BELLEVUE AND ALLIED HOSPITALS.

REPORT FOR QUARTER ENDING SEPTEMBER 30, 1913.

Sir—I have the honor to submit the following report for the three months ending September 30, 1913.

The Department as a Whole.

The Municipal Civil Service Commission submitted to the Board of Trustees on August 14, an eligible list from which to make a promotion to the position of General Medical Superintendent. This enabled the Trustees to appoint Dr. George O'Hanlon, who had been Acting Superintendent. Dr. O'Hanlon's appointment became effective at once.

In the place of Mr. Joseph McDonough, who resigned as Purchasing Agent, the Trustees appointed Mr. Ardolph H. Witschieben, whose transfer from the Department of Finance was approved by the Municipal Civil Service Commission. Mr. Witschieben entered upon the duties of his new position on September 8.

Mr. L. C. Frees resigned as General Inspector of Construction on July 1, and the Municipal Civil Service Commission has been asked for an eligible list from which to appoint his successor.

It is anticipated that there will be a deficit of \$68,633.50 in the appropriations for the year 1913, and the Board of Aldermen has been requested to issue revenue bonds in this amount. In preparing the Budget for the year 1914, provision was made for an increase in salary and wages to the amount of \$13,710, in addition to the sum of \$98,807.90 for new positions, many of which will be necessary upon the opening of the new buildings in the department. The renewal of supplemental appropria-

tions obtained or requested from the 1st of January, 1913, has been included in the Budget, a total of \$898,500 being requested for all funds other than salaries. The request of the Resident Alienist for a change in his title to that of Director of Alcoholic and Psychopathic Service was approved without change of duties. Subject to the approval of the Training School, the title of the General Superintendent of the Training School is to be changed to Directress of Nursing or Supervising Nurse. Provision was made for the payment of day wage employees while on military service. Approval was given to the request of the Training School for additional Nurses. The salary of one Physician and one Surgeon on each of the four divisions at Bellevue Hospital was provided for.

An outlined program for the construction of the new Sea Breeze Hospital at Rockaway Beach has been prepared by Dr. S. S. Goldwater, Expert in Hospital Construction to the department, and is under consideration by the Building Committee.

The Board of Health was asked to help this department to carry out the new regulations with regard to the diagnosis of venereal diseases by allowing an appropriation from their funds for this purpose. They reported, however, that their funds were granted under such conditions that workers could not be sent from their laboratories. The Board has asked for revenue bonds with which to pay the salary of two Laboratory Assistants to make Wassermann tests in such cases.

The question of food waste has been raised in connection with the investigation now being conducted by the Board of Estimate into the Departments of Health, Charities and Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, and the General Medical Superintendent has been instructed to consider carefully the feasibility of adopting the recommendations of the report. Conditions at Bellevue are so different from those at the Kings Park State Hospital, which was selected by the committee for comparison, that it is doubtful whether a similar standard could be adopted. The matter is, however, under investigation by the hospital authorities.

The method of treating fractures in the different hospitals of the department has been the subject of investigation, with the result of disclosing a considerable lack of uniformity in the methods employed at the various hospitals. The Trustees have informed the Medical Boards of their desire that these cases be treated by the Visiting and Assistant Visiting Surgeons and not by members of the House Staff.

An additional motor ambulance will be purchased at a cost not exceeding \$3,000.

A change has been made in the form of the diplomas issued to the internes at the Allied Hospitals by which the name of the hospital in which they have served is given greater emphasis. The old diplomas so emphasized the word Bellevue as to create the impression that the doctors had served in the parent hospital and not in one of its branches.

The Trustees took appropriate action upon the death of Mayor Gaynor by spreading resolutions on their minutes expressing their appreciation of his services to the City and by voting as a mark of respect to attend his funeral in a body.

Bellevue Hospital.

The Architects report progress on the new buildings as follows:

Pavilions L and M.

Pavilions L and M are nearly finished. All the plastering and wood work have been completed. The marble work throughout the building is installed, this includes the marble shelving, threads and platforms on the main stairs, and partitions.

The composition flooring has been laid in all the small rooms of the third, fourth, fifth and sixth floors and in the wards of the last three named. The colors were selected by a Committee of Trustees who have designated lighter shades for the lower floors of the building.

The heating and ventilating installations are completed with the exception of connections to the radiators in those places where the flooring is not laid. The plumbing work is completed with the exception of the connecting fixtures in the surgical dressing rooms where structural glass wainscoting has not yet been placed. The glass wainscoting is finished in a few places. The tiled floors and wainscoting are finished throughout the entire building.

An advertisement for the furnishings for the new pavilions has been authorized.

Pavilions I and K.

The exterior of the first three sections of pavilions I and K is finished. The concrete bases for the tile and composition flooring on all floors are completed.

The steel frame work of the fourth section has been completed, and all the iron work and exterior fire escapes, with the exception of one on the north side of the loggia connecting I and K with L and M are practically completed.

All the granite and limestone copings on the roof, arches and loggias are in place on the exterior of the entire buildings with the exception of the south side of section 4, for which the limestone has been delivered. In the first three sections the frames for all doors, windows and plaster work on the interior of the building have been completed.

The plumbing connections for hot and cold water lines, general pressure mains, vacuum cleaner and waste vents are made and ready to receive the fixtures throughout the building. In the first three sections this work has been tested and on the fourth the test is now under way. The mains for the refrigerating service, with all branches for pantry refrigerators are practically completed. The brine mains are installed in the cellar and the branch lines and refrigerators on the first floor are installed. The steam pipes and heating coils are set in place and connections made. All piping on the first floor is covered, and most of the thermostatic instruments are installed.

The conduits for the signal system, telephone, watchman's clock and fire alarm system are completed and ready for wiring. All the outlet boxes and panels are in place. The electric fixtures and mains for electric current in the first three sections are nearly completed.

Balconies and Roof Wards.

J. M. Knoop, the contractor for the additional balconies on pavilions A and B, requested an extension of time to complete his contract to June 7. After obtaining the opinion of the Architects upon this request, the Trustees voted to deny it, insufficient reason having been shown.

The contractor for the roof wards of the same pavilions, Daniel J. Ryan, communicated with the Trustees early in July excusing his delay on the ground of his inability to get the proper amount of brick. Mr. Ryan subsequently asked permission to transfer his contract, on account of financial difficulties, to Pierson & Goodrich. The Architects having expressed their conviction of the ability of this firm to complete the work in the shortest possible time, the Trustees communicated with the Corporation Counsel, who advised them that they might consent to this assignment of the contract, provided the sureties approved, and the contractor was informed accordingly. The proposed transfer was not, however, consummated, and the Board has recently referred the matter to the Corporation Counsel to take the necessary steps to protect the interest of the City by compelling the sureties to complete the work or by instituting abandonment proceedings.

Other Building Matters.

Messrs. McKim, Mead & White have been asked to prepare plans for enclosing the ends of the balconies of pavilions A and B, and the sum of \$8,500 has been appropriated for this purpose.

The recommendation that a separate ward be provided for female erysipelas patients had to be disapproved, inasmuch as the structural character of Ward 32 is such that no change can be made at present and no other place is available.

A proposal from the Lincoln Steele Fleming Company to erect and complete one additional balcony on pavilion B for the sum of \$997 has been accepted.

The Medical Service.

The question of the establishment of one or more night clinics in the Out Patient Department at Bellevue has been under consideration by the Trustees, and a committee has been appointed to confer with the representatives of the Medical Board upon this matter. The committee will make an extensive investigation and report in a few months.

The Medical Board has recommended to the Trustees the payment of fees for direct blood transfusions instead of leaving them to be paid, as formerly, by private subscription.

The use of Salvarsan in the Out Patient Department has been discontinued and will hereafter be administered only on the request of a Visiting or Assistant Visiting Surgeon.

The rule excluding visitors from the wards during the time the Visiting Staff are making rounds has been rescinded.

The Psychopathic Wards.

A request from the Medical Board that a qualified Ambulance Surgeon be sent at each call received by the Psychopathic Department was denied on the ground that this work can be more satisfactorily performed by one of the Nurses permanently in that service.

A question having been raised by the Board of Estimate's Investigating Committee regarding patients who have been kept in the psychopathic wards for a longer period than twenty days, a report was requested of the Alienist in charge, who was able to show that this had been done with the consent of the patients and to the great advantage of their condition and the welfare of the public.

Fire Protection.

The Trustees have secured the services of Mr. H. F. J. Porter, Industrial Engineer, to report upon the fire conditions at Bellevue. He estimates that they can be made fire proof in accordance with his plans at very little expense.

An Electrician was employed for a temporary period to repair the internal fire alarm system which was found to be out of order.

A new contract has been entered into with the Croker National Fire Prevention Engineering Company, under which the company has agreed to reduce its estimate by approximately \$200 for the remainder of the year.

The School for Midwives.

The premises, 225 E. 26th st., have been leased for a period of three years from the 1st of September, thus affording additional facilities for the accommodation of pupils in the School for Midwives, making it possible to increase the number of pupils to about fifty.

Miscellaneous.

It is a matter of regret to the Trustees that the new morgue in the Pathological building is still unused. The attention of the Commissioner of Public Charities has been called to the fact, and assistance was offered by the Trustees in securing from the Board of Estimate the additional funds which would be required to put the morgue in operation.

During the heavy storm of September 4 and 5 the basement of the new Pavilions I, K, L and M, and the laundry extension of the new hospital were flooded. Investigation disclosed that the branch to the main sewer on 29th st. and 1st ave., is inadequate. The Trustees have communicated with the Commissioner of Public Works inviting him to give this condition his attention.

The cost of replacing coal burning equipment in the kitchen of Pavilions I and K, with gas cooking apparatus, has proved more expensive than the Trustees anticipated and has had to be abandoned. Provision will, however, be made hereafter for both gas and coal conveniences for cooking.

For greater convenience and economy during the summer months, the annex, Lusk room and Townsend cottage, as well as one of the genito urinary wards at Bellevue Hospital were closed.

It has been necessary to provide a new disinfectant in connection with the fumigator at Bellevue. The lowest estimate received was that of \$816, from the Kensington Engine Works. This has given complete satisfaction in other hospitals of the department and is now installed at Bellevue.

Covering has been provided to prevent the rain from dripping through the floor to the balconies attached to Ward 26.

The Board of Coroners has been requested to allow a representative of the Pathological Department at Bellevue, to be present at all autopsies on cases from this hospital.

The Trustees have under consideration a recommendation from the Medical Board to the effect that a solicitor be appointed for the purpose of securing the consent, from the families of deceased patients, for the performance of autopsies.

Medical Appointments.

During the quarter the following medical appointments and changes were made in Bellevue Hospital:

July 1, 1913—Dr. B. L. Crawford, appointed Resident Assistant Pathologist for one year, beginning July 1, 1913; Dr. Clement C. Young, appointed Assistant Gynecologist to out patients, 2d division; appointment of Dr. J. S. Meltzer as Interne, 4th division for 18 months, from January 1, 1914, cancelled; Dr. Allan M. Yeates, appointed Interne, 2d division, for 18 months, beginning July 1, 1913.

July 17, 1913—Dr. Joseph Sweet Martin, appointed Interne on 3d division for six months, beginning July 1, 1913; Dr. Leo A. Sutter, appointed Voluntary Assistant Resident Physician on psychopathic and alcoholic service for six months, dating from July 1, 1913.

July 31, 1913—Dr. Samuel Lawson Burton, Dr. Joseph Previtali, and Dr. Miner Clifford Hill, appointed Assistant Physicians to Out Patients on the children's service of the 1st division; Dr. Frank Stewart Park, appointed Interne on the 2d division for one year, beginning July 23, 1913.

September 16, 1913—Dr. Henry G. Rudner and Dr. Robert C. Williams, appointed Voluntary Assistant Resident Physicians, psychopathic and alcoholic service for six months, dating from September 1.

Gouverneur Hospital.

The Trustees have awaited the consummation of the purchase of the land for a new out patient building before taking definite action in regard to the plans for the building itself.

The Trustees joined in a protest to the Mayor against the transfer of the public dump, now situated at Clinton st., to South st., between Jackson and Gouverneur sts. The protest, however, came too late as the new site had been already approved by the authorities concerned.

The house at 197 Monroe st. has been leased as an additional residence for the Nurses on duty at Gouverneur.

An expenditure of about \$100 has been made for pumping out and putting the boat "Westfield," used as a day camp for tuberculosis, into proper condition.

The Trustees have called to the attention of the Medical Board the need of a rearrangement of the house staff, so that each Interne should have a two years' service.

Harlem Hospital.

Bids were received on July 31 for:

1. The construction of the new ward wing extension.
2. The steam heating and ventilating of same.
3. Plumbing and gas fitting.

It was voted to accept the lowest bids in each case, the awards being made in consequence to (1) P. J. Brennan for the sum of \$216,950; (2) E. Rutzler Company for the sum of \$20,611, and (3) P. J. Kenney Company for the sum of \$20,900. An addition of \$30,000 to the corporate stock heretofore authorized for the construction of the new wing has been made available by the Board of Aldermen, and J. H. Freedlander, the Architect, was instructed at the time this appropriation was made to proceed with plans for the extension and alterations. Owing to the delay in signing the resolution appropriating this additional corporate stock, it became necessary for the trustees to reaward these contracts, which was done at the meeting of September 4.

The sum of \$75,000 in corporate stock was provided for the construction of an addition to the power house and ambulance station. Plans for these alterations were submitted by Mr. Freedlander on August 22d, and it was announced at the same time that the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity would not approve of the plans for the alteration until the rewiring of the present building was included in the specifications. This would involve, it was thought, an expenditure of \$6,000 in excess of the appropriation available, a request for which was included in the Departmental Estimate for 1914.

No action has been taken, as yet, on awarding contracts for the equipment of the new ward wing, as no appropriation for this purpose has been granted.

Luke A. Burke & Sons Company, contractors for the new nurses' residence on the grounds of Harlem Hospital, have asked for an extension of six months' time on their contract, on account of their delay in getting structural steel during the fall of 1912 and by reason of inclement weather. After due consideration of the matter, the Trustees voted to grant the contractors an extension of their contract time to January 1, 1914.

The Trustees have asked to have the wording of the appropriation for this building modified so that it may include the furnishing and equipment of the new building. It is estimated that this will amount to \$15,000, and there is an unencumbered balance of \$20,175.39 in the construction fund for the building.

Contracts with J. H. Freedlander for his architectural services for the new wing of the hospital and the additions to the power house and ambulance station have been referred to the Board of Estimate for their approval.

The General Medical Superintendent has been instructed to comply, as far as possible, with the State Board of Charities' rules regarding the separation of sexes in the Out Patient Department. The criticism regarding the smallness of the treatment rooms will be remedied when the new wing is constructed. The Trustees have decided to open a night clinic for venereal diseases in this dispensary, provided it should be found not to conflict with an evening clinic already authorized by the Board of Health.

The Trustees have learned with deep sorrow of the death of Dr. Richard Van Santvoord, for many years a member of the attending staff of Harlem Hospital. Appropriate resolutions have been adopted and spread upon their minutes.

Medical Appointments.

July 1, 1913—Dr. Edmond C. Linton, Assistant Physician to Out Patients, resigned.

July 17, 1913—Dr. Robert Francis McDonald, appointed Assistant Surgeon to Out Patients (gynecology); Dr. George Sanders, appointed Assistant Physician to Out Patients.

September 4, 1913—Dr. Max Spiegel, appointed Assistant Physician to Out Patients.

Fordham Hospital.

The Trustees have called to the attention of the Medical Board the unsatisfactory condition of the surgical service, and have asked for a rearrangement of the same. A request from the Medical Board for the appointment of two additional internes for one year's service on the medical, obstetrical and laboratory services has been made but not yet granted by the Trustees. A more satisfactory plan for the keeping of clinical records has been decided on and adopted.

The General Medical Superintendent has been authorized to secure a portable house for use in connection with the hospital as additional quarters for the nurses, the estimated cost of which is \$500.

The contractor for the roof ward has been granted an additional month on his contract, owing to the delay caused by the failure of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity to pass upon certain drawings and samples of fixtures submitted to them for approval. This brought the time of his contract to August 28.

A request from the Wadsworth Construction Company to the Trustees to withdraw their resolution in regard to the contract of this company and to issue in its place a certificate which would make the amount of liquidated damages correspond with the resolution adopted on December 3, 1912, was referred to the Building Committee for its consideration. On the advice of this committee the Trustees replied to the request that if the contractor could secure from the Law Department an opinion under which the Trustees might legally grant this request they would take up the matter for further consideration.

Considerable damage was done at the hospital by the storm on Sunday afternoon, August 10, much glass being broken and awnings torn away. Some of the patients on the balconies got a thorough wetting before they could be taken into the wards, but no serious accidents resulted from the experience.

Medical Appointments.

July 1, 1913—Dr. Joseph E. Donnelly, appointed Assistant Surgeon to Out Patients (nose and throat).

July 17, 1913—Dr. John C. Dolan, appointed interne for two years, beginning July 1, 1913; Dr. Stanley H. Steiner, Assistant Physician to Out Patients, resigned.

August 14, 1913—Dr. Joseph Byrne and Dr. Herbert C. DeV. Cornwell, appointed Consulting Neurologists; Dr. George Reese Satterlee, appointed Visiting Physician; Dr. Joseph M. Sheridan, appointed Assistant Surgeon to Out Patients (laryngologist).

September 16, 1913—Dr. C. B. Fluker, interne, resignation accepted as of September 2.

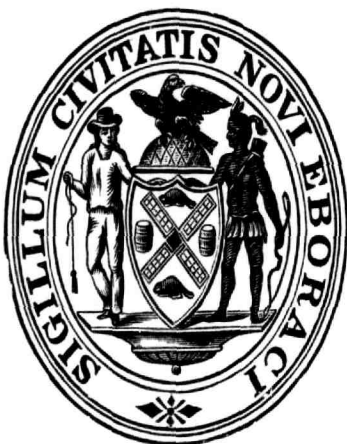

Whereas, By a contract dated July 10, 1912, the Company was authorized to construct, maintain and operate a street surface railway upon and along Desbrosses, Vestry, Washington, Greenwich and Canal streets, in the Borough of Manhattan, to and across the Manhattan Bridge, and upon and along Flatbush Avenue Extension and other streets in the Borough of Brooklyn, from the Desbrosses Street Ferry, Borough of Manhattan, to the Long Island Railroad Depot, Borough of Brooklyn; and

Whereas, By a contract dated , 1913, said contract of July 10, 1912, was amended by extending the times for commencement and completion of construction; and

Whereas, The Company has by a petition dated September 25, 1913, applied to the Board for certain modifications and amendments in and to said contract dated July 10, 1912, as amended by said contract dated , 1913, to wit:

First—By substituting for that portion of the route authorized by said contract of July 10, 1912, upon and along Rockwell place, Flatbush ave. from Rockwell place to 4th ave., 4th, Atlantic and 3d aves., in the Borough of Brooklyn, the following routes:

(a) An additional single track upon and along Fulton st. from Flatbush Avenue Extension to Rockwell place; thence by double track upon and along Fulton st. and Ashland place from Rockwell place to Hanson place.

(b) A single track upon and along Lafayette ave. and Flatbush ave. from the above described route on Ashland place to and connecting with the existing route of the Company in Flatbush ave. between 3d ave. and Livingston st.

Second—By amending Section 2, sixth of said contract of July 10, 1912, by permitting the use of overhead electric power upon the Manhattan Bridge, its terminals and approaches.

Now, therefore, in consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements herein contained, the parties hereto do hereby covenant and agree as follows:

Section 1. The City hereby consents, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, to certain modifications and amendments in and to said contract of July 10, 1912, as amended by said contract of , 1913; said modifications and amendments to be as follows:

1. So much of section 1, first (2) of said contract dated July 10, 1912, reading as follows:—"thence by single track in and upon Fulton street to Rockwell place, thence by single track in and upon Rockwell place to Flatbush avenue, thence by single track in and upon Flatbush avenue to 4th avenue, thence by single track in and upon 4th avenue to Atlantic avenue, thence by single track in and upon Atlantic avenue to 3d avenue, thence by single track in and upon 3d avenue to Flatbush avenue," is hereby stricken out and the following substituted therefor:—"thence by double track in and upon Fulton street to Ashland place, thence by double track in and upon Ashland place to the northerly side of Hanson place. Also a branch beginning at and connecting with the above described route at the intersection of Ashland place and Lafayette avenue; thence by single track in and upon Lafayette avenue to Flatbush avenue;"

2. By adding at the end of Section 1-First of said contract of July 10, 1912, a new paragraph reading as follows:

"The said substituted routes with turnouts, switches and crossovers hereby authorized are shown upon a map entitled: 'Map Showing Proposed Substitute Route of the Manhattan Bridge Three Cent Line in the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, to accompany petition to Board of Estimate and Apportionment, dated September 25, 1913,' and signed by Frederick W. Rowe, President, and J. C. Brackenridge, Engineer; a copy of which is attached hereto, it to be deemed a part of this contract, and is to be construed with the text thereof, and is to be substantially followed, provided that deviations therefrom and additional turnouts, switches and crossovers which are consistent with the foregoing description, and the other provisions of this contract may be permitted by resolution of the Board."

Section 2. The grant of this privilege is subject to the following conditions:

First—All the terms, provisions and conditions contained in said contract dated July 10, 1912, as amended by said contract dated

1913, excepting those which are herein amended or modified, shall remain unchanged, and shall apply to the route herein described in Section 1 of this contract, with the same force and effect as when they applied to the route described in said contract dated July 10, 1912, and as though the route herein described had been specifically described in said contract.

Second—The consent in writing of the owners of half in value of the property bounded on the routes herein described in and upon Fulton street, Ashland place, Lafayette avenue and Flatbush avenue, to the construction and operation of said railway shall be obtained by the company within six (6) months from the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and a copy of such consents shall be filed with the Board within such time, or in the event that such consents cannot be obtained within such time, the company shall, within said six (6) months or within one (1) month thereafter, make application to the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court for the appointment of Commissioners in the manner provided by the Railroad Law to determine if said railway ought to be constructed; otherwise this grant shall cease and determine.

Third—The Company shall within one year from the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor, comply with the provisions of section 184 of the Railroad Law for the abandonment of that portion of the route granted by said contract dated July 10, 1912, shown in yellow upon the map attached hereto, and more particularly described as follows:

Beginning at the intersection of Rockwell place and Fulton street, thence by single track in and upon Rockwell place to Flatbush avenue, thence by single track in and upon Flatbush avenue to 4th avenue, thence by single track in and upon 4th avenue to Atlantic avenue, thence by single track in and upon Atlantic avenue to 3d avenue, and thence by single track in and upon 3d avenue to Flatbush avenue.

If the Company shall fail to secure the approval of the Public Service Commission, or shall fail for any other reason to comply with the provisions of this subdivision within the time stipulated, this contract shall thereupon cease and determine and the original franchise contract dated July 10, 1912, as amended by said contract dated , 1913, and the obligations and liability of the Company thereunder shall be unaffected by the provisions of this contract, provided, however, that the Board may extend the time allowed herein for compliance by the Company with the provisions of section 184 of the Railroad Law for a period or periods not exceeding in the aggregate six (6) months.

Fourth—Upon one (1) year's notice from the Board, the Company shall, if the Board shall so determine by resolution, cease the operation of the stubend terminal in Ashland place at or near the northerly side of Hanson place, and shall within sixty (60) days from the date of such notice, make application to the Board for the right to construct, maintain and operate a loop terminal upon streets to be designated by the Board, and shall on or before the expiration of said one (1) year, enter into a contract for such new terminal in substitution for the stubend terminal hereby authorized.

Section 3. The Company promises, covenants and agrees on its part and behalf to conform to, abide by and perform all the terms, conditions and requirements in this contract fixed and contained.

INVITATION TO CONTRACTORS.

PART OF THE SEVENTH AVENUE-LEXINGTON AVENUE RAPID TRANSIT RAILROAD.

THE PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION FOR the First District (hereinafter called the "Commission") invites proposals to construct Section No. 6 of Routes 4 and 38, a part of the Seventh Avenue-Lexington Avenue Rapid Transit Railroad.

The points within The City of New York between which the said part is to run and the route or routes to be followed are briefly as follows: Section No. 6—Beginning at a point under 7th ave., in the Borough of Manhattan, about seventy-five (75) feet north of the northerly building line of W. 30th st., and extending thence northerly under 7th ave. to a point about one hundred (100) feet south of the southerly building line of W. 43d st.

The general plan of construction calls for a subsurface railroad having four and five tracks. The details of the construction of the railroad and appurtenances are more particularly indicated on the contract drawings.

Bidders will not be required to provide or lay tracks, ties or ballast, nor to do station finish work.

The work of construction under the contract will include the construction of all necessary sewers and connections along or off the route of the railroad, also the necessary support, maintenance, readjustment and reconstruction of vaults adjacent to buildings, pipes, tubes, conduits, subways or other subsurface structures; the support and care, including underpinning or the maintaining, protecting and securing, where necessary, of all buildings, monuments, surface and subsurface railroads and other surface, subsurface and overhead structures of any kind, etc., affected by or interfered with during the construction of the work, also the restoration of the sidewalks and roadways.

The method of construction will be by trench excavation under cover, unless otherwise permitted by the Commission, as set forth in the form of contract.

Bidders must examine the form of contract and the specifications, maps and plans; must visit the location of the work and inform themselves of the present conditions along the line thereof and make their own estimates of the facilities and difficulties attending the execution of the proposed work.

A fuller description of the work to be done is set forth, and other requirements, provisions, details and specifications are stated, in the printed form of contract and in the contract drawings therein referred to. Printed copies of the form of contract, bond and contractor's proposal may be had on application at the office of the Commission, No. 154 Nassau st., Borough of Manhattan, City of New York. The contract drawings may be inspected at the same office, and copies thereof may be purchased by prospective bidders on payment of five dollars (\$5). The printed form of contract and the contract drawings are to be deemed a part of this invitation.

The City and the Interborough Rapid Transit Company will both be parties to the contract; the Interborough Rapid Transit Company being a party for the purpose of disbursing part of its contribution toward the cost of construction as provided in the contract dated March 19, 1913, between The City of New York, acting by the Commission, and Interborough Rapid Transit Company for the equipment, maintenance

and operation of additional rapid transit railroads. The liability of Interborough Rapid Transit Company under the contract for which bids are now invited will be limited to an amount equal to ninety-five (95) per centum of the aggregate sum arrived at by multiplying the estimated approximate quantities by the unit prices, as contained in the schedule of unit prices in the contractor's proposal. The contractor is to accept the obligation of the Interborough Rapid Transit Company to make payments to the amount and in the manner provided in the contract, and is to agree not to look to the City except to the extent that the amounts earned under the contract may exceed the amount for which the Interborough Rapid Transit Company is liable.

The Commission is informed by the Department of Docks and Ferries that docks and bulkheads along the East River or along the North River may be available for dumping purposes. Information in regard thereto may be obtained by any intending bidder upon inquiry at the office of the Department of Docks and Ferries with whom all arrangements must be made with respect to utilizing such docks and bulkheads as may be available.

Partial payments to the contractor will be made monthly as the work proceeds, as provided in the form of contract.

The contractor will be required to complete the work as soon as practicable and within a period of thirty-six (36) months from the date of the delivery of the contract.

Sealed bids or proposals will be received at the office of the Commission at No. 154 Nassau street, Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, until the 29th day of December, 1913, at twelve fifteen (12.15) o'clock p. m., at which time, or at a later date to be fixed by the Commission, the proposals will be publicly opened.

Proposals must be in the form prescribed by the Commission, copies of which may be obtained at the office of the Commission.

A statement based upon estimate of the Engineer of the quantities of the various classes of work and of the nature and extent as near as practicable of the work required is to be found in the schedule forming a part of the form of contractor's proposal. The quantities given in such schedule are approximate only, being given as a basis for the uniform comparison of bids, and no claim is to be made against the City on account of any excess or deficiency, absolute or relative, in the same, except as provided in the specifications and form of contract.

All proposals must, when submitted, be enclosed in a sealed envelope endorsed "Proposal for Constructing Part of Rapid Transit Railroad—Routes Nos. 4 and 38, Section No. 6," and must be delivered to the Commission or its Secretary; and in the presence of the person submitting the proposal, it will be deposited in a sealed box, in which all proposals will be deposited. No proposal will be received or deposited unless accompanied by a separate certified check drawn upon a national or state bank or trust company having its principal office in The City of New York satisfactory to the Commission and payable to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York for the sum of Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000). Such check must not be enclosed in the envelope containing the proposal.

The unit prices must not be improperly balanced, and any bid which the Commission considers detrimental to the City's interests may be rejected.

No proposal, after it shall have been deposited with the Commission, will be allowed to be withdrawn for any reason whatever.

The award of the contract will be made by the Commission as soon as practicable after the opening of the proposals.

Bidders whose proposals are otherwise satisfactory, in case the sureties or securities named by them are not approved by the Commission, may substitute in their proposals the names of other sureties or securities approved by the Commission, but such substitution must be made within five (5) days after notice of disapproval, unless such period is extended by the Commission.

A bidder whose proposal shall be accepted shall, in person or by duly authorized representative, attend at the said office of the Commission within ten days after the delivery of a notice by the Commission that his proposal is accepted and that the contract is consented to by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and such bidder shall then deliver a contract in the form referred to, duly executed and with its execution duly proved.

At the time of the delivery of the contract the contractor will be required to furnish security to the City by giving a bond for two hundred thousand dollars (\$200,000). At the option of the successful bidder, cash or approved securities may be deposited instead of giving a bond. If securities are deposited in place of a bond under the contract, they must be of the character of securities in which savings banks may invest their funds and must be approved by the Commission.

The contractor's bond must be in the form annexed to the form of contract.

In addition and as further security, fifteen (15) per centum of the amounts certified from time to time to be due to the contractor will be deducted until the amounts so deducted and retained shall equal ten (10) per centum of the sum of the amounts resulting from the product of the estimated approximate quantities and the unit prices, as contained in the schedule of unit prices in the contractor's proposal. Thereafter there shall be so deducted and retained for such purpose ten (10) per centum of the amount certified from time to time to be due to the contractor. The contractor may from time to time withdraw portions of the amounts so retained upon depositing in lieu thereof corporate stock of The City of New York equal in market value to the amount so withdrawn.

In case of failure or neglect to execute and deliver the contract or to execute and deliver the required bond or to make the required deposit, such bidder will, at the option of the Commission, be deemed either to have made the contract or to have abandoned the contract. In the latter case, the Commission will give notice thereof to such defaulting bidder, and the Commission may thereupon proceed to make another contract with such, if any, of the original bidders, as, in the opinion of the Commission, it will be to the best interests of the City to contract with, or may by new advertisement invite further proposals. The defaulting bidder shall thereupon be liable to the City for all loss and damage by it sustained, including the excess, if any, of the amount it shall pay any other contractor over the amount of the bid of such defaulting bidder.

If the Commission shall give notice to any bidder that his or its proposal is accepted and that the contract is consented to by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and if the bidder shall fail within ten days thereafter or within such further period, if any, as may be prescribed by the Commission, to execute and deliver the contract and to execute and deliver the bond with sureties, or to make the required deposit, then the invitation to contractors and proposal accepted as aforesaid shall be a contract binding the bidder to pay to the City the damage by it sustained by reason of such failure, and in such case the bidder shall, by the terms of the proposal, absolutely assign to the City the ownership of the check accompanying

his or its proposal as a payment on account of such damages.

All such deposits made by bidders whose proposals shall not be accepted by the Commission will be returned to the person or persons making the same within five days after the contract shall be executed and delivered. The deposit of the successful bidder will be returned when the contract is executed and its provisions in respect of the bond or deposit are complied with.

The right to reject any and all bids is reserved.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a Department, chief of a Bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement, to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate. For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel can be obtained upon application thereto at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done.
