DEAR SIR—In order to determine the amount of rental accruing July 1, 1908, and payable by the Interborough Rapid Transit Company, under provisions of the contract made with John B. McDonald, Feb. 21, 1903 (by the City of New York acting by the former Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners for The City of New York),

and agreements supplemental thereto, I have to request that you furnish this Department with a statement for the second quarter of the year 1908, containing the necessary information, classified and arranged as in the quarterly statements heretofore prepared by the Engineers of your Commission.

I have also to request of you a statement of the rental due the City under the terms of the contract for the construction of the Brooklyn-Manhattan section of the Rapid Transit Railroad, classified and arranged as in statements for that section as heretofore prepared by the Engineers of your Commission, also for the second quarter of the year 1908.

In order to facilitate the furnishing of this information, I beg to enclose statements for both of these sections mentioned above, showing the bonds authorized to be issued, bonds issued, the premium realized thereon, and the disbursements made to June 30th, 1908, inclusive, on account of the original contract price, extras, ducts, real estate, terminals and interest paid on bonds issued, etc.

I also enclose a copy of a letter to the Auditor of the Interborough Rapid Transit Company, stating the amount of bonds issued that were allotted to the construction of the Rapid Transit Railroad during the quarter ending June 30, 1908.

Note—The amount of interest paid on bonds issued as shown above will be subject to a deduction of the amount of "interest rental" paid to the City by the Interborough Rapid Transit Company on bonds issued for the construction of that portion of the Brooklyn-Manhattan Division of the subway now in operation, viz.: \$59,808.61.

Included in this amount is the sum of \$75,000 for the construction of the Van Cortlandt Park extension of the Rapid Transit Railroad, the estimated cost of which is taken at \$750,000, and also \$15,000 for certain changes in the Rapid Transit Railroad station at One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, \$850,000 for certain changes in trackage at Ninety-sixth street and \$600,000 for expenses incurred as extra work for the construction of outlet chambers and fan houses.

Note—This statement does not include interest paid on bonds issued except that amount which has been charged direct to this fund.

The President reported that Melville Eggleston, Esq., counsel for the Hudson River Telephone Company, in accordance with his statement made to the Commissioners at the meeting held on June 23, 1908, had submitted a communication on said date relative to the source of the company's rights as owner, or otherwise, of the real estate and property affected in the matter of the claim of said company for compensation as damages on account of the removal and relocation of certain telephone lines due to the construction of the Croton Falls dam and reservoir, and that the matter had been referred to the Corporation Counsel on June 24, 1908, for his opinion as to whether, under the circumstances, the Commissioners are justified in submitting to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, for their approval, proposed agreement for compensation, as damages, for said removal and relocation of the lines of said company.

The action of the President was approved.

The President also reported the receipt of two communications from J. J. Beaudras, Esq., special counsel, dated respectively, June 30 and July 3, 1908, requesting that an Engineer be designated to attend the trial of Parcel No. 373, Eighth Cornell Proceeding, Commissioners of Appraisal, with map prepared to testify as to the rainfall in the watershed, and stated that he had complied therewith.

The action of the President was approved.

Progress reports of the Chief Engineer for the weeks ending June 4, 11, 18 and 25, 1908, were received and referred to the Construction Committee.

Report No. 1708 of the Chief Engineer, dated June 16, 1908, in the matter of the application of the Croton Falls Construction Company, contractor for the Croton Falls dam and reservoir, dated April 14, 1908, for the omission of the steel derrick towers required under the contract for the construction of said dam and reservoir, and recommending that the request of the contractors be granted, was received and ordered filed, and the President directed to obtain the opinion of the Corporation Counsel as to the power of the Commissioners to dispense with the use of such steel derrick towers in the construction of said dam.

Report No. 1700 of the Chief Engineer, dated June 20, 1908, submitting first and final estimate of William P. Mitchell for printing and publishing the Aqueduct Commissioners' reports, 1895 to 1907, and recommending that the same be paid, was received and ordered filed, and in connection therewith the following preamble and resolution was offered:

Whereas, The Chief Engineer of this Commission has certified, under date of June 20, 1908, that, in his opinion, William P. Mitchell has completely performed and carried out the provisions of the contract made by him with this Commission on June 6, 1907, for printing and publishing the Aqueduct Commissioners' reports, 1895 to 1907, and the Chief Engineer has stated that the work has been performed and the material furnished in accordance with the contract, and recommending that the final estimate be paid; therefore

Resolved, That the Aqueduct Commissioners do accept the work done and materials furnished by William P. Mitchell under the contract above referred to, and direct that a proper voucher for the final payment therefor be approved and ordered certified to the Comptroller for payment.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—Commissioners Cowan, Ten Eyck, Ryan and Windolph—4.

The Acting Secretary presented certificate, in duplicate, providing for the acceptance of the work done and materials furnished by William P. Mitchell under his contract dated June 6, 1907, for printing and publishing the Aqueduct Commissioners' reports, 1895 to 1907, which were ordered executed by the Commissioners.

Communication from E. R. L. Gould, Chairman, Committee on City Indebtedness, New York Charter Commission, dated June 23, 1908, requesting certain data with reference to this Commission, was received and referred to the President for reply.

Communication from Acting Corporation Counsel Connolly, dated July 6, 1908, with regard to action of Elizabeth Flanagan, as administratrix of William J. Flanagan, vs. The City of New York, to recover \$25,272, and requesting that voucher for extra work, amounting to \$2,726.47, constituting part of said claim, be prepared and transmitted to the Comptroller's office to take the place of vouchers for said amount which were mislaid, was received and ordered filed and the Secretary directed to prepare the vouchers accordingly.

The Acting Secretary presented circular letter from Supervisor of the City Record, dated June 27, 1908, requesting list of employees, their addresses, salaries, etc., and stated that he had furnished such list on July 1, 1908, which action was approved.

The Acting Secretary submitted a report dated July 7, 1908, of the transmission of the sum of \$12, being the proceeds of sale of Aqueduct Commissioners' reports, to the City Chamberlain, for the credit of the Additional Water Fund, with receipt therefor.

The report was ordered filed and the action of the Acting Secretary approved. The Commissioners then adjourned.
