"C."-Preparation of Final Maps.

"C."—Preparation of Final Maps. The preliminary plan of the new street system for the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards has been reported completed in the report of the third quarter of 1892. Only alterations, caused by suggestions of property-owners, etc., were made during this quarter. The grade studies were finished for Sections 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5, and those for Sections 6, 7, 8, 10 and 11 are under way. The calcula-tions for the dimensions of side lines of Sections 3, 4 and 5 were completed during the quarter. One complete set of maps and profiles of the first five sections, consisting of 19 pages, drawn on mounted drawing-paper of 31 inches by 52 inches, was completed and submitted to the Commis-sioner of Street Improvements for adoption. These five sections were presented to the Board of Street Opening and Improvement for its concurrence; were concurred in by said Board, and were ordered to be filed. A second set of 19 pages, on mounted drawing-paper, was completed for filing in the Topographical Bureau. A third set, on tracing-cloth, to be used as record-tracings, was completed. Special record-tracings for each of the five sections was completed—first, one showing the assumptions on which the laying out of the street plan was based; second, one showing the results of calculations, distances between monuments, bearings of avenues and streets, co-ordinates of monuments, etc.; and third, one showing the grades of avenues and streets preco-ordinates of monuments, etc.; and third, one showing the grades of avenues and streets, viously established and of those changed; also surface-levels, which were taken for determining the grades. The work of draughting the remaining twenty-three sections is in progress, and also the calculations of dimensions of Sections 6, 7 and 11 are under way. Two field parties were at work running traverses in the Hunt's Point District preliminary to setting monument stones and bolts to define avenues and streets.

setting monument stones and bolts to define avenues and streets. A grand boulevard and concourse has been laid out on top of an almost continuous ridge, from East One Hundred and Sixty-first street and Mott Haven to the intersection of Jerome avenue with the Mosholu Parkway, with transverse roads under it for heavy traffic, and approaches from both sides to reach the level of the boulevard. This project was worked up with considerable care, and an approximate estimate of the cost has been made during this quarter. The length of the boulevard and concourse is 4.09 miles, its width 182 feet; it is subdivided into two sidewalks of twenty feet each on the east and west sides of the boulevard—two roadways of 24 feet each, two walks of 15 feet each, and one of four feet, planted with trees, and two speedways, each 30 feet wide. Transverse roads have a width of 45 feet, an 1 the two approaches to the level of the boulevard and concourse are each 34 feet in with.

" D."-Monumenting.

Instructions were prepared : I. For referencing monuments in East One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street, between Union and Westchester avenues; for referencing monuments at Eagle avenue and Cedar place; for referencing monuments at John street and Brook avenue.

"E."-Tax Maps.

Final calculations, examinations, searches, and comparisons of surveys were progressed for the preparation of Volume XI. of the Twenty-fourth Ward, which comprises the area lying between Broadway, Spuyten Duyvil Creek, Hudson river and Delafield's lane. Instruction sheets, blue prints, etc., for making tax map surveys for Volume XI. for use of computers, were made and will be enumerated with drafting record. The record and search sheets, giving dates of conveyances, description of lots sold, which are necessary for locating the properties, were kept up to date for Volumes XI. and XII. of the Twenty-fourth Ward.

Inspection on Work of Constructing Trolley System and Erecting Electric Light and Telephone Poles.

The following work, in the matter of building the trolley system and of erecting electric light, The following work, in the matter of building the trolley system and of erecting electric light telegraph and telephone poles, has been done during the quarter ending December 31, 1892 : On the line of the trolley system switches were put in at sheds north of One Hundred and Seventieth street. Much of the old timbers and rails, north of One Hundred and Seventieth street and Pelham avenue, were removed by the company. Some of the bridge-stone has been replaced between One Hundred and Seventieth street and Pelham avenue, on Third avenue and on Westchester avenue; also some repaving on Westchester avenue has been done. Metropolitan Telephone and Telegraph Company have erected about 56 poles on Kingsbridge road and on One Hundred and Forty-first street. The Postal Telegraph Cable Company have erected poles from One Hundred and Thirty-sixth to One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, on Rider avenue and on One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, from Rider to Gerard avenue. The North River Electric Light and Power Company have put up 108 poles in Boston avenue, Washington avenue, One Hundred and Thirty-sixth and One Hundred and Thirty-seventh streets during the quarter.
