

## DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH.

A T A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF Health of the Department of Health, held August 16, 1910, the following resolution was

Resolved, That section 69 of the Sanitary Code of the Board of Health of The City of New York, be and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 69. No person shall manufacture or produce or have, sell or offer for sale in The City of New York any drug which is adulterated or misbranded. The term drug as herein used shall include all medicines for external or internal use, or both. Drugs as herein defined shall be deemed adulterated:

National formulary, it differs from the standard of strength, quality or purity as determined by the test laid down in the United States pharmacopoeia or National formulary official at the time of investigation; provided that no drug defined in the United States pharmacopoeia or National formulary shall be deemed to be adulterated under this provision if the standard of strength quality or purity be plainly stated. of strength, quality or purity be plainly stated upon the bottle, box or other container thereof; although the standard may differ from that determined by the test laid down in the United States pharmacopoeia or National formulary.

(b) If its strength or purity falls below the professed standard under which it is sold.

A drug shall be deemed micheaded.

A drug shall be deemed misbranded:

(a) If it be an imitation or offered for sale under the distinctive name of another article. (b) If the contents of the package as originally put up shall have been removed, in whole or in part, and other contents shall have been placed in such package, or if the package fails to bear a statement on the label of the quantity or proportion of any alcohol, morphine, opium, cocaine, heroin, chloroform, cannabis indica, chloral hydrate or acetanilid, or any derivative or preparation of any such substances contained therein.

(c) If the package or its label bear any statement, design, or device regarding the ingredients or regarding their action on diseased conditions, which statement, design or device shall be false or misleading in any particular.
