### REPORT:

That, having examined the subject, they believe the proposed issue to be necessary. They therefore recommend that the said resolution be adopted.

Whereas, In and by an ordinance duly passed by the Board of Aldermen at its meeting on March 15, 1904, and duly approved thereafter by his Honor the Mayor, it was in part provided in section 1 thereof as follows:

"There shall be a Mayor's Bureau of Weights and Measures in The City of New York, in charge of an Inspector of Weights and Measures to be appointed by the Mayor and removable by him at his pleasure, who shall be paid a salary of twenty-five hundred dollars per annum"; and

Whereas, There now exists no appropriation from which said salary can be paid and the incidental expenses of said office can be defrayed; now therefore be it

Resolved, pursuant to subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Charter, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and they hereby are requested to authorize the Comptroller to issue Special Revenue Bonds to the amount of three thousand dollars, to provide the means necessary to make said payments for the year 1904, from and including the first day of April, 1904.

### REPORT:

That, having examined the subject, they believe the proposed ordinance to be necessary, but with the following amendment, adding after the words "Superintendent of Buildings" in the sixth and seventh lines of section 157a the words "or such person as may be designated by him."

They therefore recommend that the said ordinance be adopted.

AN ORDINANCE to amend an Ordinance known as the Building Code.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

An ordinance entitled the Building Code, adopted September 12, 1899, by the Board of Aldermen and by the Common Council on October 10, 1899, and approved by the Mayor on October 24, 1899, is hereby amended by adding thereto a section to be known as section 157a, as follows:

Section 157a. In case there shall be, in the opinion of the Superintendent of Buildings in any borough having jurisdiction, danger to life or property by reason of any defective or illegal work, or work in violation of or not in compliance with any of the provisions or requirements of this code, the said Superintendent of Buildings or such person as may be designated by him shall have the right and he is hereby authorized and empowered to order all further work to be stopped in and about said building, and to require all persons in and about said building forthwith to vacate the same, and to cause such work to be done in or about the building as in his judgment may be necessary to remove any danger therefrom. And said Superintendent of Buildings may, when necessary for the public safety, temporarily close the sidewalks and streets adjacent to said building, or part thereof, and the Police Department, when called upon by the said Superintendent of Buildings to co-operate, shall enforce such orders or requirements.

#### REPORT:

That, having examined the subject, they recommend that the said resolution be adopted.

Resolved, That permission be and is hereby given to the Kings County Refrigerating Company to open streets, as shown in the accompanying diagram, for the purpose of laying pipes under Hall street and under and across Flushing avenue to Wallabout Market, under Washington avenue between Park and Flushing avenues, under and across Flushing avenue between Waverly and Washington avenues and under and across Washington avenue within the bounds of the Wallabout Market, provided that said pipe-line shall not be laid at more than three feet below the surface of the street and that said Kings County Refrigerating Company shall enter into an undertaking, to be approved by the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, to save The City of New York harmless from any loss or damage that may be occasioned by reason of the construction or maintenance of said pipe-line. The work of said construction to be done under the direction of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn and the permission hereby granted to continue only during the pleasure of the Board of Aldermen.

And provided further, that the said Kings County Refrigerating Company shall pay to The City of New York as compensation for the privilege hereby granted, such amount as may be deemed equivalent therefor by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and that the permission hereby granted shall take effect only upon and after the payment by the said Kings County Refrigerating Company of any sum or sums so provided by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment; and no permit shall be issued to said company for the construction of said pipe-line until a proper receipt for the amount so paid is produced and submitted to the President of the said Borough. And in case of any default being made at any time in making any payment fixed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the license herein provided for shall cease and determine without any action on the part of the Board of Aldermen at the expiration of ninety days after such default.

Hon WILLIAM McADOO, Police Commissioner:

Sir—I am in receipt of a communication from your Chief Clerk, under date of April 27, 1904, inclosing for my consideration and advice communication received by you from Messrs. Black, Olcott, Gruber and Bonyng, attorneys for Inspector Grant, requesting that his back salary be paid to him.

There is a grave question whether Inspector Grant can recover any back salary from the City. By law the Police Department is only entitled to fifteen Inspectors, and when Inspector Grant was dismissed someone else was appointed or promoted in his place and stead. The salary of the office was paid, if I understand the situation correctly, to the de facto incumbent and Inspector Grant's cause of action, it seems to me, is not against the City, but against the officer to whom his salary was paid.

My advice is to refuse to certify any pay-rolls in the matter until you are compelled to do so in any appropriate proceeding.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

Sir—Whereas, The order of the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court, First Division, has reinstated Donald Grant in his office as Inspector of Police, thereby increasing the number of Inspectors of Police to sixteen; and

Whereas, The exigencies of the Department require the services of sixteen Inspectors of Police;

Ordered, That it be and is hereby recommended to the Board of Aldermen, under the provisions of section 276 of the Greater New York Charter, by and with the approval and on the recommendation of the Mayor, to authorize the quota of Inspectors of Police to consist of 16 in number; and be it further

## BUREAU OF TOPOGRAPHICAL SURVEY.

## Work Done by Field Force.

The preparation of a topographical map showing a tentative street system and grades of portions of the Second and Fourth Wards, including Richmond Hill, Morris Park, Dunton, Ozone Park, Woodhaven, Union Course and adjacent territory, necessary locations of the existing streets and railroads were made, and elevations, taking along centre and side lines at intervals of 100 feet.

Accurate traverses were run for determining the exact positions of these streets on the map of the borough.

All unimproved property in the above-mentioned localities were surveyed with transit "Y" level and plane table. Measurements were made along Atlantic avenue, between Borough of Brooklyn and Lefferts avenue, also on the streets intersecting Atlantic avenue, for the purpose of monumenting.

Elevations were taken on centre lines of streets in Long Island City, for the purpose of establishing grades.

## Work Done by Office Force.

Calculations were made on the work of the field parties, and the same were plotted on the above-mentioned topographical maps, on the scale of 80 feet to 1 inch, and portions as completed were reduced to a scale of 200 feet to 1 inch.

Academy street, from Hunter's Point to Grand avenue.

Pomeroy street, from Jackson avenue to Riker avenue.

Elm street, from DeBevoise avenue to the East river.

## NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

## GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President, or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures. Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done.
