### (PUBLIC IMPROVEMENTS.)

A meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York was held in the old Council Chamber (Room 16), City Hall, Borough of Manhattan, on Friday, June 13, at 10:30 a. m.

Present—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen, the President of the Borough of Manhattan, the President of the Borough of The Bronx, the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, the President of the Borough of Queens and the President of the Borough of Richmond.

After the consideration of financial matters, the Board took up the consideration of the Public Improvements calendar.

### LAYING OUT EAST ONE HUNDRED AND FIFTIETH STREET, THE BRONX.

The report of the Secretary was presented in the matter of the proposed laying out of East One Hundred and Fiftieth street, from Brook avenue to St. Ann's avenue, in the Borough of The Bronx, showing that the matter has been duly advertised for a hearing, as required by law.

Mr. Luce, of counsel for the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, appeared for the railroad company and called attention to the grade of the street at the crossing of the Port Morris branch of the New York and Harlem Railroad.

No opposition being offered to the proposed laying out, the following resolutions were adopted:

Whereas, At a meeting of this Board held on the 26th day of May, 1902, resolutions were adopted proposing to alter the map or plan of The City of New York by laying out East One Hundred and Fiftieth street, from Brook avenue to St. Ann's avenue, 175 feet northerly of East One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, in the Borough of The Bronx, City of New York, and for a meeting of this Board to be held in the Council Chamber (Room 16), City Hall, Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, on the 13th day of June, 1902, at 10:30 o'clock a. m., at which meeting such proposed laying out would be considered by this Board, and for a notice to all persons affected thereby of the aforesaid time and place at which such proposed laying out would be considered to be published in the "City Record" for at least ten days continuously, exclusive of Sundays and legal holidays, prior to the 13th day of June, 1902; and

Whereas, It appears from the affidavit of the Supervisor of the City Record that the aforesaid resolutions and notice have been published in the "City Record" for ten days continuously, Sundays and legal holidays excepted, prior to the 13th day of June, 1902; and

Whereas, At the aforesaid time and place a public hearing was given to all persons affected by such proposed laying out who have appeared, and such proposed laying out was duly considered by this Board; now therefore be it

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 442 of The Greater New York Charter, deeming it for the public interest to alter the map or plan of The City of New York by laying out East One Hundred and Fiftieth street, from Brook avenue to St. Ann's avenue, in the Borough of The Bronx, City of New York, does hereby favor and approve of the same so as to lay out the aforesaid street as follows:

Beginning at a point in the eastern line of Brook avenue distant 175 feet northerly from the intersection of the easterly line of Brook avenue and the northern line of East One Hundred and Forty-ninth street;

Thence northerly along the eastern side line of Brook avenue for 60 feet;

Thence easterly deflecting 90 degrees to the right for 524.50 feet to the western side line of St. Ann's avenue;

Thence southerly on the western side line of St. Ann's avenue for 60 feet.

Thence westerly for 524.5 feet to the point of beginning.

Said street to be 60 feet wide.

#### Grades.

There is no change of grade on Brook avenue or St. Ann's avenue.

Hon. SETH LOW, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Sir—Herewith is returned copy of a resolution adopted on April 18, 1902, by the Local Board of the Bay Ridge District of the Borough of Brooklyn, initiating proceedings to open Ninety-sixth street, between Third avenue and the Shore road. This street is open for public travel within the limits named and houses have been erected upon both blocks.

I am informed that there is no present occasion to extend the limits of the proceeding, and that possession is desired at once so that the street may be entered upon for the purpose of constructing a sewer. From an inspection of the street it does not appear that there are any encroachments of buildings upon the line of the street to be opened, although no statement to this effect accompanies the papers, and I would recommend that the Corporation Counsel be requested to apply to the Court for the appointment of Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment under the provisions of section 990 of the Charter, and that title vest in the City upon the filing of the oaths of such Commissioners.

SIR—The resolution of the Local Board of the Bay Ridge District, Borough of Brooklyn, passed on March 19, 1902, which is herewith returned, recommends a change in the map or plan of The City of New York, by laying out and continuing Gravesend avenue, south of its junction with Avenue X and Eighty-sixth street, on the line of the Shell road, 70 feet wide, to a point north of Canal avenue, which point is indicated on the accompanying plan, and from that point it is recommended that said Gravesend avenue diverge southeasterly so as to connect with West Sixth street at Canal avenue and so as to conform with the width of West Sixth street, as laid out; and it is further recommended that West Sixth street be laid out and continued from its terminus at Neptune avenue, 60 feet wide, to Sheepshead Bay road, all of which is described on the accompanying plan.

The laying out of such a street has been proposed before. A plan was prepared and a public hearing given on January 9, 1901. This plan proposed a street 100 feet in width, curving until it connected with West Eighth street, which it was proposed to widen to 100 feet. This plan was opposed on account of the expense, and a new plan was prepared and another public hearing given on April 17, 1901. This later plan was the same as the one now submitted, and was approved by the Board of Public Improvements, but was not acted upon by the Municipal Assembly. Of the pressing need of another street leading to Coney Island there can be no question. There is none between the Ocean parkway and West Seventeenth street, a distance of over three-quarters of a mile, while between the ends of these streets runs Surf avenue, which in summer is thronged with people and vehicles of all descriptions.

The street, or rather the short lengths of different streets which this plan proposes, constitutes a narrow tortuous route, which ends at Sheepshead Bay road, one block north of Surf avenue, which is the principal street of this popular resort of the people of New York City. I submit a sketch showing the connection provided for by the resolution before the Board, and that which was first proposed.

It will be seen that the earlier plan provided a street 100 feet in width (which is the same width as the lower part of Gravesend avenue), leading directly to Surf avenue, while the latter makes use, as far as possible, of existing streets which are narrow and poorly suited to the end it is desired to attain. The street plan of this part of Brooklyn is so wretchedly bad that this opportunity should, in my judgment, be embraced, to provide a second suitable approach to Coney Island. It is true that the laying out of a 100-foot street would involve the taking of several buildings, but they are nearly all cheap frame structures of small value.

It is to be presumed that as soon as the street is placed upon the map steps will be taken to acquire title, and in view of the fact that there would not be much use for it during the winter months, but that it would be of great benefit to the thousands who flock to this seaside resort from all the boroughs of the city during the summer months, I believe this is a case in which the Board could properly determine that one-half of the expense of the opening proceedings should be borne by The City of New York.

I submit a resolution for a public hearing in order that the matter may be freely discussed, and it can then be determined whether to approve the present plan or to recommend a change which will result more satisfactorily to accomplish the object sought.

That adjacent to the foot of East One Hundred and Thirty-second street the East river has the greatest depth of any point along the shore in this locality, and is the only available, as well as practicable, location for docks.

SIR—In the matter of the application of the Port Morris Land and Improvement Company, of March 25, 1902, through their attorney, Thos. S. Bassford, for relief from the payment of fifty per cent. of their assessment for costs of opening of East One Hundred and Thirty-second street, between Locust avenue and the East river, I beg to report that the records of the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment in this case show that the assessment against this company for all of their holdings in the district (consisting of sixteen plots) amounted in the aggregate to \$32,578.55, and that they were awarded \$43,000 as damages. The total length of the street covered by the proceedings was about 415 feet, of which about 379½ feet was owned by the Port Morris Land and Improvement Company, and the remainder, or about 35½ feet of water front, by the City, for which it was awarded \$50.

I can see no reason why this petitioner should be relieved from payment of the costs of owning a street wholly through their property, and fully believe that the benefits which will accrue to them abundantly justify the assessment as it stands.

Title to Twelfth avenue, between Sixtieth and Sixty-fifth streets, was acquired by the City on February 4, 1899.

Between Sixty-first and Sixty-second streets the avenue crosses two double track railroads in a deep cut, requiring the construction of a viaduct, which, under the Railroad Law and after the approval of the crossing by the State Board of Railroad Commissioners has been obtained, should be built under an arrangement whereby one-half of its cost would be borne by the City and the other half by the railroad companies.

To carry out the improvement requested under the resolution, a retaining wall must be built on each side of the cut, and this should be suitable to act as an abutment for the bridge.

It does not appear from the papers accompanying the resolution that the plan proposed for this crossing has yet been formally agreed upon between the City and the railroads, or that the consent of the Railroad Commissioners has been obtained.

I would recommend that the President of the Borough of Brooklyn be authorized to proceed with the desired improvement, the cost thereof to be assessed upon the property to be benefited, and that the work should not be undertaken until after the bridge abutments or retaining walls have been built. The estimated cost of the improvement requested is \$8,800, and the valuation of the property within the district of assessment is \$42,700.

SIR—The resolution of the Local Board of the Morrisania District, passed April 28, 1902, which is herewith returned, provides for macadamizing, on a telford base, Webster avenue, between Mosholu parkway and Gun Hill road.

Webster avenue is one of the most important thoroughfares in the Borough of The Bronx, having a roadway sixty (60) feet in width except for a short distance along Parkside place, where it is narrowed on the westerly side. It is also occupied by a double track surface railroad. The avenue for its entire distance south of Mosholu parkway is well paved, either with granite block or vitrified brick, and it would seem as if so important a street should be improved with something more permanent than macadam.

Such a material is certainly unsuitable between the railroad tracks, which seem to be included in the proposed improvement without cost to the company owning and using them. If these spaces were omitted or paved by the railroad company, as they should be, enough money would probably be saved to the property owners to enable them to have a permanent and much more satisfactory pavement. I think such a change so desirable that a strong effort should be made to accomplish it before approving the action of the Local Board, and would so recommend.

The estimated cost of the work as proposed is \$43,000, while the assessed value of the property within the probable area of assessment is \$206,480.

Their history is: On December 20, 1900, bids for blankbooks for the year 1901 were received and opened from the Martin B. Brown Company, The J. W. Pratt Company, John Cassidy, and the Jordan Stationery Company.

On December 28, 1900, on the coming in of a report of the Supervisor, award was made, by Departments, to the respective lowest bidders.

The resolutions awarded to the Martin B. Brown Company, among other items, the following:

"New York County—County Clerk, Surrogate, District Attorney, Register and Public Administrator... \$5,932.40"

This contained the item of \$3,935.53 for the Register's office covered by Requisition No. 2798.

"County Court, County Treasurer, Register..... \$5,582.16"  
This contained the item of \$4,669.51 for the Register's office covered by Requisition No. 2799.

After the award was made, it was discovered by the Supervisor that the appropriations for New York County and Kings County, respectively, were insufficient.

It was therefore agreed that the amounts named should not be charged on the contract, but on special orders, to be drawn later.

The work was done and the goods delivered, but, so far as we are informed, the requisitions were never formally passed by the Board of City Record.

## BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN.

## BUREAU OF PUBLIC BUILDINGS AND OFFICES.
