

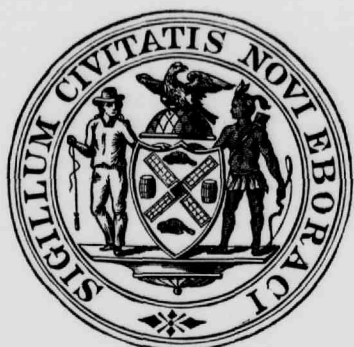

THE MARINE COURT OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK, }
NEW YORK, September 22, 1877. }

To the President and Members of the Board of Aldermen:

GENTLEMEN—Permit me to request that you will, if you approve, take such action in Common Council, and elsewhere, as will lead to the adoption of measures by which a suitable room and furniture may be at any time at the disposal of the Justices of the Marine Court in which to hold a term for trials by jury, Part IV, additional to the three parts for jury terms, and one special term, otherwise already assigned. There is an opportunity of holding such a term in November next, if a room and furniture can be procured in time. As the new Code of Civil Procedure seems to provide that the appointment of the term must be advertised for three weeks before the term is held, and as the appointment to be made by the Justices, ought to designate the place, it is manifestly important that the room should be reported to the Justices as secured, at the earliest practicable period. Complaints respecting the alleged condition of the Calendar of this Court have been rife for some years, and have probably come to your knowledge. From information received I am led to believe that a resolution in the form subjoined, would confer the requisite authority.

for every such building two cocks or faucets, to be affixed to the pipe for supplying the tanks, to one of which shall be attached hose of a length sufficient to reach any part of the floor or story, the other to be used in filling the tank, and for filling water pails or other vessels to be used immediately in case of fire, a sufficient supply of which, not less than six, to be kept constantly on each tank and ready for immediate use; and the said Superintendent of Buildings is hereby directed not to approve any plan for the erection of any such building unless the provisions of this resolution are strictly complied with.

I beg leave to forward to the Board of Health a petition from occupants of No. 401 East Sixty-fifth street. I have inspected this house and find that in four cases bullets have penetrated its windows, in one case narrowly missing an old man on the top floor. Three of these shots occurred a year ago, but one is recent. It is probable that the house has been struck many times, if the windows have been struck four times.

The arrangement at the Schutzen Park for the prevention of accidents would seem to be ample if the marksmen were skillful, careful and sober. As it is I consider it dangerous to allow firearms to be used in that locality, and I respectfully recommend that the Honorable Board of Aldermen be requested to investigate this matter, as the shooting is now permitted by virtue of an exception to a city ordinance.

Maintenance of Parks and Places.

Including wages of Foremen, Gardeners, Mechanics, and Laborers, etc., employed on works of maintenance, and also the maintenance of the Meteorological Observatory..... \$200,000 00

That a petition has been received from the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments, stating that an assessment of sixty-eight thousand eight hundred and sixty-three dollars upon the property of the Hamilton Fire Insurance Company liable to taxation in the year 1876, was erroneously omitted from the assessment-roll for that year; that said assessment has been placed upon the assessment-roll for the current year, and requesting the Board of Supervisors to proceed to levy a tax on the same at the rate per cent. of the tax imposed for the year 1876, according to the provisions of chapter 453, Laws of 1865.

Section 4 of chapter 756, Laws of 1873, provides as follows:

"It shall be the duty of the Board of Supervisors of the County of New York to include in any and every ordinance passed by them imposing and levying taxes for any purpose or purposes authorized by law, within the City and County of New York, such sum, in addition to the aggregate amount required for such purposes, as they shall deem necessary, not exceeding three per cent. of said aggregate amount, to provide for deficiencies in the actual product of the amount imposed and levied therefor."

For the purpose of providing for deficiencies in the actual product of the amount of taxes imposed and levied upon real and personal estates in the year 1877, your Committee recommend the addition of the sum of \$696,599.15, to the aggregate amount required to be raised by tax in the year 1877.

Every person bidding for a ferry franchise must state what percentage of the gross receipts collected at the landing place in the City of New York he will pay for the same. All moneys received for the conveyance of passengers, animals, vehicles, or freight from the City of New York, over any ferry route, to any of the opposite shores, to be collected at the landing place in New York, or if collected elsewhere, to be included in the receipts upon which such percentage is to be calculated and paid.
