Beginning at a point on the southerly side of Jamaica Avenue where the same is intersected by the centre line of the block between Hemlock Street and Railroad Avenue; running thence southerly and along the centre line of the blocks between Hemlock Street and Railroad Avenue to the northerly side of Atlantic Avenue; running thence westerly and along the northerly side of Atlantic Avenue to the centre line of the block between Crescent Street and Hemlock Street; running thence southerly and along the centre line of the blocks between Crescent Street and Hemlock Street to the southerly side of Jamaica Avenue; running thence easterly along the southerly side of Jamaica Avenue to the point or place of beginning.
