Abstract of proceedings for the week ending August 19, 1882.

Present—Commissioners Lane, Wales, MacLean, Olliffe. On motion of Commissioner Wales, Commissioner Lane was called to the chair. At the hour of half-past nine o'clock, the Comptroller of the city being present and the meeting open to the public, the Chairman, in the presence of the Comptroller and of such of the parties making proposals as were present, opened the estimate-box and publicly opened and read all the estimates or proposals which had been received in pursuance of advertisements duly published in the CITY Broopp, for the following works, namely:

The following preambles and resolutions were adopted : Whereas, A certain proceeding was instituted by the Department of Public Parks by virtue of chapter 604 of the Laws of 1874, and other statutes, to-wit : In the matter of the application of the Department of Public Parks, for and in behalf of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, relative to the opening of Boston road and Westchester avenue (in West Farms) from Third avenue to the east line of the city at the Bronx

and Westchester avenue (in West Farms) from Third avenue to the east line of the city at the bronx river, and, Whereas, The report of the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment, appointed by the Supreme Court in said proceeding, was confirmed by said Court at a Special Term, February 9, 1882, and confirmed by the General Term, May 19, 1882, and, Whereas, Section 7 of said act provides for the creation and issue of stock of the City of New York for the payment of the damages awarded by said Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment, and of the expense, charges, and disbursements in the premises ; therefore, Resolved, That pursuant to section 7 of chapter 204, Laws of 1874, the Commissioners of the City of New York, by said provision of law, is authorized and directed to create, and caused to be issued in the manner and on behalf of the City of New York, shall be issued at such time or times, in such manner and form, of such description and in such amounts, not exceeding the total sum of one hun-dred and ninety-five thousand, four hundred and twenty-two dollars (\$195,422), as the said Comp-troller may determine, for the payment of the awards for damages, expenses, charges, and disburse-ments made and incurred by the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment appointed by the Supreme Court in a certain proceeding instituted by the Department of Public Parks by virtue of said act, to wit :

In the matter of the application of the Department of Public Parks, for and in behalf of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, relative to the opening of Boston road and Westchester avenue (in West Farms), from Third avenue to the east line of the city at Bronx river;

C. Cady, Architect. Resolved, That the Acting Engineer of Construction be directed to report, at the next regular meeting, what work is necessary to be done on the several bridges and the approaches thereto, crossing the Bronx river, and other streams and waters in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, to make them secure and convenient for travel, with an estimate of the cost of each of the several pieces of work that may be required.

Guion & Co. the thanks of this Department for their liberality in bringing to this country, free of expense, a ram imported for the Central park flock.

Henderson & Phelps, Supervisors of the County of Westchester, appeared before the Board, and were heard in relation to the bridges over the Bronx river, and the approaches thereto, and Mr. J. M. Constable appeared before the Board and was heard in relation to plans for the im-provement of the approaches to the entrances to Manhattan square. Commissioner Lane offered the following : Resolved, That Aneurin Jones be removed from the position of Superintendent of Parks for the following reasons :

From John Beckett, asking for a vacation of one week. From B C. Murray, asking to be allowed for the overtime in the completion of his contract for constructing a sewer in One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street. From George F. Stearns, complaining in relation to the sale of liquors at Battery Park. From Anna M. Bradley, Anthony B. Durant and others, property owners, applying for the construction of a sewer in One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, between Willis and Brook avenues.

From William H. Fogg, desiring permission to erect an entrance porch, a tower, and two bay-windows on his proposed new building, on the northeast corner of Fifth avenue and Sixty-seventh street

From James Callahan, in relation to his suspension from work, and asking to be restored.

Commissioner Wales presented the quarterly report of the Department for the quarter ending June 30, 1882, which was approved, and ordered signed by the Chairman, and transmitted to the Mayor.

Commissioner Olliffe laid before the Board assignments of James W. O'Grady to Charles Jones

of contracts for the following named works : Regulating, grading, etc., One Hundred and Forty-second street, from Willis to Brook avenue. Constructing sewers, etc., in One Hundred and Forty-sixth street, from Third to Brook Constructing sewers, e avenue, with branches, etc.

On motion said assignments were accepted, and Commissioner Ollifie was authorized to sign the consent to the same, for and on behalf of this Department.

From the Comptroller in relation to the proceeding for opening Boston road and Westchester avenue instituted by section 7 of chapter 604 of the Laws of 1874, and confirmed February 9, 1882, and May 19, 1882, and recommending the adoption of a resolution authorizing the issue of bonds as provided by said Act.

Negligence of his duties, and extravagance and waste in the matter of the painting of the Third avenue bridge over the Harlem river.

Upon the designs and specifications prepared by the Engineer of Construction, and his estimate that the work would cost \$1,800, dated 25th October, 1881, the Board, on 2d November, 1881, ordered the Third avenue bridge, over the Harlem river, to be painted under the direction of Aneurin

Jones, Superintendent of Parks. He assumed the direction of the work without the aid of a foreman of painters, on the 2d November, 1881, and set painters, laborers and carpenters at work, and purchased materials until 17th July, 1882, when, without any direction from the Board, he suspended the work while unfinished

In that period he had incurred an expense of \$6,314.72, as follows

That such an expenditure on such a work is extravagant and wasteful, and that his neglect of his duties shows that, to continue him in his position, is detrimental to the public interests.

On motion of Commissioner Wales, it was Resolved, That the resolution as offered by Commissioner Lane be laid over, and that the Super-intendent of Parks be directed to appear before the Board at the next regular meeting, and make such explanation in relation to the charges as contained in said resolution, as he may desire.
