

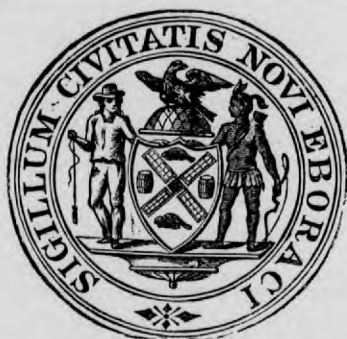

Action of the Board on Tenement-House Plans.

Plan No. 1140, for two four-story tenements, each 25 feet by 56 feet, on lots 25 feet by 100 feet, at Nos. 319 and 321 East One Hundred and Fifteenth street, each to be occupied by eight families.

Plan No. 1141, for one five-story tenement 25 feet by 50 feet, on the front of a lot 25 feet by 100 feet, at No. 148 East Forty-ninth street, to be occupied by four families.

Plan No. 1142, for the four-story tenement 18 feet by 45 feet, as proposed to be altered by the addition of a two-story extension 12 feet by 24 feet, at No. 623 Fifth street, on a lot 18 feet by 97 feet, the house to be occupied by six families.

Plan No. 1143, for one four-story tenement 25 feet by 50 feet, with an extension 17 feet by 23 feet, on a lot 25 feet by 100 feet, on the side of One Hundred and Fifth street, feet, of avenue, to be occupied by four families.

Plan Disapproved.

Resolved, That the following plan for light and ventilation of tenement-houses, be and is hereby disapproved.

Plan No. 1103-2, for the four four-story tenements proposed to be built on the north side of One Hundred and Twelfth street, beginning 145 feet east of First avenue.

Permit Revoked.

Resolved, That the permit heretofore granted on Plan No. 1103, for light and ventilation of the four tenement-houses proposed to be built on the north side of One Hundred and Twelfth street, beginning 145 feet east of First avenue, be and is hereby revoked.

The weekly report of inspections of new tenement-houses was received and ordered on file.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending July 23, 1881:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,334, as follows, viz: 1 public building, 521 tenement-houses, 90 private dwellings, 81 other dwellings, 13 manufactories and workshops, 22 stores and warehouses, 30 stables, 21 slaughter-houses, 3 public sewers and drains, 4 lodging-houses, 1 mill, 1 foundry, 3 ash and garbage dumps, 21 sunken and vacant lots, 1 tripe-boiling establishment, 1 gas works, 1 wool-pulling establishment, 2 soap factories, 1 sheepskin factory, 46 yards, courts, and areas, 91 cellars and basements, 190 waste-pipes and drains, 164 privies and water-closets, 9 street gutters and sidewalks, 4 dangerous stairways, 5 smoky chimneys, 4 cesspools, 3 other nuisances.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 516.

During the past week 295 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 112 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the port.

101 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 167 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 145 houses, 145 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc. 29 cases of contagious disease were removed to hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

The special Disinfecting Corps have disinfected 210 cellars, 4083 privies and water-closets, 211 yards, courts, and areas, 32 garbage-boxes, and 151½ miles of street-gutters.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 541 births, 55 still-births, 150 marriages, and 965 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, July 23, 1881; this shows a decrease of 18 births, 19 marriages and 25 deaths, and an increase of 8 still-births when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1880, there was a decrease of 45 births and an increase of 20 still-births, 49 marriages, and 324 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from croup decreased 2; diphtheria, 6; whooping cough, 2; cerebro-spinal fever, 5; diarrhoeal diseases, 33; alcoholism, 3; rheumatism and gout, 2; cancer, 4; bronchitis, 1; pneumonia, 7; heart diseases, 2; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 5; apoplexy, 10; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 1; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 3; cyanosis and atelectasis, 2; premature and preterm births, 16; suicide, 3; drowning, 2; while the deaths from small-pox increased 2; measles, 4; erysipelas, 1; typhus fever, 6; typhoid fever, 3; malarial fevers, 5; puerperal diseases, 3; inanition, 1; phthisis pulmonalis, 5; marasmus, tabes mesenterica, and scrofula, 4; meningitis and encephalitis, 6; convulsions, 2; direct effect of solar heat, 4; gastritis, enteritis, and peritonitis, 10; Bright's disease and nephritis, 5. The number of deaths from scarlatina was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week 143 were in institutions, 557 in tenement-houses, 252 in houses containing three families or less, 3 in hotels and boarding-houses, 7 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 15 were on the basement floor, 196 on the first, 245 on the second, 205 on the third, 120 on the fourth, 30 on the fifth, 1 on the sixth. 962 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 3 non-residents; 0 were stated to be single, 0 married, 0 widowed, and the condition of 0 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 965; still-births, 55; bodies in transitu, 34. Of the total burial permits issued for city and still-births 85 were upon certificates received from the Coroners. 541 births, 150 marriages, 55 still-births, 965 deaths. 34 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated, 56 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 6 transcripts of the birth record, 10 of marriage, and 44 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending July 23, 1881, was 74 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.599, the mean humidity was 64, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,279, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0 inches depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph. D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

CHAPTER 33.

AN ACT relative to the collection of taxes and assessments,
and of arrears of taxes and assessments, and Croton
water rents, in the City of New York.

(Passed March 16, 1881; three-fifths being present.)

The People of the State of New York, represented in
Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. If any taxes of any year shall remain unpaid
on the first day of November, after the assessment-rolls
and the warrants to collect such taxes have been delivered
to the Receiver of Taxes in the City of New York, it shall
be the duty of said Receiver to give public notice, by ad-
vertisement for at least ten days in two of the daily news-
papers, and in the CITY RECORD, printed and published in
said city, respectively, that unless the same shall be paid
to him at his office on or before the first day of December,
in any such year, he will immediately thereafter proceed
to collect such unpaid taxes, as provided in the following
section of this act:

Section 2. If any such tax shall remain unpaid on the
said first day of December, it shall be the duty of the said
Receiver of Taxes in said city to charge, receive, and collect
upon such tax so remaining unpaid on that day, in addi-
tion to the amount of such tax, one per centum on the
amount thereof; and to charge, receive, and collect upon
such tax so remaining unpaid on the first day of January
thereafter, interest upon the amount thereof at the rate of
seven per centum per annum, to be calculated from the
day on which said assessment-rolls and warrants shall
have been delivered to the said Receiver of Taxes to the
date of payment.

The same rate of interest shall be so charged and col-
lected upon any tax levied in the year eighteen hundred
and eighty, remaining unpaid at the date of the passage of
this act.

Section 3. All existing provisions of law which impose a
charge and require the collection of interest at the rate of
twelve per centum per annum upon arrears of taxes on
real and personal estate within the City of New York,
upon arrears of assessments for local improvements, and
street openings in said city, and upon arrears of Croton
water rents in said city, are hereby repealed; and in lieu
of such charge of interest at the rate of twelve per centum
per annum, there shall be charged and collected by the
officer authorized to collect and receive any such arrears
of taxes and assessments and Croton water rents, interest
upon the amount thereof at the rate of seven per centum
per annum, to be calculated for the same period as interest
at the rate of twelve per centum per annum is now re-
quired by law to be calculated thereon. This provision
shall apply to taxes, assessments, or Croton water rents
remaining unpaid and due, for the non-payment of which
the lands and tenements liable therefor shall be hereafter
sold at public auction as now provided by law; provided,
however, that nothing in this act shall be construed to
affect the rights of purchasers at sales for taxes, assess-
ments, or Croton water rents, heretofore made, or to
authorize the redemption of lands and tenements from
sales heretofore made for any lesser sums than the sums
collectible for such redemption under the provisions of
existing laws.

Section 4. It shall be the duty of the Comptroller of the
City of New York to give public notice, by advertisement,
for at least ten days, in the CITY RECORD, printed and
published in said city, immediately after the confirmation
of any assessment for a local improvement or street open-
ing in said city, that the same has been confirmed
specifying the title of such assessment and the date of its
confirmation by the Board of Revision and Correction of
Assessments in proceedings for local improvements, and

by the Supreme Court in proceedings for street openings,
and also the date of entry in the record of titles of assess-
ments kept in the Bureau for the Collection of Assessments,
and of Arrears of Taxes and Assessments, and of Croton

ORDER OF THE COMPTROLLER OF THE CITY
OF NEW YORK, CONSOLIDATING CERTAIN
BUREAUX IN THE FINANCE DEPART-
MENT

SECTION 3 OF CHAPTER 521 OF THE LAWS
of 1880, requires that heads of departments shall
reduce the aggregate expenses of their respective
departments by a reduction of salaries, and confers upon
them authority to consolidate bureaux and offices for that
purpose, as follows, to wit:

"In making the reduction herein required, every head
of department may abolish and consolidate offices and
bureaux, and discharge subordinates in the same
department."

The Comptroller of the City of New York, in pursuance
of the duty imposed and the authority thus conferred upon
him, hereby orders and directs that the following Bureaux
in the Finance Department shall be consolidated, the
consolidation thereof to take effect on the first day of
January, 1881, viz.:

First—"The Bureau or the Collection of Assessments,
and "The Bureau for the Collection of Arrears of Taxes
and Assessments, and of Water Rents," shall be consoli-
dated as one bureau, and on and after January 1, 1881,
shall be known as "The Bureau for the Collection of
Assessments and of Arrears of Taxes and Assessments, and
of Water Rents," and possess all the power conferred and
perform all the duties imposed by law and ordinance upon
both said bureaux, and the officers thereof, the chief
officer of which consolidated bureau shall be called "Col-
lector of Assessments and Clerk of Arrears."

Second—"The Bureau for the Collection of the Revenue
accruing from rents, and interest on bonds and mortgages,
revenue arising from the use or sale of property belong-
ing to or managed by the city," and "The Bureau of
Markets," shall be consolidated as one Bureau, and on
and after January 1, 1881, shall be known as "The
Bureau for the Collection of City Revenue and of
Markets," and possess all the powers conferred and per-
form all the duties imposed by law and ordinance upon
both said Bureaux, and the officers thereof; the chief
officer of which said consolidated Bureau shall be called
"Collector of City Revenue and Superintendent of
Markets."
