

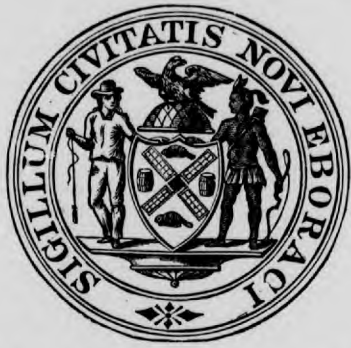

Report for the Quarter Ending March 31, 1878.

To the Honorable SMITH ELY, Jr.,
Mayor of the City of New York:

SIR—Pursuant to section 27 of chapter 335 of the Laws of 1873, the Board of Police of the Police Department of the City of New York hereby respectfully submits the following report of the operations and transactions of the Police Department, for the three months ending March 31, 1878:

REPORT.

On the 31st day of March, 1878, the number of members of the force, of the several grades, including Surgeons, was 2,536.

SICK TIME.

The time lost by members of the Police Force, by reason of sickness, disability, and injuries, for the quarter ending March 31, 1878, and the details thereof, are shown in the annexed table, marked "A," from which it will be seen that the time lost was 8,364½ days:

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending April 27, 1878. The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,350, as follows, viz. :

2 public buildings, 535 tenement-houses, 133 private dwellings, 93 other dwellings, 11 manufactories and workshops, 36 stores and warehouses, 33 stables, 30 slaughter-houses, 1 roadway, 14 fat-rendering establishments, 7 soap manufactories, 8 manure dumps, 2 public sewers, 2 garbage dumps, 31 sunken and vacant lots, 37 yards, courts, and areas, 39 cellars and basements, 130 waste-pipes and drains, 98 privies and water-closets, 18 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 5 dangerous stairways, 1 cess-pool, 1 piggery, 3 smoky chimneys, 11 other nuisances, together with 69 visits of the Sanitary Inspectors to cases of contagious disease.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 530.

During the past week 154 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 78 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

122 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 41 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 34 houses, 34 privy-sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

1 case of small-pox and 1 case of measles was removed to the hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

The following is a comparative statement of cases of contagious disease reported at this Bureau for the two weeks ending April 27, 1878 :

During the week ending April 27, 1878, there were issued from this Bureau 503 burial permits for city deaths, 26 for bodies in transit, and 34 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 503 deaths, 170 marriages, 502 births, 34 still-births, 26 applications for transit permits, and 50 returns from coroners. There were 42 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths, and 2 transcripts of birth record, 6 of marriage and 34 of death were issued from this Bureau.

W. DE F. DAY, M. D., Sanitary Superintendent and Register:

SIR—During the week ending Saturday, April 27, 1878, 503 deaths were reported to have occurred in this city. This is a decrease of 60, as compared with the preceding week, and an increase of 23 as compared with the number reported during the corresponding week of 1877. The actual mortality for the week ending April 20, was 551, which is 27 above the average for the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 26.52 per 1,000 inhabitants, the population estimated at 1,080,566.

The diseases which caused 20 deaths and over during the past week, were the following, viz.: phthisis pulmonalis, 75; pneumonia, 63; diseases of the brain and nervous system, 50; bronchitis, 35; scarlatina, 26; Bright's disease and nephritis, 21, and diseases of the heart, 21. The diseases that showed a decrease compared with the previous week were, measles, 5; diphtheria, 3; croup, 8; whooping cough, 4; erysipelas, 3; typhoid fever, 2; diarrhoeal diseases, 7; inanition, 2; alcoholism, 3; phthisis pulmonalis, 21; diseases of the heart, 1; scrofula and marasmus, 2; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 9; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 5; Bright's disease and nephritis, 2; cyanosis and atelectasis, 1; suicide, 1, and drowning, 3; while malarial fevers increased, 2; puerperal diseases, 4; rheumatism and gout, 2; cancer, 2; bronchitis, 7; pneumonia, 3; diseases of the brain and nervous system, 4; enteritis, gastritis, and peritonitis, 3; premature and pretermatural births, 6.

During the four weeks ending April 27, 1878, 51 deaths were reported from measles, 93 from scarlatina, 85 from diphtheria, 53 from croup, and 17 whooping cough; of this number 40 deaths from measles, 61 from scarlatina, 48 from diphtheria, 36 from croup, and 14 from whooping cough were in tenement-houses, while 8 deaths from measles, 31 from scarlatina, 32 from diphtheria, 13 from croup, and 3 from whooping cough were in houses containing three families and less; 2 from diphtheria were in hotels and boarding-houses, and 11 from measles, 1 from scarlatina, 3 from diphtheria, and 4 from croup were in institutions. It appears, therefore, that there were 307 deaths from these diseases during the past four weeks, of which 87 were in houses containing three families and less, 109 in tenement-houses, 2 in hotels and boarding-houses, and 19 in institutions, showing a percentage to the total mortality from these five diseases of 64.82 in tenement-houses, 28.33 in houses containing three families and less, 0.65 in hotels and boarding-houses, and 6.19 in institutions. The total mortality for these four weeks was 2,084, of which 383 were in institutions, 586 in houses containing three families and less, 1,060 in houses containing four families and more, 22 in hotels and boarding-houses, and 29 in rivers, streets, etc., showing a percentage to the total deaths of 18.38 in institutions, 28.11 in houses containing three families and less, 50.86 in houses containing four families and more, 1.05 in hotels and boarding-houses, and 1.39 in rivers, streets, etc. Thus, the comparison will show that from the five diseases above-mentioned there was an increase of 13.96 in tenement-houses, 0.22 in houses containing three families and less, showing that the death-rate for the past four weeks in tenement-houses from all causes was considerably less than the mortality from contagious diseases in the same class of dwellings.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 83 were in institutions, 248 in tenement houses, 159 in houses containing three families or less, 7 in hotels and boarding-houses, 5 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 11 were on the basement floor, 86 on the first, 143 on the second, 109 on the third, 55 on the fourth, 10 on the fifth; 500 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 3 non-resident; 49 were stated to be single, 135 married, 50 widowed, and the condition of 269 was not stated, these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The disposition of 476 deaths and still-births, or 88.64 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 9; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 194; City pauper burial-ground (undenominational), 57; Greenwood (undenominational), 38; Lutheran (undenominational), 76; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 23; Evergreen (undenominational), 35; Woodlawn (undenominational), 14; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 10; Union (Methodist Protestant), 1; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 4; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 4; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 5; Washington (undenominational), 6.

The distribution of deaths for the week ending April 20, 1878, was in the following wards, viz.: First, 4; Second, 1; Third, 0; Fourth, 7; Fifth, 7; Sixth, 13; Seventh, 15; Eighth, 15; Ninth, 25; Tenth, 29; Eleventh, 31; Twelfth, 41; Thirteenth, 12; Fourteenth, 12; Fifteenth, 6; Sixteenth, 20; Seventeenth, 43; Eighteenth, 33; Nineteenth, 103; Twentieth, 43; Twenty-first, 30; Twenty-second, 51; Twenty-third, 6; Twenty-fourth, 4.

The mean temperature for the week ending April 27, 1878, was 56.6 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.797, the mean humidity was 79, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,165, and the total amount of rain-fall was .67 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

AN ORDINANCE to amend sections 1 and 3 of chapter XXXII. of the Revised Ordinances.

The Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York, in Common Council convened, do ordain as follows:

Sections 1 and 3 of chapter XXXII. of the Revised Ordinances are hereby amended so as to read as follows:

§ 1. In all cases of blasting rock or stones within the City of New York, each blast, before firing it, shall be securely covered with six timbers of oak or hickory not less than four inches thick, ten inches wide, and ten feet long each, to be placed over and around each charge, and which said timbers shall be securely fastened together by an iron or steel chain, the links of which shall not be less than one inch in diameter, and which said timbers shall also be held in place by at least five hundred pounds of large stones piled on top of them.

§ 3. For every violation of either of the preceding sections of this chapter the offending party, upon complaint and conviction thereof before a police justice, shall be liable to a fine of twenty-five dollars, and stand committed until the same is paid.
