ART COMMISSION.

REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDING DECEMBER 31, 1906.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor of the City of New York:

Sir-In compliance with the Charter, the Art Commission begs to submit its report

Sir—In compliance with the Charter, the Art Commission begs to submit to the year 1906.

The membership of the Commission, in accordance with the provisions of the Charter, consisted throughout the year of George B. McClellan (Mayor), J. Pierpont Morgan (President of the Metropolitan Museum of Art), A. Augustus Healy (President of the Brooklyn Institute of Arts and Sciences), John Bigelow (President of the New York Public Library), J. Carroll Beckwith (painter), Walter Cook (architect), John J. Boyle (sculptor), Robert W. de Forest (layman), John D. Crimmins (layman) and Howard Mansfield (layman).

At the first meeting of the Commission, held January 9, 1906, the Commission organized by electing the following officers: Robert W. de Forest, President; A. Augustus Healy, Vice-President and Howard Mansfield, Secretary.

Powers and Duties of the Commission.

Under the Charter, the Commission has jurisdiction over:

(a) All works of art to be acquired by The City of New York by purchase, gift

or otherwise.

(b) The removal, relocation or alteration in any way of all works of art already possessed by the City.

(c) All designs of municipal buildings, bridges, approaches, gates, fences, lamps or other structures erected or to be erected upon land belonging to the City; the lines, grades, plotting of public ways and grounds; arches, bridges, structures and approaches which are the property of any corporation or private individual and which shall extend over or upon any street, park or public place belonging to the City, provided they are referred to the Commission by the Mayor or the Board of Aldermen.

(d) All structures, as mentioned in (c) above, to be erected or contracted for at

expense exceeding \$1,000,000. (e) The selection of art productions, costing not to exceed \$50,000 in any one year, when such appropriation has been made by the Board of Estimate and Appor-

Works of art, as above defined, include all paintings, mural decorations, stained glass, statues, bas reliefs or other sculptures, monuments, fountains, arches, or other structures of a permanent character, intended for ornament or commemoration.

The Charter further provides that no work of art shall become the property of the City unless such work of art, or a design, together with a statement of the proposed location, shall have been submitted to and approved by the Art Commission. Until so approved, it may not be erected or placed in, upon or over any building, street, park or public place belonging to the City.

Further, no existing work of art may be removed, relocated or altered, in any way unless the plan for such removal, relocation or alteration shall have been submitted to and approved by the Commission.

Matters Submitted in 1906.

The matters submitted to the Commission under these provisions during 1906 numbered 128, four others were presented in 1905, but not disposed of before January 1 of this year, making a total of 132 considered during the current year. The total amount of money involved approximated \$27,000,000.

Action Upon Submissions.

In each one of the one hundred and eighteen submissions acted upon during the past year, from one to twenty-six plans have been examined and passed upon. past year, from one to twenty-six plans have been examined and passed upon. In eighty submissions the designs were approved as submitted, and in twenty-six instances the Commission disapproved in whole or in part. These twenty-six submissions dealt with nine different structures and fountains for thirty different locations. For four of these structures, amended plans were prepared, again submitted to the Commission and approved. For five of the structures, plans have not yet been approved. The new designs have shown marked improvement, and the Commission feels, therefore, that its work has been successful in securing a higher aesthetic standard for public structures. ard for public structures.

The requirements of the Charter, that approval must be secured before structures may be erected, and the knowledge upon the part of the designers that plans would not be approved by the Commission which did not possess artistic merit, have also had an indirect effect, for those intending to submit designs to the Commission have naturally been desirous that their plans should be of such merit as to command immediate approval. Consequently, greater care has been taken in the preparation of these designs than otherwise would be the case.

In twelve instances submissions were temporarily withdrawn for the purpose of improving the designs before action by the Commission was requested.

Eighteen submissions remained unacted upon at the close of the year, having been received such a short time before December 31 that there had not been suffi-

cient time within which to examine the plans and make report.

Fourteen meetings of the Commission have been held. The minutes appear as an appendix to this report. Each submission is immediately referred to a special committee to be examined and reported upon before it is considered by the full Commission. It is in committee work, therefore, of which no record is kept, that are found the more engrossing duties of Commissioners.

The following summary of the submissions presented and acted upon by the Art Commission during the nine years of its existence, indicates the general trend of the work of the Commission, the increase since January 1, 1902, being particularly noticeable. More submissions were made upon the request of the Mayor or the Board of Aldermen during 1906, than during any previous year. Practically every structure of any importance was referred to the Commission. The method of regularly noting and reporting for consideration by the Mayor of proposed structures that, judging from experience, the Art Commission might expect to be referred to it, has been certified during the pact year. This procedure, which has been developed as been continued during the past year. This procedure, which has been developed as experience has justified, has proved not only satisfactory and convenient to the Mayor and the Art Commission, but has been invoked in certain instances by architects and heads of departments who have specifically requested that their plans be submitted to the Art Commission for approval before contracts were made.

* The provisions requiring all structures exceeding in cost \$1,000,000 to be approved by the Commission did not become part of the Charter until January 1, 1902.

The experience of the past few years, and especially of the one just closed, has emphasized certain matters of importance which we take this opportunity of calling to your attention.

The Fire Department has submitted from time to time the designs for a number of buildings to be used as quarters for engine companies or hook and ladder companies. During the past year plans for ten such structures from several different architects, came before the Commission. In certain instances, the designs originated entirely with the Department; in others, they were prepared by different architects connected in no way with the Department, and working apparently under few instructions, except those relating to interior arrangements. The result was, naturally enough, that the designs submitted showed great variety. The only factor possessed in common by many of the designs was the large double door at the front of the building. In all other respects, materials, style of architecture, decoration, etc., the designs were entirely dissimilar and incongruous. If one design were the proper style of architecture to use for a fire station, the others could not be suitable. The Fire Department has submitted from time to time the designs for a number

In the opinion of the Commission, such a condition is to be deplored, and, if pos sible, remedied. There should be a harmony and unity of design for all City buildings erected for similar uses and purposes, a design thoroughly adapted to and expressive of the use of the structure. It does not follow, of course, that all fire stations should be absolutely alike or that there should be no variety in detail and expression, but that certain fundamental rules should be adopted which will produce harmony and symmetry between all buildings used for fire stations, and establish a style or type that will indicate a fire station wherever seen. One city department, the Police Department, has already adopted the idea to a certain degree with satisfactory results. The plans prepared for it, though by different architects have been in harmony, and yet there has been variety in details.

The Fire Department is only mentioned to illustrate a condition assumes to allow

The Fire Department is only mentioned to illustrate a condition common to other City departments. There is equal reason for unity of design in court houses, hospitals, public baths, public comfort stations and other classes of City structures which must duplicate themselves in different parts of our metropolis.

The cause of this unfortunate situation is not far to seek. There is no common control or supervision over City buildings. Each City department head and each Borough President absolutely controls the selection of an architect and the design for every building to be erected by his department. With every change in departmental head, there is a change in architect, and usually in style. Nor does the same Commissioner by any means always select the same architect or prescribe any general style. The Art Commission has been confronted at the same time with three totally different styles of building by as many different architects, all submitted by a single department and intended to serve the same general purpose.

No city officer under the Charter can control the independent action of any departmental head in this particular.

Nor is this architectural medley due to any special intention on the part of our different City Commissioners. Few of them have or can fairly be expected to have any knowledge other than the convenience of interior arrangement.

Most of them would welcome the aid and supervision which some architect officially related to the city might give and some common city authority might ex-

The present procedure regarding the approval by the Commission of the locations of public structures is not satisfactory. The Charter requires that the Art Commission shall approve not only the designs of a structure coming within its jurisdiction, but its proposed location as well, the apparent intent of the provision being that the suitability of the site for the structure should be considered as well as the character of the design itself. The law does not make it clear, however, that the approval of a location by the Commission shall precede the acquisition of the property. In the case of the structure to be placed thereon, the language is so plain that the Comptroller refuses to sign a contract for the erection of a structure over which the Commission refuses to sign a contract for the erection of a structure over which the Commission has jurisdiction until the plans have been approved and such approval properly certified; but there has yet been no instance where the opinion of the Commission has been asked prior to the acquisition of land for any structure.

problem of finding another use for the land—a most unfortunate and expensive solution—or of evading the action of the Art Commission and of placing a structure in an unsuitable location. The one means financial loss possibly, the other an interference with the artistic development of the city and a marring of its beauty.

The Art Commission is also placed in a difficult situation. If it has no jurisdiction over the selection of sites, it cannot properly exercise its functions, the question of a proper location being inseparably connected with that of structure. Upon the other proper location being inseparably connected with that of structure. Upon the other hand, if it has jurisdiction, even though the land has been purchased, it is impaled upon one of the horns of the dilemma by being obliged either to disapprove the site and cause serious financial loss or inconvenience, or to approve the site and assume the responsibility for a serious injury to the artistic character of the building—the very thing it is supposed to safeguard. In our opinion the interests of the city would be better conserved financially and artistically if proposed locations for important public structures were submitted to some central authority which can comprehensively view all the city's structural needs, to which the Art Commission might be advisory, before being actually acquired. Then any objections could be met and dealt with before the city is in any way committed. before the city is in any way committed.

The question of location is of great importance. A mean or inartistic building is not only made more objectionable and ugly by giving it a prominent location, but excellent sites are all too few in any city, and they should be reserved for worthy buildings. A beautiful structure, upon the other hand, loses much of its beauty if placed in a poor location where it is elbowed by commonplace structures and so shut in that no proper view may ever be obtained. It is important, therefore, that the questions of artistic merit and value should be considered at the earliest stage, before the city is committed to the acquisition of any location. the city is committed to the acquisition of any location.

In this connection, we wish to mention one other point emphasized by the work of the Commission. The city annually acquires a large number of pieces of property to be used as sites for public structures. In the main these sites have been selected purely from utilitarian considerations, principally cheapness, and are scattered about without any apparent relation one to the other. Of course there must be a certain without any apparent relation one to the other. Of course there must be a certain amount of geographical distribution, but it is equally true that by using a little foresight certain foci might be created where there would be grouped the public buildings in that immediate neighborhood. Take for example, Stuyvesant square. Within four minutes' walk from the park, there are four buildings which are owned and used by the city, but not one of them faces the park. Within the same area, there are sixteen semi-public buildings, such as churches, hospitals and charitable institutions, and six of them face the park. About Tompkins square, there are five semi-public buildings but not one building belonging to the city, although there are six within a short distance. Seward park is faced by only one public building, but there are seven within three minutes' walk, and there are two semi-public buildings which front upon it. Union square and Washington square can boast of no public buildings upon their borders; and Madison square, Hamilton Fish park, Mulberry Bend park and Battery park are each favored with only one; yet in every case, there are several public buildings in the immediate neighborhood which might have been grouped about these parks. The uptown parks are even more lacking than those down town. In Brooklyn, several public buildings recently erected near the new McLaughlin park might easily have been public buildings recently erected near the new McLaughlin park might easily have been located so as to front upon it. A number of other similar instances in that borough might be cited.

The parks above named have been selected to show how aimlessly structures have been scattered, because they are naturally the centres for artistic grouping. The open space permits one to get an adequate view of the facades of the buildings—quite impossible in narrow streets. The facades should add to the beauty and enjoyment of the park by affording artistic views, when placed about parks where they may be seen and enjoyed by the crowds who fill the settees. The park in turn, with its trees, flowers, shrubs and green grass, gives a setting to the buildings which brick, stone and asphalt pavements cannot provide. Indeed, each factor in the scheme not only contributes its own beauty but multiplies the beauty of every other factor.

Vet in spite of the evident reasons from the art point of view and the many

Yet in spite of the evident reasons from the art point of view and the many utilitarian advantages arising from the grouping of the public buildings, little has yet been accomplished in New York City. The only focus approaching a civic centre is City Hall park where there are four municipal buildings, and soon to be five. Scores of buildings have been erected throughout the city in recent years, and many of them might have been grouped about the small parks. Since 1880, only a half dozen building sites on parks have been chosen by the city south of Twenty-third street out of upwards of sixty sites acquired, and no attention has been paid to any plan for artistic grouping. artistic grouping.

To the query, why such a course has been followed, the answer has often been made that the cost of such sites is much above what need be paid for land away from parks in the side streets and that the city cannot afford to pay the additional cost. There is much to be said in reply to this answer and in justification of the wisdom of acquiring land upon parks even at the additional cost; many semi-public organizations consider this policy a wise investment of their funds. But there is a solution which avoids the increased expense and secures the best sites, viz., the acquisition of land in excess of what is needed for immediate park purposes when park lands are condemned. For example, if a number of lots fronting on Seward park had been taken by the city when it acquired the land now used for park purposes, avoiding the sites could have been required at less than has been paid for lots in side park had been taken by the city when it acquired the land now used for park purposes, excellent sites could have been secured at less than has been paid for lots in side streets. This property could have been retained as part of the park or even rented temporarily until needed for public buildings. Then when a school, a library, a public bath or a court house had to be erected, the required area could be cleared. A fine location facing a park would thus be obtained at low cost, and as new buildings were needed, a "civic centre" would gradually evolve which would add greatly to the attractiveness of the district and the beauty of the park, and would stimulate and inspire civic pride and patriotism in a class of people whose principal conception of city government is that of a big policeman—a restrictive, repressing and repelling force, something to be avoided and hated, rather than loved and admired.

Plans for the grouping of public buildings have been formulated in several

Plans for the grouping of public buildings have been formulated in several American cities, notably Washington, Cleveland, St. Louis, San Francisco, Minneapolis, Buffalo and Hartford. In Europe, much more has been actually accomplished than in the United States, and a few representative photographs and maps have been reproduced in this report to illustrate what foreign cities have done

The financial side of the solution we suggest is also attractive. The entire cost of the land for Seward Park was \$1,811,127—an average cost per lot of about \$39,000—which includes not only the land but the buildings thereon. It is reasonably accurate to say that the properties facing the park could have been purchased at the same time for the same amount per lot. Now, since 1894, when the project of a park in this district was first pushed, several lots have been acquired for public purposes in the immediate neighborhood of Seward Park, at an average of \$35,000 per lot, without buildings. Therefore, if the lots bordering on Seward Park had been acquired when the park lands were bought, and if they had rented for amounts equal to the repairs, lost taxes and interest at the low rate paid by the City in the meantime—a reasonable supposition—the City to-day would not have had to pay as much for the fine sites on Seward Park as for the sites it has purchased in inferior locations.

It may be asserted that the price of land has risen throughout the east side, and that this is merely equivalent to saying that if the City had purchased in 1894 the sites that it had to buy in 1906, it would have profited by the increase in land values. This is true in part, but it is also true that it is the laying out of a park by the City's own action that has caused, to a considerable extent, the rise in values. This is shown by a comparison of the assessed values of lots fronting the park and those at a considerable distance not affected by the creation of the park.

From 1894 to 1906 the total assessed valuation of ten lots fronting Seward Park, with buildings that have not been changed during the period, increased 115 per cent. In the same period the average increase for lots with the same sort of buildings, but at a considerable distance from the park, increased only about 80 per cent. The increase in both instances was due in part to the raising of the ratio of assessed value to real value and the rise in real estate values generally but the additional increase of the ratio. The result is that property may be purchased, and indeed has been purchased, for a certain use only to find that the site was not considered suitable for the proposed structure by the Art Commission. In such a case the city is face to face with the more valuable. Why should not the City be authorized to do what a private corporation would do, viz., buy what additional land it was likely to need and thus save a considerable sum besides securing the suitable locations it ought to have for its public buildings?

The Commission's collection of books, pamphlets, periodicals, photographs and prints on civic art in Europe and America has been considerably added to and extended during the current year. A card catalogue has been made of 275 bound volumes, 101 maps separately mounted and catalogued, several hundred unbound pamphlets and between 2,300 and 2,400 photographs and prints, relating to about one hundred cities. A considerable number of books, maps and photographs are yet to be catalogued. The collection is probably the best upon this subject in the United States, and has been consulted not only by members of the Commission, City officials, architects, contractors and other citizens interested in City improvement, but by visitors from other cities who have learned of its value and comprehensive scope.

Appreciating the necessity of a complete catalogue of the works of art be-

Appreciating the necessity of a complete catalogue of the works of art belonging to the City, the Commission began the preparation of such a catalogue in 1903. The last two annual reports have contained tentative lists for the Boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn. Many works of art were practically unknown to the public, and had almost been lost sight of by the City authorities themselves. It was necessary, therefore, to canvass the public buildings, parks and open spaces in addition to the examination of the records belonging to the various departments. The Borough of Richmond has been canvassed during the past year, and also a considerable portion of the Borough of The Bronx, but few works of art have been found in these boroughs. The work will be continued until the entire city is covered. A revised list in the form of a complete catalogue for the whole city will then be published. The continuing demand for the list shows that it has evoked general interest.
