BELLEVUE AND ALLIED HOSPITALS.

A regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals was held on Monday, July 20, 1908, at 1 o'clock.

Present—Dr. Brannan, the President, in the chair; Messrs. Barry, Sachs and Stern, Trustees, and Mr. Hebbard, the Commissioner of Public Charities.

The minutes of the meeting of July 13 were read and approved. The list of appointments, dismissals, resignations, increases in salaries, transfers, promotions, etc., was approved and placed on file.

The following bills were presented for approval, and, on motion, duly seconded, it was

Dr. S. T. Armstrong, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows: From July 12 to July 18, inclusive, fifty-five operations were performed at Bellevue Hospital, nine at Gouverneur Hospital, seventeen at Harlem Hospital and seven at Fordham Hospital, at all of which the Attending Surgeons or their Assistants were present.

The following amounts of money have been deposited with the City Chamberlain: Bellevue Hospital, \$38.50 for treatment of patients; \$13.28 received for fat, \$14.52 for bones and \$2.50 for grease; Gouverneur Hospital, 27 cents for fat and 84 cents for bones; Harlem Hospital, \$4.16 for fat and \$6.19 for bones, and \$21 for treatment of patients at Fordham Hospital and \$3.84 for grease sold.

The departmental estimates for the year 1909 are herewith submitted.

The expenditures for investigations made by the Charity Organization Society were \$20.75 in the month of May. The report for the month of June has not yet been received, but the charge will not be enough to warrant the payment of the salary of an investigator.

The Department of Commerce and Labor requests authority to reprint in a publication it is about to issue the nomenclature used by Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, and it is recommended that such authority be granted.

The contract of Messrs. Kelly & Kelley for laying out the grounds at Harlem Hospital was awarded on October 8, 1906. The work was to be completed on January 24, 1907, and in case of failure to complete same there was to be a penalty of \$40 a day. The bill has been sent to the Finance Department, which calls attention to the fact that no authority has been received from the Board of Trustees extending the time of the completion of the contract. In order to meet the delay the time should be extended to June 15.

On motion, duly seconded, it was Resolved, To request of the Corporation Counsel an opinion in the matter of the payment of forty dollars by the contractor for the grounds at Harlem Hospital for every day required by him to complete the contract after the date set for the completion of the same.

On motion, duly seconded, it was Resolved, To include in the departmental estimate for 1909 two additional radiographers, at a salary of \$1,800 each, for Gouverneur and Fordham Hospitals.

Reports of Committees.

Mr. Barry, the Chairman of the Building Committee, to whom had been referred the estimate of the John H. Parker Company (\$537) on changes in the reception room of the new Training School for Women Nurses, recommended that the changes be made and the estimate be accepted, and, on motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, To approve the recommendation of the Building Committee and authorize this expenditure.

Messrs. Barry and Hebbard, the Special Committee to which had been referred the applications for increases in salaries, recommended that the salaries of the following employees be increased:

 Messrs. Barry and Hebbert, the Special Committee to which had been referred the matter of allowing a salary to the Protestant clergyman at Bellevue Hospital, recommended that the same salary be paid the Protestant clergyman as is paid the Hebrew chaplain and the Catholic priests, and, on motion, duly seconded, it was Resolved, To approve the recommendation of the Committee.

The President of the Board of Trustees and Messrs. Sachs and Stern, of the committee to which had been referred the proposed special tuberculosis service at Gouverneur Hospital, recommended that, on account of the distance of the pier from Gouverneur Hospital and the inadequate kitchen accommodations at that institution and the additional duties which would have to be imposed upon the Supervising Nurse, the old ferryboat "Westfield" be placed in charge of an auxiliary committee.

Dr. Brannan and Mr. Hebbert, of the committee appointed to suggest an arrangement for the care of the tubercular patients at Bellevue Hospital, reported progress.

Mr. Barry, the Chairman of the Building Committee, to whom had been referred the letters of July 6 and July 13 from Messrs. Parish & Schroeder regarding the layout of the grounds and the enclosing wall and fence of the Training School for Women Nurses, reported favorably upon the matter, and, on motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, To approve the design for the fence and to authorize advertisement for bids upon the work.

Communications.

A communication dated July 17 was received from Messrs. Parish & Schroeder with reports for the weeks ending July 4 and July 11 from the Inspector for the Training School building, Mr. William E. Barton.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, this communication and the reports were placed on file.

A communication dated July 14 was received from the Chairman of the sub-committee of the New York Charter Commission announcing a meeting of that committee on Tuesday evening, July 21, at No. 42 West Forty-fourth street.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, this communication was placed on file, the President having requested the members of the Board of Trustees who would be in the city at that time to attend the meeting.

A communication dated July 20 was received from the John H. Parker Company informing the Trustees that the upper part of Pavilions A and B is complete and in first-class condition, and that all the tile floors and wood floors, trim and glazing, have been cleaned down to the basement.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, Upon the recommendation of the architect (in letter dated July 26), to accept the work of the John H. Parker Company in Pavilions A and B.

Resolved, further, To transfer the keys to the architects, Messrs. McKim, Mead & White, with directions to give them to the painters, with the warning that they will be held strictly responsible for any damage to the building.

Specifications were received from Mr. R. F. Airmall for additional work at Gouverneur Hospital, and, on motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, To refer these specifications to Messrs. Barry and Sachs for report. (Proposed alterations, extension and additional work in connection with the installation and construction of a vacuum sweeping plant, a coal vault, mesh guards for fire-escapes, new operating room, fitting up of drug rooms, etc.)

Plans and specifications for converting two of the wards into rooms for the members of the house staff were prepared by the Supervising Engineer and presented by the General Medical Superintendent for approval.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, To approve these plans and specifications and to authorize advertisement for bids on the work.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York:

The petition of the New York, Westchester and Boston Railway Company shows:

That heretofore and on or about the 2d day of August, 1904, an ordinance, passed by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, was duly approved by the Mayor of The City of New York, and upon said 2d day of August, 1904, the date of said approval, took effect and became law. That said ordinance was entitled "An ordinance granting to the New York, Westchester and Boston Railway Company the right to cross certain streets and highways and to construct and operate a four-track railway above or below said streets or highways of The City of New York." That in and by said ordinance, among other things, said Board of Aldermen of The City of New York granted to said railway company, subject to certain conditions and provisions set forth in said ordinance, the right to cross certain streets or highways of The City of New York, in the Borough of The Bronx, in said City, and to construct and operate a four-track railway, with connections, turnouts, switches and cross-overs necessary for the accommodation and operation of the said railway, in, upon and across the streets, avenues, highways, parkways and public places, and upon the route situate in the Borough of The Bronx, City, County and State of New York, as described in the said ordinance in section 1, subdivisions 1 and 2 thereof, all as shown on the maps entitled "Map and profile of the amended route of the New York, Westchester and Boston Railway Company, section 1," adopted by the Board of Directors of said company on the 20th day of May, 1904, and signed by William L. Bull, President; John Bogart, Engineer, and H. C. Winchester, Secretary, under seal; "Map and profile of the amended route of the New York, Westchester and Boston Railway Company, section 2," adopted by the Board of Directors of the company on the 7th day of April, 1904, and signed by William L. Bull, President; John Bogart, Engineer, and Thomas W. Baker, Secretary, under seal; and "Map and profile of the amended route of the New York, Westchester and Boston Railway Company, section 3," adopted by the Board of Directors of the said company on the 15th day of May, 1904, and signed by the President, Wm. L. Bull; John Bogart, Engineer, and H. C. Winchester, Secretary, under seal, and which maps and profiles were filed in the office of the County Clerk of the City and County of New York on the 23d day of June, 1904, or any lawful amendments thereof consented to by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

That on the 15th day of June, 1905, your petitioner duly changed and altered its route in the County of New York and duly and lawfully adopted an amended route, as shown upon the maps, surveys and profiles of such amended route filed in the office of the County Clerk of the County of New York on or about the 15th day of June, 1905. That subsequently and on or about the 10th day of July, 1905, an amended route of that part of said railroad lying between the Bronx River and the northern boundary line of The City of New York, known as Section 2, was duly adopted by your petitioner, and an amended map and profile of such Section No. 2, was on the said 10th day of July, filed in the office of the County Clerk of the County of New York. Such change in the route in Section 2 was made subsequent to the petition to your Board next referred to, and to satisfy certain changes proposed by the Engineer of your Board. That in addition thereto the street system as now laid out in The Bronx would be seriously interfered with by the construction of your petitioner's road over the said route.

That by reason of the foregoing facts, the cost of constructing the road over the said route would be so great as practically to prohibit the Railway Company from building and operating the line and the delay in acquiring the real estate would necessarily postpone the period of completion for an indefinite time.

The route as amended is situated in a section of The Bronx where real estate has not been devoted to building purposes and where the right of way can be acquired at a more reasonable price and within a reasonable time, and under this route your petitioner can proceed with the construction of its road and complete the same at a cost and within a period of time which will render it practicable to build and operate its road. That the change in the route of the branch line is made necessary by the change in the main line of your petitioner, to which the consent of your Honorable Board is requested as herein set forth.

That a copy of the said map and profile filed in the County Clerk's office on the 17th day of June, 1908, as aforesaid, showing the amendment to said route, which copy is marked Exhibit A, June 17, 1908, is submitted herewith.

And your petitioner respectfully prays that the consent of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to the said route as lawfully amended in conformity with the map and profile filed on the 17th day of June, 1908, may be given to this petitioner.

The petition of the East River Terminal Railroad respectfully shows to your Honorable Board:

I. That your petitioner is a corporation duly organized under and by virtue of the laws of this State as a railroad corporation for the transportation and carriage of freight exclusively, with an office and principal place of business located at No. 113 Wall street, in the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, and that William Butler Duncan, Jr., of Port Washington, N. Y., is the President, and John McCafferty, of the Borough of Brooklyn, is the Secretary thereof.

II. That your petitioner is desirous of establishing and maintaining large freight terminals or stations in the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, where all classes of freight may be shipped and received by the public, and delivered to and received from the trunk lines traversing the United States and Canada, which said freight terminals or stations, when established, will connect with and be used in conjunction with the freight terminal stations, already established in

the same locality, of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad, West Shore Railroad, Vermont Central Railroad, Lehigh Valley Railroad, Erie lines, Central Railroad of New Jersey, Grand Trunk lines and other railroad and transportation lines.

III. Said terminals or freight stations are to be for the use of the public for the shipment, receipt and distribution of all classes of freight, and are designed to relieve conditions in the Eastern District, or Williamsburg section, of the Borough of Brooklyn, which has grown almost unmanageably in an industrial way in the last seven years, and has increased almost a quarter of a million in population in the same time, while the facilities for the handling of freight are practically as they were twenty-five years ago, and therefore totally inadequate to respond to present requirements. GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any collusion with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the amount, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a quantity or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be included in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either included in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, or surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the owner's envelope in which to place the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
