

## DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS AND FERRIES.

At a regular meeting of the Board of Docks held Friday, March 3, 1899, at 2 o'clock P. M. Present—The full Board.

The minutes of the meeting held February 24, 1899, were approved.

Daniel Lord, attorney, appeared and requested on behalf of the Cunard Steamship Company, a ten years' renewal lease of Pier, new 40, North river, from May 1, 1903, the date of the expira-

tion of the present lease.

On motion, the application was granted and the Secretary directed to request the Corporation Counsel to prepare the necessary form of renewal lease, the rental for the renewal term to be \$40,150 per annum, as provided for in the existing lease.

Messrs. Russell & Jennings, attorneys, appeared in relation to the order of the Board of February 24, 1899, directing the removal of the buildings maintained by the Hudson Tunnel Railway Company at the foot of Morton street, North river.

On motion, the time in which to remove said structures was extended to March 15, 1899.

The communication from the Engineer-in-Chief recommending the construction of a steam launch for the use of the Department was again tabled for one week.

The report of the Engineer-in-Chief on Secretary's Order No. 18681, submitting plan for the extension of Pier, new 1, North river, out to the pierhead-line of 1897, was tabled for one week.

The communication from the Brooklyn Ferry Company of New York, in relation to the proposed improvement of the water front in the vicinity of East Twenty-third street, was tabled for

one week.

On motion, the Engineer-in-Chief was directed to prepare plans, specifications and form of contract for the construction of a new pier out to the present pierhead-line at the foot of East Twenty-second street, and the following preamble and resolutions were adopted:

Whereas, In and by an indenture made the 22d day of July, 1898, between The City of New York, acting by the Board of Docks, party of the first part, and the Tenth and Twenty-third Street Ferry Company, party of the second part, "the privilege or franchise to run a ferry to and from the foot of Twenty-third street, East river, Borough of Manhattan, in The City of New York, from and to Greenpoint avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, in The City of New York, together with all that certain wharf property, situated in the Borough of Manhattan, in The City of New York, known and described as the bulkhead between East Twenty-third and East Twenty-fourth streets, East river, including all wharf structures belonging to the city, which have heretofore been used East river, including all wharf structures belonging to the city, which have heretofore been used for the purposes of said ferry," was leased for a term of ten years from the 1st day of May, 1898,

Whereas, Said indenture was, by and with the consent of the Board of Docks, assigned by the said Tenth and Twenty-third Street Ferry Company to the Brooklyn Ferry Company of New

Whereas, In and by said indenture, it is mutually covenanted and agreed that "if at any time during the said term of ten years hereby granted, the party of the first part, or its proper department, officers or officer, shall decide to extend or otherwise improve the wharf property hereby demised, or any portion thereof, in the manner provided by law, it or he shall have the right to enter upon said property provided the Board of Docks shall give to the said party of the second part, its successors or assigns, three months' notice in writing of its intention to use said wharf property, or any portion thereof, for the improvement of the water front in the vicinity of the ferry landing. "And it is mutually covenanted and agreed that the notice provided for in the preceding paragraph shall specify by general terms of description or by reference to the plans and specifications of the proposed work of improvement, the character of the alterations and improvements to be made in regard to the said water front affecting the rights and property hereby demised."

Resolved, That said Board of Docks hereby decides to extend or otherwise improve the wharf

property demised in said indenture, in the manner provided by law, in accordance with the plan of improvement of that part of the water front in The City of New York, on the westerly side of the East river, between the southerly side of East Seventeenth street and the northerly side of East Thirty-fourth street, made in accordance with the provisions of section 712 of chapter 410 of the Laws of 1882, as amended by chapter 517 of the Laws of 1884, determined by the Board of Docks December 17, 1888, and adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund December 19, 1888.

Resolved, That the Board of Docks hereby gives notice to the said Brooklyn Ferry Company of New York that it will, at the expiration of three months from the date of service of a copy of this notice upon said company, require said company to vacate and surrender the said wharf property with all improvements thereon.

On motion, the matter of fixing the upset price for the new franchise to run the ferry to and from the foot of Twenty-third street, East river, Borough of Manhattan, in The City of New York, from and to Greenpoint avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, in The City of New York, when the improvements in the vicinity of East Twenty-third street shall have been completed, was referred to the Treasurer and Commissioner Meyer.

The communication from the President, recommending that steps be taken for the acquisition of Pier 36, East river, owned by George II. Penniman, was referred to Commissioner Meyer to arrange with said owner for the acquisition of his rights in the pier.

The communication from the Wholesale Oyster Dealers, requesting that the oyster barges be placed in the new basin at the new West Washington Market, in the same order in which they are now located, north of West Tenth street, was referred to the Dock Superintendent.

The following permit was granted on the usual terms:

Pennsylvania Kailroad Company, to make general repairs to Pier, old I, and south side of Pier, old 2; Piers, old 4 and 5; Pier, old 16, and the Cortlandt Street Ferry premises on the North river, during the ensuing six months.

The following permits were granted to continue during the pleasure of the Board: Joy Steamship Company, to use and occupy berth on the north side of Pier new 1, North, on Mondays, Tuesdays, Thursdays and Fridays of each week, compensation therefor to be

fixed by the Treasurer. Brown & Fleming, to use a portion of the dumping board on the Pier foot of Sixteenth street, North river, for the purpose of loading cellar dirt thereat, provided the consent of the lessee is

obtained.

T. C. Hoornbeck, to maintain tally-house on Pier 19, East river, the consent of the lessee

having been obtained.

Charles W. Davis, to berth the steamer "Mary E. Gordon" at the foot of Pike street, East river, on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays of each week, compensation therefor to be fixed by the Treasurer.

Gustave Zismar, to maintain portable hoisting mast on the Pier foot of East Seventy-fifth

street, said hoisting mast to be for public use.
