneys; David Phenix, Bookkeeper; Frederick W. Boerman, Assistant Bookkeeper; George B. Hawthorne and Charles H. Rayen, Clerks.

The following named persons acting as tax clerks in said office are hereby assigned to duty in the office of the Collector of Assessments and Arrears in the Department of Finance of the City of New York, viz.: Ferdinand De Wigne and Moses Hirshfield.

Thirty-fourth—The Deputy Cashier, Clerks and Messenger employed in the office of the Collector of Taxes and Assessments of the City of Brooklyn, and the Deputy Cashier, Assistant Cashier, and Clerks employed in the office of Registrar of Arrears of said city are hereby assigned to duty in the office of the Collector of Assessments and Arrears in the Department of Finance of the City of New York.

Thirty-fifth—The Assistants to the Corporation Counsel of the City of Brooklyn, and the Clerks, Messengers, Stenographers, and other employees in his office, the Counsel to the Department of Police and Excise of said city, the Counsel and Law Clerk to the Health Department and the Counsel to the Board of Charities and Correction of said city are hereby transferred to the Law Department of the City of New York and assigned to duty in the office of the Corporation Counsel of said city in the Borough of Brooklyn.

Thirty-sixth—The Chief Clerks, Clerks, Draughtsmen, Engineers, Surveyors, and Messengers employed in the Department of Assessment of the City of Brooklyn are hereby transferred to the Department of Taxes and Assessments of the City of New York and assigned to duty in its office in the Borough of Brooklyn.

Thirty-seventh—The superintendent, deputy superintendent, clerk to the superintendent, messenger to the superintendent, inspector, captains, sergeants, detective sergeants, roundsmen, patrolmen, doormen, bridge keepers, police surgeons, superintendent of telegraph, telegraph operators and linemen now attached to the police force of the City of Brooklyn, or the police force appointed by the Department of Parks of said city, are hereby transferred to the police force specified in section 276 of the said Greater New York Charter and hereby assigned to duty in the Borough of Brooklyn. The chief clerk, deputy chief clerk, engineers, accountants, inspectors, boiler superintendent, clerks, matrons, subordinates and employees now in the service of the Department of Police and Excise of said city and connected by service with the police force thereof are hereby continued in service under the Police Board of the City of New York, and assigned to the same duties as are now performed by them in the Borough of Brooklyn.

Thirty-eighth—The deputy, secretaries, registrar of records, clerks, janitors, messengers, superintendents, inspectors, vaccinators, chief of plumbing and drainage bureau, assistant sanitary engineers, chemists, bacteriologists, engineers, firemen, laborers, drivers, matrons, nurses and other hospital employees, disinfectors and all other subordinates now employed in the Department of Health of the City of Brooklyn are hereby transferred to the Department of Health of the City of New York and assigned to duty in the Borough of Brooklyn.

Thirty-ninth—The officers and members of the uniformed force of the Fire Department of the City of Brooklyn, including the secretary, chief engineers, assistant engineers, district engineers and officers ranking as district engineers, captains, pilots, inspectors, assistant inspectors, foremen, assistant foremen, engineers of steamers, firemen, bell ringers, fire marshal, veterinary surgeons, surgeons, superintendent of repair-shop, superintendent of supplies, superintendent of telegraph, inspector of telegraph, are hereby transferred to the Fire Department as constituted by the Greater New York Charter and assigned to duty in the Borough of Brooklyn in the same rank and grade as is now held by them respectively. The other subordinates and employees now connected with the said Fire Department of the City of Brooklyn are hereby transferred to the Fire Department as constituted by the Greater New York Charter and assigned to duty in the Borough of Brooklyn in the same positions as now held by them respectively.

Fortieth—The deputies, secretary, examiners, clerks, engineers, experts, inspectors, stenographer, messengers and other subordinates employed in the Department of Buildings of the City of Brooklyn are hereby transferred to the Department of Buildings of the City of New York and assigned to duty in the Borough of Brooklyn.

Forty-first—Robert M. Whiting, Secretary; Bernard Fowler, Record Clerk; Frederick E. Haskins, Clerk; G. Imroth, Clerk; Daniel Harte, Messenger; T. D. Hoxsie, Clerk to Commissioner; M. M. Berry, Stenographer; Reuben B. Caffrey, Stenographer; Frederick D. Bakus, Accountant; William Chambers, Bookkeeper; William W. Morton, Clerk; James W. Mason, Clerk; Edward Eastman, Clerk; William G. Steves, Clerk; George H. Brown, Clerk; Edward E. Underwood, Clerk; William E. Kisby, Clerk; Benjamin M. Bushe, Clerk; Charlotte E. Coffin, Stenographer; John F. Denny, Messenger; Michael Haggerty, Teamster. All persons connected by appointment or employment with the Department of City Works of the City of Brooklyn subordinate to the Commissioner of said department, whose duties in said department relate to the matters specified in section four hundred and sixty-nine of the Greater New York Charter are hereby transferred to the Department of Water Supply of the City of New York and assigned to duty under the Commissioner of Water Supply in as nearly as practicable the same positions as are now severally held by them.

Forty-second—All persons connected by appointment or employment with the Department of City Works of the City of Brooklyn, subordinate to the Commissioner of the said department, whose duties in said department relate to the matters specified in section five hundred and twenty-four of the Greater New York Charter, are hereby transferred to the Department of Highways of the City of New York and assigned to duty under the Commissioner of Highways in as nearly as practicable the same positions as are now severally held by them.

Forty-third—All persons connected by appointment or employment with the Department of City Works of the City of Brooklyn, subordinate to the Commissioner of the said department, whose duties in said department relate to the matters specified in section five hundred and fifty-six of the Greater New York Charter, are hereby transferred to the Department of Sewers of the City of New York and assigned to duty under the Commissioner of Sewers in as nearly as practicable the same positions as are now severally held by them.

Forty-fourth—All persons connected by appointment or employment with the Department of City Works of the City of Brooklyn, subordinate to the Commissioner of the said department, whose duties in said department relate to the matters specified in section five hundred and thirty-four of the Greater New York Charter, are hereby transferred to the Department of Street Cleaning of the City of New York and assigned to duty under the Commissioner of Street Cleaning in as nearly as practicable the same positions as are now severally held by them.

Forty-fifth—All persons connected by appointment or employment with the Department of City Works of the City of Brooklyn, subordinate to the Commissioner of the said department, whose duties in said department relate to the matters specified in section five hundred and seventy-three of the Greater New York Charter, are hereby transferred to the Department of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies, and assigned to duty under the Commissioner of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies, in as nearly as practicable the same positions as are now severally held by them.

Forty-sixth—The accountants employed under that Board of the City of Brooklyn commonly known as the Board of Audit are hereby assigned to perform the same duties as are now performed by them under the Commissioners of Accounts of the City of New York.

Forty-seventh—The subordinates, clerks and employees in the office of the Clerk of the City of Brooklyn are hereby assigned to duty in the office of the Clerk of the City of New York.

Forty-eighth—The Clerk of the Wallabout Market Bureau in the Department of City Works of the City of Brooklyn, and the inspectors, collectors, laborers and foremen employed in said bureau, are hereby transferred to the Finance Department in the City of New York and assigned to duty under the Collector of City Revenues and Superintendent of Markets of said city.

Forty-ninth—The Assistant Civil Engineer, draughtsmen, rodmen and inspectors employed in the Department of City Works in the City of Brooklyn upon the Wallabout improvement, are hereby transferred to the Department of Docks and Ferries of the City of New York and assigned to duty under the Board of Docks of said city.

Fiftieth—The Keeper and Assistant Keeper of the City Hall of the City of Brooklyn are hereby assigned to the performance of the duties of Janitor and Assistant Janitor of the Commissioner of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies of the City of New York, in the Borough of Brooklyn.

Fifty-first—The Clerks of Committees of the Board of Aldermen of the City of Brooklyn, the Sergeant-at-Arms, Assistant Sergeant-at-Arms and Messengers and City Auctioneer are hereby assigned to the performance of the same duties as they are now performing under the Municipal Assembly of the City of New York.

Fifty-second—The several heads of departments and officers whose subordinates or employees are by this plan assigned to duty under any of the departments of the City of New York, shall, on or before the first day of January, eighteen hundred and ninety-eight, transmit to the Comptroller

of the City of New York a list of such subordinates and employees, with a statement of the salaries or compensation paid to them respectively, on the thirty-first day of December, eighteen hundred and ninety-seven, and a concise statement of the duties severally performed by them and the positions held by them on the date last aforesaid, and shall also indicate in such list which of the persons so transferred are veterans of the late war and which are veteran firemen.

Fifty-third—The several interpreters heretofore appointed by the Common Council of the City of Brooklyn and now acting are hereby continued in the service under the City of New York and assigned to the same duties as they are now performing in the local courts situated in the Borough of Brooklyn.

Fifty-fourth—The Clerk of the Board of Estimate of the City of Brooklyn is hereby transferred to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the City of New York and assigned to clerical duties thereunder.

Annexed hereto is a list of the subordinates and employees transferred pursuant to paragraphs forty-first to forty-fifth, inclusive, of this plan.

LONG ISLAND CITY.

Pursuant to the provisions of section 1536 of the Greater New York Charter, constituting chapter 378 of the Laws of the State of New York, passed in the year 1897, we, the undersigned, William L. Strong, Mayor of the City of New York; Frederick W. Wurster, Mayor of the City of Brooklyn; Patrick J. Gleason, Mayor of Long Island City; John L. Feeney, the Chairman of the Board of Supervisors of the County of Richmond, and Harrison S. Moore the County Judge of Queens County, with the approval of the Mayor of Long Island City manifested by his signature hereto, do hereby adopt this plan for the transfer to and the partition between the several public departments, bureaus and offices created by said act, of the public books, records, vouchers and other papers and property of the Municipality of Long Island City; and also for the apportionment between the said several public departments, bureaus and offices and assignment to duty therein of all subordinates and employees of the said Municipality of Long Island City.

First—The Treasurer and Receiver of Long Island City shall retain in his possession all the said books, records, vouchers, other papers and property now on file, or being in the Finance Department of the said city, or under his control, until the Comptroller-elect of the City of New York shall assume the duties of his office, when the said Treasurer of Long Island City shall deliver to the said Comptroller of the City of New York all of the said books, records, vouchers and property to be distributed by the Comptroller of the City of New York to and among the proper bureaus in the Finance Department of said city except as hereinafter provided.

Second—All stocks, bonds, securities, moneys and other property belonging to the Sinking Fund of Long Island City shall be delivered and paid over by the Treasurer of said city to the Board of Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of the City of New York.

Third—The Mayor of Long Island City shall retain in his custody all the said books, papers and property now being and remaining in the Executive Department of said City, until the Comptroller of the City of New York shall assume the duties of his office, when he shall deliver to the said Comptroller all the said books, records, vouchers, papers and property to be by the said Comptroller distributed to and among the proper bureaus in the Finance Department in the City of New York.

Fourth—The Attorney and Counsel to the Corporation of Long Island City shall retain in his possession all the books, records, papers, vouchers and property appertaining to the discharge of his duties of his office, until the Corporation Counsel of the City of New York shall be appointed and assume the duties of his office, when he shall deliver the same to the said Corporation Counsel.

Fifth—All the books, records, vouchers, papers and property of every description now being of and remaining in the Department of Assessment of the Long Island City shall continue in the possession of the President of the said Department until the Board of Taxes and Assessment of the City of New York shall be constituted and entered upon the discharge of the duties of its office, when the President of the Department of Assessment of Long Island City shall deliver to said Board all of such books, records, vouchers, papers and property, except so much thereof as may relate to the laying of assessment for local improvement, which shall be delivered by said President to the Board of Assessors of the said City of New York, when such Board shall be appointed, qualify and assume the duties of its office.

Sixth—All the books, records, vouchers and papers of every description and property aforesaid now being and remaining in the Department of Police of Long Island City, subject to the control of the Commissioners of the said Department, shall remain in charge and custody of the President of said Police Board until the Police Board of the City of New York shall be constituted, qualify and assume the duties of its office, when the said President shall deliver the same to the said Board.

Seventh—All the books, records, papers, vouchers and other property aforesaid of every description now being or remaining in the Department of Health of Long Island City or under the charge or control of the Health Commissioner of the said city, or in any wise relating to the duties of the office of said Commissioner, shall remain in the charge and control of the President of the Board of Health of Long Island City until the Board of Health of the City of New York shall be constituted and assume the duties of its office, when all of such books, records, papers, vouchers, and other property shall be by the said President transferred and delivered to the said Board.

Eighth—All the property in any wise relating to the extinguishment of fire in Long Island City and all the records, books, vouchers and other papers in the Department of Fire of said city or in the custody or under charge or control of the Commissioners of said department, shall remain under the charge or control of the President of the Board of Fire Commissioners of said city until the Commissioners of the Fire Department of the City of New York shall be appointed and enter upon the discharge of its duties, when all of its property, records, books, vouchers and other papers shall be by him delivered to the said Commissioner of the Fire Department of the City of New York to be and remain in his custody and control at his office in the proper borough and for uses in said borough.

Ninth—All the plans, records, books, vouchers and papers of every description now being and remaining in the Board of Plumbers and Plumbing or in the custody or under the control of such Board shall remain in the custody and under the control of the Commissioner of Public Works of said city until the Board of Buildings of the City of New York shall be constituted and assume the duties of its offices, when the same shall be delivered by the said Commissioner to the said Board.

Tenth—All property of every description relating to the water works of Long Island City or to the water supply thereof, and all records, papers, vouchers and documents of every character relating to said water works and system not under the charge or control of the Board of Water Commissioners of said city or in the custody of the Clerk thereof shall continue under the charge and control of the President of said Board until the Commissioner of Water Supply of the City of New York shall be appointed and enter upon the discharge of the duties of his office, when the same shall be surrendered and delivered by the said President to the said Commissioner of Water Supply.

Eleventh—All the records, maps, plans, rolls, papers, vouchers, documents and property of every character now being and remaining in the Department of Public Works of Long Island City, or under the charge or in the custody of the Commissioner of Public Works until the Board of Public Improvements of the City of New York shall be appointed and enter upon the discharge of their office, when same shall be delivered to said Board or such respective departments as said Board may designate.

Twelfth—All the records, maps, plans, rolls, papers, vouchers, documents and property of every character now being and remaining in the Department or Board, known as the General Improvement Commission of Long Island City, or under the charge or in the custody of the Commissioners thereof, shall remain in the charge and custody of the Commissioner of Public Works of Long Island City until the Board of Public Improvements of the City of New York shall be appointed and enter upon the discharge of the duties of their office, when the same shall be delivered to the said Board or such respective departments as said Board may designate.

Thirteenth—All public parks, squares and public places of Long Island City and all the property, records, documents or other papers relating thereto and now in the possession of or under the control of the Commissioner of Public Works of said city shall remain in his possession and under his control until the Park Board of the City of New York shall be constituted and enter upon the discharge of its duties, when possession and control of the same shall be delivered by said Commissioner to the said Park Board.

Fourteenth—All the muniments, records, patents, deeds, minutes, writings and papers relating to the title of Long Island City to any property whatsoever, owned by it, now in the possession or custody of the City Clerk of the said city or any officer or department of said city shall remain in the custody of such officers and department until a Clerk of the City of New York shall be appointed and assume the duties of his office, when the same shall be delivered to such clerk.

Fifteenth—The Overseer of the Poor of Long Island City shall retain in his possession all the said books, records, vouchers, other papers and property, now on file or being in his possession until the Board of Public Charities shall be appointed and constituted under the said Greater New York Charter, when he shall deliver over to the said Board all of said books, records, vouchers, other papers and property under his control relating to that part or branch of his duties in the administration of the work appertaining to the Charities Department. And the said Overseer of the Poor shall likewise retain in his possession all other books, records, vouchers, papers and other property now under his control or on file in his office, relating to the duties of Commissioners of Correction in the Greater City of New York until the Commissioner of Correction

under the said Greater New York Charter shall be appointed and enter upon the discharge of the duties of his office when he shall deliver the same to him.

Sixteenth—All the books, papers, documents, records and property of every description now being and remaining in the office of the City Clerk of Long Island City or under and subject to his control shall continue in his possession and under his control until a Clerk of the City of New York shall be appointed and assume the duties of his office, when the same shall be delivered to such clerk by the said City Clerk of Long Island City, provided however, that all papers in his possession relating to the Police Department, Water Department or the Fire Department shall be delivered to such respective departments as herein otherwise mentioned.

Seventeenth—All moneys in the Treasury of Long Island City and deposited to the credit of said city in any bank or trust company, shall be paid over to the Chamberlain of the City of New York; the intention hereof being that sufficient money shall remain to the credit of said city to meet and pay all warrants of said Long Island City drawn and delivered on or prior to December 31, 1897, and not presented for payment or paid.

Eighteenth—Every officer of Long Island City and every head of department of said city having under his charge or control any moneys belonging to said city or any moneys as special deposits made as security for any claim or demand of said city, shall render a detailed statement thereof to the Chamberlain of said City of New York and pay the same over to such Chamberlain as soon as he shall be appointed and assume the duties of his office, to be held and applied by him for the purposes and under the terms of the deposits.

The Board of Examiners met this day, 3:05 P.M.

Present—Stevenson Constable, Superintendent of Buildings, in the chair, and Messrs. Dobbs, Bonner, Moore, Fryer, Conover, O'Reilly and McMillan.

The minutes of December 14, 1897, were read and approved.

Petitions were then submitted for approval, as follows:

Slip Application 2404, 1897—C. B. J. Snyder, petitioner—To allow building to be altered for use as temporary school, as stated in petition; north side of One Hundred and Fourth street, 265 feet west of Columbus avenue. Approved on condition that exits are constructed as required by the Superintendent of Buildings, and subject to the approval of the construction by the Superintendent of Buildings.

Slip Application 2435, 1897—A. V. Porter, petitioner—To allow the erection of an open coal platform for temporary use, as stated in petition; south side of One Hundred and Forty-sixth street, 285 feet west of Lenox avenue. Approved, subject to the approval of the construction by the Superintendent of Buildings.

Plan 1100, Alterations to Buildings, 1897—Horenburger & Straub, petitioners—To allow basement and first story to be altered for use as stores, the upper floors being occupied by two families. Third.—That our report herein will be presented to the Supreme Court of the State of New York, at a Special Term, Part III, thereof, to be held in the County Court-house, in the City of New York, on the 25th day of February, 1898, at the opening of Court on that day, and that then and there, or as soon thereafter as counsel can be heard thereon, a motion will be made that the said report be confirmed, and for such other and further relief as may be just and meet.
