BRIDGES OVER THE EAST RIVER.

No. 1—Brooklyn Bridge.

During the quarter plans and specifications have been prepared providing for a limited extension of the Manhattan terminal station of the bridge railway that, when consummated, will afford limited relief to overcrowded traffic conditions prevalent at certain hours of each day, and also permit improvement in the desirable through-train service over the bridge. These plans have received the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the requisite authority has been granted empowering the Department to proceed with the undertaking, and it is hoped that contracts will be closed and the work completed at an early date.

The vehicular and passenger traffic over the bridge has been maintained with the usual regularity; the weather conditions at times tended to cripple and impede city traffic in general, yet the train and car service on the bridge was but slightly delayed. The injuries received by persons upon the bridge were comparatively few and generally not serious—one exception, that of a young man who was killed while attempting to board a train in motion that was leaving the platform.

The following statement of the typical week day and Sunday average passenger travel on the bridge railway was compiled from actual counts made for several hours of each day, varied weekly, during the months of February and March last:

From the foregoing statement it will be seen that of about 221,980 passengers carried on the bridge railway each weekday, 78,490 persons cross between 6 A. M. and 10 A. M., and 81,120 persons between 4 P. M. and 7 P. M., a total of 159,610 passengers, or almost 72 per cent. of the total average travel. As indicated in the statement, these passengers are carried in bridge trains, and are therefore required (except local passengers) to transfer in the Brooklyn station to or from elevated railway trains during the hours mentioned.

The present weekday train service consists of about 530 elevated railway trains, composed of from two to five cars each, as traffic requires, operated by electric power, from seven distinct railway lines in Brooklyn; and about 313 bridge local four-car trains, operated by cable in the morning and evening rush hours only.

The surface car service has been suspended a number of nights during the month of March to permit extensive repairs to the car track on the bridge roadways. The total number of car round-trips during the quarter was:

No. 2—Williamsburg Bridge.

During the quarter no new work was undertaken, and but little accomplished on the outstanding contracts, owing to the severe weather conditions.

Comfort Stations—The plumbing, windows, doors and weather-proofing of the pipes were finished early in January, and the contract completed on January 26, 1905.

Conduit Tracks—The work remaining under this contract was sufficiently completed on February 9 to allow the operation of the New York City Railway Company's cars to begin, the Fourteenth Street Crosstown Line commencing operations on that date, and on the 15th of February the Eighth Street Crosstown Line commenced running, and have continued to do so without interruption.

Footwalk Railing—On March 6, 1905, contract was entered into with the William Bayley Company for the erection of a lattice railing on the inner side of the footwalks across the bridge, but none of this material has yet been delivered.

No. 3—Manhattan Bridge.

Office Work—The work has been confined almost exclusively to the computation and preparation of the contract plans for the superstructure extending from anchorage to anchorage, including the main towers, cables and fastenings, and the suspended stiffening trusses and floor. These plans are now almost fully outlined and are approaching the finished state. A considerable amount of work has also been done toward the development of approach and terminal plans on the Manhattan side, both in this office and by Messrs. Carrere & Hastings, consulting architects.

Construction—The contracts for the construction of the anchorages, the bids for which were received December 22, 1904, were awarded about the middle of January, the Brooklyn anchorage to the Kosmos Engineering Company of Brooklyn, and the Manhattan anchorage to the Williams Engineering and Contracting Company of Manhattan.

The Kosmos Engineering Company began February 6 sinking three test pits on the anchorage site, and also fitting up offices in one of the buildings on the bridge property. The work during the month of February consisted of excavating test pits and driving test piles, also delivering material for the contractor's plant. There was some delay because of bad weather. The removal of buildings from the anchorage site was begun during the second week of March and the excavation for the anchorage foundation was commenced with one traveling derrick bucket hoist the 11th of that month, and during the following week another one was installed. The work during the month of March was confined principally to the installation of construction plant, consisting of docks, trestle, tracks, etc., but about 2,000 yards of excavation for anchorage foundation was done and a part of the sewer from Water street to Plymouth street was constructed.

The Williams Engineering and Contracting Company has done nothing at the Manhattan anchorage site except to deliver four large derricks, some iron lattice girders, track rails, etc., and construct a fence across Cherry street, and to tear out some of the partitions and floors of the Seaman's Home Building.

The Hecker Mills at Cherry, Pike and Water streets, and also the warehouse on the opposite side of Cherry street, are still occupied with a large quantity of cereals and flour, but the company seems to be making all possible haste to get out and is much hampered by lack of storage room elsewhere.

No. 4—Blackwell's Island Bridge.

Checking and approval of drawings—In December, 1904, the contractor submitted four albums containing the general and detail drawings and stress sheets. These drawings were approved by the Chief Engineer and the Consulting Architect in February, 1905. Since then good progress has been made and all of the contractor's stress sheets and shop drawings for the Island span, with the exception of one or two sheets of promenade beams and channels, have been checked, corrected and approved. About one-third of the shop drawings of the cantilevers of the Island span have been submitted and checked; 21 general drawings and stress sheets and 243 shop drawings have been finally approved; preliminary approval has been given on 50 drawings.

Manufacture—The total amount of material rolled, inspected and delivered at shops is 1,594 tons, 2,780 tons have been manufactured and 1,245 tons have been delivered at bridge site.

Erection of falsework—The contractor has completed the landing dock and erection plant on Blackwell's Island, and has in operation a large power plant for generating electricity and for compressing air. Derricks are in position and 65-ton gantries are distributing the received material. Erection of the steel falsework has been in progress since December last. Bents Nos. 58 to 72, inclusive, have been erected. The complete falsework and travelers Nos. 1 and 2 will be erected before the middle of April.

Erection—Most of the lower floor beams and stringers for the Island span have been received at the bridge site. Some of the lower chords and box girder tie for Pier No. 2 are in transit. Failure of the sub-contractor to deliver steel castings on time may delay erection for a week or two.

Masonry—On account of the severe winter little progress has been made on the masonry of the stair and elevator shafts of the anchor piers in Manhattan and Queens. No work has been done on any of the other piers.

New York Steam Company—The chimney for the New York Steam Company, completed in December last, has been connected to the flues of the boilers.

Approaches—The Consulting Architect has submitted small scale sketches for the approaches. The Manhattan approach shows a concrete and stone structure. Calculations and sketches of detail are being made on a tentative layout of an all-steel approach in Queens.

BRIDGES OVER THE HARLEM RIVER AND IN THE BOROUGH OF MANHATTAN—MAINTENANCE.

No. 1—Willis Avenue Bridge.

The work of erecting a fascia plate has been carried on when nothing more pressing demanded attention. It is now complete for the whole length of the north side of the bridge and approaches, and erection has begun on the south side.

New doors and door frames have been made and fitted to four Bridgetenders' houses in place of the old ones which were a poor protection against the weather.

A carpenter shop has been fitted up on the first floor of the building owned by this Department at No. 700 Southern Boulevard, and the upper floors of the building adapted to the use of the Engineer Corps in the Borough of The Bronx.

No. 3—Third Avenue Bridge.

The engine and boiler rooms have been painted, and vestibules with glass sides and front have been built outside the main doors of engine room, so that in operating the draw the engine man can step outside the door into a vestibule commanding a view of the river, without being exposed to the weather.

No. 6—Macomb's Dam Bridge.

When the weather has permitted, painters have been at work on the Bronx approach, and the under body of the structure from One Hundred and Sixty-first street to Sedgwick avenue approach is now practically completed. The engine room was painted during bad weather.

Sheet-iron chutes have been built through the lower chords of draw spans so that the chord gratings can be raised and snow shoveled from the draw into the river.

The shop on fender pier has been enlarged, and a derrick erected for the convenient handling of material.

New doors, windows and frames have been made and fitted to the four Bridgetenders' houses to replace old doors and windows which did not keep out the weather.

No. 8—Washington Bridge.

The three-inch gas-mains laid in the sidewalks on both sides of the bridge have occasionally given trouble by breaking during cold weather, due to their not being able to respond to unusual temperature changes. Three stuffing box expansion joints have been put in the mains and others will be introduced as the necessity for them develops. Connection with the lamps has been restored, and broken lanterns have been repaired.

CONSTRUCTION.

No. 1—Willis Avenue Bridge.

Work on the Southern Boulevard approach, which was suspended on account of cold weather, has not yet been resumed, but a considerable quantity of steel work is in process of manufacture at the shops, and sixty-six tons of completed material has been shipped for erection.

Granite has been cut at the quarry during the winter, and a large proportion of the necessary amount has already been shipped.

No. 5—One Hundred and Forty-fifth Street Bridge.

The severe weather has not permitted much work during the quarter just ended, but the machinery is now being assembled and erected with a prospect of swinging the draw and taking on the pavement in a few weeks.

No. 9—University Heights Bridge.

Plans for the completion of the bridge and approaches were presented to the Art Commission December 22, 1904. They were approved January 13, 1905. A form of contract and specifications has been prepared and bids advertised for, which will be opened April 11, 1905.

BRIDGES IN THE BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.
MAINTENANCE.

No. 1—One Hundred and Thirty-fifth Street and Mott Haven Canal Bridge. The machinery was overhauled and adjusted. Only a few small repairs were necessary and the bridge has been maintained in good order at a trifling expense.

No. 2T—Westchester Avenue Bridge—Temporary.

No repairs were needed and the bridge was little used on account of the closing of Westchester avenue, east of the Bronx river, by the contractor grading that thoroughfare. We shall be able to abandon this crossing during the coming quarter.

No. 2—Westchester Avenue Bridge—Permanent.

Repairs were made to the hauling cable and the Harlem river repair gang erected a substantial railing on the abutments. The greater part of the small traffic on Westchester avenue has lately used this bridge in preference to the temporary.

No. 3—Unionport Bridge.

A survey, plan and estimate for shifting the present crossing one block north, preparatory to building a modern bridge at this point, were made during the winter. Studies were also made for the new bridge.

No. 4T—Pelham Bridge.

A few repairs were made to the deck and to the trestle sidewalk along the causeway approach. This bridge will need further attention during the ensuing quarter.

No. 5—City Island Bridge.

The roadways of the approaches were repaired. The asphalt roadway on the bridge will need resurfacing early this season.

No. 6—Eastchester Bridge.

No repairs were made. The structure will be adequate for the present light traffic until it shall have been replaced by the draw span now used for Westchester avenue temporary bridge.

No. 11—Farmer's Bridge.

No. 13—King's Bridge.

As these crossings were completely rebuilt during the preceding quarter they required little care.

BRIDGES PROJECTED OR UNDER CONSTRUCTION.

No. 4—New Pelham Bridge.

On account of the severe winter no work was possible on the foundations since December 8. The condition is therefore the same as that reported on January 1, 1905. During the first few weeks of the quarter the 8-inch water main under Eastchester Bay was relaid and is now in service.

Southern Boulevard Approach, Willis Avenue Bridge.

This work was also suspended during the winter, but shipments of steel have already been begun, and I am informed that some of the stone facing of the retaining walls is quarried and cut.

General.

The laboring force was engaged principally in removing snow and in making small repairs.

The Engineers worked on record plans of bridges under construction, force accounts and similar office work. They made studies for projected work and estimates for the same, superintended test borings, made surveys and prepared sketches for repairs and small improvements to existing structures by the repair gang.

As all the bays and streams were ice-bound until about the middle of March, the account of bridge openings and of water traffic is very small, excepting on Mott Haven canal, where the water is warm on account of discharge of condenser water from steam plants.

BRIDGES OVER NEWTOWN CREEK AND IN THE BOROUGH OF QUEENS.

BRIDGES OVER NEWTOWN CREEK.

No. 1—Vernon Avenue Bridge—Construction.

The erection of structural steel has been completed and April 15 is set as the date of the completion of the riveting. The structure from the north leaf to abutment has received two field coats of paint, and work has been commenced on south side by the painting of the south viaduct.

All the counterweight for the north leaf has been placed, and all but thirty-five tons has been placed on south leaf. Each leaf has 315 tons of counterweight, and the amount left out on south leaf offsets the weight of timber, tracks and railing which are yet to be placed.

The operating machinery has been set up on both leaves, and that of the north leaf has been turned by hand with satisfactory result. Owing to the position of the south leaf this could not be done until electric motors are in place. The hand railing is completed with the exception of that on the south Scherzer bridge span.

The creosoted roadway stringers and four-inch under flooring on north Scherzer bridge span is about three-fourths completed. The sidewalk stringers are in place and about one-third of the sidewalk planking has been laid.

The laying of the "kosmocrete" sidewalks on north viaduct has been resumed.

The filling between the walls of the south approach has been commenced, and it is the intention to continue this filling until the streets and avenue have been brought to the new subgrades. Bids for laying trolley tracks, building two stairways at the corner of Borden and Vernon avenues, and the reconstruction of roadway (bridge) expansion joints were received on January 19, 1905, and Cooper & Evans, the lowest bidders, were awarded the contract for this work at a lump sum price of \$19,480. Work has been commenced on this contract by the reconstruction of the expansion joints. The rails have been rolled and have been delivered to machine shop for finishing. Shop drawings for stairways have been approved and their early completion is looked forward to.

The structure on March 31 was 85 per cent. completed, and its completion may be fixed at about July 15, 1905.

No. 1T—Temporary Bridge at East Avenue.

The east sidewalk and railing of the Brooklyn approach and the west sidewalk and railing of the Queens approach, damaged by passing vessels, have been repaired. This bridge is getting its usual knocks from the creek traffic, and its early discontinuance (at the completion of the new bridge) is hoped for.

No. 2—Greenpoint Avenue Bridge.

This structure is in good condition. The operating wedges at one end of draw span have been removed and planed to allow of their action in unison with those at other end of draw. The centre latch pocket (iron casting) has been renewed.

No. 3—Meeker Avenue Bridge.

The sidewalk planking and wheel guard removed, to permit of repairing damage to draw span posts by tugs "Starbuck" and "Boy" on November 29, 1904, have been replaced. No other repairs necessary.

No. 4—Grand Street Bridge.

Two panels of hand railing, broken by being hit by tugs of the Newtown Creek Towing Company, have been repaired. Department force built timber bulkhead at east end of east approach, to hold sidewalk material, and also laid extra flooring in loft of shelter house.

No. 5—Metropolitan Avenue Bridge.

Reconstruction completed with the painting of hand railing and fascia.

BOROUGH OF QUEENS BRIDGES.

No. 6—Borden Avenue Bridge.

Roadway planking renewed in part. Four thousand feet of 3-inch timber used in replanking. New single and compound gearing and shafting, to replace the broken gears, etc., have been provided. Plans for a new bridge are under way, and it is expected that the necessary funds will be secured for its construction.

No. 7—Flushing Creek Bridge—Construction.

The removal of the old bridge superstructure has been completed by the taking up of the draw span rack, track, rollers, etc. No other work done on this contract. About 750 foundation piles have been received at bridge site.

The delay in the appointment of Commissioners to acquire land for permanent bridge has practically stopped all field operations in the matter of construction of the permanent bridge. Three Commissioners were appointed on January 18, and title to property will vest in the City on May 6, 1905. The contractor expects to begin operations about April 15.

No. 7T—Temporary Bridge at Flushing.

This bridge is working satisfactorily. Practically nothing has been expended in the maintenance of this structure since its opening to traffic. This is quite an item, especially so when its distance from the shops is so great.

No. 8—Strong's Causeway Bridge.

This structure is in fair condition and required no repairs during the quarter.

No. 9—Little Neck Bridge.

Your attention is again called to the necessity of a new bridge to replace the present inadequate structure. This bridge accommodates, in a way, the present traffic and perhaps will answer until the completion of the new bridge at Flushing creek. No repairs on present structure during quarter.

BRIDGES IN THE BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN AND RICHMOND.

BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN.

Construction.

Three of the four new bridges over Gowanus canal, which have been under construction during the past year, have been completed. These bridges are at Hamilton avenue and Union street, which were opened on March 4, and at Third street, which was opened on March 31. The work on the street approaches to the Hamilton Avenue Bridge have not been completed, being delayed by the winter weather and the use of a portion of Smith street for an approach to the temporary bridge.

The fourth bridge, Ninth street, the construction of which was delayed until the Hamilton Avenue Bridge was completed, was started on March 10, and considerable headway has been already made. The old centre pier has been removed, dredging completed, and three-quarters of the bearing piles have been driven.

While this bridge is being built the cars of the Coney Island and Brooklyn Railroad Company are using the Union Street Bridge.

Maintenance.

The Metropolitan Avenue Bridge has been painted and minor repairs have been made as required.

BOROUGH OF RICHMOND.

The bridge at Princess Bay over Lemon creek is beyond repair, and plans are being made for a temporary bridge, which will serve the double purpose of replacing quickly this worn out structure and also expedite the construction of the permanent bridge, when funds are supplied for that purpose.

The bridge openings for the quarter are given on the accompanying sheet.

The Committee on Transfers recommended that the transfer of Mr. Henry M. Murray, from the position of Bookkeeper in the Department of Finance to a similar position in the Department of Parks, Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, be approved. The recommendation of the Committee on Transfers was adopted.

The report of the Chief Examiner on the examinations conducted by him during the month of March was ordered filed.

A report was presented from Examiner Byrne on the matter of the employment of Dennis Gerrity in the Department of Public Charities, which employment had been complained of by the Civil Service Reform Association on the ground that the same was not appropriate to the title under which Mr. Gerrity appeared on the pay-roll—Laboratory Assistant. The report of Examiner Byrne showed that Mr. Gerrity had been employed in the Department of Public Charities for twenty-five years under the various titles of Apothecary, Assistant Chemist and Laboratory Assistant; that he had at times the entire direction of the bureau in which he was employed without ever having his efficiency brought into question; that his title had been changed to Laboratory Assistant at the request of the Department of Public Charities, but that the same did not seem appropriate to the duties performed by Mr. Gerrity; that he would suggest restoring the title formerly held by Mr. Gerrity—Apothecary—after which a suitable office title might be assigned to him which would exactly define the duties which he performed. The recommendation of Examiner Byrne was adopted, and the Secretary was instructed to communicate with the Department of Public Charities and suggest that they immediately make application for the change of title suggested, in order that there may be no further cause for complaint; also to notify the Civil Service Reform Association of the action taken.

A report was presented from Examiner Byrne on the complaint of the People's Security Company against an alleged violation of the law in the assignment of one Charles Jamar to perform the duties of a "Supervising Engineer." The report showed that on August 12, 1902, Charles Jamar was appointed from the Civil Service eligible list as an Inspector of Heating and Ventilating in the Department of Correction, and as chapter 626 of the Laws of 1896, providing for the construction of the new City Prison, specifically provided for the employment of an Inspector, Mr. Jamar's salary was charged to that appropriation; that for some time past, as the work remaining to be done on the City Prison has not warranted Mr. Jamar's assignment there except occasionally, he has been employed in making inspections of the new construction and repair work in progress on different institutions and buildings within the control of the department; that the work he had been performing was not the work of a "Supervising Engineer," as stated in the letter of the People's Security Company; that, although his entire salary had been paid out of the appropriation for the building of the Tombs, yet it was not the province of the Commission to question the propriety of such an arrangement nor to determine to what appropriation the services of Mr. Jamar should have been charged. The Secretary was directed to communicate the findings of Examiner Byrne to the People's Security Company.

A letter was presented from the Department of Parks, dated March 23, requesting that the position of Pattern Maker be classified.

The matter was laid over.

The following letter was presented from the Fire Commissioner:

"Borough of Manhattan, March 31, 1905.

"Hon. WILLIAM F. BAKER, President, Municipal Civil Service Commission, No. 61 Elm Street, New York City:

"Sir—Clerk James J. Carroll, of the Bureau of Combustibles of this Department, until stricken with brain trouble, about two years and six months since, had served the Department well and faithfully for seventeen years. He has for several months past been in a sanitarium undergoing treatment for his malady, with little, if any, prospect of recovery. During the entire period of his connection with the Department—more than nineteen years—he has been a contributor to the New York Fire Department Life Insurance Fund (see section 792 of the Greater New York Charter), paying into the same, by way of assessments, several hundred dollars, and if he were to be dropped from the rolls prior to his death, his family, the members of which are in straitened circumstances, would forfeit all claim to the payment of the sum of one thousand dollars to which they would otherwise be entitled.

A statement of the facts in the case was presented by me to your Commission under date of October 14, 1904, and an extension of leave of absence for Carroll, without pay, was granted for six months from October 1, 1904, pursuant to the provisions of Clause 2 of Rule XIII. of your Commission, as per communication of October 24, 1904. The extension of leave granted by your Commission will expire April 1, 1905, and I have the honor to request that under the circumstances of the case as hereinbefore detailed, it be extended by your Commission, without pay, for six months from that date.

A letter was presented from the President of the Borough of Richmond, dated March 29, requesting to be informed whether, under the Civil Service rules, he might reinstate Mr. William L. Corse in the position of Axeman in his Department. The matter was referred to the Assistant Secretary for further information.

The Secretary presented a supplementary pay-roll of the office of the President of the Borough of Queens, for the month of March, 1905, containing the names of nine persons who had been serving temporarily as Topographical Draftsmen, pending the establishment of the eligible list for that position. It appeared that the sixty days for which said persons were certified had expired on February 20, 1905; that the eligible list for the position of Topographical Draftsman was not yet ready for certification, and that the President of the Borough of Queens could not dispense with the services of the temporary Draftsmen until he could procure the services of an equal number of permanent employees. The Secretary was directed to attach a special certificate to the pay-roll, and to forward the same to the Finance Department.

A letter was presented from the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, dated April 1, requesting that the examination for promotion to Assistant Engineer in that Department to be held April 7, be opened to the Draughtsmen as well as to the persons in the intervening grades. The request was granted, and, it appearing that the examination was then being held and it was too late to summon the candidates to compete in same on that day, as requested by the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, the Secretary was instructed to hold a supplemental examination for the said candidates, and in the event of their passing, to place their names on the eligible list established as a result of the general examination, in accordance with their percentage.

A letter was presented from the Mayor, dated April 4, announcing his approval of the following resolutions of the Civil Service Commission:

Waiving the 12th paragraph of Rule VII., so far as the same applied to James V. Nugent, candidate in the recent examination for Patrolman, who was admitted to the examination in error.

Amending the classification of positions in the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, in the exempt class, by including therein the position of Superintendent of Ponds and Reservoirs.

The Secretary was instructed to forward the aforesaid resolutions to the State Civil Service Commission for their approval.

The request of James F. Carroll, No. 340 East Fifty-eighth street, Manhattan, that his name be restored to the list for Attendance Officer was denied, it appearing that he declined appointment in the Board of Education on November 23, 1903.

The request of Eugene E. De Mandeville, that he be restored to eligibility for appointment to the position of Janitor, at a salary of \$1,150 per annum, was granted, on his statement that when he declined appointment in the Department of Education he was employed, but that now he is without employment, and would be glad to accept an appointment at any salary.

The request of F. H. Connolly, No. 639 East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, that his name be restored to the list for Engineman, was denied, he having been dropped from the list for failing to report to a notice of appointment sent him by the President of the Borough of Richmond on September 19, 1904.

The Secretary was instructed to proceed with an open competitive examination for the position of Architectural Draughtsman.

The request of Benjamin F. Bemak, that his name be restored to the preferred list for the position of Rodman, at a salary of \$900 per annum, was granted, it appearing that he declined appointment in the Aqueduct Commission at that figure, not on the score of insufficiency of salary, but because the services were to be rendered at Katonah, New York.

On the recommendation of the President, the request of Ernest A. Fintel, that the papers submitted by him in the examination for promotion to Assistant Engineer held April 13, 1903, be rated, was denied, for laches.

On the recommendation of the President, the examination for promotion from the position of Telephone Operator to that of Messenger in the office of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, ordered by the Commission on February 24, was canceled.

The Commission then adjourned, to meet Wednesday, April 12, at 9 A. M.

2. Floor will be made of cement.

3. Wire glass will be used wherever glass is necessary.

4. Proper skylights will be provided.

5. All woodwork for the window frames, sash, doors, trim and base of the pent house will be thoroughly fireproof.

6. The highest point of the pent house roof will not exceed 150 feet from the curb level.

7. All woodwork entering into the construction of the pent house will be fireproofed by the process which is fully accepted and approved by the Bureau of Buildings.

8. The entire pent house will be constructed entirely fireproof.

9. And that a standpipe with hose connection and outlet in the hall of the pent house will be provided.

10. Pent house will not cover more than 50 per cent. of the roof area.

Mr. Browne appeared before the Board.

On motion, approved on condition that all woodwork entering into construction of the pent house shall be covered with kalmained iron.

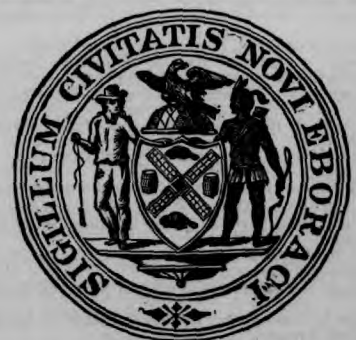

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.
