



The Board of Police of the Police Department of the City of New York, in pursuance of the requirements of section 27 of chapter 335 of the Laws of 1873, and of your instructions, respectfully submit a report of the operations and action of the Police Department for the three months ending the 30th day of September, 1874.

#### APPLICATIONS FOR APPOINTMENT.

The number of persons who applied to the Board of Police for appointments to membership in the force, during the quarter, and were examined by the surgeons in respect to health and physical condition, was 120. Of this number 104 were passed and certified as sound and qualified, and 16 rejected as unsound and disqualified.

#### ARRESTS.

The total number of persons arrested for offenses by the Police force during the quarter (consisting of the months of July, August, and September) was 24,817, being 1,840 more than the preceding quarter.

In seven Precincts the arrests exceeded 1,000 in number, as follows: Fourth Precinct, 1,334; Sixth Precinct, 1,532; Eighth Precinct, 1,599; Tenth Precinct, 1,504; Fourteenth Precinct, 1,241; Eighteenth Precinct, 1,167; Twenty-first Precinct, 1,007.

## Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending October 31, 1874:

The number of inspections made by the Inspectors was 2,189, as follows, viz.: 3 public buildings, 1,179 tenement houses, 230 private dwellings, 101 other dwellings, 20 manufactorys and workshops, 30 stores and warehouses, 87 stables, 59 slaughter-houses, 2 dumping-grounds, 1 pond, 2 piers and docks, 5 fat-rendering establishments, 7 head and tripe establishments, 4 public sewers and drains, 42 sunken and vacant lots, 3 gut-cleaning establishments, 3 manure dumps, 1 smoke-house, 45 yards, courts, and areas, 78 cellulars and basements, 85 waste-pipes and drains, 119 privies and water-closets, 41 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 7 dangerous stairways, 2 cisterns and cesspools, 2 dangerous and smoky chimneys, 8 other nuisances, together with 23 visits of the Inspectors to cases of contagious diseases.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 527.

During the past week 57 complaints have been received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 81 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 72 houses, 72 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

13 cases of small-pox were removed to the hospital, by the Ambulance Corps.

Permits have been issued to consignees of 88 vessels to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

92 permits were granted to Scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks.

The following number of cases of contagious diseases were reported for the week ending October 31, 1874: Typhus fever, 1; typhoid fever, 16; scarlet fever, 38; measles, 7; diphtheria, 108; small-pox, 26; and cerebro-spinal meningitis, 1.

## HEALTH DEPARTMENT OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK, BUREAU OF VITAL STATISTICS, November 10, 1874.

## To the Secretary of the Board of Health:

SIR—In the week ending on Saturday, November 7th, there were 535 deaths reported in the city, and in the previous week there were 519 reported and 521 verified as actually occurring in that week. Of these deaths 144 and 136 were of infants under 1 year of age, and 228 and 238 were of children under 5 years of age, in the successive weeks. Pulmonary phthisis is charged with 79 and 86 deaths in the successive weeks, and the constitutional diseases, altogether, with 111 and 125 deaths; the local diseases—which are chiefly inflammatory,—with 173 and 176; and the zymotic—mostly preventable,—with 180 and 180 deaths in these respective weeks. Scarletina caused 8 deaths last week, and 45 in the four preceding weeks. Small-pox caused 14 deaths last week, and 44 in the four preceding weeks; and diphtheria destroyed 54 lives (53 children and 1 adult) last week, and 191 in the preceding four weeks. In the corresponding five weeks in 1873 diphtheria caused 171 deaths. As regards the endemic, and the domestically infectious characteristics of diphtheria, they are sufficiently manifested to warrant the increased endeavors which are put forth by sanitary officers and physicians to diminish the prevalence of this malady. That diphtheria is also epidemic in such a degree as to call for the most timely medical attention to every case of it, is obvious from the fact that in many country districts over a wide region beyond this city it is fatally prevalent. Up to the present time, during a period now considerably exceeding one year, the dwellings upon the well-drained, most cleanly, and naturally dry grounds of this city have enjoyed comparative freedom from this subtle malady. The accompanying chart shows where its fatal visitations were made during the past five weeks.

The rate of mortality the past four weeks has been equal to a yearly death-rate of 26.27 per 1,000 inhabitants. Last week it was equal to 26.75 per 1,000; and in that portion of the inhabitants which is of the age of five years and upward (88.2 per cent. of total population), the rate was only 16.80 per 1,000 yearly. As shown in the report for the third quarter of the year, it is the high rate of infant mortality which gives the excessive figures of the general death-rate. The reduction of that source of excess must depend chiefly upon better housing, and the domestic application of sanitary knowledge. For this purpose New York needs the most efficient organization of its methods of charitable and advisory aid. The death-rates are excessive, chiefly among the poor, the debased, and the ignorant.
