## COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

*Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at a Meeting Held at the Mayor's Office, at 11 o'clock A. M., on Thursday, March 16, 1899.*

Present—Robert A. Van Wyck, Mayor ; Bird S. Coler, Comptroller ; Patrick Keenan, Chamberlain, Randolph Guggenheimer, President of the Council and Robert Muh, Chairman, Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen.

The minutes of the meeting held March 2, 1899, were read and approved.

Col. Asa Bird Gardiner, District Attorney for New York County, appeared before the Board and was heard in regard to the necessity for increased accommodations in the Criminal Court Building for his office.

The following communication was received from the Special Commissioner of Jurors, relative to a renewal of lease of offices in the Constable Building, at Eighteenth street and Fifth avenue, Borough of Manhattan :

NEW YORK, March 3, 1899.

EDGAR J. LEVEY, Secretary to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund :  
DEAR SIR—I inclose, herewith, a lease in blank for premises occupied by me as Special Commissioner of Jurors, with a request that your Honorable Board recommend the execution of said lease by the Comptroller under section 217 of the Charter.

In connection therewith the Comptroller presented the following report and offered the accompanying resolution :

MARCH 13, 1899.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund :

GENTLEMEN—The Special Commissioner of Jurors in a communication dated March 3, 1899, requests that the lease of rooms now occupied by him in the Constable Building be renewed.

These rooms have been occupied by the Special Commissioner of Jurors since that office was created, and the law requires that he should be provided with suitable office accommodations. As the rental is not unreasonable, I offer the following resolution.

Respectfully,

BIRD S. COLER, Comptroller.

Resolved, That the Corporation Counsel be and is hereby requested to prepare a lease of the Rooms Nos. 1004 and 1005 in the tenth story of the building situated on the northeast corner of Fifth avenue and Eighteenth street, known as the Constable Building, for the use of the Special Commissioner of Jurors of the County of New York, for a term of one year from May 1, 1899, at an annual rental of twenty-three hundred dollars (\$2,300), on the same terms and conditions as are contained in the existing lease thereof.

Discussion followed, whereupon the Mayor moved that the resolution lay over and that the Comptroller be requested to secure office accommodations for the Special Commissioner of Jurors in the immediate neighborhood of the County Court-house.

Which was adopted.

The following communications were received from the Board of Public Improvements, relative to a lease of rooms in the "Solingen" Building, at One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street and Mott avenue, Borough of The Bronx :

NEW YORK, February 6, 1899.

To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund :

SIRS—At a meeting of this Board, held on the 1st instant, the following resolution was unanimously adopted :

"Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be requested to furnish additional room for the use of the Topographical Bureau of this Department by leasing the three rooms on the west side and the three rooms on the east side of the second floor of the building known as the 'Solingen,' situated at the corner of 138th street and Mott avenue, Borough of The Bronx, the present premises in the Municipal Building in Crotona Park being insufficient to accommodate the force now employed."

In accordance with the foregoing, I am directed to request your Honorable Body to lease the six rooms designated in the above resolution. The three rooms on the west side contain 1,795 square feet, and those on the east side 1,492 square feet, making a total of 3,287 square feet, which can be secured for 75 cents a square foot, or an annual rental of \$2,450, including the furnishing of light and heat and the use of a janitor.

I inclose herewith, for your further information, a copy of communication from the Chief Engineer of this Department, setting forth the necessity for this additional space.

SIR—The Topographical Bureau having been unsuccessful in obtaining additional room in the Municipal Building and in the frame cottage near the building, Crotona Park, One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street and Third avenue, and as the work laid out for the Topographical force of this Board is seriously retarded for the want of proper accommodation, it is hereby recommended that additional room facilities be secured elsewhere. I have examined different buildings, not too far from the main office, and found only one which is suitable for the purpose. This building is called the "Solingen" and is fitted for offices only, with plenty of light and air, and is located at One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, near the station of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad. It is conveniently located and can be reached from all sides by trolleys and railroads. Upon inquiry I found that on the second floor on the west side of the building three rooms containing 1,795 square feet and on the east side three rooms containing 1,492 square feet of space, making a total of 3,287 square feet, are available. I am informed that these six rooms can be secured for seventy-five cents per square foot, or at an annual rental of \$2,450, including the furnishing of light and heat and the use of a janitor.

This additional space would be sufficient for a number of years to come, and would largely increase the facilities for aiding the work in preparation for the five boroughs of the Greater New York. The work of the Topographical Bureau has been largely increased since consolidation and the floor space it now occupies is less than before consolidation.

In connection therewith, the Comptroller presented the following report of the Engineer of the Department of Finance, and offered the accompanying resolution :

MARCH 4, 1899.

Hon. BIRD S. COLER, Comptroller :

SIR—The Board of Public Improvements by resolution adopted February 1, 1899, and amended February 15, 1899, requests the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund "to furnish additional room for the use of the Topographical Bureau of this Department, by leasing for three years, with privilege of renewal, the three rooms on the west side and the three rooms on the east side of the second floor of the building known as the 'Solingen,' situated at the corner of One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street and Mott avenue, Borough of The Bronx, the present premises in the Municipal Building in Crotona Park being insufficient to accommodate the force now employed" ; owner, Buena Vista Realty Company ; attorney for owner, Charles Stewart Davison, No. 56 Wall street, New York City.

Terms, 3,287 square feet at the rate of 75 cents per square foot, or an annual rental of \$2,450, including the furnishing of light and heat and the use of a janitor.

The premises consist of six rooms, containing an area of 3,287 square feet on the second story of a two and one-half story brick and frame-trimmed building, occupying the north side of East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, between Mott and Walton avenues, Borough of The Bronx.

The first story is divided into stores and the second into offices. The offices are heated by stoves and the halls and lavatories by gas stoves.

The rental asked I considered excessive and communicated with the attorney, whose letter, addressed to the Comptroller under date of February 27, 1899, advised us that his client would accept 65 cents.

On February 28, the agent of the building, C. A. Bunner, called and submitted a price of 57 cents per square foot, making an annual rental of \$1,873.59, which he states is the least amount the owners will accept.

Although this is somewhat high for a lease of 3 years for so large a space in such a building, in view of the fact that the President of the Board of Public Improvements represents the great necessity for this additional space in this particular locality, the lease might be approved at this rate, viz. : \$1,873.59 per annum.

In connection with this matter, Mr. L. Napoleon Levy, in a letter to the Comptroller, dated February 14, 1899, offers for the use of the Topographical Bureau of the Board of Public Improvements, the second floor of the new frame building located at Third avenue, between One Hundred and Seventy-seventh and One Hundred and Seventy-eighth streets, nearly opposite the Municipal Building, containing an area of about 3,000 square feet.

Terms, \$1,450 per annum.

One of my assistants called on Mr. Levy, who informed him that he had had a conversation with an official of the Topographical Bureau in relation to the same, and that he would submit a new proposition for our consideration.

The building in question is a new two-story frame building 54 feet by 60 feet, known as Nos. 4243 and 4245 Third avenue, with two stores on the ground floor, and one room on the second floor. The building is piped for gas and would have to be heated by stoves unless a furnace should be installed.

Mr. Levy now submits an amended offer as follows :

To lease the second floor of the building Nos. 4243 and 4245 Third avenue, to construct a lavatory, furnish heat, light and janitor's services for three years at an annual rental of \$1,150, payable quarterly.

He also adds that he will build a brick addition, 6 feet by 9 feet, with iron door, for the storage of valuable papers, etc., at an additional rental of \$150 per annum.

It will be seen that the rental asked is at the rate of 37 cents per square foot, which I consider full but not excessive.

There has been no application from the Board of Public Improvements for this building.

P. S.—I have consulted President Holahan with reference to these two buildings and he is very decided in his preference for the building on One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, on account, especially, of the convenience of the location for the business which he expects to transact there.

I therefore recommend that the three adjoining rooms on the west side, and the three adjoining rooms on the east side of the second floor of the building known as the "Solingen," situated at the northwest corner of One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street and Mott avenue, Borough of The Bronx, be leased for the term of three years, with the privilege of renewal, at the rate of \$1,873 per annum, payable quarterly, the lease to begin from the time of occupation. The owner, the Buena Vista Realty Company, to furnish light, heat and janitor's service.

Resolved, That the Corporation Counsel be and is hereby requested to prepare a lease to the city from the Buena Vista Realty Company of the three adjoining rooms on the west side, and the three adjoining rooms on the east side of the second floor of the building known as the "Solingen," situated at the northwest corner of One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street and Mott avenue, Borough of The Bronx, for a term of three years, with the privilege of renewal, at the rate of one thousand eight hundred and seventy-three dollars (\$1,873) per annum, payable quarterly, the lease to begin from the time of occupation ; the owner to furnish light, heat and janitor's service ; and the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, deeming the said rent fair and reasonable and that it would be for the interests of the city that such lease be made, the Comptroller is hereby authorized and directed to execute the same when prepared and approved by the Corporation Counsel, as provided by sections 149 and 217 of the Greater New York Charter.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

The following communication was received from the Bureau of Municipal Statistics, requesting that the resolution adopted March 2, 1899, be reconsidered or rescinded, and that a resolution be passed authorizing a renewal of the lease of rooms at No. 346 Broadway :



NEW YORK, March 7, 1899.

Hon. ROBERT A. VAN WYCK, Mayor, and Chairman of the Sinking Fund Commission, New York City:

SIR—I have the honor to acknowledge receipt of a communication dated March 3, 1899, from Edgar J. Levey, Secretary of the Sinking Fund Commission, inclosing a resolution dated March 2, which authorizes the Comptroller to lease rooms for the use of this Bureau in the Syndicate Building on Park row, including a space not greater than that now used by this Bureau in the New York Life Insurance Company's Building.

I respectfully request that the above-mentioned resolution of the Sinking Fund Commission be reconsidered or rescinded, and that a resolution be passed authorizing a renewal of the lease of rooms 1033 and 1034 of No. 346 Broadway (New York Life Building) for one or two years at an annual rental not to exceed \$1,840, which is the amount of rental now paid for them, and for which they can be leased for one or two years. This rental is equal to \$1.58 per annum for each square foot of the space that is now occupied by the Bureau, to wit: 1,165 square feet.

The rooms that the Comptroller has selected for the use of this Bureau in the Syndicate Building are situated on the twelfth floor back, and are numbered 735, 736, 737, 738 and 739, and their dimensions respectively are as follows: 9.8 by 14, 14.8 by 23, 8 by 17, 8 by 17, 16.8 by 17, or about 1,019 square feet, and their rental per square foot is \$1.65. Four of these rooms have windows facing Theatre alley, and another has a window facing the "light (?) court." These rooms are much inferior for the kind of work this office is engaged in to those now occupied by it. The location in the Syndicate Building is not so desirable, and, in my opinion, neither are the light, ventilation, accommodations or situation as good as in the present quarters of the Bureau, while the annual rental per square foot is greater (\$1.65).

The present location of this Bureau is more accessible to the general public who may have recourse to it for information about the work of the various departments and matters of interest to the city than the location of the Syndicate Building, and more people are familiar with Broadway than with Park row. The present location of the Bureau is much nearer to the city departments, from which the bulk of its statistics will be obtained, and which will have to be embodied in the annual volume of Municipal Statistics of The City of New York, as required by section 137, chapter 378, Laws of 1897, viz.:

Department of Finance, corner Chambers street and Broadway;  
Department of Health, Criminal Court Building;  
Criminal Courts, etc., Criminal Court Building;  
Department of Education, Grand and Elm streets;  
Department of Police, No. 300 Mulberry street;  
Department of Charities, foot of East Twenty-sixth street;  
Department of Correction, No. 140 East Twentieth street;  
Department of Fire, No. 159 East Sixty-seventh street;  
Department of Parks, Central Park;

—and other offices whose statistics will form a minor part of the volume.

The rooms now occupied by this Bureau have an unobstructed westerly and southerly light, with four large windows facing Broadway and the same number facing Catharine lane to the southward, which is very desirable for the work which this office is engaged in. They are large, airy, bright and well ventilated, have water in each room, are furnished with electric light, steam-heat and janitor service; and, in my opinion, cannot be excelled in service and accommodation by any office building in the United States; moreover, a removal of the Bureau will interrupt its business and may disarrange its papers and books of reference on statistical subjects and matters of interest relating to the city.

The clerical force as at present constituted is inadequate to perform properly and satisfactorily the duties required of it under sections 135, 136 and 137, chapter 378, Laws of 1897, and additional assistants will be needed and room for them will have to be provided.

The great bulk of the blanks or tables for the collection of the statistical data I am personally obliged to design, and these are copied by Mr. Louis Kraushaar, who is experienced in this line, and presumably has no equal by any employee of the city government. Mr. Kraushaar has kindly consented to aid me until May 1, when he is going to leave the service.

I would be pleased to submit these tables for the inspection of the Sinking Fund Commission so that they may be better able to examine and judge of the character of the work that this Bureau is performing. The tables, however, are incomplete and are subject to revision and alteration.

In conclusion, I respectfully state that the tables and data relating to the workings of the various departments of the city and its government, as designated by the Charter that we should prepare, are also accumulating to a great extent, and sufficient room should be provided where they can be systematically arranged for ready and convenient reference, particularly as the work will continue to increase in a greater ratio from year to year. All this finished work requires ample desk room, closet, shelf and storage room with their attendant furniture. Valuable statistical books, official documents and reports contributed from American cities and foreign countries, are rapidly accumulating, and these need proper space as well as the reports from the different departments.

If any change of these offices of this Bureau be deemed necessary, I would suggest that the Bureau be located at the City Hall, close to its library, where its books might be placed, as I believe it was contemplated that this Bureau should be attached to the Mayor's office, for the introductory in the "Greater New York Charter with Appendices, Annotated, Ash," on page CXXII., states as follows:

## MUNICIPAL STATISTICS.

"The Mayor has also been authorized to establish in his office a Bureau of Municipal Statistics, which, it is expected, without any great expense to the city, will be able to systematize the statistics of the various departments and give such information to those interested as will enable the Greater New York to contribute to the science of sociology and of good city government all over the world."

All the space now occupied by the Bureau is necessary for its efficiency and the proper arrangement of its documents, books of reference and other matters of interest to the citizens of this city, which ought to be kept in as systematic order as its space will admit.

The following communication was received from the Commissioner of Public Charities for the boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, relative to leases of premises Nos. 126 and 128 Livingston street, Borough of Brooklyn:

BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN, NEW YORK CITY, March 8, 1899.

EDGAR J. LEVEY, Secretary, Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, City of New York:

DEAR SIR—The agent of premises No. 128 Livingston street has given me verbal notice that the owner of said premises will not lease them to the city upon the terms contained in the resolution of your Board on March 2. The owner of No. 126 Livingston street also declines to accept said terms, as proved by the inclosed letter received to-day.

Again I recommend that the city accept the proposition to hire these houses for the term of five years. They are very much more accessible to the people who have use for this Department, and are much better adapted to my work. There is absolutely no property to be had in the neighborhood of the City Hall that would answer my purpose. Furthermore, this Department should not be subject to the whims of owners every year or two, as has been the case with the present premises. The owner of No. 27 Elm place, now used by me, has given me notice to vacate, and I am only in possession by his favor, as he is about to tear down this building. The owner of No. 29 Elm place has a notice "To Let" on the building, and I must have a place by the 1st of April in which to place my Department. I therefore would respectfully urge upon your Board immediate action.

SIR—The Commissioner of the Department of Street Cleaning, in communication of February 25, 1899, to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, requests the consent and approval of the Commissioners for a lease of the premises Nos. 271 and 273 West Eighty-seventh street, in the Borough of Manhattan, for a term of five years from the 1st day of April, 1899, at an annual rental of \$5,000, payable quarterly, the city to make necessary repairs, for the use of the Department as a stable.

I have examined the premises, which are located on the north side of Eighty-seventh street, 100 feet east of West End avenue. They are, substantially, as described in the Commissioner's letter. The stable is not of the first class, and is not in a perfect state of repair. The basement is dark and does not appear to me well ventilated. The elevator is run by hand.



The property is valued on the tax-books at \$30,000. It may be worth \$50,000.

At this valuation, the rent asked is 10 per cent. on the value, which I consider high.

The Commissioner informs me that this rate is the lowest he can obtain, the first rate asked having been \$5,700. He considers the rent high, but he says: "Since I have become Commissioner of Street Cleaning, I have exhausted all the means at my command to procure a stable for that part of the city at a reasonable rate. The above is the best that can be done."

The absolute necessity for a stable in this locality, and the impossibility of obtaining one at a less rate, would be the only justification for paying such a price.

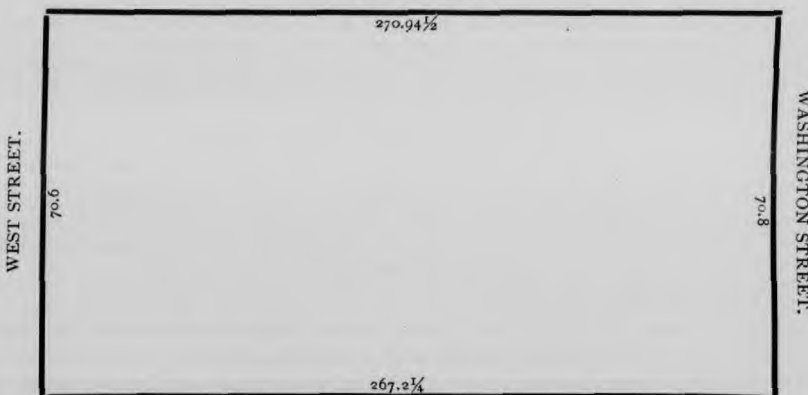

The buildings on the plot of ground have scarcely any value. They are at present used as stores and lofts. I examined the property myself and had two experts go over my figures, and I beg to submit the following as a fair upset price for the city to obtain in case of sale. The locations and frontage are on four streets, with 70 feet on the river front and facing the terminal of the Erie Railroad depot. It comprises in the neighborhood of 18,900 square feet, or about seven and a half city lots, the value of which I would estimate about as follows:

West street front, 70 by 100.....	\$185,000 00
Washington street front, 70 by 100.....	150,000 00
Inside lots, Reade to Duane street, 68 by 70.....	90,000 00

DEAR SIR—Representing the Orphans' Home and Asylum of the Protestant Episcopal Church in New York, which is situated at Forty-ninth street and Lexington avenue, Borough of Manhattan, holding under a lease from the city, we desire to ascertain your wishes in regard to the renewal by The City of New York of the lease of the premises now occupied by the Home. By chapter 457, Laws of 1879, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund were authorized to lease the premises for twenty-one (21) years to the Orphans' Home and Asylum, and they made the lease. This lease will expire shortly, and the ladies of the Board of Managers are anxious to obtain a similar lease, but they desire the approval of the city authorities before introducing a bill into the Legislature authorizing the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to make such a new lease.

The Orphans' Home and Asylum has, at its own expense, erected substantial buildings of brick and stone, suitable for its purposes, which cover the greater part of the property, and has for many years maintained there a home and infirmary for orphans. SCHEDULE A.

SITES CHOSEN AND APPROVED BY THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE BROOKLYN PUBLIC LIBRARY FOR BRANCHES OF THE SAID LIBRARY.

## 1. The Brooklyn Public Library—Central.

This property consists of five city lots at the southeast corner of Brevoort place and Bedford place, near Fulton avenue, whereon is erected a large double house, four stories in height, built of brick and stone and finished in hardwood, conveniently arranged as to the disposition of rooms and in perfect repair. It is known as the Brevoort Mansion and is owned in fee-simple by Mr. Walter C. Longmire. It is offered for a term of five years at a yearly rent of about three thousand dollars.\* The owner will donate to the library upon its entry into possession of the premises a number of bookcases of the best quality available as they stand, for immediate use, all the carpets, which are new and of the best makes, and other desirable and useful personal property, representing on the whole a value of about three thousand dollars.

## 2. The Brooklyn Public Library—South.

This property is a store at the northeast corner of Forty-eighth street and Fourth avenue, wholly new, provided with all necessary conveniences and well lighted from the front and one side. It will be so arranged, internally and externally, as to meet the requirements of a library. The heating will be at the expense of the Board. The property is owned in fee-simple by Mr. P. M. Haag, and is offered for a term of one year, with the privilege of two or three yearly renewals at the option of the lessee, for a yearly rent of four hundred and eighty dollars. A local literary association will, upon the entry of the library into these premises, donate to it a considerable number of desirable books, and pay for any special improvement the cost of which may not be assumed by the lessor. The size of the premises is about twenty-three by seventy-three feet.

## 3. The Brooklyn Public Library—East.

This property is a store situated at No. 29 Pennsylvania avenue, wholly new, provided with all necessary conveniences, and well lighted. It will be so arranged, internally and externally, as to meet the requirements of a library. Heat and the services of a janitor for external purposes will be furnished by the lessor. The property is owned in fee-simple by Mr. A. S. Walsh, and is offered for a term of one year, with the privilege of two or three yearly renewals at the option of the lessee, for a yearly rent of five hundred and forty dollars. The size of the premises is about 27 by 87 feet. Upon the entry of the library into possession, a local literary society will make valuable donations of books and will undertake to aid in many ways the labors and efforts of the Board.

Appended to this schedule are unipartite agreements† signed by the owners of premises Nos. 2 and 3.

SIR—The Board of Directors of the Brooklyn Public Library, acting through its Committee on Sites, whose action has been duly considered and formally approved in regular course, respectfully solicits from you an approval of the steps which, under the provisions contained in the Charter of the city and in the statutes relating to the establishment and government of the library, it has taken for the purpose of selecting and leasing the sites required for the several branches which, after mature investigation, it has found to be necessary for making the library a convenient and useful institution for the public and a vigorous and efficient factor in the educational work of the Greater New York.

A study of the distribution of population in the Borough of Brooklyn and of the systems of communication afforded by the steam and electric roads and the ferries and bridges has induced the Board to divide the entire borough into five principal districts, the Central, the Northern, the Southern, the Eastern and the Western, the first comprising the section of which the junction of Fulton street and Bedford avenue forms the point of radiation, and the others representing the areas indicated by the geographical terms employed to designate them. In each district there will be a branch of the library, to be surrounded ultimately by stations and sub-stations so arranged in respect to locality and distance as to favor the most complete and satisfactory distribution of the facilities and advantages the library is designed to afford.

In the Southern, Eastern and Central districts appropriate sites for branches have already been secured, and in the Northern district, it is confidently expected, an offer will soon be made of a well-arranged and thoroughly equipped establishment in the neighborhood of South Third and

Berry streets. In the Western district there is no pressing need for immediate action, owing to the existence there of several privately managed libraries of fair size, which, for the time being, administer sufficiently well to the requirements of the locality, thus leaving the Board free to concentrate its efforts upon the districts most urgently demanding its immediate attention. The question of the main building which must, in the future, serve as a source of supply for the branches and stations, and be for the whole people a conspicuous and worthy embodiment of the idea involved in the foundation of the Library, has been reserved for special consideration at a later date, the great anxiety of the Board being to provide becomingly and promptly for the immediate needs of the public in the most populous quarters, and thereby bring its work into touch with the demands of those who so largely depend upon it for moral and intellectual aid and refreshment.

A description of each site chosen for a Branch, and all necessary details in regard to the leasing thereof, are given in a separate paper herewith attached, and marked Schedule A.

The official designations by which the branches already chosen, as above stated, are known in the plan of the Library are as follows:

1. The Brooklyn Public Library—Central.
2. The Brooklyn Public Library—South.
3. The Brooklyn Public Library—East.

The total expenditure involved in the establishment of these branches has, by an appeal to the public spirit of each locality, been kept well within the limits of the appropriation made in their favor; and it is manifest that the people of the Borough of Brooklyn not only desire most earnestly the facilities which it is the duty of the Board to place at their disposal, but are ready to energetically aid and generously supplement the labors of the Board in their behalf.

As the Board of Education, under pressure of urgent need for the enlargement of the High School for Boys, has demanded instant possession of the quarters at present occupied by the Central Branch and executive offices of the library on Bedford avenue, the Board of Directors of the Brooklyn Public Library earnestly begs that the promptest attention be accorded to this communication, so that the library be not put to large expense for the storage and care of its books and effects and the public be not deprived of a service to which it has already become accustomed and to which it attaches the highest importance.

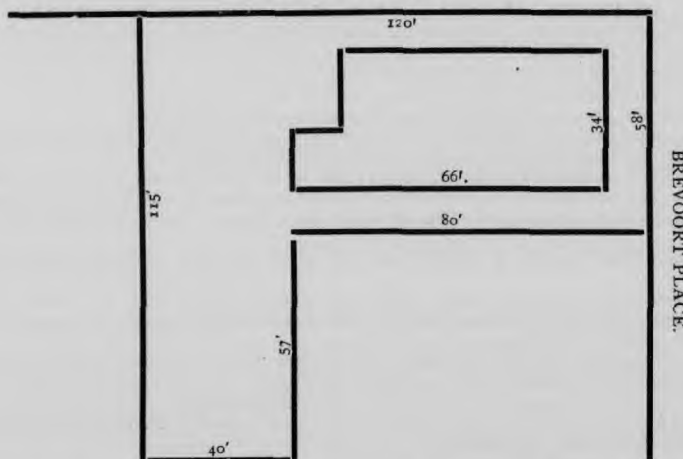
The premises proposed to be leased are as follows:

1st. For the so-called "Brooklyn Public Library—Central." Premises known as No. 26 Brevoort place, located on the southeast corner of Brevoort place and Bedford place, consisting of a four-story and basement brick and stone dwelling, on a plot of ground containing 3.696 city lots, a diagram of which is appended.

Terms of lease: Five years at \$2,250, and taxes, per annum.

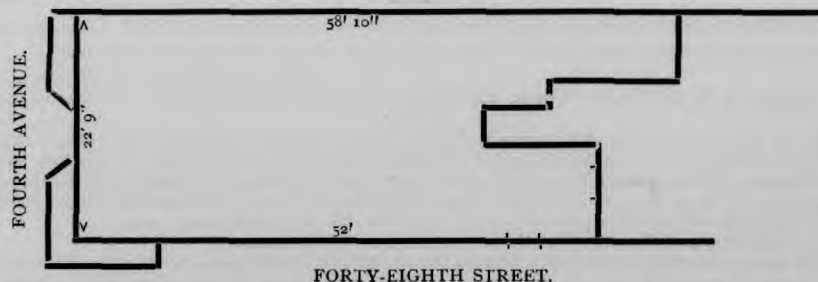
Owner: Walter C. Longmire, No. 26 Brevoort place.

## BEDFORD PLACE.



This property was assessed in 1897 for \$28,000 and is on the books of the Department of Taxes and Assessments for 1899 at the same amount. The taxes might be estimated for this year at \$750, making a total rental of \$3,000, which on a market valuation of \$40,000 would be at the rate of seven and one-half per cent., which I consider just and reasonable. However, as there is nothing definite about the tax rate, it would seem that if a fixed sum was named for the total rental, it would be more satisfactory.

2d. For the so-called "Brooklyn Public Library—South." The premises consist of a store on the ground floor of a three-story and basement brick building 25.2 feet by 63 feet on a lot 25.2 feet by 100 feet, situated at the northeast corner of Fourth avenue and Forty-eighth street. The building is new and occupied as flats on the two upper stories. A diagram of the store is here given.



Terms of lease: One year, with privilege of three yearly renewals, at \$480 per annum. Owner, P. M. Haag. The owner agrees to make certain alterations and improvements, as follows:

- (a) Install a furnace and make necessary connections.
- (b) Erect certain partitions.
- (c) Put in sanitary and basin.
- (d) Erect storm-door.
- (e) Furnish suitable chandeliers, decorate walls, etc.

This is store property, and in view of the changes above mentioned I do not consider the rental asked excessive.

3d. For the so-called "Brooklyn Public Library—East." The premises consist of a store 27 feet by 87 feet in the building known as the Penn-Fulton Hall, situated on the east side of Pennsylvania avenue, 20 feet north of Fulton street. The building, 55 feet by 87 feet, is new, of yellow brick, four and one-half stories high, with basement. There are two stores on the ground floor numbered 29 and 31 Pennsylvania avenue, of which No. 29 is the one proposed to be leased. The upper stories are arranged for lodge-rooms and a dancing-hall, with bowling-alleys in the basement under No. 31. The store is furnished with necessary toilet facilities in separate room, and is heated with steam. Terms of lease: One year, with privilege of three yearly renewals, at \$540 per annum, including steam heat and services of janitor for outside work. Owner, A. S.

This is store property, and in view of the changes above mentioned, which the owner estimates to cost \$180, I do not consider the rental asked excessive.

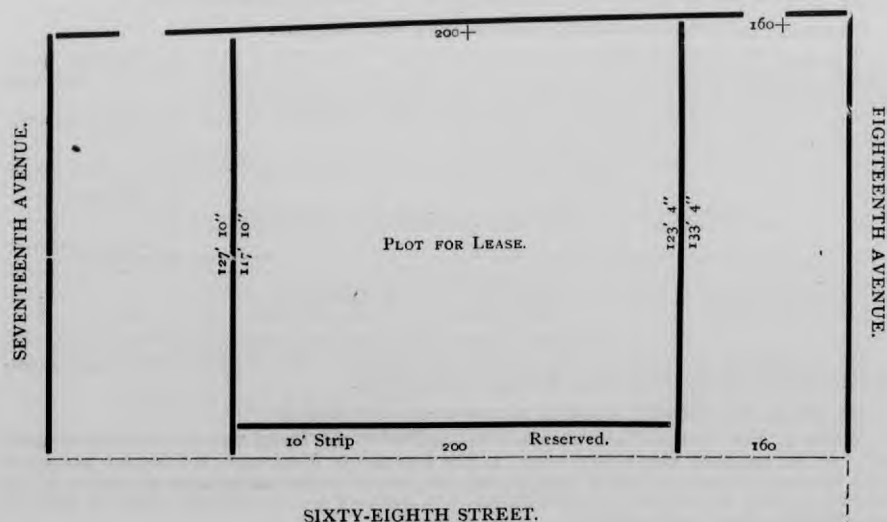
