

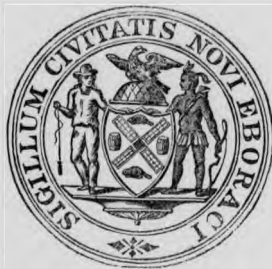

## Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending October 11, 1884.

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors was 7,564.

The number of complaints returned by the Sanitary Inspectors was 743.

During the past week 198 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

88 permits were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

3 permits were issued to consignees to discharge rags (in bulk, under bonds).

There were 2 permits issued to remove manure from stables in the city.

166 permits were issued to scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks.

23 premises were visited where contagious diseases were reported, and 23 disinfections and 5 fumigations were performed.

2 cases of contagious disease were removed to Riverside Hospital.

The number of vaccinations performed was 842, of which 215 were primary and 627 revaccinations.

4,310 pounds of meat and 3,475 pounds of fish were seized and condemned.

691 specimens of milk were examined, 315 quarts of adulterated milk destroyed, 1 arrest made, and the amount of fines imposed was \$125.

The certificates of 632 births, 69 still-births, 244 marriages and 621 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, October 11, 1884. This shows an increase of 11 births, 14 still-births and 12 deaths, and a decrease of 28 marriages, when compared with the number received during the preceding week; but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1883, there was a decrease of 7 births and 56 marriages, and an increase of 17 still-births and 75 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during preceding week, the deaths from croup decreased 2; whooping cough, 9; erysipelas, 2; malarial fevers, 1; puerperal diseases, 5; rheumatism and gout, 2; bronchitis, 2; heart diseases, 5; aneurism, 1; meningitis and encephalitis, 4; convulsions, 3; apoplexy, 2; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 5; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 1; Bright's disease and nephritis, 4; cyanosis and atelectasis, 1; premature and preterm births, 3; suicide, 1; while the deaths from measles increased 1; scarlatina, 5; diphtheria, 3; typhoid fever, 1; cerebro spinal fever, 1; diarrhoeal diseases, 5; inanition, 1; alcoholism, 1; cancer, 5; phthisis pulmonalis, 16; pneumonia, 9; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 13; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 1; gastritis, enteritis and peritonitis, 10, and drowning, 1. The number of deaths from surgical operations was the same in two successive weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 123 were in institutions, 343 in tenement-houses, 137 in houses containing three families or less, 8 in hotels and boarding-houses, 7 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 15 were on the basement floor, 114 on the first, 145 on the second, 124 on the third, 59 on the fourth, 25 on the fifth, 6 on the sixth; 618 were stated to be residents of New York City and 3 non-residents; 58 were stated to be single, 156 married, 56 widowed, and the condition of 351 was not stated—these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 621; still-births, 69; bodies in transitu, 10. Of the total burial permits issued for city and still-births, 68 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 632 births, 244 marriages, 69 still-births; 621 deaths, 10 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated; 126 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 7 transcripts of the birth record, 5 of marriage, and 65 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending October 11, 1884, was 63.1 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.912, the mean humidity was 81, saturation being 100; the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,090, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.02 inches depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph. D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 605 deaths and still-births, or 87.68 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 12; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 253; City pauper burial ground (undenominational), 101; Greenwood (undenominational), 29; Lutheran (undenominational), 95; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 16; Evergreen (undenominational), 37; Woodlawn (undenominational), 17; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 11; Union (Methodist Protestant), 1; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 6; Macphelah, L. From Commissioners of the Sinking Fund—Transmitting copy of resolution, adopted September 30th ultimo, authorizing the issue of Dock bonds, to the amount of \$250,000.

From Counsel to the Corporation—In reference to the action brought by Mary F. Connolly against the Mayor, etc., and requesting Department to furnish him with a copy of the lease (or the original lease itself) of Pier, new 26, North river, made to the Old Dominion Steamship Company. The Secretary's stating that by direction of the Commissioners he had transmitted the original lease of the said premises to the Counsel to the Corporation, his action was approved.

From Board of Aldermen—Requesting Commissioners to attend a meeting of the Committee on Markets, on Thursday, 9th instant, at 12 o'clock P. M., in relation to the lease to the Fulton Market Fish Mongers Association. Invitation accepted.

From Fire Department—In reference to the building erected on the Pier, foot of Fifty-seventh street, North River. Referred to Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report.

From Municipal Service Examining Board:

1st. Transmitting list of occupations which are to be considered as laborers and exempt from examinations.

2d. Informing the Board that there will be an examination for watchmen on Friday, October 10th instant, at 4 o'clock, P. M.

From A. F. Higgins, Chairman Standing Committee on Harbor and Shipping of Chamber of Commerce—Requesting Department to inform him if any extensive changes are contemplated in the dock fronts on the East river, between Grand and Thirty-fourth street, and if so, requesting all the information in possession of the Department in respect thereto. Secretary directed to furnish the desired information.

From Cornelius Hagan—Requesting permission to sink a barge in order to form a bulkhead, etc., on north side East One Hundred and Seventh street, fifty-five feet from Avenue A. Application denied.

From Bridgeport Steamboat Company—Requesting permission to drive twenty-one piles underneath Pier 35, East river, at the outer end, under the coal bunker. Permission granted, the said work to be done under the supervision and direction of the Engineer-in-Chief.

From Henry Du Bois Sons—Requesting permission to drive thirty-one piles for the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, inside of the abutment guard of the Harlem Railroad Bridge on Harlem river. Permission granted, the work to be done under the supervision and direction of the Engineer-in-Chief.

5th. Reporting that two bearing-piles are broke on the north end of Store-house Pier at Blackwell's Island, East river, and recommending that the said piles be pulled up and two new ones driven thereat. Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to do the work.

6th. Reporting in relation to the delivery of granite for Pier A, North river.

7th. Reporting the completion of repairs to Pier foot of Horatio street, North river, by the Contractor. Secretary directed to notify the Dock Master that the Pier is ready for use for the berthing of vessels thereat.

8th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 2070, that the Pier foot of West Twenty-eighth street, North river, was kept in good order until closed.

9th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 2300, that he had superintended and directed the work of removing that part of the Platform on piles between One Hundred and Nineteenth and One Hundred and Twentieth streets, Harlem river, which was built outside of the existing lines by Robert Murray; the work was begun August 19, 1884, and finished August 27, 1884; the Platform is now on the established Bulkhead line. Secretary directed to advise the Counsel to the Corporation that the obstruction complained of as an illegal construction erected on the Harlem river between One Hundred and Nineteenth and One Hundred and Twentieth streets, has been removed by Mr. Murray, and that the suit brought by Mr. Murray enjoining the Department from removing the same can be readily disposed of, as no cause therefor now exists.

10th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 2349, that the filling is practically finished between Seventy-second and Seventy-sixth street, North river.

11th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 2814, in reference to repairing the damage done by the steamer "Baluc" to Pier, new 45, North river.

## AQUEDUCT COMMISSION.

Minutes of Stated Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, held at their office, No. 78 Tribune Building, Wednesday, October 15, 1884, at 3 o'clock P. M.

Commissioners present—The Mayor, The Comptroller, Commissioners James C. Spencer and William Dowd.

Also, Chief-Engineer Church, Consulting Engineer Davis, Executive Engineer Fiteley, Engineer of Construction Craven, and Assistant Engineer Birdsall, of the Department of Public Works.

The minutes of the stated meeting of October 8th were read and approved.

The Committee of Finance and Audit reported the examination and audit of bills included in vouchers Nos. 365 to 371; and on motion of the Comptroller the said vouchers were approved and ordered certified to the Comptroller for payment.

Final Plan Sheet No. 12, of the Gate-house at Croton Dam, and Sheet No. 13 (in three parts) of the blow-offs upon the line of the Aqueduct, were then certified and acknowledged by the Commissioners, and the Secretary directed to transmit one copy to the Commissioner of Public Works for filing in his office.

Chief-Engineer Church verbally reported upon the forms for specifications and contracts for the various sections in Westchester County, and stated that he had not yet been able to submit the same to the Consulting Engineer, but would do so shortly, and be prepared to submit them formally to the Commissioners by the time of their next meeting.

On motion of the Mayor, the Chief-Engineer and Secretary were directed to complete the forms and to submit them to the Special Committee on Forms for examination, and report to the Commissioners as soon as practicable.

The Secretary stated that the numerous applications for copies of the specifications and contract might exhaust the number previously ordered by the Commissioners before the day of letting.

On motion of Commissioner Spencer, the Secretary was authorized to order as many additional copies as he found necessary, not exceeding five hundred in all.

The Chief-Engineer presented a report from Engineer of Construction Craven, dated October 14, in relation to the procurement of certain instruments and apparatus for making measurements upon the tunnel; which report, upon motion of the Mayor, was referred to the Committee of Finance and Audit, with power.

The Secretary presented the forms for bids (and envelopes for their inclosure), which were approved by the Commissioners.

The Comptroller then offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That this Board appoint some suitable person, who shall be designated "Purveyor for the Aqueduct Commissioners," to act as purchaser of supplies, under the direction of the Board, who shall from time to time, as this Board may direct, make sale at public auction to the highest bidder of all materials not required or unfit for the uses of the Commissioners; and to collect and receive the proceeds of any such sale, and within twenty-four hours after such collection, to transmit said proceeds to this Board for deposit as may be by this Board directed.

The said Purveyor shall enter into bonds in the sum of two thousand dollars for the faithful discharge of the duties of his office.

Which resolution was adopted unanimously.

The Comptroller next offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That Daniel D. Foote be and he is hereby appointed Purveyor for the Aqueduct Commissioners, at an annual salary of twelve hundred dollars.

After discussion, the last resolution was laid over for further consideration and future action. The Commissioners then adjourned.
