A meeting of the Armory Board was held this day at 11.30 o'clock a. m. at the office of the Mayor.

The Mayor presented and read charges preferred by Comptroller Grout against Secretary John P. Gustaveson, dated May 19, 1903, and also read a letter from the Secretary and a third letter from Comptroller Grout. The Mayor then asked the Secretary what reply he had to make. Whereupon Secretary Gustaveson made a general denial of the charges.

this work.

The Secretary explained that the plans for this work were now in the hands of the Advisory Architects, Messrs. Post and Hardenbergh.

The matter was then referred to the Generals commanding the First and Second Brigades for investigation and report.

G., N. Y., in the Borough of Brooklyn, giving a technical description of such addition. Crdered filed.

A communication was received from the Corporation Counsel, of date April 14, 1903, being an opinion from him as to the authority and warrant to the Board for taking action in the case of the default of Luke A. Burke, contractor, in finishing the armory for the First Battery, N. G., N. Y., under his contract, and transmitting forms of notice and particulars for such action.

A communication was received from the Fire Department, of date April 17, 1903, directing the Armory Board to provide in the Ninth Regiment Armory certain standpipes, fire extinguishers, with hooks and axes, particularly specified; and also to provide means of communicating alarms of fire from said premises with the Department's Headquarters.

Brigadier-General McLeer brought up the question of lighting the Twenty-third Regiment Armory, in the Borough of Brooklyn, with electricity provided by an independent plant, instead of securing the current from the street.

Section 1. The Board of Aldermen of The City of New York hereby grants to the Eric Railroad Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the franchise, right and privilege to construct and operate a double-track surface railroad, with a single switch connecting the two tracks, to be operated by steam locomotives or other motive power which may be lawfully employed, except horses or the overhead system of electricity, across Thirteenth avenue and the marginal wharf or way extending from the westerly side of Thirteenth avenue to the Mudson river, between Twenty-seventh and Twenty-ninth streets, in the Borough of Manhattan, City, County and State of New York.

Sixth—The said railroad may be operated by locomotive steam power or by any other motive power which may be approved by the Board of Railroad Commissioners in accordance with the provisions of the Railroad Law, excepting overhead electrical power and horse power, provided, however, that the locomotive steam engines used shall be housed or boxed so as to conform to the type commonly known as the dummy engine.

The number of cars to be included in any train operated upon the railroad shall be limited to ten, and the speed of the engines and cars shall never exceed six miles per hour. No car or engine shall be permitted to remain stationary within the limits of Thirteenth avenue, or upon it e marginal wharf or street at any time.

Seventh—The railroad constructed under this ordinance shall be maintained and operated solely for the purpose of the transportation of goods, wares and merchandise and for no other purpose, and especially for no purpose in connection with the passenger traffic as commonly understood.

Eighth—Such railroad shall be constructed, maintend and operated subjec

tracks, and for a distance of two feet beyond the rails on either side thereof, free and clear from ice and snow.

Eleventh—The grantee, its successors or assigns, shall keep in permanent repair the portion of the surface of the street and of the marginal wharf or way between its tracks, the rails of its tracks and two feet in width outside of its tracks, under the supervision of the proper local authorities, and whenever required by them to do so, and in such manner as they may prescribe. And The City of New York shall have the right to change the material or character of the pavement of the street and marginal wharf or way, and in that event the grantee, its successors or assigns shall be bound to replace such pavement in the manner directed by the proper City officer at its own expense, and the provision as to repairs here in contained shall apply to such renewed or altered pavement.

Twelfth—In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained, this grant may be forfeited and annulled by The City of New York by an action brought by the Corporation Counsel on ten days notice to the grantee, its successors or assigns.

This grant is upon the further and express condition that the provisions of the Railroad Law applicable thereto, and all laws or ordinances now in force or which may be adopted relating to surface railroads operating in The City of New York shall be strictly complied with. Sec. 4. The grantee, its successors or assigns shall commence the construction of the railroad under this franchise and complete the same within six months from the date when it has obtained the necessary permits and resolutions of the City officials and Departments, and on or before January 1, 1904, otherwise for that purpose, provided, however, that such time may be extended under and for causes specified in section 99 of the Railroad Law, by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, for a period not exceeding six months.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof.
