

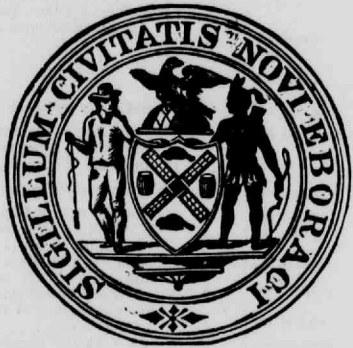

COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND.

Abstract of the Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at the meeting held July 23, 1879.

Present—Hon. Edward Cooper, Mayor (Chairman); Hon. John K. Hackett, Recorder; Hon. John Kelly, Comptroller; J. Nelson Tappan, Esq., Chamberlain; and Nicholas Haughton, Esq., Chairman Finance Committee Board of Aldermen.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.
The Comptroller called up the agreement drawn by the Counsel to the Corporation, between the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York, and Francis B. Spinola and associates, submitted at the last meeting, and moved that the same be approved and referred to the Comptroller to be executed.

At the request of the Recorder the contract was read.
The Mayor moved that the motion of the Comptroller be laid upon the table. Which was adopted; the Mayor, Recorder, and Chairman of the Finance Committee Board of Aldermen voting in the affirmative, and the Comptroller and Chamberlain in the negative.

A confirmatory deed to Sabina Wendel and others, and a satisfaction of mortgages to John Wendel, prepared by the Counsel to the Corporation, in response to the resolution of this Board, adopted June 27, 1879, were received; whereupon the following resolution, submitted by the Comptroller, was, on motion, adopted, viz. :

Resolved, That the Mayor be authorized, on behalf of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, to execute the confirmatory deed of the premises on the northwest corner of Third avenue and Fifty-fifth street, to Sabina Wendel and others, widow and heirs at law of John Wendel, deceased; also to execute the satisfaction of mortgages on such premises, as prepared by the Counsel to the Corporation, and that the same be delivered to the heirs of John Wendel, deceased.

The Comptroller submitted the report of William Kennelly, as to the value of premises known as Fulton Market, which, at the request of the Committee representing the standholders in said market, was laid over to the next meeting.

The Comptroller submitted the following report on the petition of the Orphans' Home and Asylum of the Protestant Episcopal Church in New York, for renewal of lease of land now occupied by said Home and Asylum :

The Comptroller, to whom was referred the petition of The Orphans' Home and Asylum of the Protestant Episcopal Church in New York, for a renewal of the lease of premises occupied by them on the west side of Lexington avenue, extending 305 feet along the south side of Forty-ninth street, together with a certified copy of chapter 457 of the laws of 1879, authorizing the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to renew the lease heretofore made of such premises to the petitioners, would report :

That the term of the existing lease to this institution will expire on the first day of May, 1881, the rent reserved being \$1 per annum. A number of leases of city property having been given to charitable institutions for long terms, and this society being fully organized and in successful opera-

tion, I would advise that their petition be granted, and that a new term of twenty-one years be given with an annual rent of \$1; the same covenants and restrictions to be inserted in the new lease as were contained in the original grant made on April 26, 1861.

Whereas, By chapter 457 of the Laws of 1879, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund are authorized to renew the lease made to the Orphans' Home and Asylum of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the City of New York, for a period of twenty-one years from the date of the expiration of the same, at a nominal rent of one dollar per year, as provided in said lease, or to grant a new lease of the said premises upon the same terms and conditions as are provided in such lease about to expire.

Resolved, That a lease for a term of twenty-one years from May 1, 1881, at one dollar per annum, of the premises at the southwest corner of Forty-ninth street and Lexington avenue, 305 feet on Forty-ninth street, and 100 feet 5 inches on Lexington avenue, be made to the Orphans' Home and Asylum of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the City of New York, the terms and conditions of the new lease, except as herein stated, to be the same as those of the present lease; that the Counsel to the Corporation cause the same to be prepared, and that the Mayor be authorized to execute such lease on behalf of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

The Comptroller submitted the following report on the application of standholders in that part of Fulton Market which was damaged by fire in June, 1879, for "a rebate of three weeks market fees :"

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund :

GENTLEMEN—Application has been made, by a number of the standholders in Fulton market, for a rebate of three weeks market fees, being for the time in which they were without a covering in consequence of the burning of the roof of such market in June, 1879.

In this case the Superintendent of Markets reports that the centre part of the roof of Fulton Market was damaged by fire in the night of June 14, 1879, and that the persons making application for a release from rent were standholders in that part of the market that was damaged; that they were without a roof for about the time stated in the petition, and that such remission of rent would be right and just.

The annexed resolution, authorizing a remission of rent for three weeks, is submitted for the action of this Board.

That on an examination of the record of the deed from the City of New York to Edward J. King, dated May 1, 1850, the common seal of the city does not appear affixed thereto. The petitioner states that after diligent search made by her, she has been unable to find the original deed, so that the error in the record cannot be corrected therefrom. Davenport.

The Comptroller, in response to the resolution of this Board, adopted May 15, 1879, reported the appraisal, by William Kennelly, of the value of vacant lot on Mangin and Tompkins streets, one hundred and fifty-two feet six and a quarter inches north of Rivington street, which, on motion, was laid over for consideration.
