

AQUEDUCT COMMISSION.

D. LOWBER SMITH, Deputy Commissioner of Public Works.

Minutes of Stated Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, held at their office, No. 209 Stewart Building, on Wednesday, August 31, 1887, at 2 o'clock P. M.

Present—Commissioners Dowd, Baldwin, Barnes, and Fish. Also, Chief Engineer Church, and Chief Engineer Birdsall of the Department of Public Works.

The minutes of the executive session and of the stated meeting of August 17 were read and approved.

The Committee of Finance and Audit reported their examination and audit of bills contained in Vouchers Nos. 2833 to 2900, inclusive, and, on motion of Commissioner Ridgway, the same were approved, and ordered certified to the Comptroller for payment.

The Committee also submitted the following report

The Committee also submitted the following report:

The Committee of Finance and Audit, after consideration of the application of E. P. Roberts,
Assistant Engineer, for leave of absence, with pay, from August 21 to September 10, 1887, on
account of severe illness contracted on the work, recommend that the same be granted, and submit
the following resolution for adoption by the Board:

Resolved, That E. P. Roberts, Assistant Engineer, be granted leave of absence, with pay, from
August 21 to September 10, 1887, on account of sickness contracted on the work.

On motion of Commissioner Fish, the report of the Committee was approved, and the resolution
adopted

adopted. The Committee on Construction made report, recommending that Charles S. Gowan, Division Engineer, be granted leave of absence from September 6 to September 26; and, on motion of Commissioner Barnes, the report was approved, and the leave of absence granted.

The Committee also reported that J. C. Ward had tendered his resignation as Rodman on the New Croton Aqueduct, and recommended that the same be accepted, to take effect on the 31st of

August. Adopted.

The Committee next submitted the following report:

The Committee on Construction recommend that Adrian C. Rapelje be appointed Rodman, in place of J. C. Ward, resigned, and that Charles S. Clapp be appointed Axeman, in place of James E. Towner, resigned.

The report of the Committee was approved, and the appointments made.

The Committee next made report, recommending that the resignation of Inspector James E. Hayes be accepted, and that the action of the Chief Engineer in suspending Inspector J. H. Decker and Inspector C. A. Carraher, and in asking for the resignation of said Carraher and Inspector F. T.

On motion of Commissioner Barnes, the report of the Committee was adopted.

The Committee next reported that the Chief Engineer, in compliance with the directions of the Commissioners of July 19, 1887, in regard to the lining of Shaft No. 1956, had, after an examination of the subject matter, recommended that the contractors be paid for the additional excavation required to prepare said shaft for lining, amounting to 240 cubic yards, at contract price, viz., \$7 per yard, as the advantages resulting from the lining of said shaft, instead of Shaft No. 19½, would justify the expense, and having examined into the matter, and being of the same opinion, we recommend the adoption of the same

On motion of Commissioner Barnes, the report was adopted.

The Secretary presented a communication from the Commissioners of Accounts, and addressed to the President, in which they state that they have examined the general account books and vouchers of the Commission for six months of the current year, ending June 30, and that they find the same correct. Ordered filed.

A communication was received from the Chief Engineer, dated August 31, recommending that P. W. Barlow be appointed Secretary to the Chief Engineer, at a salary to be fixed by the Board, to take effect September 1, 1887.

On motion of Commissioner Baldwin, the communication was referred to the Committee of

Finance and Audit.

The Comptroller, under date of August 20, gave notice of the issue of warrants for the payment of vouchers not certified to by the Aqueduct Commissioners—For New York County Section, \$450; Westchester County Section, \$450; and under date of August 27 gave notice of the issue of warrants for the payment of vouchers not certified to by the Aqueduct Commissioners – For Westchester County Section, \$182.57, and for advertising "Double Reservoir I," \$902.50. Which were ordered entered upon the books of the Commission and filed.

On motion of Commissioner Barnes, the Secretary was directed to notify the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the appointment of William Cichton as Assistant Clerk in the office of the Chief Engineer, and ask for their approval of the same, provided he deems such action necessary.

The Commissioners then adjourned.

DEAR SIR—The following amendment to Regulation 16 of the New York City Civil Service Regulations has been made:

If the appointing officer shall notify the Secretary of more than one vacancy at any one time, the Secretary shall certify to the appointing officer for appointment, the names of as many persons as there are vacancies to be filled, with the addition of two names for the first vacancy and one name for every two vacancies in addition and one name for every two vacancies in addition to the first.

DEAR SIR—The following resolution was passed by the Supervisory Board at their meeting, held May 27, 1887:

"Resolved, That in view of the inadequate space in the Secretary's office and in order to enable him more readily to discharge the business of the same, the Secretary is authorized to arrange the business of the office so that the same shall be open for personal interviews with appli-cants and the public during a part of the day only."

NUMEROUS APPLICATIONS HAVE BEEN made to this Department by citizens claiming reductions or rebates on bills for water supplied through meters, on the alleged ground of leakage caused by defective plumbing and worn-out service pipes, or by willful waste of water by tenants allowing the faucets to be turned on in full force in water-closets, sinks, etc., without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the premises.

out the knowledge or consent of the owners of the premises.

The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable this Department to detect and check the useless and unwarrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this object can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water wasted.

Under the law all charges for water supplied through meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the law therefore holds the owner of the premises responsible for the amount of water used or wasted.

Notice is therefore given to all householders that, in all further applications for reduction of water rents, in allowance will be made on account of waste of water occurring through leaks, from defective service pipes or plumbing, or wasteful use of water by tenants or occupants of buildings, though such leakage or waste may have occurred without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the buildings.

House-owners are further notified that whenever their premises become vacant, and are likely to remain vacant, they must notify this Department in writing, and that unless this requirement is complied with no deductions in extra water rents will he allowed for any portion of one year.
