

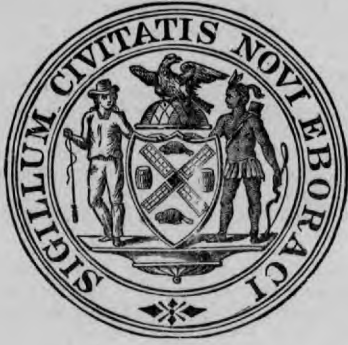

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS—COMMISSIONER'S OFFICE,  
No. 31 CHAMBERS STREET,  
NEW YORK, February 6, 1893.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

GENTLEMEN—In accordance with the provisions of section 321 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, as amended by chapter 569 of the Laws of 1887, I hereby certify and report to your Honorable Board that the safety, health and convenience of the public require that a crosswalk of two courses, with a row of paving-blocks between the courses, be laid across Kingsbridge road, at its intersection with the northerly side of One Hundred and Eighty-seventh street; the materials to be used for said work to be bridge-stone of North river blue stone of the dimensions and according to the specifications now used in the Department of Public Works.

CITY OF NEW YORK—OFFICE OF THE MAYOR,  
February 7, 1893.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

MOTIONS AND RESOLUTIONS.

By Alderman Brown—

Whereas, The ferry running to the landing known as St. George, Staten Island, has been operated entirely from the westerly slip at the foot of Whitehall street, and almost all the passenger and freight business of the whole of Staten Island with New York is done over that route, and from the slip mentioned, and the traffic has now become so large that the convenience and safety of the public require more slip room and larger terminal facilities so as to permit the use of more boats and the making of more frequent trips; and

Whereas, A small amount of business has been done with the north shore of Staten Island, from the slip lying next to the eastward of the aforesaid westerly slip, under a ferry franchise therefor; and

Whereas, The leases under which all ferry business to Staten Island has been carried on will all expire on the first day of May next; now, therefore be it

Resolved, That the sale of the ferry leases and franchises to Staten Island for the operation of ferries for the term to begin May 1, 1893, shall include the exclusive use of the two slips at the bulkhead at the foot of Whitehall street, and the wharf and dock property connected with the same; the said two slips, with their wharf and dock properties, being those lying next adjoining, and to the westward of the Hamilton Avenue Ferry.

Which was referred to Committee on Ferries and Franchises.

By the same—

Resolved, That Thursday, February 9, 1893, at 12 o'clock M., and the Chamber of the Common Council, be and they are hereby designated as the time and place for a public hearing in the matter of the sale of the leases and franchises to Staten Island for the operation of ferries for the term beginning May 1, 1893.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative.

By the same—

Whereas, Under the provisions of a resolution passed by the Board of Aldermen on the 29th day of May, 1877, and approved by the Mayor June 4, 1877, a ferry was established from the foot of Whitehall street, New York City, to Sixty-fifth street, Bay Ridge, in the town of New Utrecht,

Long Island, which, since its establishment, has been operated only during the three summer months each year, and then only for the purpose of accommodating excursion travel, and has never been organized, equipped or operated as or for a regular, every day, all the year round ferry, for day and night use by the public and the people living adjacent to its terminus on the Brooklyn shore, and has never provided any means of transit for goods, merchandise, or teams, or vehicles of any description, and has never had a ferry-house at its landing at the Brooklyn shore, or any adequate terminal facilities on either shore for the conduct of a regular ferry business; and

Whereas, Under the ordinance establishing this ferry, no attempt has ever been made to establish a regular ferry, none has ever been established or operated, and no ferry is now being operated; the only thing that has ever been done under the said ordinance or franchise, having been to put on the line during the summer time each summer some excursion steamboats, and to reap the profits from the rush of summer business, and then to suddenly abandon the territory, and to leave the public and the regular residents of that territory without means of access to New York, except by long and circuitous routes through Brooklyn; now, therefore be it

Resolved, That the resolution adopted by the Board of Aldermen on May 29, 1877, and approved by the Mayor June 4, 1877, in the words following, to wit:

"Resolved, That a ferry be and is hereby established, to run from the bulkhead at the foot of Whitehall street, New York City, to the foot of Sixty-fifth street, Bay Ridge, in the Town of New Utrecht, Long Island, the franchise to be sold at public auction to the highest bidder."

—be and the same hereby is rescinded, repealed and annulled.

This action shall not affect, impair or destroy any rights acquired under the present lease of said ferry, which will expire on the 1st day of May, 1893.

Which was referred to the Committee on Ferries and Franchises.

By the same—

Resolved, That Thursday February 9, 1893, at 12 o'clock M., and the Chamber of the Common Council, be and they are hereby designated as the time and place for a public hearing in the matter of revoking, repealing and rescinding a resolution authorizing the establishment of a ferry from the foot of Whitehall street, New York City, to the foot of Sixty-fifth street, Bay Ridge, said resolution having adopted by the Board of Aldermen on May 29, 1877, and approved by the Mayor June 4, 1877.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative.

By Alderman Owens—

Resolved, That his Honor the Mayor be and he is hereby requested to return to this Board for further consideration G. O. 94, a resolution now in his hands, to provide for the placing of an improved iron drinking-fountain on northwest corner One Hundred and Nineteenth street and Fifth avenue.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative.

Subsequently the paper was received from his Honor the Mayor, and is as follows:

Resolved, That an improved iron drinking-fountain be placed on the sidewalk nearest the curb on the northwest corner of One Hundred and Nineteenth street and Fifth avenue, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works.

Alderman Owens moved a reconsideration of the vote by which the above resolution was adopted.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said motion.

Which was decided in the affirmative.

On motion of Alderman Owens, the paper was then placed on file.

Resolved, That an improved iron drinking-fountain be placed on the southwest corner of One Hundred and Sixtieth street and Courtlandt avenue, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Foley Bros. to place and keep a watering-trough on the sidewalk nearest the curb, on the northeast corner of Forty-sixth street and Second avenue, the work to be done and water supplied at their own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative.

REPORT:

That, having examined the subject, they believe the proposed improvement to be necessary. They therefore recommend that the annexed resolution be adopted:

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to the Central Park, North and East River Railroad Company to place and keep a platform scale, not to exceed eight by fourteen feet, on Fifty-fourth street side and close to their building, about three hundred feet from Tenth avenue, the same to be constructed flush with the surface of the street so as to be no obstruction to the free use thereof, the work to be done and material supplied at their own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

In view of the fact that we this morning learn from the Board of Health that two cases of defined typhus fever have been discovered in a newsboy and an employee, who have been sleeping together in the basement of this building, and have been removed and isolated, warrants us in calling your attention to the matter, believing it to be a menace to the health of the many thousands of people who at this season are called here in relation to taxation.

The Board of Health have taken action in the matter and inform us that they propose giving the building a further sanitary inspection. We feel that speedy action should be taken, as we are unwilling to be responsible for subjecting any person, calling at this office on business, to the probabilities of contagion, and ask that you will take such action to supply such proper accommodations as the condition of affairs as recited demand.

*To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:*

DEAR SIR—I think it my duty to lay before you for your consideration and such action as you may deem advisable the facts in relation to the condition of the building commonly known as the Staats Zeitung Building, Tryon Row, in this city, of which a part is occupied, as you know, by the Law Department.

There have been matters which have given rise to complaint at various times in connection with the building, and there have now been two cases of typhus fever, one at least of a very severe type, which have originated therein, and, I have no doubt, resulted from its condition.

In view of the large number of persons, fifty-five, employed in this Department, and the very serious danger to their health which would seem to be possible from the existence of typhus originating in this building, I deem it my duty to call these facts to your attention in order that you may consider them with a view to such action on your part as would seem advisable under the circumstances.

*Hon. CHARLES G. WILSON, President, Health Department:*

SIR—I have the honor to report that I made a personal inspection of the Staats Zeitung Building this day, in company with Mr. Beebe and Dr. Huddleston of this Department, for the purpose of ascertaining the danger that might exist from infection with typhus fever from the case of the fireman who was removed to North Brother Island suffering from typhus fever yesterday. This man had been employed in the cellar of the building on the easterly side, and his duties were to fire the boilers situated under the sidewalk at the point named. The only person with whom he came into close contact was the engineer, whom I have directed to be treated as a "suspect" at his home. The engineer states that he was in contact more or less close with the fireman for about two hours after the fireman had been taken sick. I have also directed that the elevator boys who have been in contact with the engineer, more or less, be replaced by boys who will be employed to-day who have not been in contact with any employees of the paper in any way. The two boys thus laid off will also be treated as "suspects." The conditions and surroundings in the rooms where the case in question was are such as to make the danger from infection practically nil. Moreover, these rooms are so cut off from the rest of the building as to make it possible to isolate a case of contagious disease in them without danger to occupants of other rooms in the building. The floors, walls, woodwork of closets and plumbing fixtures in the press-room and business offices have been thoroughly disinfected and are now in a cleanly condition.

I have the honor to forward herewith preliminary report of Inspector Sprenger, of this Department, on the sanitary condition of the plumbing of the building in question. This report will be supplemented as soon as possible with a full report, giving the result of peppermint test. I also forward a diagram showing the general plan of the building.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT—CITY OF NEW YORK.

Complaint and report of inspection in reference to premises junction of Park Row and Centre street by the Inspector on Special Inspection of Staats Zeitung Building:

*To the Board of Health:*

I, Frederick Sprenger, holding the position of a Sanitary Inspector in the Health Department of the City of New York, do report that on the 19th day of January, 1893, I personally examined and carefully inspected the premises situated at junction of Park Row and Centre street, and found the facts as follows: Said premises consist of a newspaper and office building, of which Oswald Ottendorfer of premises is owner, and in violation of section of the Sanitary Code were found in a condition dangerous to life and detrimental to health, for the following reasons, viz.:

Owing to loose couplings in connections of vent pipes with water-closet bowls and loose and missing trap covers of two traps in the cellar a test of the plumbing could not be made. These defects are to be repaired at once and arrangements made to test the work on Saturday, the 21st instant. A large portion of the plumbing was put in new about two years ago, the fixtures renewed then were all separately trapped and traps separately ventilated. The portion of the cellar and sub-cellar occupied by the boilers and engine-room is almost entirely shut off from the rest of the building, thereby reducing the liability of the air from this portion of the cellar entering the upper part of the building. As far as can be seen at present, the only connection from cellar with upper floors is in openings for pipe lines and lift for type between the cellar and top floor.

Discussion followed, participated in by all the members of the Board.

The Mayor asked: "Is there any danger now if the public should visit the building?"

Mr. Wilson replied as follows: "None at all, so far as typhus is concerned. There are no persons in the building that have come in contact with the typhus patient. The history of the case is, a boy who slept at a lodging-house in Duane street on the night of December 31, 1892, slept in the engine-room of the Staats Zeitung Building, coming in contact with the fireman. The boy developed typhus next day and was taken away. I think he will recover."

In reply to a question by the Comptroller, whether the building is now in a cleanly condition, Mr. Wilson said: "So far as danger from typhus is concerned, we consider it nothing."

Hon. Edward P. Barker, President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, asked that more convenient and commodious quarters be obtained for his Department upon the expiration of the present lease.

On motion of the Chamberlain, the application of the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments for lease of new offices, was referred to the Comptroller, with request that he confer with the Commissioners in the selection of such offices and report back to this Board.

## BOARD OF ELECTRICAL CONTROL.

Minutes of a meeting of the Board of Electrical Control, held at the office of the Mayor, in the City of New York, on Wednesday, February 1, 1893, at 12 M.  
Present—Mayor Thomas F. Gilroy, President; Commissioners Jacob Hess and Theodore Moss.  
The minutes of January 25 were read and approved.

The Engineer's report and the accompanying applications and letters, as follows, were read:

OFFICE OF THE BOARD OF ELECTRICAL CONTROL,  
No. 1266 BROADWAY,  
NEW YORK, February 1, 1893.

## To the Honorable Commissioners of the Board of Electrical Control:

GENTLEMEN—In compliance with the resolution of the Board at the last meeting, I have to recommend a new subway district, to be designated as Proscribed District No. 4, extending from Fifty-ninth street on the north to the Battery on the south, and from Eighth avenue and Greenwich street on the east to Eleventh avenue and West street on the west.

It is not deemed practicable to maintain cables in subway, if constructed in West street, as the water rises so near the surface of the street that the subways would be constantly flooded with salt water. So, for the present, I am not prepared to recommend building subways in West street, and as Eleventh avenue is largely devoted to manufacturing and railroad purposes, I would suggest the poles be allowed to remain there for the present, and the energy of constructing subways be directed to some other neighborhood.

If the Board sees fit to adopt the above recommendation, I have to suggest that they notify all companies operating wires in that district to be prepared to remove their overhead wires on poles by a certain day and operate their circuits through the subways.

I have to report upon the application of the Metropolitan Telephone and Telegraph Company to place cross-arms on Fire Department poles on West End avenue, between Sixty-sixth and Seventieth streets; that this is for the purpose of placing in better order telephone wires which are already supported on these poles by small insulators attached to the side of poles, and I therefore recommend that the application be granted,

The facilities asked for are temporary until a subway can be provided. I therefore recommend that the application be granted,

Those numbered from 1 to 37, inclusive, are for individual telephone connections, and extend from the nearest subway terminals to the desired points. As there is no subway over the routes asked for, I recommend they be granted,

"I have to report upon the application of the North River Electric-light Company (and the letters accompanying same) to erect a line of poles and string two circuits on same, on the south side of Westchester avenue, from Robbins avenue to Bronx river, for city lighting ; that this permit could not be granted because the route was not cleared, and that a letter to this effect was sent to the applicant December 7, 1892, by the Secretary ; but that, so far as I know, no reply has been received or any work done on the line indicated, and therefore I make no recommendation upon the application."

Mayor Gilroy moved the following resolution :

That your petitioner is fully organized and supplied with ample means for the production and supply and distribution of electricity under and in accordance with the statutes of the State of New York and the rules and regulations of the Board of Electrical Control.

That your petitioner is ready to make agreements for the distribution of electricity produced by it, upon being authorized to transact business over electrical conductors in the City of New York, as required by the agreement between the Board of Electrical Control and the Consolidated Telegraph and Electrical Subway Company, and upon obtaining the use of sufficient ducts and spaces in the conduits of the underground system for the transaction of its business, it will be able to enter upon and transact the business of producing, conveying and distributing electricity within the said city, according to the system inaugurated by the Board of Electrical Control, and under such reasonable regulations as your Honorable Board may provide.

And your petitioner further respectfully requests your Honorable Board to exercise the powers conferred upon it by the Laws of the State of New York to authorize and enable your petitioner to prosecute the transaction of business over electrical conductors in the City of New York, through the streets, avenues, public parks and places thereof, upon such terms and conditions as the public convenience and welfare may require and as may be required by the agreement of the Board of Electrical Control with the Consolidated Telegraph and Electrical Subway Company ; and that your Honorable Board will adopt and pass a resolution conferring such right upon this petitioner.

Commissioner Hess moved the following resolution :

Resolved, That the application of the New York Heat, Light and Power Company of the City of New York be referred to a committee, to be appointed by the Chair, to investigate and report by resolution.

Which was unanimously adopted.

Mayor Gilroy appointed Commissioner Hess the committee.

Judge Kelly, of counsel for the Thomson-Houston Electric Company of New York, stated to the Board that the company was refused by the Consolidated Telegraph and Electrical Subway Company occupancy of a three-inch subway duct on Fourth avenue, between Fourteenth and Thirty-second streets, because it declined to pay for the same at the rate of \$1,000 per mile, and claimed that the Board had established the rate of rental at \$900 per mile.

Mr. Ridgway (Vice-President of the Consolidated Telegraph and Electrical Subway Company) stated to the Board that the rate of charge for a 3-inch distributing duct—the kind applied for by the Thomson-Houston Company—was \$1,000 per mile per annum.

Mayor Gilroy suggested that the remedy of the Thomson-Houston Company was in the courts.

Judge Kelly also stated :

"About four years ago the city electric lamp-posts were erected on First avenue, both above and below Fourteenth street, on alternate corners, as designated by the Department of Public Works, and under permits given by this Board. We have asked permits of the Expert of the Board to connect the overhead line on First avenue with these lamp-posts erected according to law, for which there is a contract with the City for public lighting, and we are refused on the ground—"

Mayor Gilroy—Is there an application in writing before this Board?

Judge Kelly—I think there is.

The application, on motion of his Honor the Mayor, was referred to the Electrical Expert and the Engineer for examination and report.

The following application of R. Hoe & Co., with the appended report of the Engineer thereon, was read :

The Honorable Commissioners of Electrical Control, New York City :

This is almost indispensable, so that in case of accident to either machine we may make use of the other for lighting our premises.

This work will be done under the supervision of a competent electrician in accordance with the requirements of your office.

Will you kindly grant us the necessary permit?
