209 orders for the abatement of nuisances were made.

The Attorney was directed to commence suits for non-compliance with the orders of the Board in 20 cases.

Resolved, That the Register of Records be and is hereby authorized and directed to correct the death record of the child of Lizzie D. Mitander, deceased September 2, 1877, so as to read female in place of male, the same being a clerical error.

Resolved, That the Sanitary Superintendent be and is hereby directed to report on the general sanitary condition of the city and upon the work of the Sanitary Bureau during the present season.

Resolved, That under the power conferred by law upon the Health Department, the following additional section of the Sanitary Code for the security of life and health, be and the same is hereby adopted and declared to form a portion of the Sanitary Code.

Section 188. That hereafter no Texas, Colorado, or other dangerous cattle shall be driven through or along the public streets, except in those cases only where the cattle shall be landed at the

foot of the street leading to the slaughter-house to which such cattle shall be destined, and where the street shall be effectually barred or closed so as to prevent the escape of such cattle during the transfer thereof from the dock to such slaughter-house, and no such cattle shall be landed except in accordance with the provisions and restrictions of this ordinance.

Resolved, That the Secretary be and is hereby authorized and directed to publish the above ordinance in accordance with law.

Resolved, That the Register of Records be and is hereby authorized and directed to correct the death record of Elizabeth Mitander, deceased September 2, 1877, so as to read Lizzie D. Mitander, the same being a clerical error.

#### Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending September 1, 1877:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,514, as follows, viz.: 17 public buildings, 658 tenement-houses, 142 private dwellings, 55 other dwellings, 15 manufactories and workshops, 18 stores and warehouses, 29 stables, 1 market, 57 slaughter-houses, 5 public sewers, 6 manure dumps, 1 head picking, 24 sunken lots, 1 garbage dump, 3 tripe houses, 2 bladder drying, 1 bone house, 5 fat rendering establishments, 1 fat house, 43 yards, courts, and areas, 60 cellars and basements, 84 waste-pipes and drains, 137 privies and water-closets, 57 streets and gutters, 4 dangerous stairways, 2 cesspools, 5 piggeries, 6 chimneys, 33 violations of the Code, 18 other nuisances, 14 visits to contagious diseases.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 625.

During the past week 166 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

69 permits were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

129 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 30 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 27 privy-sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

The Special Corps have disinfected 2,356 privies, 92 yards, courts, and areas, 216 cellars and basements, 151 garbage-boxes, and 74½ miles of street gutters.

During the week ending Saturday, September 1, 1877, there were issued from this Bureau 644 burial permits for city deaths, 27 for bodies in transitu, and 35 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 644 deaths, 96 marriages, 511 births, 35 still-births, 27 applications for transit permits, and 64 returns from coroners. There were 23 searches of the registers of marriages, and deaths, and 4 transcripts of marriage record, and 19 of death were issued from this Bureau.

SIR—644 deaths were reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, September 1, 1877, which is an increase of 48 as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 34 more than were reported during the corresponding week of 1876. The actual mortality for the week ending August 25, was 618, which is 30.6 below the average for the corresponding weeks of the past 5 years, and represents an annual death-rate of 29.76 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,079,326.

The increase in the number of deaths during the past week compared with the preceding week was from the following causes: Diphtheria, 2; whooping-cough, 4; typhoid fever, 1; malarial fevers, 9; diarrhoeal diseases, 31; alcoholism, 2; phthisis pulmonalis, 74; marasmus and scrofula, 5; sun-stroke, 2; diseases of the brain and nervous system, 15; enteritis, gastritis, and peritonitis, 1; Bright's disease and nephritis, 7; cyanosis and atelectasis, 1; suicides, 2, and drowning, 1; while scarlatina decreased 2; croup, 2; erysipelas, 1; cerebro-spinal fever, 1; puerperal diseases, 4; inanition, etc., 2; cancer, 1; bronchitis and pneumonia, 1 each; diseases of the heart, 8.

The increase in the deaths during the past week was chiefly among those diseases that are habitually influenced by a high temperature in this city, most noticeable among them were intestinal disorders and diseases of the nervous system, of which infantile convulsions form a very large percentage, the deaths from the zymotic class show an increase of 36; constitutional, 10; local, 5, and violence, 4. The deaths of children under 5 increased 33, those who died in institutions, 23, and in tenement-houses, 12, showing a percentage to the total deaths for the week of 59.7 of children under 5, 55.4 in tenement-houses, and 14.3 in institutions.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 92 were in institutions, 357 in tenement-houses, 181 in houses containing 3 families and less, 2 in hotels and boarding-houses, 11 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 12 were on the basement floor, 148 on the first, 181 on the second, 115 on the third, 71 on the fourth, 10 on the fifth, 2 on the sixth, and 1 on the seventh; 643 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 1 non-resident; 47 were stated to be single, 119 married, 46 widowed, and the condition of 432 was not stated, these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The disposition of 627 deaths and still-births, or 92.34 per cent. of the total number reported, were in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish) 10, Calvary (Roman Catholic) 268, City pauper burial ground (undenominational) 84, Greenwood (undenominational) 40, Lutheran (undenominational) 99, Cypress Hills (undenominational) 32, Evergreen (undenominational) 39, Woodlawn (undenominational) 19, St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal) 7, Union (Methodist Protestant) 9, Holy Cross (Roman Catholic) 5, Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish) 4, St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic) 5, Washington (undenominational) 6.

The distribution of the deaths for the week ending August 25 was in the following Wards, viz.: First, 12; Second, 0; Third, 1; Fourth, 14; Fifth, 10; Sixth, 7; Seventh, 34; Eighth, 23; Ninth, 30; Tenth, 31; Eleventh, 28; Twelfth, 38; Thirteenth, 27; Fourteenth, 16; Fifteenth, 6; Sixteenth, 21; Seventeenth, 33; Eighteenth, 33; Nineteenth, 91; Twentieth, 41; Twenty-first, 33; Twenty-second, 63; Twenty-third, 12; Twenty-fourth, 7.

The mean temperature for the week ending September 1 was 77.4 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.900 inches, the mean humidity was 60, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 686, and the amount of rain-fall was .16 inches, as reported by D. Draper, Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

Resolved, That, under the power conferred by law upon the Health Department, the following additional section of the Sanitary Code, for the security of life and health, be and the same is hereby adopted and declared to form a portion of the Sanitary Code:

Section 188. That hereafter, no Texas, Colorado, or other dangerous cattle shall be driven through or along the public streets, except in those cases only where the cattle shall be landed at the foot of the street leading to the slaughter-house to which such cattle shall be destined, and where the street shall be effectually barred or closed, so as to permit the escape of such cattle during the transfer from the dock to such slaughter-house, and no such cattle shall be landed except in accordance with the provisions and restrictions of this ordinance.
