That no privy vault or cesspool shall be allowed, within thirty feet of any tenement or lodging-house, hotel or manufactory, in the City of New York, of a greater depth than two feet; nor unless it be connected at the upper cut with the Croton water and at the lower end with the street sewer, and provided with an outlet at the lowest point and on the bottom, so as to admit of the complete discharge of the contents, whenever the outlet is opened and the vault or sink is flushed with water. The sides and bottom of every privy vault, cesspool or school sink in the City of New York must be impermeable and secured against any saturation of the walls or the ground about the same.

An application from Wm. H. McNeill for a permit to test the working of a machine for cutting and washing black guts, was received and on motion granted for four days.

Action of the Board on Tenement-house Plans.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending December 24, 1881:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,313, as follows, viz.: 3 public buildings, 549 tenement-houses, 85 private dwellings, 69 other dwellings, 6 manufactories and workshops, 15 stores and warehouses, 28 stables, 45 slaughter-houses, 1 manure dump, 1 gas-main, 1 public park, 1 ash and garbage dump, 1 roadway, 11 sunken and vacant lots, 1 cemetery, 1 lodging-house, 1 smoke-house, 50 yards, courts, and areas, 75 cellars and basements, 130 waste-pipes and drains, 206 privies and water-closets, 10 stores and warehouses, 5 dangerous stairways, 3 smoky chimneys, 2 cesspools, 7 other nuisances.

The number of reports thereon received from the Sanitary Inspectors was 364.

During the past week 130 complaints have been received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were granted to the consignees of 58 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

80 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 179 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 134 houses, 134 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

19 cases of contagious disease were removed to the hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 515 births, 46 still-births, 189 marriages, and 762 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, December 24, 1881; this shows an increase of 21 births, 9 marriages, and 14 deaths, and a decrease of 7 still-births when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1880, there was an increase of 92 births, 2 still-births and 115 deaths, and a decrease of 11 marriages. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from small-pox decreased 1; measles, 1; whooping cough, 2; puerperal diseases, 6; alcoholism, 2; cancer, 7; phthisis pulmonalis, 14; bronchitis, 3; heart diseases, 7; aneurism, 1; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 1; meningitis and encephalitis, 4; convulsions, 9; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 11; enteritis, gastro-enteritis, gastritis, and peritonitis, 1; premature and preterm births, 6; surgical operations, 2; while the deaths from scarlatina increased 24; diphtheria, 10; erysipelas, 2; typhoid fever, 2; cerebro-spinal fever, 4; malarial fevers, 1; diarrhoeal diseases, 8; inanition, 6; pneumonia, 4; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 4; apoplexy, 4; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 2; Bright's disease and nephritis, 10; and suicide, 1. The number of deaths from cyanosis and atelectasis and drowning was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week 125 were in institutions, 411 in tenement-houses, 203 in houses containing three families or less, 9 in hotels and boarding-houses, 10 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 9 were on the basement floor, 156 on the first, 193 on the second, 148 on the third, 92 on the fourth, 23 on the fifth, 2 on the sixth. 753 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 9 non-residents; 80 were stated to be single, 157 married, 77 widowed, and the condition of 448 was not stated, these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 762; still-births, 46; bodies in transitu, 14; of the total burial permits issued for city and still-births 85 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 515 births; 189 marriages; 46 still-births; 762 deaths; 14 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed and tabulated. 69 searches of the registers of births, marriages and deaths were made, and 7 transcripts of the birth record, 3 of marriage and 34 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending Dec. 24, 1881, was 40.5 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 30.048, the mean humidity was 79, saturation being 100, the number of miles

traveled by the wind was 1,220, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.75 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph. D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 699 deaths and still-births, or 86.51 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 19; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 299; City, pauper burial ground (undenominational), 78; Greenwood (undenominational), 54; Lutheran, (undenominational), 109; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 23; Evergreen (undenominational), 44; Woodlawn (undenominational), 27; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 9; Union (Methodist Protestant), 2; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 8; Machpelah, L. The actual mortality for the week ending Dec. 17, 1881, was 735; this is 82 more than the number that occurred during the corresponding week of the year 1880, and 223.6 more than the average of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 30.34 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,259,670.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH of the Health Department of the City of New York, held at its office on the 27th day of December, 1881, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That, under the power conferred by law upon the Health Department, the following additional ordinance of the Sanitary Code for the security of life and health, be and the same is hereby adopted, and declared to form a portion of the Sanitary Code:

§ 206. That no privy vault or cess-pool shall be allowed within thirty feet of any tenement or lodging house, hotel or manufactory in the City of New York, of a greater depth than two feet; nor unless it be connected at the upper end with the Croton-water and at the lower end with the street sewer, and provided with an outlet at the lowest point and on the bottom, so as to admit of the complete discharge of the contents whenever the outlet is opened and the vault or sink is flushed with water. The sides and bottom of every privy vault, cess-pool, or school sink in the City of New York must be impermeable and secured against any saturation of the walls or the ground about the same.
