SIR—In accordance with your instructions, I have the honor to submit the following report of the transactions of this Bureau for the quarter ending June 30, 1900:

CRIMINAL COURT BUILDING.

The usual orders for cleaning glass in doors and windows were renewed. Plumber's supplies, carpenter's supplies, janitor's supplies, engineer's supplies, consisting of oil, waste, etc., were

furnished. 200 feet of 3/4-inch rubber hose, together with couplings and 2 patent nozzles, complete, 1 Economy waste oil filter, 1 dozen cocoa mats and 2 United States standard hunting flags made of best standard bunting also furnished. New suction and drip-pipes put on drip-tank. 6 field coils of electric generator repaired and rewound. Voltmeters repaired and overhauled. The carpet, linoleum, etc., in the several courts, offices, etc., were taken up, cleaned and relaid. 60 new window shades hung on Hartshorn rollers, made of best Nonpareil shade cloth, furnished and put up complete, and 218 old shades overhauled and repaired.

85 awning frames were repaired and reconstructed on windows of above building, old coverings were removed from frames, and same recovered with Neapolitan awning stripe No. 94.

Worn-out and defective parts of Welsbach lights throughout the building were replaced with new parts. 20 window awnings, with necessary pulleys, etc., complete, were furnished and put up on windows of above building. The carpets, linoleum, etc., in the various courts, offices, etc., were taken up, cleaned and relaid. The iron water tanks in the above building were repaired, cleaned and painted. New main cables, new top and bottom guide-springs were furnished and put in place; guide-post and guide-strips secured on south elevator. An order was given for cleaning all the glass in windows and doors of above building. The usual cleaning supplies were furnished. The window shades throughout the building were thoroughly repaired and 16 window shades, made of best quality Nonpareil shade cloth, hung on old rollers were furnished and put up.

City Court—3 directories and a supply of law books were furnished.

Judges' Chambers—6 toilet cabinets with a supply of clean towels weekly were furnished.

Clerk's Office—1 toilet cabinet with a supply of clean towels weekly was furnished.

HALL OF RECORDS.

The usual cleaning supplies, 1 office chair, 100 feet 3/4-inch rubber hose with couplings and nozzle complete, 1 8-gallon water-cooler and stand were furnished. An order was given for cleaning all the glass in the windows and doors of above building. Old and worn-out parts of Welsbach lights were replaced with new parts. The intercommunicating telephone system in above office was repaired and thoroughly overhauled and same left in perfect working order.

HARLEM COURT-HOUSE.

The usual cleaning and engineer's supplies were furnished. 6 Yale lock cylinders repaired and 6 Yale pass-keys furnished. An order was given for cleaning all the glass in the windows and doors of above building. Old and worn-out parts of Welsbach lights were replaced with new parts. One set of Imperial rocking and dumping grate-bars were furnished and installed in boilers in above building. The floor of platform on elevator was renewed, also piece on front edge of platform faced. Part of side walls of furnaces were taken down and rebuilt and furnaces relined. Brick arches rebuilt, coal pit was repaired and part of floor cemented, also frame was set for grate-bars in 1 boiler. West Washington Market—One hundred and fifty feet of 2 1/2-inch rubber fire-hose, with couplings and nozzles complete, and one barrel of disinfectant furnished. The steel rolling shutters were repaired, scraped and painted over the following stands: Nos. 58, 59, 56, 60, 61 and 62 Loew avenue; Nos. 13 and 60 Hewitt avenue; Nos. 35, 37, 39, 41, 53 and 56 Gansevoort street; No. 54 Thompson avenue; No. 11 West street; Nos. 30, 32, 60 and 62 Bloomfield street, and Nos. 51, 53, 54, 56, 58 and 60 Lawton avenue.

Clinton Market—All worn and defective parts of Welsbach lights were replaced with new parts. Twelve dozen corn brooms for cleaning purposes were furnished. Defective tin on roof of above market was cut out and replaced with tin of best quality, painted bottom and top.

Jefferson Market—All worn and defective parts of Welsbach lights were replaced with new parts.

First Brigade Headquarters—The usual cleaning supplies were furnished.

Fifth Brigade Headquarters—Twenty-five gallons Marvin's Floor Dressing and one 30-gallon oil tank was delivered.

Seventh Regiment—Three dozen chamois skins, 4 dozen sheep's-wool sponges, 1 barrel of raw linseed oil, 2 barrels of turpentine were furnished. An order was issued to make repairs to the electrical gas-lighting apparatus in the above armory. The electric-bell system was repaired. The large clock in drill-room was readjusted, oiled and regulated. The three upper flights of stairs on the northerly side of stairway were repaired and reconstructed, and top floor over same was repaired and strengthened. A drinking-fountain was erected for use of above armory. The top slab of fountain is 1 1/2 inches thick, 15 inches wide, countersunk 1/2 inch. Back of fountain 2 feet wide, 3/8 inch thick, with apron on front and ends 5 inches wide, 3/8 inch thick, with nickel-plated legs to support slab; floor slab of Tennessee marble, 15 inches x 1 1/4 inches and 15 feet long. The slabs are provided with seven nickel-plated flange and thimble self-closing faucets, projecting from the back of slab, discharging into a nickel-plated cup strainer set under each faucet.

The necessary connections from the strainer of fountain and ice-chest to a sink in cellar, with 1 1/2-inch galvanized-iron pipe and T branches, with brass plugs for cleaning purposes, were made. The faucets are supplied with water through 1/2-inch "A" tin-lined lead pipe connected with 3/4-inch pipe coil in ice chest. An ice-chest for use in connection with above fountain was furnished and lined with 20-ounce tinned copper and necessary connections to galvanized-iron waste-pipe; also connections to Croton and supply pipes provided with the necessary valves and stop-cocks to shut off water and clean coil; all exposed pipes nickel-plated, all marble polished Tennessee marble. All worn and defective parts of Welsbach lights replaced with new parts.

Ninth Regiment—All worn and defective parts of Welsbach lights were replaced with new parts, the following articles were furnished: 2 barrels of cleaning compound, 1 dozen chamois skins, 1 dozen bath sponges, 400 pounds of Perfection Moth and Buffalo Moth Exterminator, 125 pounds cotton waste, 1 dozen enameled iron cuspidors, 1 barrel Marvin's Floor Dressing, 4 barrels Marvin's Floor Wash, and 1 barrel Marvin's Furniture Polish was furnished. Four rooms and hallway on fourth floor and one room and three closets on fifth floor were cleaned off, prepared and kalsomined. All the walls and ceilings of rooms occupied by the Majors and room occupied by the Inspector of Rifle Practice were prepared in varnish and tinted two coats of water-color paint, ceilings and walls decorated. All the woodwork cleaned in oil and bleached where necessary and finished to correspond with original color. The terra-cotta connected with mantels, was painted three coats of white lead and linseed-oil paint properly blocked out. Walls and ceilings of vestibule and halls on Fourteenth street side of building, also those of hall and stairs up to first landing of stairs leading to third floor, also corridor leading westerly on second floor, from above-mentioned stairs to the Colonel's room, properly prepared and tinted with two coats of water paint. All woodwork cleaned off in oil. The two large rooms occupied by the Colonel prepared, tinted and decorated in ornamental design. The terra-cotta in fireplace in both rooms painted and blocked off. All woodwork cleaned in oil and pumice stone. All worn and defective parts of Welsbach lights to be replaced with new parts.

Ten lockers were removed from Non-commissioned staff-room and two additional lockers added; 32 feet of wall cases were removed from Quartermaster's room on top floor to new Quartermaster's room on first floor. The lockers of Field and Staff Officers were removed, repaired, reconstructed and placed in adjoining room. Four new lockers were placed on west wall of above armory, repairs made to base, chair rail and partition in various rooms affected by the change.

The hull was painted with marine black and the upper part with navy spar color. Four new pontoons were furnished and built in Baths Nos. 8 and 9. The framework, sides, bottom and ends were built of well-seasoned yellow pine and spruce. The pontoons were calked all over top, bottom, sides and ends and made perfectly water-tight, each and every seam and joint having one thread of cotton and three threads of best navy oakum paved with pitch. All spikes and bolts in planking having a yarn of oakum around heads before being driven. All timber used on pontoons dressed both sides. The outside and inside entirely covered with coal-tar and arsenic, thoroughly mixed and put on before pontoons were launched. Anchors and chains for Battery, East Fifty-first and East One Hundred and Thirty-sixth street baths were removed from storage quarters and properly fastened, to moor above baths securely. Tie-rods, with necessary turn-buckles, nets, washers, clips, eyebolts, etc., were placed on Baths Nos. 1, 2 and 10 as directed. New galvanized-iron framework was furnished and put up on Bath No. 14. The defective tin was removed from the entire 15 baths and the same replaced with best quality tin; all new tin received two coats of paint and old material one coat. The outside of the baths were scraped off and washed. All nail-holes and cracks were properly puttied up. All the woodwork of above-mentioned baths which has been painted to receive one coat of paint composed of Atlantic white lead and linseed oil. The portions painted were the sides and ends on the outside, extending one foot below the water-line to roof, also the outside of the upper house on roof, including the flagpoles, gangways, bridges and all other woodwork exposed to the weather. The interior of swimming-wells and stairways connecting same received two coats of metallic paint ground in linseed oil, extending one foot below water-line. All the above-mentioned baths were also relettered. Oak fenders, dressed on three sides were placed and secured on Baths Nos. 2, 3, 4, 6, 7, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, also oak wearing pieces dressed with chambréd edge, scarfed joints, securely fastened on aforesaid baths. Damaged hackmatack knee removed and replaced with new one of same size and pattern; also 1 floating fender, 68 feet long, 7 feet 6 inches wide, furnished and built, same painted one coat of coal-tar oil. Caps and badges for use of Attendants were furnished. 230 pumps were overhauled and repaired, new parts replacing defective and worn parts; 25 handles also repaired. The usual cleaning supplies, lumber, hardware, etc., for repairing were furnished.

The following supplies were furnished: 2,250 pounds 6-inch, 1,080 pounds 3-inch, 90 pounds 2½-inch, 25 pounds ¾-inch manila rope; 15 boxes of wax tapers, 15 pieces gas hose, 50 squillees with handles, 30 fine scup-net handles and frames complete, 2 dozen fine nets, 2 dozen coarse nets, 1 ball stout fish line, 5 coal scoops, 8 axes, long handles; 15 claw hammers, 15 screw drivers, 1 dozen stable lanterns, 1 dozen stable-lantern globes, 1 gross rubber treads, 1 box sapolio, 1 gross matches, 3 dozen reflectors, 3 dozen mop handles, 3 boxes small carpet tacks, 12 pieces of 1-inch 3-ply rubber hose, coupled, each piece 30 feet long; 6 pieces 1¼-inch rubber hose, coupled, each piece 6 feet long, with strainers. Bath No. 11 removed from berth at Eighteenth street, East river, to Twentieth street, East river. The baths were opened to the public on June 25, 1900.

Public Comfort Stations, City Hall Park—An order was issued to clean all the glass in the windows and doors at above stations.

Dewey Arch—The carpentering and plastering work on above arch was thoroughly repaired and put in good condition.

DEAR SIR—In compliance with the directions contained in your letter of the 3d instant, I herein submit a report of the transactions of the Bureau of Lamps and Gas for the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx for the quarter ending June 30, 1900.

Exhibit "A" is a statement showing the amounts drawn on vouchers for gas and electric currents supplied to the various public markets, offices, armories, etc., and for lighting and maintaining public lamps.

Exhibit "B" is a summary of the appropriation for "Lamps and Lighting," 1900, showing the vouchers drawn during the quarter amounting to three hundred and twenty-one thousand eight hundred and sixty dollars and eighty-one cents (\$321,860.81), outstanding liabilities amounting to eight hundred and thirty-five dollars and fifty cents (\$835.50), leaving an available balance of six hundred and sixty-one thousand four hundred and forty dollars and sixty-six cents (\$661,440.66).

Exhibit "C" is a summary of the lamp account, showing the number of new lamps lighted, old lamps relighted and lamps discontinued during the quarter; 128 new gas lamps, 22 new naphtha lamps, 2 new Welsbach naphtha lamps and 21 new electric lamps have been lighted; 64 gas lamps and one electric lamp have been relighted; 304 gas lamps, 22 naphtha lamps and 21 electric lamps have been discontinued. Of the gas lamps discontinued 166 were extinguished on account of electric lights. The total number of lamps lighted June 30 was 24,174 gas; 1,587 naphtha and 451 Welsbach naphtha and 4,558 electric lamps, making a total of 30,770 lamps.

Exhibit "D" is a statement showing the candle-power of the gases supplied to the City by such of the gas companies as are within reach of our Photometric Stations.

The following statement will show the average amount of impurities found in the gases of the several gas companies as determined by E. G. Love, Ph. D., the Gas Examiner, at the Laboratories of the Department:

SIR—In accordance with your instructions, I submit herewith a report of the transactions of this office for the quarter ending June 30, 1900.

Four men have been employed in office, laboratory, draughting room and general outside inspection.

In the laboratory additional apparatus has been installed for the analysis of coal, and daily tests of cement have been in progress—first of samples secured from 16 car-load shipments, and later of the same cement as delivered in small lots for use by the Department. A summary of the average results obtained follows in tables marked "A," "B" and "C."

The work of the draughting room has included checking up the detail maps of the city street lamps and making up of special plans showing proposed changes and improvements in street lighting of Manhattan and The Bronx.

Maps of the several boroughs have been corrected up to June 30, 1900, and show the lighting system of the City as follows:

General outside inspection has resulted in discontinuing 118 gas lamps near arc lights and saving about \$2,000 per year.

BUILDINGS.

During the quarter the tin roofs of the Town Hall and Armory, both in Flushing, Third Ward, have been thoroughly repaired and painted; also necessary repairs to all other Municipal buildings have been made.

The building at No. 46 Jackson avenue, Long Island City, leased by the City, was assigned to the Street Cleaning Department. On requisition from the same, furniture and the necessary alterations were ordered.

The rooms at No. 85 Borden avenue, Long Island City, were leased by the proper City authorities and assigned to the Topographical Bureau, Board of Public Improvements, who made requisition on this Department for furniture, etc., which was given prompt attention.

The Supervisors' term of office having expired April 1, the care of the County Buildings came under the jurisdiction of this Department.

Steps were taken to put new tin roof on the County Court-house, Long Island City, and the County Clerk's Office, Jamaica, and overhaul plumbing, etc.

On requisition from the County Judge for the rearrangement of the Judge's bench, Jury box, etc., of one of the Court-rooms, official orders were issued.

All County work was stopped by an injunction being served on this Department by the Board of Supervisors, which was referred to the Corporation Counsel and argued in May before Judge Gaynor, whose decision was reserved and has not been rendered at this date, July 2.
