### Bellevue and Allied Hospitals.

A regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals was held on Wednesday, November 4th, 1914, at 3.30 p. m.

Present—Dr. Brannan, the President, in the chair; and Messrs. Paulding, O'Keeffe, Farley, Sachs, Stern and Robbins, Trustees. Excused—Mr. Kingsbury, Commissioner of Public Charities.

The minutes of the meeting of October 20th were held as read and approved. Bills amounting to \$71,533.84 were presented for approval and forwarded to the Comptroller for payment.

Dr. George O'Hanlon, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:

Dr. M. S. Gregory, Resident Alienist, asked for the appointment of Dr. R. L. Seagle as interne on the staff of the Alcoholic Service, for a period of six months. Dr. Seagle is a graduate of Tulane University, served at the Post-Graduate Hospital in New York and as a substitute in Bellevue on the 4th Division.

A request has been received from Miss Tyng, who has been making a study of the Social Service Department of this hospital, for permission to give a series of ten lectures to the Social Service workers, in the Social Service office. Your approval is requested.

In the appropriation for special nurses there remains about \$100. As soon as this amount is exhausted it will be necessary for us to discontinue this service for the remainder of the year or ask for revenue bonds at the end of the year to meet the expenditure.

Permission is requested to advertise for the food supplies for the year 1915.

A communication has been received from the Contract Clerk and Auditor calling attention to the fact that it will be necessary to secure additional funds in the Salary and Wage appropriation for temporary employees for the year 1914, as follows: 2060, Bellevue Hospital, \$4,133; 2061, Nurses Residence, B. H., \$1,027.32; 2063, Harlem Hospital, \$878.82; 2064, Fordham Hospital, \$1,282. Total, \$7,321.14.

Your attention is called to the fact that the nurses who were assigned to duty on August 22nd to care for the drug cases, which service was made necessary by the opening of an additional ward for this specific service, have not yet received any compensation. A request was made for revenue bonds and the delay in action on this request has not only caused inconvenience to the nurses themselves, but makes the problem of securing people for this service very difficult.

Many of our Hospital Helpers are also obliged to wait ten days or two weeks for their October salary, by reason of the delay in the transfer of funds requested about two weeks ago.

There is a vacancy on the local Civil Service Promotion Board and also on the local Civil Service Examining Committee. To fill the former it is recommended that Dr. Thornton be appointed, and for the latter, Mr. Link, the Employment Agent.

The Contract Clerk and Auditor requests the transfer of the following funds: From the appropriation entitled 405, Motor Vehicle Repairs, 1913, \$11.58, to the appropriation entitled 406, Contingencies, 1913, \$11.58; from the appropriation entitled 2089, General Repairs, 1914, \$600, to the appropriation entitled 2076, Office Supplies, 1914, \$600.

On separate motion, duly seconded and carried, in each instance, action was taken upon the report of the General Medical Superintendent as follows:

The appointment of Dr. R. L. Seagle as interne on the Alcoholic Service for a period of six months was approved.

The granting of Miss Tyng's request was approved.

It was resolved to continue the employment of special nurses, when required, and to ask for special revenue bonds at the end of the year, if necessary.

The advertisement for food supplies for the year 1915 was authorized.

It was resolved to ascertain from the other City departments whether they will have surplus funds in their 1914 appropriations which could be transferred to

the appropriation of this department to meet the probable deficit, and it was further

Resolved, To request the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the transfer of such funds as may be needed.

It was moved, seconded and carried to authorize the President to see what could be done to expedite action on departmental requests for revenue bonds to pay the salaries of nurses employed to care for the drug cases, and for the transfer of funds in the salary schedules.

The appointment of Dr. Michael J. Thornton to the local Civil Service Promotion Board and Mr. Link to the local Civil Service Examining Committee was approved.

It was moved, seconded and carried to request the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to approve the transfer of funds within the appropriations mentioned in the General Medical Superintendent's report

### REPORTS OF COMMITTEES.

The Secretary submitted a list of the bids received on October 28th for the painting of Pavilions L and M of the new Bellevue Hospital, together with two communications from McKim, Mead & White dated November 2nd and 4th relating thereto. After several efforts to communicate with the Departments of Education, Docks and Ferries, and Charities, to inquire into the character of the lowest bidder, the Building Committee recommended in the best interest of the City that these bids be rejected. After consideration, on motion, duly seconded and carried, it was

Resolved, To adopt this recommendation and reject all bids, and it was further

Resolved, To readvertise for bids for the painting of pavilions L and M.

At the invitation of the President, Miss Stowers, Supervising Nurse of Gouverneur Hospital, appeared before the Board and gave a report of the blank forms for use in the Out-Patient Department of Gouverneur Hospital adopted by the Trustees at their meeting on October 20th, for an experimental period of thirty days. After discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried to appoint a committee composed of the President and Secretary, and a subcommittee of the General Medical Superintendent and Miss Stowers to inquire into and report on the feasibility of using in the Out-Patient Department of Gouverneur Hospital the blank forms in their present form and, if not, to make appropriate modifications.

The President reported that on October 27th he met with the Committee on Tax Budget in an effort to obtain more funds for Bellevue and Allied Hospitals in the appropriation for 1915, and that he also requested the Committee to make a change in the budget for 1915 in the title of Dr. Gregory from Resident Physician and Alienist to Director of the Psychopathic and Alcoholic services. After discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried to approve the report of the President.

### COMMUNICATIONS.

A letter dated October 20th was presented from the State Board of Charities transmitting reports of the inspections of the hospitals of the department and placing the administration of all four hospitals in Class I and the plant of Fordham and Harlem in Class I, and that of Bellevue and Gouverneur in Class 2. A copy of the needs and defects mentioned in these reports, having been sent to each member of the Board, it was moved, seconded and carried to direct the General Medical Superintendent to remedy the defects and meet the needs set forth therein as far as possible.

The minutes of the Medical Board of Gouverneur Hospital for October 5th were presented. On motion, duly seconded and carried the recommendations that the positions of Consultant in Gastro-Intestinal Diseases and Physiological Chemist be created, as well as the equipment of a laboratory for the use of the Physiological Chemist, was referred to the Conference Committee. The request to remedy the floors of the balconies was referred to the Building Committee. The General Medical Superintendent was instructed to make inquiries to determine what can be done to increase the facilities for isolation; the resignation of Dr. I. H. Alexander from the Nose, Throat and Ear Clinic of the Out-Patient Department was accepted with regret; the nominations of Dr. Harry Epstein, Dr. Robert Engle and Dr. Robert E. Buckley for appointment to the Out-Patient Department were referred to the Conference Committee.

The minutes of the Medical Board of Harlem Hospital for October 27th were presented. On motion, duly seconded and carried the usual advance in the House Staff, due to the completion of services, was approved; action on the request that a clinical laboratory be established for the use of the Out-Patient Department was deferred until the completion of the extension of the hospital; the report calling attention to the overcrowded condi-

tion in the Out-Patient Department was discussed and referred to Mr. O'Keeffe for investigation and recommendation; the suggestions relative to the reorganization of the Out-Patient Department and the plan presented for the vacation relief of the members of the staff of the Out-Patient Department were discussed, and although the Board considered them desirable, action thereon was deferred pending a conference with a physician and a surgeon from the Medical Board of Harlem Hospital and the Trustees at their meeting on November 18th.

The minutes of the Medical Board of Fordham Hospital of October 6th were presented. On motion, duly seconded and carried the application of Dr. Boorstein and Dr. Kleinberg for appointment to the Out-Patient Department, Orthopedic Service, were referred to the Conference Committee; the resignation of Dr. Roy H. Nicholl as Clinical Microscopist was accepted with regret; the resignation of Dr. Diner as Assistant Pathologist was accepted and his appointment as Clinical Microscopist was approved.

The minutes of the Medical Board of Gouverneur Hospital for November 2nd were presented. On motion, duly seconded and carried the recommendations that the position of Assistant Visiting Physician (Cystoscopist) to the hospital be established and that Dr. Russell be appointed to the place, as well as the creation of the positions of Adjunct Visiting Physician and Assistant Visiting Ophthalmologist, were referred to the Conference Committee.

A letter was presented from Dr. Joseph Fraenkel resigning as Consulting Alienist and Neurologist to Bellevue Hospital. It was moved, seconded and carried to accept this resignation with deep regret.

A letter was presented from Messrs. McKim, Mead & White, recommending the use of steel instead of oak cabinets in pavilions I and K. On the recommendation of the architects and the Building Committee it was moved, seconded and carried to approve this change.

A letter was presented from the Department of Finance, dated October 21st, calling attention to the expiration of the leases of the premises at 197, 199, 201 Monroe Street. It was moved, seconded and carried to request the Sinking Fund Commission to renew these leases for a period of one year, with the privilege of renewal.

A letter, dated November 1st, was presented from Dr. William P. Strain, applying for appointment as Attending Pediatricist to the new Sea Breeze Hospital. As this hospital is not yet under the jurisdiction of this department it was moved, seconded and carried that his application be placed on file.

A letter dated October 22nd was presented from Dr. M. Weinstein applying for appointment to the new Sea Breeze Hospital. The Secretary reported that he had informed the applicant that this hospital is not yet under the jurisdiction of the department. It was moved, seconded and carried to place the application on file.

A letter, dated November 2nd, was presented from J. H. Freedlander stating that in order to continue the work on the interior finish in the extension to Harlem Hospital it would be necessary to heat the new ward wing. On motion, duly seconded and carried the General Medical Superintendent was directed to furnish steam to the contractors on the same terms and conditions as steam was provided to the contractors of the new pavilions at Bellevue Hospital.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, it was

Resolved, To hold the next meeting on Wednesday, November 18th, 1914, at 3.30 p. m., at Bellevue Hospital.

A motion to adjourn the meeting was seconded and carried.

Dr. George O'Hanlon, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows: A request was received from Mr. White, Contract Clerk and Auditor, for permission to advertise for 300 tons of coal for the balance of the year for Fordham Hospital, and for the usual quantity for 1915.

A modification of schedules 2063, Salaries Temporary Employees, Harlem Hospital, and 2052, Salaries Regular Employees, General Administration, is re-

quested, no additional funds being necessary.

Dr. Kenneth D. Bryson, Micro-Photographer in the Pathological Department, resigned on November 1st, 1914.

On separate motion duly seconded and carried in each instance, action was taken upon the report of the General Medical Superintendent, as follows:

The advertisement for coal for the remainder of the year for Fordham Hospital, and for the usual quantity for the department for 1915, was authorized.

It was moved, seconded and carried to request the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to amend the salary schedules mentioned in the General Medical Superintendent's report.

The resignation of Dr. Kenneth Bryson was accepted with regret.

### COMMITTEE REPORTS.

Mr. O'Keeffe submitted a list of bids received on November 6th for: 1, furnishings for pavilions I, K, L and M; 2, food supplies; 3, forage.

A letter, dated November 10th, was presented from the Hospital Supply Company, protesting against the award of the contract for part of the furnishings of I, K, L and M, setting forth that the lowest bidder on certain items is unknown to the trade. A communication, dated November 12th, was presented from the Finance Department, calling attention to the necessity of exercising special care in the awarding of contracts for these furnishings. After consideration, it was moved, seconded and carried to defer action on these bids and refer the communication from the Finance Department and from the Hospital Supply Company to the Finance Committee for investigation and report.

The Committee on Supplies reported that there were not sufficient funds in the Department at this time to award contracts for food and forage. On the recommendation of that Committee it was moved, seconded and carried to defer action on the bids for food supplies and forage.

The Special Committee, consisting of the President and Secretary, appointed at the last meeting to inquire into the feasibility of using in the Out-Patient Department of Gouverneur Hospital the blank forms adopted by the Trustees on October 20th, presented blank forms to be filled out by the physicians proposed for that purpose. After discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried that the Board adopt, for an experimental period of one month, the forms as presented, but to consist of questions 1, 2, 7, 8, 9, 10, 12, 13, 14, as well as 5 and 6, if the Department does not obtain this information at present.

The Building Committee reported that it had made an examination of the floors of the balconies of Gouverneur Hospital and recommended that the General Medical Superintendent be instructed to repair them when funds become available. On motion duly seconded and carried this report was approved and the recommendations adopted.

The Conference Committee of Gouverneur Hospital recommended that there be created at that hospital the position of "Cystoscopist to the Hospital," and also the positions of "Consultant in Gastro-Intestinal Diseases" and "Ophthalmologist to the Hospital." On motion duly seconded and carried this report was approved and these places were created accordingly.

The Conference Committee of Gouverneur Hospital also recommended the appointment of Dr. Thomas Hendrick Russell as "Cystoscopist to the Hospital," and Dr. Robert Engl as Assistant Surgeon to Out-Patients. Upon motion duly seconded and carried this report was approved.

The Conference Committee of Gouverneur Hospital further reported that they had considered the request of the Medical Board to create the place of Physiological Chemist and equip a laboratory for his use, and stated that no provision has been made in the 1915 budget for this place and, as the department has no funds for this purpose, the Committee cannot recommend the creation of the place at this time. On motion duly seconded and carried this report was approved.

The Conference Committee of Harlem Hospital recommended the appointment of Dr. G. F. Duffy as Assistant Physician to Out-Patients, Male Medical Clinic; Dr. Luigi Celano, Assistant Physician to Out-Patients, gynecological clinic, and Dr. Arthur W. Uran, Assistant Physician to Out-Patients, Children's Clinic. On motion duly seconded and carried this report was approved and the appointments made accordingly.

Mr. O'Keeffe reported that he had inquired into the activities of the Out-Patient Department of Harlem Hospital and presented a comparative statement showing the amounts paid for the care of patients at the different hospitals of the department during 1913 and 1914. As there was a considerable decline in the amounts obtained for this source during 1914 it was moved, seconded and carried



to direct the General Medical Superintendent to inquire into the activities of the investigations at the allied hospitals, particularly at Harlem, and report at a future meeting.

The President reported that on November 5th he had an interview with the Comptroller, in order to see what could be done to expedite action on the department's request of August 26th for an issue of revenue bonds for the care of drug patients under the Boylan Law and the revision of Salary Schedule 2060, Bellevue Hospital, Temporary Employees, and that both these matters were placed on the calendar of the Board of Estimate on November 13th. The Comptroller also promised early action on the plans and specifications for (1) Out-Patient Department, Gouverneur Hospital and (2) the roof wards of pavilions A and B. On motion duly seconded and carried the report of the President was approved.

The President reported that he had requested McKim, Mead & White to inform him what the minimum corporate stock requirements would be for the construction of the next pavilion of the new Bellevue Hospital, and presented a letter dated November 12th, stating that the shell of the pavilions F and G could be constructed for \$800,000, and suggesting that this be done and that the work of the interior finish be deferred until more funds become available. After discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried to refer this communication to the Finance Committee for their information in the preparation of the corporate stock budget.

Mr. Farley reports that while on an inspection of Harlem Hospital he observed that transfer of patients from that hospital to the Department of Charities took place in the morning, a time which was very inconvenient to the hospital. He presented a letter from the Assistant Superintendent, under date of November 18th, relating thereto. After discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried to direct the General Medical Superintendent to determine what arrangements can be made to change the time for the transfer of patients from the hospitals in the department to those of the Department of Charities.

At the request of the Trustees Dr. Neff and Dr. Haines appeared before the Board as representatives of the Medical Board of Harlem Hospital and suggested a reorganization of the Out-Patient Department and the ward service of that hospital. As these proposals involved the enlargement of the Bureau of Inquiry, additional positions and a rearranging of the service, it was moved, seconded and carried, after considerable discussion, to request the Medical Board of Harlem Hospital to present a detailed plan setting forth such reorganization as they wish to recommend.

#### COMMUNICATIONS.

The minutes of the Executive Committee of the Medical Board of Bellevue Hospital for October 28th were presented. On motion, duly seconded and carried, it was resolved to authorize the appointment of representatives from the Executive Committee to confer with the Budget Committee of the Academy of Medicine in regard to the needs of Bellevue Hospital at an early period next year and before the departmental estimate for 1916 shall have been prepared.

The minutes of the Executive Committee of the Medical Board of Bellevue Hospital for November 11th were presented. On motion duly seconded and

carried the request that the Trustees secure for use in the entire hospital the type of history holders recommended by the Committee on Clinical Records was referred to the Committee on Supplies; the communication from the Fourth Division asking to be relieved of the care of the Children's Clinic in the Out-Patient Department, on account of the difficulty of obtaining men for the service was referred to Mr. Stern; the request for information relating to the appointment of Residents was considered, but as the department cannot provide living accommodations for these men until pavilions I and K are finished, no action could be taken at this time.

The minutes of the Medical Board of Fordham Hospital for November 6th were presented. The nominations of Dr. William Pincus and Dr. Theodore A. Clifton as Assistant Physicians to the Out-Patients, Medical Clinic, and Dr. S. W. Boorstein as Assistant Surgeon to Out-Patients (Orthopedics), were considered and on the recommendation of the Conference Committee, who had reviewed the nominations, it was moved, seconded and carried to approve these appointments.

A communication, dated November 16th, was presented from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, transmitting a resolution adopted on October 30th, requesting a review of the corporate stock requirements of the department and directing the preparation of a corporate stock budget for the year ending October 31st, 1915. On motion, duly seconded and carried this communication was referred to the Finance Committee for recommendations.

A communication dated November 4th was presented from Dr. George D. Stewart asking for permission to assign one of the research workers of New York University Medical School to the wards to work under the supervision of the Third Division. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this permission was granted.

A letter was presented from the Finance Department, dated November 9th, calling attention to the approaching expiration of the lease of the premises at 426 East 26th Street, Rooms 226-238, used for living quarters for the nurses of Bellevue Hospital. The President reported that he had requested the Sinking Fund Commission to renew this lease for one year with the privilege of renewal. It was moved, seconded and carried to approve the action of the President.

A letter, dated November 16th, was presented from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, transmitting resolutions adopted on October 31st, prescribed in the conditions under which the funds in the budget for 1915 are to be used. On motion, duly seconded and carried, the General Medical Superintendent was instructed to comply with these resolutions.

A letter was presented from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, dated November 10th, transmitting a resolution adopted on November 6th amending Salary Schedule 2062. On motion, duly seconded and carried this was placed on file.

On motion, duly seconded and carried it was resolved to hold the next regular meeting on Tuesday, December 1st, at 3.30 p. m.

A motion to adjourn the meeting was seconded and carried.

## COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at a Meeting Held in Room 16, City Hall, at 11 o'clock A. M., on Wednesday, December 16, 1914.

Present—John Purroy Mitchel, Mayor; Alexander Brough, Deputy and Acting Comptroller; Henry Bruere, Chamberlain; O. Grant Esterbrook, Acting President, Board of Aldermen, and Henry H. Curran, Chairman Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen.

The minutes of the meetings held December 2 and 9, 1914, were approved as printed.

The following communication was received from the Commissioner of Docks recommending a lease to John D. Antonopoulos of the privilege of operating stands at the St. George Terminal of the Staten Island Ferry:

Pier A, North River, November 27, 1914.  
Hon. JOHN PURROY MITCHEL, Mayor, and Chairman of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Sir—I beg to recommend that a resolution be adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund approving of and consenting to the execution of a lease by the Commissioner of Docks to John D. Antonopoulos of the privilege of operating stands at the St. George Terminal of the Staten Island Ferry.

Mr. Antonopoulos now holds this stand privilege at the St. George Terminal of the Staten Island Ferry and is paying a fee or compensation therefor at the rate of \$15,750 per annum, his present lease expiring at noon on May 1, 1915.

This stand privilege embraces the following:

(a) To vend, sell and furnish newspapers, books, periodicals, confectionery, soda water, bottled mineral waters, ice cream with soda water, cigars, tobacco and fruits and any other article which may at any time be included, at the discretion of the Commissioner of Docks. This privilege includes the use of the stand in the Terminal Building, which stand is the property of The City of New York. A small stand for the sale of newspapers may be maintained at the entrance to the Terminal Building.

(b) To maintain a stand for the vending, selling and furnishing of flowers in the Terminal Building, the flower stand or ice box to be furnished by and at the expense of the lessee and to remain his property.

(c) To maintain a stand on the outside concourse at the Terminal Building for vending, selling and furnishing fruit, this stand to be furnished by and at the expense of the lessee and to remain his property.

(d) To maintain a barber shop in the Terminal Building. The enclosure used for the purpose of a barber shop at the Terminal Building is a part of the ferry house and is the property of The City of New York.

(e) To maintain and operate restaurant in the Terminal Building. The restaurant



enclosure is a part of the Terminal Building and is the property of The City of New York.

(f) To maintain and operate a lunch counter in the Terminal Building, this lunch counter to be furnished by and at the expense of the lessee and to remain his property.

These stand privileges in the Terminal Building are for the purpose of promoting the comfort and providing for the convenience of the patrons of the Municipal Ferry system.

The lease to be for a term of three (3) years, beginning at noon on May 1, 1915, and the rental to be at the rate of \$15,750 per annum, payable quarterly in advance. The privileges leased are to be operated by the lessee under such restrictions and limitations as may from time to time be found necessary by the Commissioner of Docks. The equipment and fixtures, including chairs, tables, shelves, show cases, fountains, etc., are to be furnished by and at the expense of the lessee and are to remain his property. The City reserves the right to grant to other than the lessee the right and privilege to occupy space in the Terminal Building for the sale of newspapers, periodicals, etc., for wholesale distribution only. All charges for water, gas and electricity used by the lessee in the exercise of the privileges held by him are to be paid for by him, except the cost of such illuminant as shall be necessary for the general lighting of the ferry terminal, and the installation of all piping and wiring, except for the general lighting of the Terminal Building, is to be by and at the expense of the lessee. No installation of water, gas or electricity is to be effected by the lessee without the consent of the Commissioner of Docks and the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity. The lessee is to keep and maintain all stands and enclosures used by him in a clean, sanitary and orderly condition to the satisfaction of the Commissioner of Docks. The installation of stands or booths in the Terminal Building by the lessee is to be subject to approval by the Commissioner of Docks as to location, size, design, workmanship and materials. The storage and display of property owned by the lessee is to be confined within the limits of the stands and enclosures used by him. The lessee is not to assign or sublet the whole or any portion of the privileges without first obtaining the consent of the Commissioner of Docks in writing. The remaining terms and conditions of the lease shall be similar to those now contained in the leases of the stand privileges in the ferry terminal buildings.

The lease of the stand privileges at the St. George Terminal of the Staten Island Ferry was granted to Mr. Antonopoulos for three years from May 1, 1912, to May 1, 1915, after public auction, at rental of \$21,000 per annum. Subsequent to the auction several changes became necessary at the Terminal Building with reference to the trolley track layout, which were found to result in a loss of revenue to Mr. Antonopoulos. A reduction in the annual rental was allowed to \$15,750 per annum. An examination of the books of the lessee was made by this Department and it is felt that the annual fee or compensation now received by the City is a fair rental. The revenue derived by the City prior to May 1, 1912, for the stand privileges at the St. George Terminal amounted to but \$8,445 per annum.

Mr. Antonopoulos has invested a considerable amount of money in his equipment at the Terminal Building, including fixtures, etc. The stand privileges have been well conducted by him in a clean, reasonable and satisfactory manner, and in my opinion it is to the City's advantage to continue the privilege to him.

In connection therewith the Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution:

December 14th, 1914.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, The City of New York:

Gentlemen—Under date of November 27, 1914, the Commissioner of the Department of Docks and Ferries addressed a communication to the Mayor, as Chairman of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, recommending that a resolution be adopted by that Commission approving of and consenting to the execution of a lease by the Commissioner of Docks to John D. Antonopoulos for the privilege of operating stands at the St. George Terminal of the Staten Island Ferry. The question as to the advisability of the renewal of this lease has been referred to the Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics of the Department of Finance and the following report is submitted as a result of an examination therein made:

At the present time Mr. Antonopoulos holds the lease for the privilege at the St. George Terminal, which was awarded to him after public auction for a period from May 1, 1912, to May 1, 1915, at a rental of \$21,000 per annum. Subsequently certain changes were made in the trolley tracks which have proved unfavorable to the business carried on by the lessee and which resulted in a loss of revenue in operating this privilege. A request was accordingly made for a reduction in the annual rental, which, after an examination of the lessee's books had been conducted by representatives of the Department of Docks and Ferries, was reduced by \$5,250, thereby changing the annual rental to \$15,750 per annum.

The stand privileges operated in the Terminal Building at St. George are for the purpose of providing for the comfort and convenience of the patrons of the municipal ferries. Under the terms of the proposed lease beginning at noon, May 1, 1915, for a period of three (3) years the rental is to be fixed at the rate of \$15,750 per annum, payable quarterly in advance.

The privileges granted with the said lease are as follows:

(1) For the purpose of selling newspapers, books, periodicals, confectionery, etc., and any other article, at the discretion of the Commissioner of Docks. This stand is the property of The City of New York.

(2) To maintain a stand for the selling of flowers, the flower stand and ice box to be furnished by the lessee.

(3) To maintain a stand at the outside concourse of the Terminal Building for selling fruit, this stand to be furnished by and at the expense of the lessee.

(4) To maintain a barber shop in the Terminal Building. This barber shop is part of the ferry house and is the property of The City of New York.

(5) To maintain and operate a restaurant in the Terminal Building, which is the property of the City of New York.

(6) To maintain and operate a lunch counter to be provided by and at the expense of the lessee.

Prior to the award of this privilege under public bidding on May 1, 1912, the amount of rent received was but \$8,445 per annum. The lease was also then held by Mr. Antonopoulos, who states that he was forced to bid \$21,000 to protect his investment for equipment and fixtures, which he estimates cost about \$16,500 to install.

An examination of the changes made in the trolley tracks discloses the fact that the traffic has been diverted from its original course, that is to say, the public going to and from the cars and boats have been divided in two parts, which naturally has the effect of decreasing the revenue of the lessee.

Attached to this report is a statement marked "Exhibit A," which was prepared by representatives of the Department of Docks and Ferries, prior to the reductions in rent which was used as a basis for allowing the reduction.

The statement shows a substantial loss amounting to \$4,096.95 owing to the changed conditions referred to, which would appear to amply justify the deduction of 25 per cent in the rental which was allowed.

A further examination of the books of the lessee has been made by an examiner attached to the Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics covering the period from May 1, 1913, to May 1, 1914, the succeeding 12 months, with the object of making a full year's comparison. The records of the lessee are kept in Greek, the accounts of each stand being handled separately.

A statement has been prepared and is submitted marked "Exhibit B," which shows the receipts and disbursements for each stand and the difference representing the net profit or loss for the year ending April 30, 1914. This statement, marked "Exhibit B," which covers a period of one year, from May 1, 1913, to April 30, 1914, reflects a greater loss, namely \$5,341.03, than the preceding year, due to the rental for a portion of that year being charged at the rate of \$21,000 per annum. The falling off in business is no doubt partly due to business depression, and to the changes made to the trolley track layout previously mentioned. In reply to the question as to why, in view of the losses previously sustained by him, he desired to continue the lease now operated by him for an extended period, Mr. Antonopoulos stated that he felt sure that business would improve and that the population of the Borough of Richmond would increase. He also stated that he desired an opportunity to recover his losses and outlay for equipment by holding off for better times.

The records of the operation of the stands referred to since May 1 last to November 30, 1914, were not completed but an examination was made of the miscellaneous records and day books and the attached statement marked "Exhibit C" was prepared which shows a net loss of \$1,700.80 for that period. This would seem to indicate that about the same business conditions existed as previously. While this statement does not show as large a percentage of loss as that of the previous period allowance

must be made for the fact that the following five months, from December 1st, 1914, to April 30, 1915, will probably show an increased loss, owing to the natural falling off of business in the winter months.

The cost of installing the equipment and fixtures is shown in the following statement, which was compiled from the bills and records on file in the office of the lessee:

In the communication referred to the Commissioner of Docks states as follows:

"Mr. Antonopoulos has invested a considerable amount of money in his equipment at the Terminal Building, including pictures, etc. The stand privileges have been well conducted by him in a clean, reasonable and satisfactory manner, and in my opinion it is to the City's advantage to continue the privilege to him."

Investigation, borne out by this report, appears to support the recommendation made by the Commissioner of Docks, that the lease referred to should be renewed for a period of three years, and that the rent is fair and equitable.

The resolution attached hereto, if adopted by your Board, will grant the request authorizing the Commissioner of Docks to extend the lease herein referred to for a period of three years at the rate of \$15,750 per annum.

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby approve and consent to an extension of a lease formerly granted by the Commissioner of Docks, which lease is now held by John D. Antonopoulos, for the privilege of operating stands located at the Terminal Building at St. George, Staten Island, for a period of three years, at the same rental now paid by the lessee, amounting to \$15,750.00 per annum, which in other respects remain the same as provided for in the existing lease.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

The following communication was received from the Commissioner of Docks, transmitting offers received by him from George W. Johnson and Berri Noel for a lease of City property at Big Egg Marsh, Jamaica Bay:

November 19, 1914.

Hon. JOHN PURROY MITCHEL, Mayor, and Chairman of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Sir—During the year 1913 this Department received rents amounting to about \$10,405.06 per annum from permittees occupying City property at Big Egg Marsh, Jamaica Bay. These tenants are persons of moderate means, who have erected their own buildings, the City receiving rent for the land occupied. The buildings fringe the shore of the island and are without water, sewerage or other improvements, so that it has become absolutely necessary from a sanitary viewpoint that a water supply and other improvements shall be installed as soon as possible, as in its present condition the property is a menace to the community.

During the past year negotiations have been conducted by the Department with private individuals with a view to the improvement and development of the property by private capital, but until recently no offer has resulted which, in my opinion, was sufficiently advantageous to the City to be considered seriously.

It is not the intention to disturb the present tenants of the City, at least for some time, nor to increase the rents now paid by them, except in cases where special or general improvements have been made, and then only taking into consideration the amount of money invested in the improvements by private capital.

I transmit herewith copy of offers, submitted by George W. Johnson, of 116 Nassau Street, New York City, and Pierre Noel, of Flushing, Long Island, for a lease of the property. The terms and conditions of these propositions, other than the rental to be paid, are those insisted on by the Department.

I beg to suggest that the matter be referred to a committee of your Commission to confer with this Department to consider the propositions submitted, in order that whatever recommendation emanates from this Department will cover terms and conditions most advantageous for the City. Offer of George W. Johnson for Lease of Big Egg Marsh, Jamaica Bay, Borough of Brooklyn.

Proposed Lessee—George W. Johnson, 116 Nassau Street, New York City.

Description of Property—All that portion of Big Egg Marsh, Jamaica Bay, Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, which is owned by The City of New York, and such structures thereon as are owned by said City, together with all waterfront rights and appurtenances thereto.

Improvements—The lessee shall have the privilege of erecting bulkheads and other retaining structures, of dredging portions of the marsh lands, filling in the remaining sedge and marsh lands, of erecting and maintaining on property leased, buildings and other structures, and of making canals and basins; all of which improvements shall be constructed in accordance with the requirements of law, in accordance with the general plans to be submitted to and approved by the Chief Engineer of the Department of Docks and Ferries, and all such structures and improvements shall revert to and become the property of The City of New York at the expiration of the lease.

Term—The lease shall begin May 1, 1915, and shall be for a term of ten years, but the lessee shall have the right to enter upon the unoccupied portion of Big Egg Marsh, for the purpose of beginning the improvements and betterments herein provided for, on January 1, 1915, or as soon thereafter as the lease shall be executed by the Commissioner of Docks and the bond approved by the Comptroller.

Rental, First Term—The rental for the first term of ten years shall be at the rate of \$12,500 per annum, payable quarterly at the end of each quarter, and in addition \$10 per lot per annum for each lot or part of a lot which shall be improved or occupied by tents or structures of any description, exclusive of the lots now occupied by buildings, but in no case shall the rental for the first year be less than \$13,000. The word "lot" shall be understood to mean an area of 2,500 square feet.

Renewals—The lessee shall have the privilege of two renewals of ten years each upon giving three months' notice in writing to the Commissioner of Docks prior to the expiration of the preceding term.

Rental for Renewals—The rental for the renewals shall be 10 per cent. advance on the rental for the last year of the preceding term, and in addition \$11 per lot per annum for each lot which shall be improved or occupied by tents or structures of any description, exclusive of lots occupied by tents or structures at the beginning of said renewal term.

Expenditures in First Two Years—The lessee shall covenant and agree to improve and develop the property and to expend in actual construction work and betterments during the first two years of the term of the lease not less than \$20,000, which amount shall not include buildings for residential purposes, overhead charges, salaries of officers or employees of the lessee, advertising, legal fees and expenses, insurance, etc., and shall expend in addition during the first two years of the lease not less than \$20,000 additional for houses, bungalows, etc.

Examination of Accounts—The books and accounts of the lessee showing receipts from and expenditures made on the premises leased shall at all reasonable times be open for examination by the Commissioner of Docks or any person designated by him.

Present Tenants—It is understood and agreed that it is not the purpose to disturb the present tenants of The City of New York, nor shall the rents now paid by them be increased, except in cases where special or general improvements have been made, and then only taking into consideration the amount of money invested in the improvements with a reasonable profit, but it is absolutely necessary from a sanitary viewpoint that water supply and other improvements shall be installed as soon as possible, as the present condition of the property is a menace to the community.

Option to Present Tenants—The permittees of the City on January 1, 1915, or whenever this lease begins, shall have the option of a lease of the premises occupied under said permit for a period of two years from May 1, 1915, at the rental now paid, plus a reasonable additional charge for the improvements installed by the lessee under the terms of this lease, and in case the reasonableness of such charge is disputed by the permittee, the rent of such premises occupied under said permits until May 1, 1917, shall be fixed by the Commissioner of Docks.

Cancellation for Public Improvement—The lease shall contain a clause providing that if at any time after ten years from the commencement of the lease The City of New York shall determine to proceed with the work of building wharves, piers, bulkheads, basins, docks or slips for commercial purposes, which shall include any part of the premises hereby leased, according to any plan which may hereafter be adopted and approved, pursuant to any existing or future law, and if The City of New York shall determine that for such purposes it will be necessary to terminate the interest of the lessee in the property or any part thereof, then upon service upon the lessee of written notice from the Commissioner of Docks to that effect, describing the premises or the parts thereof affected thereby, the interest of the lessee in the said property or part thereof shall be terminated one year from the date of service

of such notice, and such proportionate deduction from the rent herein and hereby reserved shall be made by The City of New York as it shall deem to be just and reasonable, and no claim for damages or compensation in favor of the lessee by reason of the termination of such interest or for or on account of any construction or improvements that may have been made or erected upon the premises shall at any time be made by any person or persons whomsoever except as herein otherwise provided.

Notice of Cancellation—No notice of termination of said lease for the reasons specified in this paragraph shall be of any validity or effect until it shall have been approved by resolution of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, passed after a hearing of which not less than ten days' notice shall have been given to the lessee and a sufficient appropriation has been made by The City of New York for the purpose of carrying on the work of improvements of the part of the premises hereby leased and described in said notice.

Bond—The lessee shall furnish a bond in a sum to be fixed and with sureties to be approved by the Comptroller of The City of New York for the faithful performance of the covenants and conditions of the lease.

Remaining Terms—All the remaining terms and conditions of the lease shall be similar to those contained in leases of wharf property now used by this Department, except so far as they are inconsistent herewith.

Third term, \$287,500. To be divided as follows: First five (5) years, \$27,500 per year; next five (5) years, \$30,000. Average rental per year, \$28,750.

The rent specified above to be paid in equal quarterly payments, in advance, in each year of each term.

The lease to be subject to all existing leases or permits affecting any part of the premises heretofore described, and rents to be apportioned and all existing leases and permits to be terminated at a time to be mutually agreed upon; but in no event shall such leases or permits extend beyond May 1st, 1917.

If given a lease, I propose to enter upon a plan for the general development of the premises. I shall construct, under the supervision of the Engineers of the Dock Department, bulkheads, fill in land under water and erect buildings. It is my intention to furnish, within a reasonable time, a sufficient water supply as well as light, and to construct a proper sewage system.

I am prepared to furnish a bond for the faithful performance of the covenants on my part.

I shall be glad to hear from you at your earliest convenience, as to whether the terms herein stated are satisfactory. Very respectfully yours,

The Comptroller, to whom this matter was referred at meeting held December 9, 1914, presented the following report:

December 15th, 1914.

To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—At a meeting of your Board held December 9, 1914, there was referred to the Comptroller for consideration and report a communication from the Commissioner of Docks dated November 19, 1914, transmitting offers from George W. Johnson and Pierre Noel, for a lease of City property at Big Egg Marsh, Jamaica Bay.

As stated in the Commissioner's letter, the City is now receiving rents amounting to about \$10,405.06 per annum from permittees occupying this property, and the tenants are persons of moderate means who have erected their own buildings, the City receiving rent for the land occupied. The buildings fringe the shore of the island and are without water, sewerage or other improvements, so that it has become absolutely necessary from a sanitary view point that a water supply and other improvements shall be installed as soon as possible, as in its present condition the property is a menace to the community.

The Appraiser of Real Estate of this Department made an examination of the premises about a year ago in company with the Engineers of the Dock Department, and states that the facts set forth in the Commissioner's letter are true.

In view thereof, the question to determine is which of the two propositions is the better for the City to accept. George W. Johnson agrees to pay an annual rental for the first term of ten years, \$12,500, and in addition thereto, \$10 per lot per annum for each lot or part of a lot which shall be improved or occupied by tents or structures of any description, exclusive of the lots now occupied by buildings, but in no case shall the rental for the first year be less than \$13,000, the word "lot" being understood to mean an area of 2,500 square feet.

There are to be two renewals of ten years each, and the rental shall be 10 per cent. over that paid for the last year of the preceding term, and in addition thereto, \$11 per lot per annum for each lot which shall be improved or occupied, as heretofore mentioned.

He also agrees to expend in the actual construction work and betterments for the first two years of the term of the lease, not less than \$20,000, which amount shall not include buildings for residential purposes, overhead charges, salaries of officers or employees of the lessee, advertising, legal fees and expenses, insurance, etc., and shall expend in addition during the first two years of the lease not less than \$20,000 additional for houses, bungalows, etc.

With reference to the proposition submitted by Pierre Noel, the lease is to be for a term of ten years, with the privilege of renewal for two additional terms of ten years each, the rental, based upon three terms of ten years each, to be as follows:

First term, \$177,500; to be divided as follows: first three years, \$15,000 a year; next three years, \$17,500 a year; next four years, \$20,000 a year. Average rental per year, \$17,750.

Second term, \$237,500; to be divided as follows: first five years, \$22,500 per year; next five years, \$25,000. Average rental per year, \$23,750.

Third term, \$287,500; to be divided as follows: first five years, \$27,500 per year; next five years, \$30,000 per year. Average rental per year, \$28,750.

The rent specified above to be paid in equal quarterly payments, in advance, in each year of each term.

Since both of the applicants agree not to disturb the present tenants of the City for some time, nor to increase the rents now paid by them, except in cases where special or general improvements have been made, and then only taking into consideration the amount of money invested in the improvements by private capital and considering the fact that all these improvements and betterments must be constructed in accordance with the requirements of law, and according to general plans to be submitted to and approved by the Chief Engineer of the Department of Docks and Ferries, with the understanding that all of the structures and improvements shall revert to and become the property of the City of New York at the expiration of the lease, it is quite apparent that the proposition of Pierre Noel is much more favorable to the City than the one submitted by George W. Johnson.

In the former case the City would receive during the first ten years of the term \$7,500 per annum more than the City is now securing, viz: \$17,500, and this amount is \$4,500 more than the same guarantee in the Johnson offer.

Pierre Noel agrees to increase this rental about 40 per cent., namely, \$23,750 for the second ten-year term, while George W. Johnson proposes to increase the rental 10 per cent., or \$14,300, although this sum may be increased provided a sufficient number of lots be developed on a basis of \$11 a lot. There is no guarantee, however, as to the number of lots that will be developed, and I am of the opinion that Noel's 40 per cent. increase is much more advantageous to the City.



For the third renewal period of ten years Noel agrees to increase the rental for the second ten-year term about 25 per cent, namely, \$28,750, and Johnson agrees to an increase of rental of only 10 per cent. per annum, which would be \$15,730 per annum, and as set forth in the previous paragraph, this amount may be increased according to the number of lots they develop. No serious consideration need be given the fact that Johnson proposes to expend \$20,000 in improvements and \$20,000 additional in erecting bungalows and dwellings, for such an expenditure must be made by any one who intends to pay such an advanced rental over that now being received from the permittees now occupying this land. In other words, before any increased rental can be secured it will be necessary to provide water, sewerage facilities and electric light.

The advantage to be gained by the City in accepting the Noel proposition, as against the Johnson proposition, is so plain as to need no argument at my hands. I therefore recommend that your Board advise the Commissioner of Docks that the proposition submitted to Pierre Noel is more acceptable to the City, and that a lease in accordance therewith be recommended.

Discussion of the matter followed and the Commissioner of Docks was interrogated by members of the Board in regard to the matter.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution, relative to the redemption of \$100,000 of 3½ per cent. local improvement bonds of the City of Brooklyn maturing January 1, 1915:

In connection therewith the Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report of the Corporate Stock Budget Committee and offered the following resolution:

November 25, 1914.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—On August 15, 1914, the Secretary of the Armory Board, transmitted a copy of a resolution adopted by said Board on June 30, 1914, amending its resolution of October 11, 1907, which requested you to concur in an appropriation of \$625,000 in corporate stock for the erection of an armory for the Twenty-second Regiment Engineers. You are requested to include in the authorization the word, "equipment."

On June 12, 1912, your Board authorized \$70,300 in corporate stock for the equipping of the Twenty-second Regiment Armory. On November 21, 1914, there was an unencumbered balance of \$8,525.52 in this fund.

It is proposed to make available an unencumbered balance of \$9,879.33 in the corporate stock account authorized on May 5, 1909, for the construction of the Twenty-second Regiment Armory, together with the unencumbered balance of \$8,525.52 in the equipment authorization, to provide storage facilities for the said Armory, the plans for which were in the hands of the Engineer Officer of the Twenty-second Regiment.

After an examination of the plans by the Bureau of Contract Supervision it appears that, with slight modifications, sufficient storage facilities can be provided at the Twenty-second Regiment Armory by the expenditure of the unencumbered balance available in the account C. A. B.—24D, the present authorization for the equipment.

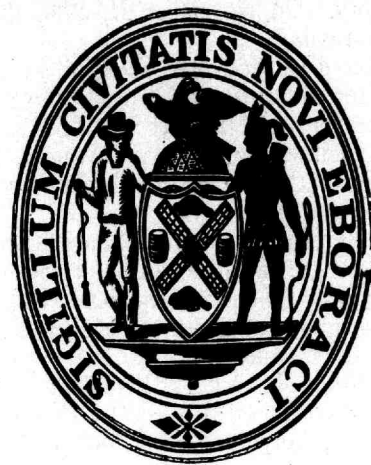

line of Maspeth Creek to the intersection of the same with a line bisecting the angle between the Southerly line of Hull Avenue and the Northerly line of Clinton Avenue, as the same are laid down West of Clark Avenue; thence westerly along said bisecting line to the intersection with a line midway between the Southerly line of Hull Avenue and the Northerly line of Clinton Avenue, as the same are laid down west of the angle in Clinton Avenue, about 188 feet west of Clark Avenue; thence westerly along said line midway between the Southerly line of Hull Avenue and the Northerly line of Clinton Avenue, and continuations thereof, to the intersection of the same with a line bisecting the angle between the Southerly line of Hull Avenue and the Northerly line of Clinton Avenue as the same are laid down between Clifton Avenue and Montgomery Avenue; thence westerly along said bisecting line to the Easterly line of Montgomery Avenue, the point or place of beginning.

AREA NO. TWO: Beginning at a point formed by the intersection of a line midway between the Southerly line of Hull Avenue and the Northerly line of Clinton Avenue with a line 100 feet Westerly of and parallel with the westerly line of Broad Street; running thence Easterly along the line midway between the Southerly line of Hull Avenue and the Northerly line of Clinton Avenue and the continuations of the same to the intersection of the same with the Easterly line of Mueller Street; thence Easterly and at right angles to Mueller Street, 100 feet; thence Southerly along a line 100 feet from and parallel with the Easterly line of Mueller Street to an intersection with a line at right angles to the Easterly line of Mueller Street where the same is intersected by the prolongation of the line midway between the Northerly line of Perry Avenue and the Southerly line of Clinton Avenue; thence westerly along said line at right angles to the Easterly line of Mueller Street to an intersection with the Easterly line of Mueller Street; thence westerly along the prolongation of and along the line midway between the Northerly line of Perry Avenue and the Southerly line of Clinton Avenue to an intersection with a line 100 feet westerly from and parallel with the westerly line of Broad Street; thence Northerly along said line 100 feet westerly from and parallel with the westerly line of Broad Street to the intersection with the line midway between the southerly line of Hull Avenue and the Northerly line of Clinton Avenue, the point or place of beginning.

Fourth—That, provided there be no objections filed to either of said supplemental and amended abstracts, our final report herein will be presented for confirmation to the Supreme Court of the State of New York, Second Department, at a Special Term thereof, for the hearing of motions, to be held in the County Court House in the Borough of Brooklyn, in The City of New York, on the 25th day of February, 1915, at the opening of the Court on that day.

Fifth—In case, however, objections are filed to either of said supplemental and amended abstracts of estimate and assessment, the notice of motion to confirm our final report herein will stand adjourned to the date to be hereafter specified, and of which notice will be given to all those who have theretofore appeared in this proceeding, as well as by publication in the City Record, pursuant to Sections 981 and 984 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by Chapter 658 of the Laws of 1906.

#### NOTICE TO BIDDERS AT SALES OF OLD BUILDINGS, ETC.

##### TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The sale will be as of the condition of the property on date of delivery thereof to the purchaser. The City of New York will not be responsible for any change or loss which may occur in the condition of the buildings, or their appurtenances between the time of the sale thereof and the time of delivering possession to the purchaser, after being properly vacated of all tenants. The sale and delivery to purchaser will be made as nearly together as the circumstances of vacating the structures of their tenants will permit.

All the material of the buildings, sheds, walks, structures and cellars of whatsoever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurtenances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foundations and the sidewalks and curb in front of said buildings, extending within the described area shall be torn down and removed from the premises. None of the dirt, debris or waste resulting from demolition shall be allowed to remain on the premises, except old mortar or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher at any point than two feet below the curb opposite that point. The exterior walls and their foundations shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. Where there is no curb the elevation of the surrounding ground shall be considered curb level. All wells, cesspools, sinks, etc., existing on the property must be filled to the level of the surrounding ground with clean earth.

The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw and remove all abandoned water taps and old service mains, and in place thereof cause to be inserted a brass plug in the main water pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that this has been performed.

The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all house sewer connections to the main sewer in

the street and the openings of the main sewer in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days from the day of possession, will work forfeiture of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances, or portion as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed, and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the day of possession, and the successful bidder will provide and furnish all materials of labor and machinery necessary thereto, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants, and each of them, against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against and from all damage and costs to which it, they or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the removal of said buildings.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate purchasers.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furrings, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beam-holes, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs and adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the Contractor.

##### GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any service, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or her name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
