To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York:

The "Prall New York Heating Company" respectfully petition your Honorable Body to grant them permission to lay mains and pipes in the streets, avenues, and public places in the City of New York for conveying hot water or steam, under the "Prall" patented system, for the purpose of supplying heat and power to the mhabitants, for warming buildings, driving machinery, extinguishing fires, and for all other purposes for which hot water or steam may be employed, under the following conditions and restrictions:

First—That in all cases where the pavements are to be disturbed for the purpose of laying or repairing said pipes, a permit therefor shall first be obtained from the Commissioner of Public Works, and, before taking out such a permit, said company shall file with the Chamberlain of the city, a bond for \$50,000, with sufficient and adequate security to be approved by the Chamberlain, to be renewed from time to time, as the Chamberlain may require, as a guarantee that the pavements and sidewalks of the streets shall be restored in as good condition as they were found at the time they were disturbed to lay said steam or hot water-pipes, and entirely to the satisfaction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and, unless this be fully complied with, the proper authorities shall be fully empowered to commence legal proceedings against the signers of the bond for the amount which it empowered to commence legal proceedings against the signers of the bond for the amount which it may have cost the city to restore said pavements in good condition.

The pipes shall be laid under such regulations as the Commissioner of Public Works may from

time to time establish, and under such part of roadway or sidewalk as he may prescribe on the

And if at any time the Commissioner of Public Works shall direct any changes to be made in the location or arrangement of said pipes, for the purpose of the laying, altering, or removing city waterpipes or sewers, or doing any other public work, such changes shall be made by said company at their own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works, and in no case shall the city be liable for any injury or damage to the said pipes; and the company shall in nowise interfere with any sewers, water-pipes, or other pipes theretofore laid, without the consent of the Commissioner of Public Works, and the owners of said pipes.

Second—Said company shall supply all the steam or hot water required by the city for any purpose in the streets, or the parts thereof in which the pipes are laid, or for heating public buildings located therein, at twenty-five per cent. less rates than steam or hot water is turnished by them to their most favored customer. And the company shall authorize the city to use for public purposes, without royalty, any of their patented appliances or apparatus for the use of the steam or hot water supplied by the company, which said company shall authorize or license any person to use.

Third—Said company, whenever requested by the proper authorities having charge of such matters, shall furnish hot water or steam, for the purpose of cleaning the streets through which the pipes are laid, from snow and ice, and also to supply hot water or steam for the use of the fire engines at reasonable rates. And if at any time the Commissioner of Public Works shall direct any changes to be made in the

Fourth—That said Company shall provide taps for connecting fire-hydrants along the line of their mains, whenever required to do so by the proper authorities, and shall supply hot water from their mains under sufficient pressure to rise through stand pipes to the top of the highest buildings, and at a cost which shall be reasonable.

Fifth—Said company shall pay into the Sinking Fund, for the benefit of the City of New York, the sum of three cents per lineal foot of street way in which their mains are laid until such payments shall have amounted to \$200,000, after which said payments shall cease and terminate.

And in addition to said three cents for each lineal foot of street way, in each year in which the company's net earnings shall exceed ten per cent. on the capital, the next three per cent. earned in the same year over ten per cent. on the capital shall be paid into the City Treasury to the credit of the Sinking Fund, for the redemption of the City Debt.

It shall not be lawful to permit water from the root, piazza, balcony, portico, baywindow, porch, or other portions of any dwelling-house or other building within the corporate limits of the City of New York, to flow over, upon, or across the surface of any sidewalk in any street, avenue, or public place in said city, and the owner or lessee of every such building who shall violate the provisions of this ordinance shall thereby incur a penalty of ten dollars.

Sec. 2. Every such dwelling-house or other building, and every piazza, balcony, portico, baywindow, porch, or other portion of every such house or other building, shall be connected with leaders of tin or other metal with the sewers on the street fronting on which every such house or other building is located; and in case there be no sewer in any such street, avenue, or public place, then such leaders from the house front to and through the curb-stone shall be placed under the sidewalk, in a covered gutter, so as to empty into the gutter in the carriageway, and every such owner or lessee shall, at all times, keep such gutters clear of ice and every other obstruction, so that the water shall pass freely through the same without overflowing or running upon the surface of the sidewalk, under a like penalty of ten dollars for every violation of the provisions contained in this section of this ordinance, and the Commissioners of Police are hereby directed to enforce the provisions of this ordinance, by complaint for every violation thereof to the Corporation Attorney.

Sec. 3. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 4. This ordinance shall take effect January 1, 1881.

SIR—In your letter to me of the 6th instant, you state that at the first meeting of the Board of Aldermen for the present year, his Honor the Mayor transmitted several messages, vetoing resolutions passed by the Board of Aldermen for 1879, whereupon, on motion of Alderman Sauer, the Clerk was instructed "to ask the opinion of the Counsel to the Corporation as to the propriety or legality of vetoing in the present Board of Aldermen subjects passed by the late Board, and if it is in the power of the present Board legally to act upon said vetoes, as provided in section 13 of chapter 335, Laws of 1873."

Where resolutions were passed by the old Board of Aldermen, and sent to the Mayor, there may be some question as to what course he should adopt, in order to prevent the same from taking effect, if he desires to do so. In view of this doubt, the course adopted by the Mayor in the present instance seems to me to have been the proper one. Under the charter he certainly was entitled to an opportunity to consider and veto the resolutions in question, if he saw fit to do so. If, in order to prevent such resolutions from taking effect, it was necessary to send veto messages to the present Board, his course was in strict accordance with law; if such resolutions would have, in any event, failed to take effect, the most that can be said would be that such veto messages to the present Board were unnecessary. were unnecessar

Were unnecessary.

Upon the other question submitted to me I do not think there is any room for doubt. The present Board cannot, under the provisions of section 13 of the Charter of 1873, reconsider resolutions passed by the old Board, and returned by the Mayor with his disapproval to the new one. Those ordinances and resolutions only can be reconsidered which have been passed in the first instance by the present Board. To this effect was the opinion addressed by me to the Mayor, January 4, 1879.
