

THE SPECIAL ORDER OF THE DAY,

being a report of the Committee on Lands, Places and Park Department, with resolution requesting the Counsel to the Corporation to transmit to the Legislature of the State An act entitled An act to amend chapter 522 of the Laws of 1884, entitled "An act laying out public places, and parks and parkways in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards of the City of New York, and in the adjacent district in Westchester County, and authorizing the taking of the lands for the same," was taken up for consideration; the act alluded to being as follows:

Section 1. Section one of chapter 522 of the Laws of 1884, entitled "An act laying out public places and parks and parkways in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards in the City of New York and in the adjacent district in Westchester County, and authorizing the taking of the lands for the same," is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Section 1. All that certain piece or parcel of land situate, lying and being in the Twenty-fourth Ward of the City of New York, to wit:

Sec. 2. Section 2 of said act is hereby amended by adding thereto, at the end thereof, the following words:

The said Commissioners of Estimate shall proceed to make the estimate of the damages arising from the taking of the several parks, parkways and boulevard enlargement as hereinbefore provided separately, and shall finish and conclude the estimate of the damages arising from the taking of each one of said parks, parkways and boulevard enlargement before proceeding to make such an estimate as to any other of them, and in making such separate estimates is the said Commissioners shall first proceed to make said estimate as to that one of said parks, parkways or boulevard enlargement which is neart furthest removed from said Harlem river, and shall then proceed to make such estimates in which said parks, parkways and boulevard enlargement shall be found to be relatively distant from said Harlem river, the last estimate to be made being of the damages arising from the taking of that one of said parks, parkways or boulevard enlargement which is furthest from said Harlem river.

Sec. 3. This act shall take effect immediately.

Alderman Van Rensselaer moved to amend the fourth subdivision of the first section by inserting before the words "feet westerly and parallel," in the tenth line, the words "and twenty"; also by striking out the word "northerly" before the words "line of Broad street," in the fifteenth line of said subdivision four, and inserting in lieu thereof the word "westerly."

Sec. 2. Section two of said act is hereby amended by adding thereto, at the end thereof, the following words:

"The said Commissioners of Estimate sha

to the Supreme Court, shall deposit a true report or transcript of such estimate in the office of the Commissioner of Public Works of the City of New York, for the inspection of whomsoever it may concern, and shall give daily notice by advertisement in the newspaper or newspapers mentioned in the last preceding section, for thirty days after depositing such report as aforesaid of the said deposit thereof in the said office, and of the day on which such report will be presented to the said court; and any person or persons whose rights may be affected thereby, and who may object to the same or any part thereof, may within thirty days after the first publication of such notice, set forth their objections to the same in writing to said Commissioners, who shall, after hearing the parties so objecting, thereupon reconsider their said estimate, or the part or parts thereof so objected to, and in case the same shall appear to them to require correction, but not otherwise, they shall and may correct the same accordingly."

Sec. 4. Section four of said act is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

"Sec. 4. The said Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York shall within four calendar months after the first day of January next succeeding the confirmation of each of said reports, pay to the parties entitled thereto the respective sum or sums so estimated and reported in their favor respectively, and in detault thereof such persons or parties respectively, his, her or their respective heirs, executors, administrators, successors or assigns, may sue for and recover the same with lawful interest from and after demand therefor, and the costs of the suit. The Board of Estimate and Apportonment in each year in which a report, or reports, shall have been confirmed as provided in this act, may include and appropriate in the final estimate for the ensuing year a sufficient sum to pay the amount of damage and expenses included in any report or reports which may have been confirme

Of the total number of deaths reperted for the week, 148 were in institutions, 385 in tenement-houses, 180 in houses containing three families or less, 7 in hotels and boarding-houses, 6 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 15 were on the basement floor, 141 on the first, 186 on the second, 132 on the third, 88 on the fourth, 20 on the fifth, 0 on the sixth; 725 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 11 non-residents; 98 were stated to be single, 190 married, 114 widowed, and the condition of 334 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week were as follows, viz.: City deaths, 736; still-births, 53; bodies in transitu, 12; of the total burial permits issued for city and still-births, 101 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 682 births, 241 marriages, 53 still-births, 736 deaths; 12 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed and tabulated; 111 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 13 transcripts of the birth record, 7 of marriage, and 61 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending February 13, 1886, was 36.4 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29,979; the mean humidity was 90, saturation being 100; the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,443, and the total amount of rain-fall was 3.41 inches depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph. D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 153 were in institutions, 353 in tenementhouses, 154 in houses containing three families or less, 11 in hotels and boarding-houses, 3 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 12 were on the basement floor, 130 on the first, 175 on the second, 107 on the third, 65 on the fourth, 29 on the fifth, 0 on the sixth; 657 were stated to be residents of New York City and 17 non-residents; 116 were stated to be single, 177 married, 96 widowed, and the condition of 285 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 674, still-births, 75 bodies in transitu, 16; of the tetal burial permits issued for city deaths and still-births, 72 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 600 births, 224 marriages, 76 still-births, 674 deaths; 16 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed and tabulated; 148 searches of the registers of births marriages and deaths were made, and 10 transcripts of the birth record, 10 of marriage and 100 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending February 20, 1886, was 33.4 degrees Fahrenheit, the mean reading of the barometer was 20.863; the mean humidity was 83, saturation being 100; the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,643, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.04 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph. D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.
