#### COMMUNICATIONS FROM DEPARTMENTS AND CORPORATION OFFICERS.

SIR—I am in receipt of resolutions of the Municipal Assembly, approved by His Honor the Mayor, June 14, which are as follows:

"Whereas, in his opinion in the case brought by The City of New York against Alexander P. Hexamer the Appellate Division of the Second Department of the Supreme Court of the State of New York has thrown doubt upon the validity of those portions of the general ordinances of the City which relate to license fees and penalties; be it

"Resolved, That the Corporation Counsel be and he hereby is requested to furnish the Municipal Assembly with his opinion as to the validity of those parts of the general ordinances in relation to businesses requiring a license and the regulation thereof in The City of New York, adopted by the Municipal Assembly in 1899, which impose penalties and license fees; and be it further

"Resolved, That the Corporation Counsel be and he hereby is requested to furnish to the Municipal Assembly information as to whether the Municipal Assembly has the power to limit the granting of licenses to persons who are residents of The City of New York."

In answer to the communication I have to say that I respectfully ask you to furnish me with a copy of exactly such parts of ordinances, referred to in the first resolution upon which my opinion is asked. I will then promptly answer your question.

In regard to the second resolution, I am assured by members of your Honorable Body that the matter is one of some importance.

I am informed that a number of hackmen come from Nassau County and do the business of an ordinary hackman soliciting custom inside of The City of New York, in the Borough of Queens.

The effect of this is that those persons, who are not taxpayers of The City of New York, will pay no license fees and compete unfairly with hackmen who are citizens and residents of New York City.

I think the proper course for you to pursue in this matter will be to pass the resolutions in question, leaving to the persons claiming to be aggrieved the duty of attacking them should they be so advised, and allowing them to take up the burden of showing that the resolutions in question are unconstitutional.

I do not think the case of The City of New York against Hexamer (59 App. Div. 4) controls the question of the right of outside hackmen to do business within the city without a license.

The circumstances of that case were very peculiar, and on this point the decision does not control the matter now under discussion.

There is, however, some doubt that an ordinance which fixes a sliding scale of penalties—for instance, a fine of not less than ten nor more than twenty-five dollars—is invalid, and that the penalty, if fixed at all, should be definite.

In view of the fact that litigation is almost certain to ensue upon the passage of the ordinance intended by you, I would suggest that perhaps it might be well to send me a copy of the whole of the ordinance, as well those now in existence as those which you intend to pass, so that I can, if necessary, submit to you any changes which may seem to me ought to be brought to your attention before your final action.

If you will do this, I will take pleasure in acting in the matter as promptly as possible.

Hon. MAURICE F. HOLAHAN, President, Board of Public Improvements:

DEAR SIR—I beg to acknowledge receipt of letter of 13th instant from the Secretary of your Board, transmitting a copy of a resolution of the Municipal Assembly, which requests that the Board of Public Improvements transmit to the Municipal Assembly an amendment to the ordinance regulating the rate of water rents in The City of New York, whereby no structure or out-building, except a stable or a dwelling, shall be subject to water tax unless such structure or out-building is of the value of \$100 or over, instead of \$50, as at present.

The schedule of water rents adopted by the Municipal Assembly, and approved by the Mayor, on April 10, 1900, makes no distinction of charge for water rent on any building upon its valuation, the ratio of charge being made according to frontage and height.

Under these circumstances I am unable to make any suggestion as to any amendment in the ordinance establishing a uniform scale of water rents.

That, in pursuance of sections 413 and 422 of the Greater New York Charter, the following resolution of the Board of Public Improvements, adopted by that Board on the 26th day of June, 1901, be and the same is hereby approved, and the public work or improvement therein provided for is hereby authorized, and it is hereby determined that the cost and expense thereof shall be borne and paid as therein provided; namely,

Resolved, by the Board of Public Improvements, That, in pursuance of sections 413 and 422 of the Greater New York Charter, the regulating and grading of East One Hundred and Seventy-eighth street (formerly Elmwood place), between Prospect avenue and Franklin avenue, in the Borough of The Bronx, setting of curbstones, flagging of sidewalks a space four (4) feet wide, building approaches and erecting of fences where necessary, under the direction of the Commissioner of Highways, be and the same hereby is authorized and approved, there having been presented to said Board an estimate in writing, in such detail as the said Board has directed, of the cost of the proposed work or improvement, and a statement of the assessed value, according to the last preceding tax-roll, of the real estate included within the probable area of assessment, the estimated cost of said work being three thousand eight hundred dollars. The said assessed value of the real estate included within the probable area of assessment is forty-eight thousand and fifty dollars.

Be it Ordained by the Municipal Assembly of The City of New York, as follows:

That, in pursuance of sections 413 and 422 of the Greater New York Charter, the following resolution of the Board of Public Improvements, adopted by that Board on the 26th day of June, 1901, be and the same is hereby approved, and the public work or improvement therein provided for is hereby authorized, and it is hereby determined that the cost and expense thereof shall be borne and paid as therein provided; namely,

Resolved, by the Board of Public Improvements, That, in pursuance of sections 413 and 422 of the Greater New York Charter, the regulating and grading of East One Hundred and Seventy-ninth street, from Third avenue to the Bronx river, in the Borough of The Bronx, setting of curbstones, flagging of sidewalks a space four (4) feet wide, laying of crosswalks, building approaches and erecting fences where necessary, and planting trees on the sidewalks, under the direction of the Commissioner of Highways, be and the same hereby is authorized and approved, there having been presented to said Board an estimate in writing, in such detail as the said Board has directed, of the cost of the proposed work or improvement, and a statement of the assessed value, according to the last preceding tax-roll, of the real estate included within the probable area of assessment, the estimated cost of said work being fifty-three thousand dollars. The said assessed value of the real estate included within the probable area of assessment is four hundred and eighty-six thousand six hundred and thirty-five dollars.

Honorable ELIAS GOODMAN, Alderman, City Hall, N. Y.:

DEAR SIR—In connection with the proposed amendment to "A general ordinance in relation to business requiring a license and the regulation thereof in The City of New York," and for your information and guidance, I beg to hand you herewith a copy of a communication from me to the Chief of Police, which is the last one of a series upon the same subject-matter extending over a considerable period of time. Permit me to say that I think the purpose of the proposed amendment can be more easily accomplished by a reasonable diligence on the part of the patrolmen in accordance with the suggestions already made by me to the Chief of Police. No lists furnished to the police will make them vigilant, and if they are vigilant they will need no lists, for under the municipal ordinance "every licensee shall have the official license and exhibit the same upon demand of any person." It has been the experience of this Bureau that no amount of notices, final or otherwise, will make a person take out a license or a licensee appear for the renewal thereof, unless backed up by actual police supervision and enforcement. The following facts will illustrate:

During the month of December last past licenses to peddlers were issued each day as follows:

1st, 3; 3d, 30; 4th, 15; 5th, 11; 6th, 5; 7th, 12; 8th, 34; 10th, 126; 11th, 105; 12th, 95; 13th, 67; 14th, 27; 15th, 20; 17th, 35; 18th, 15; 19th, 19; 20th, 10; 21st, 7; 22d, 11; 24th, 10; 26th, 31; 27th, 8; 28th, 17; 29th, 12; 31st, 5.

As you will see from the copy of letter inclosed, the original was dated the 5th of December, and in the course of a day or two had the attention of the Chief of Police, and in consequence of his orders the unusual activity of the police resulted in the increase in the number of licenses issued, shown particularly in the figures for the 10th, 11th, 12th and 13th of the month, with a gradual diminution thereafter, shown by the figures submitted. Such is the invariable experience in the past which is likely to be repeated in the future. What is true of peddlers as a class is equally true of the other classes of license.

Another instance will show you how utterly inadequate is the system of notices proposed in order to accomplish the proper enforcement of the ordinances, and how entirely unnecessary it would be if the police exercised proper vigilance. The municipal ordinance provides for the licensing of "bootblack stands, consisting of not more than three chairs." There are numberless instances, noticeable in the casual passerby, of bootblack stands in this city consisting of more than three chairs, and every such instance is a direct violation of the ordinance, which no mere notice will correct.

These suggestions will doubtless enable you to enact legislation which will be effective, and to that end it will give me much pleasure at any time and in any way to assist you to the full extent of my experience and ability.

DEAR SIR—I beg to call your attention to the laxity with which the municipal ordinances regulating peddling in the public streets and stands within stoop-lines for the sale of certain articles are being enforced. From my personal observation I think thousands of persons are peddling in the city either without any license at all or with one that has expired far more than a year. I see peddlers on the streets with badges on their breasts that from the style and shape thereof I can tell are several years old. Our records show that there are hundreds of licenses for peddling taken out in the last two or three years that have not been renewed, and it is a fair presumption that the possessors are still continuing to exercise the privileges of the license without paying the regular fee for renewal.

There are also in this office certified copies of resolutions by the Municipal Assembly, authorizing hundreds of stands within stoop-lines for various lawful purposes for which the persons named in the resolutions have not applied to this Bureau for the official permits and have not paid the official fee therefor. It is more than likely that such persons are already actually exercising the privileges authorized under the licenses and for which the fee is due this office and has not been paid. I am not informed whether the City Clerk notifies persons of the passing of such resolutions by the Municipal Assembly, and even if he did my experience would lead me to believe that a formal notice only would be entirely insufficient to bring the person down to pay the official fee and get the official license. It usually requires much more vigorous measures.

In view of the foregoing facts I would respectfully suggest that the patrolmen throughout the city be instructed to pay particular attention to peddlers and persons using stands within stoop-lines for the sale of any article, and to require every such person to produce a license therefor, issued from this Bureau within the previous year, and if such license is not produced, that the person should be notified to proceed at once to this office and obtain a proper license, and that such notification, after the lapse of a reasonable length of time, should be promptly followed up by the arrest of any person exercising the privileges requiring a license and for which he has no license.

I would respectfully beg your immediate and continued attention to this matter to the end that the municipal ordinances may be properly enforced and the duties devolving upon this Bureau satisfactorily performed.
